

Galva council passes new parking ordinance

GALVA – The Galva City Council on Monday passed a new ordinance regarding parking and storage of vehicles, farm equipment and construction equipment in the city.

The ordinance goes into effect on April 1 and governs where residents can park abandoned vehicles, farm and construction equipment, recreational vehicles, utility trailers, lawn mowers and more.

Third ward alderman Dougie Anderson said that residents need to use the month of March getting their properties free of these vehicles because, on April 1, the new law will start being enforced. Galva authorities will send letters with 15 days for clean up, or action with fines and towing will begin.

"We have dealt with this for

too many years," Anderson said.
"There are no more second chances."

It was suggested that residents who have trailers, campers and lawn mowers sitting in their yard might want to pick up a copy of the new ordinance at City Hall.

For instance, a camper in a yard may not be used for living, sleeping or housekeeping purposes for a period exceeding 48 hours or connected to gas, water, or sanitary sewer for more than 48 hours.

And no more than two mowers in working condition may be parking on a property.

First Ward Alderman Jeff Olson said, "I would not want to live by some residences as they spoil it for everyone else."

Mayor Rich Volkert reminded residents they should not put Continued on Page 2

Galva School Board approves \$323k bid for new gym roof

GALVA – The Galva School board unanimously approved the low bidder of Oldeen Roofing of Kewanee for \$323,252 for the Jr/Sr High School gym roof Bid. The alternative bid of \$7,843 was also accepted for replacing six skylights. Galva schools will have a \$50,000 grant to apply to the roof.

The board had two other bids of \$378,205 and \$424,300.00 which were rejected. The sky-

lights that were not chosen were \$9,295 and \$13,600.

The board approved Superintendent Jerry Becker's contract until June 30 of 2027. Becker will retire as Galva's Superintendent at that time.

The board approved the 2024-2025 school calendar with opening day, August 16, 2024. This is the first time, that students get election day, Tuesday, November 5 off.

The board approved a track use intergovernmental agree-

ment with Stark County to use the Galva track facilities. This will be the last agreement as Stark County is getting a new track

Board members Jill Pankau and Kaleena Conrad will serve on the bargaining team.

Eric Bates of the transportation team reported that the district might have to get a new bus as the handicapped bus is getting some age on it. It will have to be replaced with a handicapped available bus. The district is looking into a getting a mental health counselor next year through a program from the Henry County Health Department. More details will be coming.

The board will take action on the weight room renovations which were addressed by parent Mike Yepsen. He had Chrissie VanDeVelde of Kewanee give her opinions of updates. The plans are for just cosmetic changes that will make the fa-



'And the Lord said to Peter ...'

Demolition, Rock Services & More. While my father milked cows and farmed for almost 50 years, I never heard him say he loved – or, for that Chris Baumann matter, even liked – either cows or

> farming. I did know he loved to fish and it may have been that great passion that gave him the quiet patience to endure the days and decades of machinery breakdowns, sick Holsteins, six children, and his not-always-helpful Uncle Honey.

I knew this because it didn't take

much to get him to talk about his fish-centered youth: vacations with neighborhood friends to northern Minnesota in the 1930s; creekside camping and fishing under the stars

with high school pals in the early 1940s; his 1950 honeymoon on Missouri's Lake of the Ozarks so he, well, could fish.

Later, fishing kept those carefree, cow-free days alive. Most times it was just a couple of hours on slow, lazy Sunday afternoons with me and a couple of my brothers when, after his post-dinner, noon nap, Dad would ask,"Who wants to go to the river" meaning the just-over-the-levee Kaskaskia River – "to see what's bitin'?"

Usually it was the slow nibbles of toothy alligator gars or the slamming hits of a fish we called drum. Dad wanted neither so we usually went

home empty handed.

"Ah," he'd say, "it's more about gettin' the fever down anyway."

In the late 1960s Dad bought a Vhull, 16-foot aluminum boat with a 40-horsepower Scott-Atwater outboard motor. It "needed work" of course, so my brothers and I were recruited to replace dozens of leaky rivets, fiberglass its exterior ribs and bow and sand it smooth and bare for a recoat of snappy azure blue and bright white.

A couple of years later, I was in that refurbished boat one summer morning with my father and a longtime camping friend, our congregation's pastor, crappie fishing on Kentucky Lake. When the morning heat built, however, the crappie bites cooled.

My patient father, who had never had a bad day fishing no matter the results, kept his feathery jig dancing and the conversion moving.

Pastor Holstein – I kid you not – wasn't entertained by either and soon he, who insisted Dad call him "Bob" when not in church, launched into a no-fish dirge that sounded like a reading from the bitter book of Lamentations.

When he finished, Dad looked at him and said in a firm voice, "Well, Bob, remember your Bible: 'And the Lord said to Peter, "Peter, you dummy! Cast out on the other side!""

I didn't know whether to laugh out loud or jump into the lake to keep from laughing out loud. Pastor, however, guffawed so hard it shook the boat but he quickly followed the

Lord's advice.

As my brothers and I got older and more able to take over the milking and fieldwork, Dad traded his "alumatub" for a quieter, better equipped, fiberglass boat.

Soon he and Mom, an avid fisher, too, would spend weekends fishing and camping at state parks and local lakes.

Then, after the cows went in the late 1980s, Dad acquired a new, 18footer that had more conveniences and luxuries than any house he and Mom ever lived in.

"There's no law that says you can't be comfortable having fun," he said by way of explanation.

The last time I fished with Dad was in that comfortable boat. Always wanting to get to any fish first, Dad claimed the bow seat, I was in the stern, and my two older brothers – in a 40-year-old replay of those sultry Sunday afternoons on the Kaskaskia – were parked in the swivel seats in between.

It was an achingly beautiful spring afternoon and we were fishing on a small, private, spring-fed lake hidden in the southern Illinois hills. The fish were hitting, the beer was cold, and the love was honest and unmentioned

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Latest ag census serves as wake-up call

The number of farms and farmland in the U.S. continues to fall, as the average age of farmers ticks higher.

USDA's 2022 Census of Agriculture released Feb. 13 serves as a "wake-up call" to policymakers, said USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack, noting the number of farms plummeted by 142,000 from 2017 to 2022, and the country lost 20 million acres of farmland during that same period.

"This survey is essentially asking the critical question of whether as a country, are we OK with losing that many farms? And are we OK with losing that much farmland?" Vilsack said during a news conference.

Nationally, there were 1.9 million farms and ranches (down 7% from 2017) with an average size of 463 acres (up 5%) on 880 million acres of farmland (down 2%). That is 39% of all U.S. land.

The data-rich report, produced by USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service, spans more than 6 million data points about America's farms and ranches and the people who operate them down to the county level. The census dates back to 1840 and is conducted every five years.

American Farm Bureau Federation President Zippy Duvall said the new census data shows an alarming loss of family farms.

"The latest census numbers put in black and white the warnings our members have been expressing for years," Duvall said. "Increased regulations, rising supply costs, lack of available labor and weather disasters have all squeezed farmers to the point that many of them find it impossible to remain economically sustainable."


The data also contained bright spots, including a rise in the number of new and beginning (operating 10 or fewer years on any farm) as well as young (under 35) farmers.

Young farmers made up 9% of all producers, with the 221,233 farms with young farmers making decisions tending to be larger than average in both acres and sales.

In fact, 33% of all farms in 2022 had a new or beginning producer, NASS Statistician Virginia Harris highlighted during USDA's Ag Outlook Forum on Feb. 15.

While the number of producers between the ages of 35 and 64 declined 9%, the number of producers 65 and over increased 12% outpacing the 3.9% increase of young farmers. However, more than 1 million beginning producers were counted.

Illinois also is in line with a decrease in farms and farmland, as well as an aging farmer demographic. The number of farms decreased 2.1% to 71,123 (the fifth highest number of farms in the U.S.), with farmland acres falling from 27 million to 26.29 million.

The average age of an Illinois farmer rose to 58.6, slightly higher than the national average of

Of the 121,342 Illinois farmers, 10,632 are under

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the age of 35, and 32,538 are new and beginning farmers — an increase from 2017 of 11%.

New census questions dealt with hemp, precision agriculture and internet access. Farms with internet access continued to rise from 75% in 2017 to 79% in 2022. In Illinois, farms with internet access increased slightly from 77% of all farms to 79%.

The census also showed:

- Family-owned and operated farms accounted for 95% of all U.S. farms and operated 84% of land in farms.
- U.S. farms and ranches produced \$543 billion in agricultural products, up from \$389 billion in 2017. With farm production expenses of \$424 billion, U.S. farms had net cash income of \$152 billion. Average farm income rose to \$79,790 and 43% of farms had positive net cash farm income in 2022.
- The total value of crops in 2022 was \$281 billion, up 45% from 2017. For livestock, the value was \$262 billion, up 35%.
- farms and ranches used renewable energy produc-

ing systems, a 15% increase from 2017. The majority of farms (76%) with renewable energy systems reported using solar panels.

- In 2022, 116,617 farms sold products directly to consumers, with sales of \$3.3 billion. Value of sales increased 16% from 2017.
- The 105,384 farms with sales of \$1 million or more were 6% of U.S. farms and 31% of farmland; they sold more than three-fourths of agricultural products. The 1.4 million farms with sales of \$50,000 or less accounted for 74% of farms, 25% of farmland and 2% of sales.
- Nearly three-fourths of farmland was used by farms specializing in two commodity categories: oilseed and grain production (32%) and beef cattle production (40%).
- In 2022, 1.2 million female farmers accounted for 36% of all producers. Fifty-eight percent of all farms had at least one female decision maker.







Pritzker budget seeks more spending, taxes

SPRINGFIELD – Gov.
JB Pritzker last week proposed growing state spending by over \$2 billion in the upcoming fiscal year while making a handful of corporate, sports wagering and other tax changes to pay for the increase.

Pritzker's plan, laid out to lawmakers during his annual budget address on Feb. 21, does not alter or increase state income tax rates. But it would more than double the tax rate paid by sportsbooks on gross revenues and extend an existing cap on operating losses businesses can claim on taxes.

Those two changes would raise about \$726 million in revenue, erasing much of what had been projected as an \$891 million deficit for the upcoming fiscal year.

In total, Pritzker's budget anticipates \$52.9 billion in general revenue and \$52.7 billion in spending for the state's main discretionary spending account in the fiscal year that begins July 1. The proposal now goes to lawmakers, beginning the annual negotiating process that generally concludes in May.

The governor's budget office is also projecting current-year revenues will come in \$199 million

above previous estimates. The state expects the current fiscal year to end with \$52.2 billion in total revenues.

When including a proposed \$1.2 billion supplemental spending plan for the current year, next year's budget proposal would spend about \$750 million more than the current year.

Pritzker's spending plan calls for a total of about \$1 billion in revenue he proposes generating in the upcoming fiscal year through changes in the tax code or state operations.

That includes \$526 million by extending a cap on the amount of net operating losses that corporations can claim on taxes. Lawmakers created a \$100,000 cap on such deductions in 2020, but it was set to expire in the 2025 tax year.

The proposal seeks to extend it while expanding the claimable losses to \$500,000.

Another major change would increase the sports gambling tax to 35 percent from 15 percent. That tax is applied to the profits collected by sportsbooks and will bring in about \$200 million, according to the governor's office.

Other revenue changes include raising \$101 million by capping a sales tax credit retailers are allowed

to claim. The change would also generate \$85 million for local governments.


As in previous years, Pritzker called for sizeable increases in education funding. For Pre-K-12 education, Pritzker proposed a roughly \$450 million increase as well as a \$350 million increase in Evidence-Based Funding. His plan also includes an additional \$150 million to fund his "Smart Start Illinois" initiative to expand access to early childhood education and an additional \$10 million for career and technical education programs, as well as \$13 million to fund a new state agency for



early childhood department.

Pritzker is asking law-makers to dedicate \$182 million to address the influx of migrants from border states. The spending plan includes fully funding the state's \$10.1 billion required pension payment in the upcoming fiscal year.

Expansion of E15 fuel aids farmers

The Center Square

Illinois corn farmers stand to benefit from the recent decision by the U.S. **Environmental Protection** Agency to allow year round sales of E15 fuel.

In 2022, the governors of Illinois and several other Midwest states requested year-round E15 sales in an effort to lower gas prices. E15 is a 15% blend of ethanol to petroleum fuel and is also known as Unleaded

Mike Shane with the Illinois Corn Growers Association said the ruling will give a huge boost in the use of ethanol.

"It's a 50% increase for us which is a pretty large increase for the usage of corn," said Shane, "It should increase the demand for corn and help alleviate the extra supplies of corn right now."

Despite E15 having a



lower Reid vapor pressure than most fuel on the market, the ICGA said outdated regulations excluded it from being sold during summer months

The use of E15 was approved by the EPA in 2011 for all 2001 and newer vehicles, accounting for more than 96% of vehicles on the road today.

Shane said Illinoisans

will save money. "E15 is a cheaper pro-

duct than straight gasoline

so the consumer is going to drive the demand wanting cheaper gasoline at the pump," said Shane.

Some oil refiners have argued that allowing E15 in just select states instead of nationwide could lead to fuel price spikes and supply issues.

The ruling goes into effect in April of next year. It is not known if the EPA will grant waivers to states for the use of E15 this summer.



Stark County had a boys basketball season worth celebrating. The Rebels won 19 games, their highest total in more than a

As satisfying as that might have been for Stark County Coach Dusty Browning, he can be forgiven for believing the job was only semi-completed.

For the third consecutive season, Stark County lost in the Class 1A regional semifinals. This time the winner was Abingdon-Avon, 44-32 on Feb. 21 at the Williamsfield Regional.

"A heartbreaker," Stark County senior Luke Rewerts called it.

Rewerts' team-high 14 points weren't enough to boost the Rebels (19-13), who were seeded fifth in their Abingdon subsectional. Third-seeded A-Town (20-14) led 18-11 at halftime and 25-17 with three minutes left in the third quarter.

Carter Redfern then had the next 10 A-Town points, including six in a row overall, on his way to a game-leading 23. Following two free throws by Asa Stegall, the Tornadoes led 37-21 with 5:38 left in the fourth period.

"They got that one-two-three baskets in a row here and there, and that's how I thought they took control of the game," Browning said.

The two six-point A-Town runs exacerbated Stark County offensive struggles. The Rebels had only three 3-pointers, all in the fourth quarter. That's half as many

as they had overall in a 43-42 Lincoln Trail Conference loss Feb. 13 to A-Town.

"To be honest, it was the exact same game, except we didn't miss any bunnies," Browning said in comparing that game and this one. "We made every easy basket we got.

"Seven points is a massive (deficit) when you're struggling from the floor. All year long, we talked about stacking up baskets and stacking up shots. And it felt like we never got two stops in a row and two baskets in a row."

Rewerts echoed his coach.

"It felt like we were playing down 20 and we were only down seven," he said. "Just trying to hurry too much and not really playing our game, and that's where we went wrong."

A-Town lost in the regional final Feb. 23 to second-seeded Peoria Christian.

Rewerts averaged 13.8 points per game to lead Stark County this season. Senior teammates Matthew Bowser and Will Rumbold averaged 10.2 and 10.1, respectively. Rumbold also averaged 5.5 rebounds.

Browning suggested the good times this season outweighed the bad, but the ending still stung.

"We're stuck in this semifinal game," he said. "Two years ago, we played United. Last year, we played Princeville and hit a buzzsaw, and this year, the same game again. In that regard, our goal was to make a step forward in the postseason. But over-Continued on Page 11
