




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Elmwood Superintendent Wagner to take new job for '24-25

ELMWOOD - Chad Wagner will leave his job as Superintendent of Elmwood CUSD 322 at the end of this school year.

Wagner on Nov. 30 accepted a job as superintendent of Genoa-Kingston CUSD 424 in northern Illinois after approval by that district's school board.

He will start at Genoa-Kingston on July 1.

"It's exciting but bittersweet, all at the same time," said Wagner, who spent the past 10 years leading the Elmwood district. "I'll have 45 minutes from my

office to my fiancee's front door. It's a good move for us. The timing is right. Both my kids will be in college. It makes a lot of sense."

Wagner, 48, is engaged to Kristin Koopman, a Wisconsin native who owns an interior-design business in Janesville, Wis.

"Kristin, to no fault of her own, was born and raised a Packers fan and has called Wisconsin home her entire life," Wagner wrote to the Elmwood staff. "The time is now to look to a new challenge that will allow us to get closer to where she is from, while continuing my career as a superintendent."

The Elmwood School Board will meet Dec. 18 and hopes to have a job description ready to

post after that meeting, according to Board President Mark Davis.

"The sooner the better," Davis said. "We'd like to have the job posted for 30 days so we have as many applications as possible."

Davis said the tentative plan is to have Wagner's replacement hired in January or February.

"As you get farther into the calendar, it can get harder and harder to find superintendents," Davis said.

Still to be determined is which recruiting service, if any, the board will retain to help find candidates. A representative from the Illinois Association of School Boards will attend the Elmwood board's Dec. 18 meeting.

"We're going to decide whether we use someone to help us, or whether we beat the bushes ourselves." Davis said. "I think some people have already approached Chad (about Continued on Page 2

EYES IN THE SKIES

Farmington considering crimefighting cameras

FARMINGTON – Surveillance cameras are no longer just a Hollywood movie or big-city thing.

As prices drop and technology improves, more and more small towns and cities are signing up to use surveillance cameras to assist law enforcement. Farmington may soon join that list.

The Farmington City Council heard a presentation on FlockSafety cameras at Monday's meeting. The presenter was Deputy Vinnie Porcaro of the Fulton County Sheriff's Office, who said he is not paid by Flock, but is a strong believer in the company's license plate recognition



Flock Safety cameras are motion activated and automatically read license plates by snapping images that can be run through a national database to determine if a vehicle has been involved with illegal activity.

"Bad guys don't like these," he said. "Gangbangers don't like these cameras."

Flock cameras are motion activated and automatically read license plates by snapping images that are run through a national crime database. Police are alerted within 15 seconds if a car is involved with illegal activity.

Peoria installed 59 cameras last year and in November decided to buy 71 more. Peoria police officers say data from the cameras have helped solve crimes and led to the discovery of stolen vehicles and missing people.

Porcaro said cameras are spreading into Fulton County, with three in Cuba and six in Canton. Farm-

Water rates rising

Billtown increasing rates on Jan. 1

For The Weekly Post WILLIAMSFIELD -Municipal water in Williamsfield will be getting more expensive - now and in the future, probably.

Beginning Jan. 1, village water customers will be paying at least an extra \$10 a month. That additional charge is to help repay about \$2.75 million in loans for an ongoing village water-infrastructure project.

The monthly base rate of \$48.25 for all customers, good for 1,000 gallons of water, is unchanged. But for every additional 1,000 gallons used, the charge will rise from \$3.75 per month to \$10. The hike is to help erase an annual deficit of more than \$67,000 in village water operations.


In approving the increases without discussion Monday night, the Village Board accepted recommendations from an Illinois Rural Water Association study. Clark Cameron, a representative of the Taylorville-based group, suggested the new rates aren't outlandish.

"That's not really out of line with what I'm seeing," said Cameron, who assists water departments around the state. "You guys are pretty competitive with most towns I see.'

The additional gallons charge is to rise by 3% each January, beginning in 2025. That provision is designed to cover increased costs, according to the IRWA report.

"Customers very rarely comment on their water rates unless there is a size-Continued on Page 7

Wagner will become the fourth superintendent at Genoa-Kingston in the past year. Wagner has

more than 25 years of experience in education with 14 years as a superintendent. He received his undergraduate degree at the University of Northern Iowa and a master's de-

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gree at Northwest Mission with souri State. He earned his superintendent certification at Illinois State University and a doctorate at hern Aurora University.

Brent O'Daniell left Genoa-Kingston in June 2023 to take a job as superintendent at Beardstown. His interim replacement, Griffin Powell, stepped down Oct. 9 due to health issues.

Powell was replaced on an interim basis by Matt Cascio, the Genoa-Kingston High School principal.

At Elmwood, Wagner oversaw five major con-

struction projects that totaled about \$18 million, including a new juniorhigh building, a main commons addition, remodeling of the high school gym and locker rooms, a grade school HVAC replacement and the new Claude Keefer Industrial Arts Building.

Wagner also helped navigate the district through the COVID pandemic with fairly minimal angst compared to that experienced at some neighboring districts.

"I feel like I've done a lot at Elmwood and it's time to move on to a new challenge," Wagner said.


The district has also reduced the tax rate in all but one of Wagner's years.

"He's good at lots of things, but his financial acumen ... I've never seen anybody better," said Davis, who was part of the board that hired Wagner. "He's going to be missed. He's done good things for our students and our academic programs."

Wagner sent a letter to staff and parents, writing "I will be handing over the reins of this wonderful district knowing that it is in a terrific place."

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



Big soybean players facing bruising year

After a five-year run that featured a costly trade war and an even costlier deadly pandemic, the biggest players in the global soybean market – the United States, Brazil and China – are positioning themselves for a big, bruising 2023-24 marketing year.

Of the three, Brazil remains planted in the driver's seat. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) forecasts that Brazil's mostly planted 2023-24 crop will yield an exporthogging 6 billion bushels, 5% more than last year's record production and an astonishing 16% larger than the 2020-21 crop.

Two factors favor that outlook. First, after three consecutive years of dry, hot La Nina weather, this year's El Nino should bring more moisture and less crop stress. Second, for

the first time in memory, soy production costs are falling, encouraging Brazilian farmers to do what farmers anywhere would do: swap costly corn acres for cheaper bean acres.

If the projected, record 113 million soybean acres are planted and the better weather forecast comes to pass, USDA expects Brazil to export a record 103 million metric tons (mmt) of soybeans in its 2023-24 marketing year. That's 6 mmt more than last year's 97 mmt.

Just how many bushels are in 103 mmt of soybeans? A staggering 3.75 billion.

At that level, Brazil's projected

2023-24 soy exports will – brace yourself - equal 91 percent of this year's entire U.S. soybean crop of 4.1 billion bushels.

That hard-to-believe comparison isn't the only hard-to-swallow export news for U.S. soybean farmers this vear. The really bad news is that 2023-24 U.S. soybean exports, projected at 1.8 billion bushels, marks the third consecutive year of falling soybean exports.

According to USDA data, the current marketing year's soy exports will be a stunning 491 million bushels, or 21%, under the 2020-21 marketing year's total of 2.3 billion

The worldwide winner in this flooded global soybean market is the world's biggest importer, China, that buys "more than 60% of the oilseed shipped worldwide to crush into meal for animal feed and oil for cooking," reported Reuters a month

Typically, China's fourth quarter purchases are made in the U.S. market to take advantage of the priceflattening effects of the American harvest glut. Early November reports indicate China did buy 600,000 metric tons (22 million bushels) during harvest. Still, market watchers claim China will import 26 mmt of soybeans during the fourth quarter with "45% of the volumes arriving from Brazil..."

Given those estimates, China is on its way to import a record 105 mmt of soy in 2023, a figure nearly – and eerily - equal to Brazil's projected soy exports for the coming year.

In years past, that almost insatiable

Chinese need for soybeans would be good news for farmers everywhere, especially in the U.S. But markets, like countries, evolve and change and the global soybean market has changed rapidly in the last decade, wrote DTN Lead Analyst Todd Hultman in late October.

First "and more important," he explained, Brazil is outracing everyone in almost every market aspect - especially production and exporting - and no one, especially the U.S., "has ever seen this level of competition for export sales."

A second worry, noted Hultman, is the "larger market environment": "two wars (Russia-Ukraine and Israel/Hamas) plus pressure on the Federal Reserve to keep raising interest rates, already at their highest level in 16 years."

Neither condition – let alone both – creates the "kind of atmosphere that encourages traders to invest in the market," he explained.

Still, U.S. carryover stocks, at about 5%, are tight so soybean "prices should stay supported above \$13 for the remainder of 2023 and any opportunity near \$14 (per bu.) should be considered a good sale."

After New Year's, however, Hultman warned, "the risk of lower soybeans prices increases, depending largely on the conditions of South American crops."

When reading Jeff Lampe's editorial of Nov. 23, you stated: "It's impressive to see what can happen when citizens stand up and band together.


That's worth remembering the next time somebody tries to shove a pandemic down our throats."

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

Brimfield Village Board hears investment pitch

BRIMFIELD - The Brimfield Village Board heard a presentation by Fortress Bank Senior Vice President Troy McCrery regarding financial investment opportunities on Monday night.

Trustee Brian Porter reached out to Fortress Bank to investigate CD rates and found instead an opportunity to learn about sweep accounts using the IntraFi Network, a network of around 4,900 banks and the leading provider of FDIC-insured deposit solutions.

McCrery said towns with under 10,000 residents are generally not utilizing their funds in the best possible way by investing in CDs that return very little on their investment.

McCrery suggested Brimfield consider a sweep account with Fortress Bank instead, using a peg balance of \$25,000. Money below that balance, in this case the suggested \$25,000, does not accrue interest. Any money above the peg balance is "swept" into investment accounts and earns at a current rate of around 3.3%. Should the account balance fall below the peg balance, money from the investment account is "swept" back into the general account where it no longer accrues interest but is available for expenses. Conversely, if there is an excess of funds, an account representative assigned to the village can suggest to put excess funds into CDs at a higher rate, currently 5.01%.

"We want to be your easy button," McCrery said.

There are no contracts for the service, meaning Brimfield can end its agreement with no penalties.

Village President Dan Fishel put the topic on next month's agenda, suggesting the village could invest the general fund and potentially earn another \$15,000 to \$20,000 per year without changing much. He said accounts for water and sewer as well as motor fuel would remain in a local bank, for the time being.

Prior to Monday's meeting, the village heard a pitch from the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission offering to create a comprehensive plan for the village for about \$6,000. The board turned down that offer and will leave comprehensive planning up to its Village Planning Commission.

A new state law going into effect on Jan. 1 requires one hour of paid leave for every 40 hours of regular paid work to staffers. The Paid Leave Act is not anticipated to affect the village in any significant way, as current benefits are already compliant in the majority of cases. One exception is village crossing guards, who will be covered by the law come January.

The board approved a \$750 donation to the Brimfield Area Food Pantry. The pantry currently serves 195 adults and 10 children monthly in the Brimfield School District and will soon be distributing Christmas bas-

Continued from Page 1 able rate increase," the report stated. "Very few recognize a 3% increase as being extreme, but if the system waits 10 years and institutes a 20-30% increase, then everyone notices."

Village President Robert Johnson has said the hefty hike is the result of years of infrastructure neglect and not keeping pace with inflation over time, among other reasons.

If trustees deem the 3% increase unnecessary in a particular year, they can vote not to implement it, Cameron told them. The village has 288 water customers, including 25 commercial accounts and 34 outside of

The water hike wasn't the only revenue increase the board approved. It also authorized a 70% hike in the 2024 property-tax levy, to help pare a budget deficit of more than \$42,000. The village is to levy \$54,030, compared to \$31,850.50 the previous year. The tax rate will rise from 0.42362% to 0.719899%.

Like water rates, Johnson suggested the levy wasn't being adjusted for inflation. He said the increase puts Williamsfield in line with similar, nearby

A Truth in Taxation hearing held before the board meeting attracted no public comment.

"There doesn't seem to be significant resistance," Trustee Stuart Hickerson said about the increase.

Following closed session, the board voted to increase pay for village em-

ployees by \$1 an hour. The raise anticipates the hike Jan. 1 to \$14 in the state-mandated minimum wage.

In other action, trustees:

- Authorized spending \$525 for a new electronic water-meter reader. Johnson said the village's only reader doesn't always work properly. Federal American Rescue Plan Act funds will pay for the reader.
- Voted to eliminate the part-time job of water biller, in anticipation of a new computer billing system.
- Approved Christmas bonuses of \$175 for each village employee.
- Scheduled 2024 regular meetings on Jan. 2 and Sept. 3. Both dates are Tuesdays. Usually the board meets on the first Monday of the month, but those dates involve holidays.





Continued from Page 1 ington Police Officer Andy Steck says the department would like to purchase three or four cameras.

Porcaro said cameras cost \$3,000 each plus installation costs, which can be up to \$1,400 on Illinois Department of Transportation roads to as little as \$150 on a city-owned pole.

"With the amount of traffic that comes through here, I think you will have great success with them," Porcaro said.

Porcaro acknowledged there are concerns about heightened surveillance but noted that the cameras are not used for face recognition and do not provide information on vehicle drivers.


Council members asked Steck to bring a formal proposal to the Dec. 18 meeting for possible action.

In other business, the council approved a city budget for the fiscal year starting May 1, 2023, and ending April 30, 2024. The levy includes a 5% increase, with most of that to be used for parks and recreation.



USDA creates new plant hardiness zone map

Last month the USDA released a new version of its Plant Hardiness Zone Map. The new map is more precise than a 2012 version.

The old map was based on data collected by 7,980 weather stations from 1976-2005. The new map is a compilation of data gathered by 13,412 stations from 1991-2020. Zonal boundaries in the new map are more detailed, thanks to tinkering by algorithms adjusting for the temperature effects of altitude, bodies of water, and urban heat islands.

To create the map, researchers collected the coldest temperature for each of the 30 years from 1991 to 2020, added them and divided the total by 30. Thus the numbers on the map are averages, not the very lowest temperature recorded. That's an important point for gardeners who like to test the limits with borderlinehardy plants.

Climatologists caution that a particular location will likely experience temperatures below the map's zonal minimum several times over a 30-year period.

Roughly half the United States has drifted into a warmer zone, according to the USDA. The Chicken Littles of the climate brigade, however, shouldn't get too excited. The USDA cautions that temperature changes in the new map aren't evidence of climate change but rather the result of more accurate data collection by more weather stations and more sophisticated mapping techniques. They point out that hardiness zones are based on 30-year averages of ex-



treme temperatures whereas climatechange estimates are based on average annual temperatures over 50-100 years.

A nice feature on the USDA website (planthardiness.ars.usda.gov) is a zip-code search for the new map. Just enter your zip code and your hardiness zone magically appears.

Trent Ford, Illinois state climatologist, notes that the boundary between zones 5b and 6a, representing an average annual extreme minimum temperature of -10°F, moved nearly 70 miles northward, from Springfield in the 2012 map to Peoria in the 2023 version. According to the map, Canton and Peoria are now zone 6a (-10 to -5 degrees), while Galesburg, Elmwood and Princeville remain in zone 5b (-15 to -10 degrees).

Although it goes without saying, I can't help myself. Even though a perennial plant is listed as hardy to zone 5b, that's no guarantee it will do well in your garden. There's hardi-

Madison Mutual ness and then there's heartiness. Some plants are just finicky. Maybe the soil's a little too dry or the summers too warm or the humidity too high. If conditions are not exactly right, the little prima donnas just sit there and pout and eventually wither away. Such plants are not hearty, even though they may be hardy temperature-wise.

For me, variegated garden phlox and lavender are such plants. On the other hand, hearty plants are robust with a strong will to live, tolerant of conditions less than ideal. Think day-lilies, peonies and dandelions.

You may be lucky enough to have a warm microclimate somewhere on your property giving you the chance to try a plant or two out of your zone. The ground along a south-facing brick or concrete wall can provide a warm spot for out-of-zone plants. In fact your whole yard may be a microclimate, a zone warmer or cooler, if it's sheltered or exposed. Your powers of observation will serve you better than any zone map.

Also keep in mind that many perennials gradually build up cold hardiness in autumn's shorter and cooler days. Winter hardiness gradually decreases when spring arrives with longer and warmer days. A sudden extreme cold spell during these transition periods could injure plants even though the temperature stays above the zone's average lowest temperature.

If you're a gardener, you'll find the USDA website interesting. Along with the map and zone search, there's additional information and instructional videos.



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

Continued from Page 20 letics director. But he also felt his players, assistant coaches and employers deserved more certainty and reliability regarding his coaching status.

"Nobody knows, including myself, kind of what's going on - when I'm going to be back – and I'm thinking, 'Those kids need to know who they're going to have on the sidelines, who they'll have in practice," Anderson said. "They need stability."

Anderson said he made this decision on his own,

with no external influences. He also said Farquer tried to talk him into finishing the season.

"But just looking at the situation, it looks to me like everybody concerned would be better off, including myself, if I go ahead and do this thing," said Anderson, who said it wasn't an easy call. "I struggled with that."

Farquer struggled to compose himself Monday as he spoke about Anderson, for whom the 1990 Billtown graduate played.

"It's tough," Farquer said. "I don't know how to put it into words. He doesn't throw words around. When he says something, he's thought it through.

"You always know the time for everything is coming, but it's tough when the time comes. All good things end, but the end never feels good. We're extremely fortunate to have a guy like him around here for that length of time."

A 1965 Williamsfield graduate and former all-America player at Western Illinois University, Anderson became head coach in 1979 at his high school alma mater. The co-op with Oneida-based ROWVA began in 2015.

The pinnacle of Anderson's coaching career might have been the 1996-97 Williamsfield team that reached the Class A Elite

Eight and finished 28-3. Including that one, Anderson-coached teams won five regional titles.

Motivation to win another championship this season following a loss in February to Elmwood in a Class 1A regional final helped prompt Anderson to return, although during the off-season he pondered retirement. R-W returns most of its key players from 2022-23.

"I never recovered from losing that championship game in the regional last year," Anderson said about a 35-33 defeat. "I carry it with me today. I said, 'I can't quit like this.' I've got to give it another try, because I thought we had a ballclub that could get it done. And I think they can."

Billtown Bob retires

Anderson steps down with 732 wins

WILLIAMSFIELD -The first game of Bob Anderson's 45th season as a high school boys basketball head coach in Williamsfield turned out to be his last.

Anderson has decided to retire, effective immediately, he told The Weekly Post during an interview Monday. He informed Williamsfield School Superintendent Tim Farquer late last week and planned to tell the ROWVA-Williamsfield players Monday afternoon.
