# Solar project voted down for Billtown park

WILLIAMSFIELD – After three months of impassioned speeches and heated words, cold, hard facts spelled an end to a proposed 20-acre solar array next to Benjamin-Doubet Park.

The Williamsfield Village Board heard Monday at its monthly meeting that petitions circulated in Williamsfield against the solar array generated 359 signatures from people age 18 or older. Those signatures constitute 96 percent of the village's 371 registered voters, said Kyle Gibbs, one of several

residents who gathered signatures.

"The results were very overwhelming," Gibbs told the village board. "Do what you said you would do last month. Ask for a motion to drop the proposal."

Trustee Stu Hickerson did just that and, moments later, the board unanimously rejected a solar proposal from Bow Renewables. The vote elicited a round of applause from most in the crowd of nearly 20.

At issue for several members of the general public who spoke Monday was honoring the wishes of the late Verla Scheeler, who in the late 1980s bequeathed 65 acres to the village with various stipulations. According to research by Williamsfield resident Rick Smith, Scheeler's will stated that park land was to make up 50 acres of her donation and 15 acres was to be subdivided for homes.

"You are ethically obligated to abide by it," said Lee Ballard, 77, a Williamsfield resident and Caterpillar Inc. retiree. "If you don't abide by it, can we trust you? Don't let that piece of ground be your 30 pieces of silver."

# Celestial experience

Travel needed to see totality of solar eclipse

While totality will be limited to parts of southern Illinois, local residents can still witness a unique experience during the solar eclipse on Monday, April 8.

For those not traveling to see the moon block the sun for several mi-



nutes, a partial eclipse is expected in central Illinois with totality of about 94%. That's more than during the 2017

eclipse and experts say it will be greater than any partial eclipse in the contiguous U.S. between now and Aug. 20, 2044, date of the next total eclipse.

The partial eclipse is expected to start at 12:47 p.m. in the Peoria

area and last until 3:18. Maximum sun coverage should occur at 2:03 p.m. During the partial eclipse, the sky will be dimmer, temperature will drop and winds should decrease. Cloud cover can obscure the viewing experience.

Prime viewing in Illinois is in Carbondale, which is in the center of the path of totality and will see an estimated 4 minutes and 9 sec-

onds of complete sunlight blockage. In all, the path of totality will be visible over 128 miles of the state.

Safe viewing of the eclipse can only be done with safe solar glasses or viewing devices. Regular sunglasses are not safe. Some local libraries offer loans of solar glasses for patrons to watch the unique celestial occurrence.

# No crime cameras

Farmington will not install Flock cameras

FARMINGTON – The
Farmington City Council
on Monday opted to not
pursue a contract with
Flock Safety for licensereading cameras in town.

On Feb. 19, Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam cast the deciding vote in deciding to purchase three Flock cameras for \$12,750 apiece. But the acquisition was contingent on a review of the contract.

On Monday, Stufflebeam indicated he was less than happy with the deal.

"It turns out we don't own these cameras," Stufflebeam said. "When our agreement is up they come and take them back and they can raise our fees with a 60-day notice."

Added Alderman Alex Gilles, "It's hard to justify spending \$30,000 on cam-

eras we don't own."

After discussion, there was no motion to ratify the purchase agreement, meaning no purchase will take place.

After the camera decision, the council spent 19 minutes in executive session and return to unanimously approve raises for all city employees.

"It is just for employees of the city and does not include council people, the mayor, treasurer or clerk," Stufflebeam said.

Stufflebeam said increases were largest for police officers in an effort



# FARMINGTON: Raises for all city employees OK'd

Continued from Page 1 to keep them from leaving Farmington. He did not provide details. The Weekly Post will file a Freedom of Information Act request for the compensation increases.

The board also approved flooring work in the administrative offices and the cemetery office at the mu-



nicipal building. Work will be done by 6G Hardwood Floors LLC of Edwards for \$16,142 – \$9,000 cheaper than the next-lowest bid.

Stufflebeam said contractors will use a leveling compound to hold flooring tiles in place and encapsulate any asbestos in the existing flooring.

"We're going to do three rooms as guinea pigs to make sure we're happy with this flooring and how it looks and make sure it does what we want," Stufflebeam said. "We're trying to make this nice."

Summer tar-and-chip projects were approved for \$75,000 from the Motor Fuel Tax fund. Streets scheduled for resurfacing include a portion of E. Prairie; S. Victory; N. Hedden Ave.; S. Brebner; E. Stone; Butler Ave.; around Reed's Park; and two pieces of Prospect St. that run between N. West and N. East.

That is less than has been spent in recent years, but Stufflebeam explained MFT funds are being held back for a complete overhaul of Oak Street.


The board accepted the April 24 resignation of Brenda Balagna as deputy clerk. To replace her, Tracy Sollenberger was appointed deputy clerk and IMRF representative.

Residents should be receiving reminders in next month's sewer bills about a city-funded program to recycle electronics and paint every Wednesday from 1:30-3:30 p.m. at the municipal building.

The board also approved refunding \$48,766.53 in TIF funds to the Farmington School District and \$171,073.41 to Fulton County for a surplus portion of the TIF district.

# VILLAGE OF PRINCEVILLE RESIDENTS: PUBLIC WORKS WILL BE FLUSHING HYDRANTS APRIL 9, 10 & 11

Hydrant valves are opened and closed to control the flow of water and flush the system lines of sediment. Given the scouring velocities involved, flushing operations will likely lead to discolored water during, or immediately following the flushing.

Hydrant flushing may also result in sediment being disturbed within the water mains. Although this sediment is common and expected in any system, we are now required by Illinois EPA regulations to notify our customers that this sediment may contain lead even though our water system contains no known lead conduits. The benefits of flushing include removal of rust and sediment, improved chlorine residual, and reduction in taste and odor; all of which can help provide high quality water to our residents.

# THINGS YOU CAN DO AS A HOMEOWNER OR BUSINESS OWNER:

- If water discoloration is noticed in your residence or building, stop all water use and wait. Several hours may be required to rid the cloudiness from the water mains that serve your home or business.
- Turn on outside spigots, cold-water bathtub faucets, flush toilets, and run a cycle through the washing machine to clear the water in your service line.
- Do not wash clothes or run a dishwasher during or immediately after flushing takes place. Washing clothes with discolored water can cause laundry stains.
- Discolored water poses no threat to your health. You may wish to avoid drinking or cooking with the water.

# The Mystery of the Missing Calf

"The Mystery of the Missing Calf" opens like Snoopy's stories: It was a dark and stormy night. The wind was howling, rain was pelting, hail was rattling and just a couple dozen miles away, a tornado was swirling.

It was not optimal calving weather.

We knew it was coming, though. Before Matt left late that morning he had sorted off three likely suspects to calve and proactively stashed them in the barns. By early afternoon, all three had babies.

At the evening sort they pulled any cow who even remotely looked or acted as though she might calve in the next couple days. We have space for 10 or 12 cows under

cover and it was a full house that night. We felt ready for this storm. Ha!

Mother Nature often scoffs at the hubris of mortals. All had been quiet during AJ's late-night check of the herd, but morning presented a very different story. He and Matt discovered that not one, but two cows had calves in the west lot. These were cows still in the "least likely to calve" group.

But not only did they have calves, they had them in a nine-square-yard piece of real estate about as far from the barns as they could be. There was another problem, as if the steady rain wasn't enough. The men could find only one calf. Both cows claimed it. Zealously.

Standing in a downpour does nothing to improve one's reasoning ability, but Matt and AJ quickly concluded that the sodden little black-white-faced calf the two cows were licking surely must belong to the gray-white-faced mama. So Matt got the calf mover and they headed for the barn, both cows keenly following the beloved baby.

Once they had the proper pair in a pen, they secured the very disgruntled and befuddled other cow in the box stall and hastened back out into the rain to search for the missing calf.

The two of them walked every foot of every lot together, then separately. Matt even climbed the fence into the neighbor's field and searched there. Completely mystified and now discouraged, they refocused their attention to getting the

morning's chores done and setting out bales of cornstalk bedding for those cows and calves in the pas-

AJ got into the tractor, picked up the first bale and headed down the lane to the little pasture. Matt finished securing gates. Both men were devastated to think there was a newborn calf out there somewhere without a mom, in the pouring rain. It was demoralizing, frustrating, and just plain sad. But they needed to care for the rest of the herd.

Matt got into the RTV and headed down the lane that runs along the south edge of the lots, then makes a sharp turn south down to the little pasture. By this time AJ had divested himself of the first bale and was headed back up to get another. He stopped in the turn to allow Matt to go by him.

But instead, Matt suddenly stopped the RTV, leapt out, ran to the tractor and shouted up to AJ, "I think there's a calf under the spreader!"

From his seat in the RTV, Matt now had a different angle. That plus his keen eyesight allowed him to see the black calf lying in black mud. He was over the gates and back into the muddy lot in two steps. He feared the worst, given the inhospitable conditions.

With great difficulty, but a much lighter heart once he saw the bewildered calf blink, Matt was finally able to extricate the big bull calf from beneath the old manure spreader, parked there in hopes of eventual repair. It had slowly settled into the dirt, now mud.

There wasn't much clearance underneath it and how that calf got under there so completely that it disappeared from sight is still a mystery. It never occurred to either man to look under there because it doesn't look like a calf could fit. And it barely did. (I later measured the space: 13 inches.)

We theorized that the cow licked her calf so vigorously on the muddy ground that she inadvertently slid it under the spreader, out of sight and out of reach. Meanwhile, the other cow birthed a baby and Mom 1 thought that was hers, since she knew she had one and that was the only calf visible.

Again, standing in a downpour does nothing to improve one's ability to think clearly.

Having tugged the calf out and into the rain, Matt hoisted it up and headed for the barn. Matt is tall, strong and young. I've seen him

sling a 50-pound bag of feed up onto each shoulder and stride nonchalantly across the feed lot. But this calf was an armload, even for

He positioned the calf near its mom and bedded the stall with fresh straw. The cow was still convinced that the other calf was hers, however. AJ and Matt patiently worked with her to get the calf to nurse, and soon enough they bonded and all was well.

While we will never fully solve "The Mystery of the Missing Calf," we can rejoice that it had a happy ending. And we can feel satisfied that we do our best to take care of these cows and calves, even in challenging conditions.

# **ONE POT LASAGNA PASTA**

Ingredients

- 1 pound ground beef (93% lean or
- 1 medium zucchini, chopped (about 1-1/2 cups)
- 1 jar (24 to 26 ounces) gardenstyle pasta sauce
- 2 cups water
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 6 ounces uncooked mini bow tie (farfalle) pasta (about 2-1/8 cups)
- 2/3 cup reduced-fat ricotta cheese
- 1 cup reduced-fat shredded mozzarella cheese
- Thinly sliced or chopped fresh basil

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375°F. Heat ovenproof 5- to 6-quart Dutch oven or stockpot over medium heat until hot. Add ground beef and zucchini; cook 8 to 10 minutes, breaking beef into small crumbles and stirring occasionally.
- 2. Stir in pasta sauce, water and pepper. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Stir in pasta. Spoon heaping teaspoons ricotta cheese over top of sauce. Slightly swirl ricotta into sauce, not mixing in completely.
- 3. Cover and bake in 375°F oven 10 minutes. Uncover. Sprinkle with mozzarella cheese. Bake 7 to 10 minutes or until pasta is tender. Let stand 5 minutes. Sprinkle with basil before serving.

# Brimfield board OKs repairs for ball field

BRIMFIELD - The Village of Brimfield will soon be updating its ball diamond.

The Village Board at its monthly meeting on Monday approved two bids from Hohulin Fence Company of Goodfield for upgrades to the diamond at Brimfield Community Park. One bid was to replace the backstop at the diamond and one was to install fencing to secure the property on the east side. The combined bids total \$34,788.

Hohulin was the only bidder offering to complete the entire project. Fence Company Peoria of Metamora submitted a bid for the backstop at a price of \$21,264.40.

The board heard that Hohulin will be able to reuse a good deal of the existing posts and framework at the diamond, making its bid for the backstop alone \$10,246.

This allowed for extra funds to be spent on additional fencing to be placed from both the

third-base and first-base sides to the outfield on either side, along with a double-swing gate.

The fencing and backstop project will be funded using money received from the American Rescue Plan Relief Act during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Board President Dan Fishel called this an "opportunity to invest that money in something that

will give back to the community."

In addition, a bid for \$1,650 from Hoerr Masonry in Brimfield to cut four ventilation ducts in each dugout was also accepted by the board.

More work is planned for the community park, as bids are also being sought to build a new pavilion for the ball diamond.

In other business, the

board passed Ordinance 2024-2 to enforce the mowing of ditches in front of properties and approved a \$1,000 donation to the B.Y.E. Ambulance Service in honor of the group's 50K for 50 Years fundraiser.

Finally, a trustee position remains open on the village board and there is also a spot open on the local planning commission.



# Police reports

• PRINCEVILLE – A Creve Coeur woman was arrested after she was accused of firing a gun outside a Princeville-area residence.

Jessica R. Dunn, 39, was transported to the Peoria County Jail following the incident, which happened about 5 p.m. March 24 in the 5000 block of W. Streitmatter Rd. Almost the entire Peoria County Sheriff's Office report about the incident was redacted.

According to jail records, Dunn initially was charged with aggravated assault/use of a deadly weapon, possession of a firearm without a valid FOID card and domestic battery/ bodily harm. She also had outstanding warrants in Peoria and Tazewell counties.

Dunn is to appear April 24 in Peoria County Circuit Court regarding a charge of unlawful possession of a weapon by a felon.

• GALESBURG – Staff members at a Galesburg youth-detention facility were battered during what lawenforcement officials called a riot. There were two juveniles and eight staff members injured, some who required hospital visits.

The Knox County Sheriff's Office received word about fighting at the Mary Davis Detention Home about 8 p.m. March 27. The incident morphed into a riot quickly in multiple areas of the facility, according to a sheriff's-office news release.

Upon arrival, deputies and police officers from Galesburg and Knoxville secured and returned juveniles to their cells. The facility sustained significant damage. Charges are forthcoming, the release stated.

• **PRINCEVILLE** – A fire west of Princeville destroyed a garage that contained about \$60,000 worth of vehicles and other items, according to authorities.

The blaze began about 5:15 p.m. March 20 at a residence in the 11800 block of W. Illinois Route 90. According to a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report, the homeowner said he had been burning garbage northwest of the detached garage. When he returned outside, the garage was engulfed in flames.

Inside the garage, per the report, were a 1979 International truck cab valued at \$20,000; a 2004 GMC Sierra pickup truck valued at \$8,000; a 1984 Chevrolet Silverado pickup truck valued at \$5,000; a 2008 Polaris all-terrain vehicle valued at \$1,500; and a 2015 Yamaha 50CC motorcycle valued at

Power tools and equipment valued at \$20,000 and saddles and other equestrian gear valued at \$4,000 also were reported to be inside the

A damaged burn barrel on the north side of the garage appeared to be the fire source, the report stated. Flames probably spread from the barrel to a wood pile behind the garage, then to the garage itself. Akron-Princeville, Brimfield and Elmwood firefighters responded.

• TRIVOLI – A driver and her passenger refused a hospital trip following a single-vehicle accident south of Trivoli.

At 9:30 a.m. March 13, Heather Krueger of Glasford was behind the wheel of a southbound 2008 Pontiac G6 on Trivoli Road, about one mile south of Higgs Road, when a deer entered the roadway, a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report stated.

Krueger swerved to avoid the deer but lost control of the vehicle on a gravel patch. The passenger side of the vehicle then struck an embankment on the east side of the road.

First responders evaluated Krueger and her female passenger. The vehicle was towed and the road was closed to traffic briefly.

• YATES CITY – A Yates City woman was cited in connection with a child-custody dispute.

About 6 p.m. on March 8, the 37year-old woman said she wasn't going to allow her 13-year-old son to stay with her former husband, a violation of a parenting agreement, a Knox County Sheriff's Office report stated. # Bill would add requirements for gun purchases

The Center Square Despite Illinois having nearly four million background checks done on gun owning residents in 2023, Illinoisans who want to buy a firearm would have to undergo state-approved training and three background checks if a pro-

posed bill makes it across

the finish line.

House Bill 3239, sponsored by state Rep. Maura Hirschauer, D-Batavia, would obligate Illinoisans who want to buy a firearm to go through eight hours of training and other requirements. The bill is in the House Judiciary Criminal Committee, which is scheduled to meet in

Springfield Tuesday. Her office said she will not be calling the bill this week.

A FOID card is required in Illinois for residents to own or purchase firearms and ammunition. According to numbers from Illinois State Police, over 2.4 million Illinois residents possess FOID cards, nearly 19% of the state's 12.7 million people.

The greatest number of these cards have been issued in Cook County, with over 730,000 active cards at the end of 2023. Champaign County had issued 34,144.

Illinoisans already undergo some of the most extensive background checks when it comes to firearms.

Federal Bureau of Investigations firearm background check data shows Illinois had 248,767 background checks in February. Most of those, or 163,355, were "permit rechecks." That's second in the country next to Kentucky's

321,300 total checks and 294,377 rechecks. For all of 2023, FBI data show Illinois had 3,961,236 total firearm background checks in the country. That's more than any other state and nearly 300,000 more than Kentucky's 3.6 million.

# BILLTOWN: FFA Farm, apple orchard discussed

Continued from Page 1 Another speaker, Mark Ebner, reminded the board. "You serve at the will of the people."

After the board vote, talk turned quickly to what to do with the 20 acres of Scheeler's donation that has not been developed or turned into park. The land is currently leased for farming through harvest.

Williamsfield Agriculture Teacher Kent Rigg discussed a proposal he submitted two years ago for a Williamsfield FFA Farm on the property, which is within walking distance of the school.

Under the plan, the school district would rent the land from the village. Williamsfield students would then operate and manage the farm in a hands-on teaching environment that would allow them to apply classroom learning to the real world.

Williamsfield FFA alumni members would provide access to resources, equipment and working capital. Any profits could fund FFA Alumni scholarships for graduating seniors and for students attending FFA events.

Williamsfield resident Smith, who led the charge against the solar array, offered another option. Smith proposes an apple orchard that could generate lease income for the village as well as income from the sale of apples and apple products for a 501(c)(3) managing the orchard possibly the Williamsfield Parks Association.

Smith said the orchard could be planted on 5-10 acres of the property, leaving room for the FFA farm.

In other business, the board had preliminary discussion of a Fiscal Year 2025 budget that shows \$421,050 in spending and a deficit of \$60,880.

"It's a deficit budget," Village President Robert Johnson said, noting that the village would still have a surplus of \$87,098.57 if the entire budget was spent.

"But it's just permission to spend the money. It doesn't mean we have to spend it," he said.

Johnson said the budget will be discussed again at a special meeting on April 29 at 7 p.m., after which the board will vote on approval. He said anyone who wants a copy of the budget between now and the hearing can get one from the village clerk.

Another subject to be brought up in the future is a proposed storm-water improvement report submitted March 14 by Bruner, Cooper & Zuck, Inc. of Galesburg. Currently, during heavy storms parts of the village experience flooding issues. The report identifies three main areas that could be improved for an estimated \$1.5 million.

"We don't have the money for that right now," Trustee Nancy Everett said. "We'll have to do it piecemeal."

Everett and Johnson said the village can use money from its Motor Fuel Tax fund and employ village labor to handle some work.

Johnson said because the median income in Williamsfield is \$75,000, the village is not eligible for grants for the project, just low-interest loans.

In other business, the board:

- Approved rolling over three CDs (two for the Village General Fund and one for Doubet-Benjamin Park) for a 13-month, 4.61% rate at Integrity Community Bank.
- Set June 3 to open sealed bids for the sale of two empty lots in the Cottonwood Court residential development.
- Approved spending up to \$2,000 to address health and safety shortcomings at the village water treatment
- Heard that a paint and electronic recycling collection for Knox County residents will be April 27 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the village's new shed, located at the corner of North Oak Street and Lion's Drive.



# Bill would explore guaranteed income

Illinois lawmakers on
March 27 heard testimony
on a handful of proposals
in front of the Illinois Senate's Health and Human
Services Appropriations
committee.

Senate Bill 3462, sponsored by Sen. Ram Villivalam (D-Chicago), would create a task force to look at the feasibility of implementing a guaranteed income of \$1,000 per month to certain Illinoisans – regardless of immigration status – including parents,

those who recently gave birth or adopted children.

Former Chicago Alderman Ameya Pawar, now senior advisor at the progressive-leaning Economic Security Project, testified in favor of the bill.

"Wages haven't gone up enough to cover the rising costs of everyday goods like groceries, gas and school lunches, and guaranteed income can help families afford what they need," Pawar said. "This is one of the first states in the country to actually have a conversation on guaranteed income."

For one year, the city of Chicago ran a pilot program that gave 5,000 residents a \$500 monthly stipend, with no strings attached.

Lake project – A \$73 million state-funded project in Lake County aims to stabilize the last undeveloped Lake Michigan shoreline in Illinois and help protect native endangered species.


Illinois Beach State Park in Zion on the state's northern border contains about 10% of Illinois' Lake Michigan shoreline, with 6.5 miles. But the undeveloped shoreline can erode up to 100 feet per year, according to the state's Capital Development Board, which is partially overseeing the stabilization project.

To mitigate the erosion, the Illinois Beach State Park Shoreline Stabilization Project seeks to build 22 breakwater structures along 2.2 miles of shoreline.

The breakwaters will protect the beach, maintaining it for human and animal use while providing natural habitats for local wildlife.






In an 11-0 victory March 28 over Farmington, six R-W players had RBI, led by Smith with two. The Cougars also had five stolen bases.

Sams started on the mound, striking out seven. Strom got the win with six whiffs, keeping the home team from scoring,


