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Better grades

Illinois school report card shows scores, grad rates up

SPRINGFIELD – Elementary and secondary students in Illinois showed consistent improvements in their reading and math scores while the state's high school graduation rate reached a 13-year high for the most recently concluded school year.

Those are some of the conclusions from the most recent annual statewide school report card, released Monday by the Illinois State Board of Education. The report includes data from the 2022-23 academic year, including results of the standardized tests that students took in the spring.

Although statewide average proficiency rates remained below pre-pandemic levels, the results showed improvement over the

New coach

Brimfield hires AD Kreiter as baseball coach for '24

BRIMFIELD – The new Brimfield-Elmwood high school baseball coach isn't exactly new. Not to the school and not to the sport, contrary to what some current students might think.

Without discussion and by unanimous vote Oct. 25, the Brimfield School Board approved Kevin Kreiter to lead the Indians' varsity for the 2024 season.

Kreiter replaces Brandon Porter, who in May after 10 years and a 232-86-1 record was not rehired following his alleged mismanagement of about \$13,000 in program-related funds.

"We just hope to have a good season and kind of put some of this bad stuff behind us," Brimfield Superintendent Chad Jones said regarding Kreiter's hire.

Porter, whose teams won five regional and three sectional titles, remains a Brimfield teacher.

A 1982 Brimfield graduate, Kreiter is the school's athletics director, a job in which he'll remain. Over the past two decades at Brimfield, Kreiter has been a head coach and/or an assistant in golf and boys basketball.

Kreiter's baseball experience isn't recent, but it's notable. In high school, Kreiter was an honorable-mention all-stater and pitched the first no-hitter in Brimfield history, he said. He played in college and in the Kickapoo Valley and Sunday Morning amateur leagues. Kreiter also once was a Brimfield baseball assistant at the high school and grade-school levels.

"I told the kids I need to answer, 'What

Pipeline battles far from over in central Illinois

Although the Navigator CO2 pipeline project has been canceled, another company is proposing to build a similar pipeline from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, to Decatur.

Wolf Carbon Solutions filed an application with the Illinois Commerce Commission on June 16 to build the 166-mile Illinois portion of the line. The pipeline would transport liquified CO2 under pressure from ethanol plants and other entities to a site near Decatur. There it would be pumped into sandstone several thousand feet below the surface.

The proposed route of the WCS pipeline enters Illinois in the Quad Cities area and passes

through Henry, Stark and Peoria counties. In Peoria County, the route passes very near the towns of Laura, Brimfield, Oak Hill, Hanna City, Smithville and Mapleton.

Some along the route are not happy about the project and have held meetings to inform residents and mobilize opposition. A meeting held in Hanna City on Oct. 24 drew a large crowd of concerned citizens.

Residents opposed to the project cite the risk of a pipeline failure releasing a cloud of carbon dioxide and suffocating anyone caught up in it. They contend such a failure is a very real possibility because the CO2 is under very high pressure, 3,200 psi, twice

that of a natural-gas pipeline.

In 2020, such a pipeline fracture occurred about a mile from the town of Satartia, Miss., discharging CO2 for several hours before it was shut down. A cloud of CO2 settled in the area, causing more than 200 people to be evacuated and 45 hospitalized.

Gaseous CO2 is heavier than air and settles close to the ground, displacing breathable air. A person or animal caught up in a cloud of CO2 can suffocate for lack of oxygen. Combustion engines cease running for lack of air.

Pipeline company representatives point out that the Satartia incident is a rare event and that they follow all federal and state guidelines. Opponents say the problem is there are no state guidelines in Illinois. Instead,

Illinois relies on the U.S. Department of Transportation's Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration.

Illinois State Sen. Steve McClure has called for a moratorium on CO2 pipeline construction for two years or until new federal regulations are passed. As of now, for example, there are no regulations regarding the placement of pipelines in relation to a school or hospital.

Pipeline opponents are also concerned about possible contamination of wells and underground aquifers near injection sites. Some researchers say if CO2 leaked from an injection site, chemical reactions could cause harmful contaminants to enter the groundwater.

Other scientists dispute the

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IDOT to get involved in railroad crossing dispute

Formal pro-and-con arguments probably will be aired publicly in early 2024 regarding the possible closure of a railroad crossing in Millbrook Township.

An evidentiary hearing is likely to be scheduled during a status hearing Dec. 20, Illinois Commerce Commission Judge Latrice Kirkland-Montague said Tuesday.

She spoke during a commission status hearing regarding a BNSF Railway request to close its unguarded crossing at Whittaker Road, about a mile east of Laura.

BNSF cited safety reasons and lack of crossing use as cause for

closure, according to its petition to the commission.

Township officials said the crossing should remain open because oversized farm equipment uses it and proposed detours are inefficient and unsafe.

Township representatives suggested the Illinois Department of Transportation should become part of the hearing process, considering BNSF has recommended a state highway as a possible detour.

During the hearing Tuesday, BNSF attorney Matthew Hammer agreed.

"It's correct and proper, given the routes that are affected here," said

Matthew Warner, a Peoria-based attorney for the township.

Illinois Route 78 is located west of the Whittaker Road crossing. A bridge carries the railroad tracks above Route 78. Township Road Commissioner Matt Perham said the clearance isn't high enough to accommodate combines, among other farm equipment.

Public notice must be posted at least 10 days before the evidentiary hearing, according to Hammer.

There was no indication where and how such a hearing might be held.

The status hearing Tuesday was conducted electronically.

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

A picture is worth countless memories

The slightly fuzzy, somewhat over-exposed photograph captures a care-free moment in my brother Christian's childhood. The three-year-old is wearing just a pair of shorts and a bewildered grin. His bare feet and shirtless body confirm what the one edge of 3½-inch square, black-and-white photo already reveals: it's "Aug 68."

I might have guessed the year because right behind him is parked the "Blue Goose," our family's pet name for a used, blue 1961 Ford Galaxie my parents bought after my two older siblings, Richard and Peggy, began to drive. It looks more like a billowy summer cloud atop four black discs than fat-feathered fowl.

The Goose sits on a patch of gravel next to our three-sided machine shed. My parents never parked it or the family car, a mid-1960s Ford station wagon, in the shed where some half-awake hired man might nick either on their way to the nearby Havoline oil barrels or, Holy Moses, clobber 'em with a tractor or implement.

Despite the preventive parking, the Goose got cooked - mangled - by Uncle Honey, Dad's machinery-bending uncle, one fall Sunday noon. It was a classic Honey hit: He simply plowed into the Goose's passenger rear panel as he backed an

1850 Oliver and its semi-mounted, five-bottom plow out of the machinery shed and into the parked car.

There was no squawk, honk or alarmed gasp. In true Honey fashion, the sound of grinding metal and sight of flying chrome went completely unnoticed. Without so much as a glance back, Honey then kicked the 1850 into road gear and roared off to plow something else - telephone poles, cows, the heifer barn and maybe a stubble field.

There's another car in the photo that captures the still-intact Goose: hired man Jackie's super sweet, '68 Ford Fairlane 500. Like the Ford Mustang of that vintage, the car's key design features were a very un-Jackie, very non-farm sloping fast-back rear window and trunk that went downhill before sliding into its tail lights.

Jackie called the car "Turtleback" because the trunk lid, almost hidden in the smooth, downward sweep of the car's rear, opened to reveal a cavern deep enough to hold a month of groceries or a week of firewood.

Quiet, purposeful Jackie, however, used it as a locked vault for his most necessary possessions - a well-oiled, 12-gauge pump shotgun, a pair of six-buckle overshoes, a rubber raincoat and a week's stash of unopened Velvet tobacco cans and enough cigarette papers to roll the Velvet in "homemades."

(If he was feeling flush, he'd treat himself to a pack of "store-boughts.")

The Fairlane was Jackie's midlife-

crisis car and he was proud of it. He had traded an owlish, practical Ford Falcon and a wad of sweat-earned cash to buy it outright and he never parked it where Honey might clip it with a silage wagon or sickle mower.

And no one - not his older brother Howard, not my dad, and certainly not my brothers and me - were allowed to drive the modest Mustang wannabe other than the wiry, over-all-wearing Jackie even if it was just a mile from its usual parking spot to the house he shared with his brothers, Howard and Orlie.

It's a rock-solid safe bet that Honey didn't even notice Jackie's new car. Remember, this was a person who was so singularly focused on the task in front of him that fateful Sunday that he never noticed our 3,500-pound Blue Goose behind him.

Worse, my family was just sitting down to a fried chicken dinner that day so we heard and saw the plucking from start to finish.

Dad, who already had many weary memories of Uncle Honey "incidents," said nothing. It was Sunday, his day off, and a platter of fried chicken and an afternoon nap were staring him in the face. I heard a long sigh, then a quiet, "Let's pray."

"For what," my mother asked sharply, "dinner or Honey?"

 does Coach Kreiter know about baseball?" he said one day after he was OK'd. "It's just one of those things where the program really hasn't needed anybody, and I've had my own sons involved in college golf for so many years that it wasn't even a thought to get involved."

Part of why Kreiter is getting involved now is because the few applicants for the baseball job didn't have enough experience or other attributes, according to Jones. The district also didn't have teaching positions available.

"I wanted to be there for the kids," said Kreiter, who also said he pursued the position. "Being a teacher, you're around the kids all the time, and it's a fantastic group of kids and it was just a way to be there for them. ... When you get to be my age, this is not about me."

Jones suggested Kreiter was the right fit for the program following Porter,

whose dismissal wasn't without controversy. Dozens of parents and players attended board meetings during which Porter's status was discussed. Some of the debates between the public and officials were acrimonious.

Contentiousness hasn't abated completely. Only six people attended the board meeting last week, but among them was Jessica Higgs, mother of a former player. She suggested Kreiter, as athletics director, was as culpable as Porter regarding the alleged financial mismanagement.

Higgs also questioned Kreiter's commitment to his new duties.

"We have had tremendous success recently at Brimfield, and every one of those teams has a coach that goes above and beyond the call of duty," she said. "If we are going to lose a coach who embodied our values, we need to hire a coach who at least

needs to match that energy."

Jones disputed Higgs' characterization. He said Kreiter worked with B-E players over the summer and has continued to do so, along with other coaches. The board also authorized Josh Johnson, the junior-high baseball coach, to be a Kreiter assistant. Porter had coached the junior-high team as well.

Like the others, Kreiter's coaching assignment is for only one year. Kreiter said he has no time frame in mind, but last week he sounded ready for opening day.

"I think our coaching staff isn't interested in maintaining. We're looking to get better," Kreiter said. "I don't mean any arrogance in that. I think if you're taking over a pro-

gram, that's your goal with anybody. We're looking forward to that."

In addition to Kreiter and Johnson, the board authorized hiring Kadie Seneca as a Brimfield Grade School second-shift custodian, Melissa Smith as a grade-school full-time paraprofessional and Ryan Wetherill as a grade-school special-education paraprofessional. The board accepted the resignation of cafeteria worker Nancy Satterfield, effective at the end of the first semester.

The board also approved a \$48,185.49 contract with Heart Technologies Inc. of East Peoria for 20 security cameras at the grade school and a request for 12 students and a chaperone to attend the National FFA Convention this week in Indianapolis.

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REPORT CARD: Chronic absenteeism a worry

Continued from Page 1 previous year across all demographic categories.

“Educators and families should be proud of the remarkable progress we see on the 2023 Illinois report card while remaining focused on understanding and meeting the students’ academic and social emotional needs at this phase of recovery,” State Superintendent of Education Tony Sanders said during a media briefing.

Robin Steans, president of the education advocacy group Advance Illinois, agreed that the report was positive overall but said it also contains cautionary information, especially regarding racial achievement gaps and attendance rates.

The annual report card offers a look at how well schools, districts and the state as a whole are performing across a wide range of indicators. In ad-

dition to student performance on standardized tests, the report includes information about student demographics, graduation rates, college readiness, career and technical education and school faculty.

Overall, the biggest area of improvement over the last year was in English language arts, where the proficiency rate rose from 29.9% to 34.6%.

That’s still below the 37.4% proficiency rate in the 2018 to 2019 school year – the last before the COVID-19 pandemic caused major interruptions the next few years.

Math scores also improved in 2023, although the gains were less significant and the overall proficiency rate remained below pre-pandemic levels. White students scored proficiency rates of 35.6%, compared to 14.3% for Hispanic stu-

dents and 8% for Black students. The statewide proficiency rate rose by just over one percentage point, to 26.9%, while all demographic groups gained on their scores.

The report card also includes indicators of how well students are progressing toward a successful completion of the preK-12 experience and how ready they will be to enter college or the workforce.

In 2023, 87.4% of ninth-graders were on track to graduate – up from 86.6% in 2022, and the same 86.6% in 2019. According to ISBE, students who finish their ninth-grade year on track are nearly four times as likely to graduate from high school as those

who are not on track.

Perhaps more significant is that in 2023, the four-year graduation rate stood at 87.6%, the highest level recorded in at least 13 years. Black and Hispanic students also saw gains in graduation rates.

One area of concern reflected in the report card was the rate of chronic absenteeism among students. Last year, 28.7% of students were classified as chronically absent – still well above the pre-pandemic level of 17.5%. The rate was higher for minority and low-income students: 42.1% for Black students; 34.5 for Hispanic students; and 38.2 percent for students classified as low income.

claim, saying CO2 that has been trapped naturally underground for over 100,000 years has produced no significant levels of contaminants.

Landowners and farmers are concerned about the loss of crop yields in the path of the pipeline. The company says it will make every effort to prevent valuable topsoil from being mixed with subsoil. Nevertheless, farmers say that soil compaction is inevitable because of the heavy equipment involved. Productivity of disturbed land after the pipeline is completed will be reduced for several years. The company acknowledges the

problem and says it will reimburse farmers.

Another concern is potential damage to field tile systems. Reconnecting tiles severed by trenching equipment is no easy task.

On Oct. 24, Brett Seagle, an engineer for the Illinois Commerce Commission and the case manager for the WCS project, testified that the majority of public comments to the commission were negative and that many landowners will not voluntarily enter into a lease agreement.

If a voluntary agreement for lease cannot be negotiated with a landowner, the company can resort to the use of eminent domain. Wolf Carbon Solutions in-

sists it considers eminent domain a last resort.

Seagle said it appears Wolf has not executed any voluntary easements with landowners yet. In his opinion, using eminent domain to obtain the majority of the land for a project indicates that it is not in the public interest. In his testimony, Seagle also noted that WCS had not yet signed a formal agreement with Archer Daniels Midland Co., its major customer, nor had the company signed final agreements with other customers.

He also said PMHSA is in the process of strengthening its CO2 pipeline regulations. If WCS were to build its pipeline before the new standards were in effect, the project could be out of compliance. Based on his findings, Seagle recommended the WCS project be denied.

Navigator CO2 said it dropped plans to construct a pipeline because of "the unpredictable nature of the regulatory and government processes involved." It's been reported, however, that the company could secure leases with only 15% of landowners.

At the Hanna City meeting, John Feltham, Knox County farmer and retired Marine attorney, said it is absolutely necessary that landowners in the pipeline's path hire an attorney before signing anything.

And not just any attorney. He said it's essential to hire a lawyer who is experienced in negotiating leases and eminent-domain situations.

Illinois' geology makes it a prime target for pipeline companies eager to cash in on 2021 legislation that provides billions in tax credits. Currently there are 5,000 miles of CO2 pipelines nationally, but some experts predict the nation will need 65,000 miles to meet President Biden's net-zero goal.

Attendees at the Hanna City meeting were urged to become fully informed and to visit noillinoisco2pipelines.org.

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
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Peoria-area home sales down 8% for 3rd quarter

PEORIA – A low inventory of homes is one cause for an 8.5% decline in home sales in the Peoria area for the third quarter, according to The Peoria Area Association of Realtors.

PAAR announced that for the first nine months of 2023, home sales are down 12.5 percent from 2022. Sales in the third quarter totaled 1,663. Year to date, 4,501 homes have been

sold in the PAAR area.

Average sale price of homes sold in the third quarter was \$188,521 compared to \$168,334 in the third quarter of 2022.

“It all comes back to low inventory,” said Bill McCarthy, PAAR president. “Since COVID we’ve seen a lack of inventory, a fact which drives home prices up.”

The average time a house was on the market was 21

days, down from an average of 89 days on the Peoria market in 2020.

Peoria’s housing situation mirrors a national downturn. The National Association of Realtors reported a 15.4% decline in

home sales in September.

The average sale price of homes sold in the Peoria area over the first nine months of 2023 was \$178,057. Nationally, the median sale price was \$394,300.

Brenda was born Nov. 17, 1957, in Peoria, Ill., a daughter of Gerald and Lois (Sering) Bibo. She never married ... but she always had a boyfriend. That includes her sweetheart of the last 10 years, Jesse "Sweetie Pie," who always made her smile when they talked about love.

It wasn't easy to move from Illinois to Wisconsin to Wyoming to Montana to Colorado to Arizona to Oregon. Dad was a hospital administrator who changed jobs a lot. Brenda was a young woman with developmental disabilities. Every change was hard. But Brenda always had her brothers and sisters. And she always had friends (and boyfriends). Maybe because she loved to please others. Even when she was hurting, it could be hard to get a straight answer from Brenda.

"I'm fine," she would say. "Getting better." Brenda loved holidays. Christmas. Easter. Halloween. Her birthday. All good. Time to dress up, decorate, see family, eat a big meal. But Christmas turkey or Easter ham couldn't beat her all-time favorite fried chicken. Dad used to say that when Brenda finally finished a piece of chicken it looked like a fossil.

She loved music, particularly Donny and Marie Osmond and Andy Williams. She loved movies, particularly musicals. Brenda may have held the world record for viewing "The Wizard of Oz" — perhaps 1,000 times, including once a day during the pandemic — closely followed by "Cinderella," "The Three Stooges," "The Flintstones" and "Willy Wonka." Her sibs have been known to wake up in the middle of the night hearing Oompa Loompa voices.

Whenever she had the opportunity, Brenda worked. Diligently. At various times she assembled medical kits, Comcast remotes and

Ruger magazines. She often worked in recycling centers, sorting paper and metal.

"I'm in the can business," she would say with great pride.

It's too bad everyone doesn't share her work ethic.

Brenda was also a social person, participating in Special Olympics, bowling, field trips, parties and dances. She didn't say much. She usually listened. But if asked, she was known to perform the hula for her brothers and sisters during their weekly Zoom meetings.

"See you next Sunday!" she would say.

For more than 20 years, Brenda made her home with Edwards Center. That was the center of her world, especially during the pandemic. That's where she made friends like Sue and Cheryl and Melanie and that's where she met Jesse. Few people could visit the group homes in person during lockdown. It was especially difficult when Brenda needed treatments for cancer, which manifested shortly after COVID-19 appeared. Despite the isolation, she responded well to that first bout.

This summer, the cancer re-appeared in a more aggressive form. Brenda had blood clots and infections. Her kidneys failed. Her blood pressure tanked. She needed regular dialysis and constant care for six weeks after being rushed to Providence St. Vincent Medical Center in late July. Although the multiple medical messages/treatments were confusing, almost every person on staff was compassionate and professional. Hospitals can be humiliating places, but her sibs were there 24/7 and witnessed almost total respect for Brenda's personal dignity.

"Thank you for saving my life," she told the folks in ICU. Still, even a trooper admitted the increasing pain was "no fun."

Brenda was preceded in death by her parents, her sister, Julie, and her cat, Keiko. She is survived by her father's close companion, Rae Winstone of Silverton, Ore.; her sisters, Terry (Bill) Knight of Elmwood and Laura Bibo (Joe Rogers) of Tualatin, Ore.; sister-in-law Midge Cook of Spokane, Wash.; her brothers, Mark (Amelia) Bibo of Gresham, Ore., and Matt (Felice Leonhardt) Bibo of Beaverton, Ore.; 13 nieces



"We just took it to them in the second half physically," R-W Coach Grant Gullstrand said. "I guess if there was a time for it to all come together, it would be in the playoffs. I don't know what it was, exactly, but they were firing on all cylinders."

It all brought the Cougars home for a game at 2 p.m. Saturday in Oneida against Stark County. It'll be the fourth time in a year those Lincoln-

Land Conference small-division rivals have played each other. R-W won twice in 2022, including in the first round of the postseason. On Sept. 29, Stark County won 24-14.

"They know everything that we do, and we know everything that they do," Gullstrand said about the undefeated Rebels. "It's going to be fun."

The Cougars had fun before and during their game at Sterling High School against Newman (7-3), winner of six state championships.

Gullstrand said his players' loosey-goosey pregame routine might have been a clue. They were grooving to a pop song straight out of a junior-high dance, according to their coach.

"I'm not quite sure how many other teams are as strange as we are," Gullstrand said jokingly. "You could tell they weren't stressed out or freaked out about the moment."

"That stadium was bigger than anything we've seen before. There wasn't one 'Look at this' or 'Look at that.' Right from the get-go, you can tell we had a chance."

That became evident from the first play. R-W recovered a too-high

Newman snap deep in Comets territory, and Brown scored from 4 yards within 90 seconds of kickoff.

"For a team that's had negative-51 yards on snaps over the quarterback's head, we were due for one of those," Gullstrand said.

Newman came back to lead 14-12 at halftime. But less than 90 seconds into the third quarter, R-W went ahead to stay, on Brown's 3-yard touchdown run.

"In the second half, they saw something they liked and they exposed it right away, and defensively we were kind of scrambling a little bit," Newman Coach Mike LeMay told Shaw Media.

Brown scored again with 5:22 left. Preston Schroeder's 27-yard pass to Talan Hull on a fake punt set up the TD and was a Newman backbreaker, Gullstrand said. An ensuing do-or-die Newman drive ended with a Devonte Noel interception.

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Emotional loss for Princeville vs. Stark County

WYOMING – It isn't unusual for a high school football player to cry following his final game. For Princeville senior quarterback Logan Carruthers, those tears might have been a little more intense.

The Princes came up just short in a 34-20 loss Oct. 27 to Stark County in a Class 1A postseason opener. That was painful enough for Carruthers. But not playing again for his father, Princeville Coach Jon Carruthers, and not again alongside his brother, freshman Collin Carruthers, might have hurt more.

"It was pretty emotional," said Logan Carruthers, who missed time earlier this season because of a dislocated shoulder. "I've battled back from injury and I've dealt with a lot of things, and for me to even make it to the playoffs, that's huge for me."

"A lot of emotions, but a lot of things to look back and be proud of in a couple of years."

The Princes (5-5) had no reason to be ashamed following this loss to the undefeated Rebels, who face ROWVA-Williamsfield at 2 p.m. Saturday in Oneida in the second round.

Princeville led 12-0 early in the second quarter at Gary Johnson Field. With about two minutes remaining in the third, the Princes led 20-13.

But Stark County (10-0) had the final three touchdowns of the game. Prolific passing from Stark County senior Luke Rewerts (164 yards overall) and big plays from junior teammate Nolan Orwig were keys.

"We came out and fired all our guns," Jon Carruthers said.

At the beginning, both teams might have been shooting blanks on of-

fense, at least.

Princeville senior Tayschaun Kieser intercepted Rewerts on the third play of the game. The Princes then drove to the Rebels' 1-yard line, but no farther. The resulting Stark County possession ended with a blocked punt and Princeville taking over at the opposing 9.

On fourth down, Logan Carruthers found Jake Williams in the deep-left corner of the end zone. Rewerts fumbled away the ball on his team's next play from scrimmage. Kieser's 2-yard scoring run on the ensuing drive came as the second period started.

It all reminded Coach Carruthers of how Princeville began its 48-28 regu-

lar-season loss Oct. 6 at Stark County. That time, Princeville limited the number of Stark County plays early and led first.

"Things were going our way, just like the first game," he said. "But it's a long game. You never feel comfortable with a lead in the first quarter."

Indeed, Rewerts ran 1 yard for a touchdown and passed 15 yards to Connor Wagenbach for another as Stark County led 13-12 at intermission. But as Stark County was driving at the Princeville 30 late in the third quarter, Rewerts fumbled. Princeville recovered.

With 2:14 remaining, as he was falling at the Stark County 3, Logan Carruthers pitched the ball forward to Kieser for a touchdown and a 20-13 Princeville lead. It took about 90 seconds and only five plays, including a 40-yard Rewerts pass, for Stark County to tie it, on his second 1-yard touchdown run.

In the fourth quarter, Rewerts completed consecutive passes of 12, 5 and 19 yards to three different receivers in a drive that ended at 3:49 when Chris Barnwell scored from 5 yards to give the Rebels a 27-20 lead.

Three minutes later,

Matthew Bowser intercepted Logan Carruthers and Orwig recovered the loose ball at the Princeville 38. On the next play, Orwig scored.

"I think all year in crunch time, we've been good," Stark County Coach Jade Noard said. "We have a lot of confidence going into the fourth quarter in a tight game."

Logan Carruthers finished with 117 yards passing and 49 rushing. Hope for the Princeville future came from sophomore Eli Christianson. He ran for a team-high 80 yards.

"The mud game, that's his style," Jon Carruthers said. "Once he started getting rolling, keep on feeding that guy."

The coach also was effusive regarding other Princeville underclassmen and their potential. The current seniors will have to watch their progress from afar, something Logan Carruthers had yet to process shortly after the game ended.

"It's going to take a long time," he said. "It's just a huge thing I'm leaving behind right now."

Farmers survive wild finish

Farmington rallies past Bismarck-Henning, then holds on for 28-23 victory

FARMINGTON – Lane Wheelwright used three words to summarize the final four minutes of the Farmington football team’s Class 2A first-round playoff game.

“I’m in disbelief,” the Farmers’ junior quarterback said.

Following a 28-23 victory Oct. 28 over Bismarck-Henning-Rossville-Alvin, Wheelwright probably had plenty of company.

Wheelwright and senior brother Jack Wheelwright erased a one-point deficit by connecting on a 7-yard touchdown pass with 44 seconds left in the game. Then Farmington (9-1) withstood a white-knuckle ride to the finish, capped when officials disallowed a B-H-R-A pass into the end zone at the final horn.

“It was crazy. Crazy game,” Farmington Coach Toby Vallas said. “Unfortunately, I’ve been in quite a few thrillers in the playoffs, but this is up there. It’s in the top two or three. Today it’s No. 1.”

No. 2 is next in the postseason for Farmington – a second-round game at 1 p.m. Saturday at second-ranked Bloomington Central Catholic (10-0). The Saints won their opener 47-0 over Mendon Unity-Payson Seymour.

Suffice it to say the Farmers’ first-round row was much tougher to hoe.

Farmington led 22-16 at intermission, but B-H-R-A (7-3) opened the second half with a methodical drive that consumed more than half the third quarter. It ended when Blue Devils quarterback Karson Stevenson ran into the end zone from 1 yard at 5:45 for a 23-22 lead.

Meanwhile, the second-half Farmington offense was stuck in neutral. The visitors from Vermilion County recovered two Farmington fumbles after Stevenson scored, and the game settled into a midfield mud battle.

But with 3:52 left in the fourth quarter and B-H-R-A driving at the

Farmington 43-yard line, Jerett Fauser forced Stevenson to fumble. Farmington recovered it. Carter Lambin and Tristan Passmore joined Fauser in spearheading that second-half defense, according to Vallas.

“The defense really bailed us out, because we were not good on offense,” he said. “We have not turned the ball over (like that) all year. They have a great team, and I think they were laying the wood. That was part of it.”

“We just told our kids, ‘Somebody has to cause a fumble. Great players make great plays. How many great players do we have? Somebody’s got to cause a fumble.’ Somebody did.”

Lane Wheelwright mixed his own rushing with a few passes to lead the Farmers to the Blue Devils 7. On first down, under pressure and rolling to his right with the clock ticking closer to zero, he passed to his brother for what proved to be the winning points.

“We knew he was rolling out. We weren’t quite fast enough to get him to the ground, and he did a nice job of staying in the play,” B-H-R-A Coach
