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PRINCEVILLE PIPELINE?

Edelstein eyes Princeville for better water

Digging a well 2,000 feet deep might not provide Edelstein residents with better water. Building a pipeline about 7 miles long probably

Water officials in Edelstein and village officials in Princeville are trying to bring such a pipeline to fruition. They also are trying to secure a federal grant to help pay for it.

The proposed water pipeline from Princeville would help bring Edelstein into compliance with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. The current Edelstein well is deficient structurally, and the radium level in its drinking water has been too high for decades. Radium is a radioactive metal.

"It's been going on too long," said Peoria County Board Member Brian



Officials in Edelstein and Princeville are hoping a federal grant will help pay for a 7-mile pipeline to bring Princeville water to Edelstein, whose current well is deficient.

Elsasser, who represents the area. "It's just a major hassle for those people."

Also too high in relation to potability might be the rates the 60 or so Edelstein Water Works Co-Operative customers pay each month - \$80 currently, according to Judd Giffin, a co-op consultant. The small size of the co-op helps make impractical a bond issue to pay for improvements.

"I see a lot of communities that have their hands out for help but not doing anything to help themselves. Edelstein is not one of those," Giffin said. "People are paying \$80 a month for water and sometimes you don't have water and sometimes it's a think, warm color because of rust."

The pipeline project might cost between \$3 million and \$4 million, ac-Continued on Page 7

Princeville settles

PRINCEVILLE - As part of a negotiated settlement, a Princeville art teacher charged with misdemeanor job-related battery resigned from his position.

A separation agreement with the Princeville School District calls for Anthony R. Johnson to receive \$53,145.45. That represents his salary and the district share of his healthinsurance premiums from Jan. 17 through Aug. 31.

"He will not return to the district," Princeville Superintendent Tony Shinall said.

Johnson has been on paid administrative leave this academic year. In August 2023, the Mackinaw resident was arrested on three counts of battery after stutouching them inappropriately. Another battery count against Johnson was filed in October.

The Princeville School Board approved the Johnson agreement Jan. 11. The 6-0 vote came in open session after the board met in closed session for about 20-25 minutes. Board Secretary Sue Hefler was absent.

In part, the agreement states the final day of district employment for Johnson was Tuesday, when he was to receive his final normal periodic salary payment. That payment is in addition to the settlement amount. The remaining money Johnson is owed is to be paid by no later than next week.

Shinall would not comment about whether the district or Johnson proposed the agreement.

The district plans to advertise the open art position and might fill it before the end of the school year, depending on who applies, Shinall suggested. Substitutes have been teaching art in Johnson's stead.

"There are a lot of programs out there," Thole said. "Quite honestly, it's not realistic for us to get into the process of trying to evaluate a ton of curriculums.

"We have to talk with (other districts) about what criteria did you use? Part of it has to be the curriculum itself, the rigor in it."

The board has been deliberating home-schoolers' extracurricular participation since September, after a parent requested it. At least two home-school parents attended the board meeting last week.






Residents had a chance to voice concerns about Elmwood's solar field at a meeting Jan. 10 with the school board's building committee and the Clean Energy Design Group of Metamora, which is overseeing the project.

School Board President Mark Davis said CEDG plans to hold another meeting with local homeowners.

"We're going to talk about things we can do to make it more appealing and work on placement," Davis said.

Beyond that would be an Elmwood Zoning Board meeting and, if it reaches that point, a vote by the city

New Year, new deal? Only knuckleheads know

The pain I felt late Sunday, Jan. 7, was hard to pinpoint until I realized exactly when it struck: just moments after news of a tentative, 2024 budget deal between Senate and House negotiators had been announced.

As such, it soon became apparent the pain wasn't physical; most likely it was emotional.

What, though? Anxiety? Bewilderment? Sorrow?

That was it, sorrow – for Kevin McCarthy, now in early retirement

because the Jan. 7 deal was almost the same as the one he had struck with the White House last October. That deal inflamed enough House Republicans to make him a former Speaker and a former House member.

Poor old Kevin, I thought, gone and forgotten because he woke up one day wanting to legislate, not bloviate. Silly pragmatist, said the House Knucklehead Caucus, and within hours McCarthy was tossed aside only to have his deal resurrected weeks later.

Alas, my McCarthy sorrow passed and by nightfall my cranky old self had reemerged.

Congress, too, seems to have returned to its institutional senses - at least temporarily – to ensure it doesn't allow the fringe elements of either party into a la-la-land abyss of foolish, even stupid, policies most of the nation abhors. Daringly, the first task its leaders took on was a budget deal.

That's smart because as soon as

the presidential primary season begins in Iowa, every House and Senate vote will be weighted even more with political implications for Nov. 5, the day of 2024's local, state and federal elections.

And the U.S. isn't the only country that will hold crucial elections this year. "Globally," reported Time magazine Dec. 28, "more voters than ever in history will head to the polls as at least 64 countries (plus the European Union) – representing a combined population of about 49% of the people in the world – are meant to hold national elections

Moreover, it added, just like in the U.S., the "results ... for many, will prove consequential for years to come ..."

Some of the most affected nations include the world's most populous country, India, and its neighbors Bangladesh and Pakistan. Other countries holding national elections are the United Kingdom, Mexico, Iran, Cambodia, Jordan and - incredibly - both Russia and its battlefield opponent, Ukraine.

All make 2024, Time adds, "not just an election year" but "perhaps the election year."

This year could also be the Farm Bill-writing year for at least two reasons - it's a year late already and the Democrats may be running out of time to influence any final bill.

The delay is typical of recent Farm Bills fights. Deep differences between the Republican-controlled House Ag Committee and the Demcontrolled Senate Ag Committee over food assistance have delayed past Farm Bills.

Stark differences remain for the 2024 bill and no one in either party or chamber returned from the holi-

day break in a charitable, let's-getthis-done mood. In fact, remarkably little news emerged from either camp in the last six weeks.

Looming over any bipartisan, bicameral compromise is the pending retirement of Michigan Sen. Debbie Stabenow, the Democratic leader of the upper chamber's Ag Committee and the key figure in passing the year-delayed 2018 Farm Bill.

Stabenow has vowed to fight proposed House GOP cuts to food assistance and to protect the Biden Administration's long-term "green" ag spending.

Still, her planned November retirement hangs over any deal-making this year. Continued delays by House Ag Republicans - combined with the probable retaking of the Senate by the GOP in November – would be a blow to both Stabenow and any hope for a bipartisan Farm

First, however, Congress needs to pass the 2024 federal budget. Can this year's renewed sense of institutional urgency move members to work through their personal and political differences to complete this straightforward responsibility?

Only time – and the Speakerchucking Knucklehead Caucus will tell.

Continued from Page 1 cording to Chad Gardner, the Princeville superintendent of public works. His village also stands to be a beneficiary.

"Princeville could make some money off of selling its water to Edelstein, and Edelstein would have good-quality water," Giffin said. "It would solve a number of things."

Said Elsasser: "It would be a huge economic-development boon if they could run that water line out there."

Word from U.S. Rep. Darin LaHood's office about federal-grant approval might be forthcoming this summer, Elsasser said.

Elsasser and Princeville officials are taking the lead regarding the grant, according to Giffin.

If it happens, the project might take a couple of years to complete, Gardner said. It's the latest attempt to solve a problem that dates to at least the beginning of this century.

The radium issue requires each Edelstein coop customer to have a water softener, according to Giffin. He said the Edelstein well, which is roughly 2,000 feet deep, is obstructed about 300 feet below the surface. Pumps cannot be lowered deeper.

"To rehabilitate it, you'd have to blow that obstruction out, which would threaten to collapse the whole well," he said. "It's just a messy ordeal."

A new Edelstein well would be expensive and not guaranteed to solve the radium problem, according to Giffin. But a transmission line east from Princeville would provide water to Edelstein from three wells 1,600 to 1,700 feet deep.

Those Princeville wells tap into the Sankoty Aquifer, which provides groundwater to sections of Peoria and to other communities in northwest and central Illinois. The pipeline grant would require Princeville to upgrade its water plant, according to Gardner.

"It's kind of a win-win, if the grant's awarded," Gardner said. "When I presented it to the Village Board, they weren't sure. But they were all about it because they do want to help the neighboring community. Those kids go to our school. They come to our functions in town."

The proposed project also appeals to Elsasser

and Giffin on a personal level. Giffin resides in the service area of the Edelstein co-op, which his grandfather helped create. Elsasser resides in Princeville, but his family farm is about 3 miles south of Edelstein.


In addition to the potential federal grant and about \$150,000 in local money, Elsasser said he's proposed Peoria County contribute \$350,000 in American Rescue Plan Act funds.

According to him, that effort hasn't gained traction so far among his board peers or other county officials.

"They say, 'What if one of our other county board members wanted that?' I'd support it in a heartbeat," Elsasser said. "If you don't have water, you don't have anything."

It's something for which Edelstein co-op customers would be willing to pay at least what they're charged currently, according to Giffin. He wasn't sure how a new pipeline would affect Edelstein water rates.

"Right now, if they had to pay 80 dollars a month but they knew they had good-quality water and they didn't have to worry about the well going down, they'd probably keep paying the 80 dollars a month," Giffin said.
"The most important thing is that everybody gets good water – quality and quantity."

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Change coming to Fulton Co. voting

LEWISTOWN – Declining population, an increase in early voting and fewer election judges have led to changes in Fulton County voting that will start with the March 19 primary election.

Among changes approved by the Fulton County Board last fall are closing polling places in Norris, Bryant and Dunfermline and consolidating other voting precincts.

"The main goal was to not disenfranchise the voter, but be practical about the current state of voting in the county," said County Clerk Patrick O'Brian, who recommended the changes. "Where we stand with a 9% loss in population countywide, the increase of voting options and the ability to combine precincts, which frees up more election judges to work in busier precincts and protect the integrity of our elections, this was a nobrainer."

Farmington voters will also experience changes. Previously, Farmington Township was divided into six precincts with Farmington 1 and 5 voting at St. Matthew's Church, Farmington 2, 4, and 6 voting at the First Baptist Church and Farmington 3 voting at Franzoni Park in Norris. Farmington will now

consist of just two precincts. Farmington 1 and 5 will become Farmington 1 and vote at the Farmington Township Hall, 141 E. Vernon St.


Farmington 2, 3, 4 and 6 will become Farmington 2 and will still vote at the First Baptist Church.

Elsewhere, Astoria Township will be reduced to one precinct, with voting at the Astoria Township Building; Buckheart Township will be reduced to one precinct, with voting at the St. David Optimist Club; Vermont Township will be reduced to one precinct with voting at Vermont Village Hall; Lewistown Township will go from six precincts to three, with no changes to polling locations; Putman Township will be reduced to one precinct with voting at the Cuba Community Center; and Canton Precinct 9 will vote at the Big Creek Park Pool/Community Center.


O'Brian said any voter impacted by the changes will receive a new voter identification card with the name of their new precinct and/or the address of their new polling location.





"We need lots of volunteers, so please see Bettina if you are interested," Stufflebeam said.


In an unrelated comment, Stufflebeam said he noticed quite a few people on Facebook mentioning the downtown snow removal.





Continued from Page 16 with 20 points and tallied all six of Elmwood's fourth-quarter points. The Lady Trojans also lost to IB on Dec. 14, 42-26, in the title game of the Monmouth United tournament.

"We didn't shoot very well against IB and we had some defensive lapses in the first half that kind of hurt us," Coach Gregg Meyers said. "In the second half, we really got after it and had the lead cut down to six or seven points.

"(We) probably had a little bit of fatigue built up on Thursday."

Andrea Glenn scored 10 points vs. IB and Brooke Allen added five points off the bench.

Those results were reflected in the latest Associated Press statewide rankings released Jan. 11. Illini Bluffs is tied for No. 8 in Class 1A while Peoria Heights is 11th with 15 votes. Elmwood received five votes in the poll, to rank 16th.

"We've had a productive couple of weeks since Christmas where we've made some major adjustments," Coach Michael Weitekamp said.


Expected back this week from injury are senior point guard Lizzie Johnston and senior center Maggie Blust, who will probably see just limited action.
