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# Lawmakers pass \$53.1 billion state budget in wee hours

**By JERRY NOWICKI** Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - After a nearderailment and an all-nighter to wrap up the General Assembly's spring session, supermajority Democrats in the Illinois House gave final legislative approval to the state budget as the sun rose Wednesday morning.

Despite holding 78 seats in the chamber, it took Democrats three tries to reach the 60 votes needed to approve more than \$1.1 billion in revenue increases, including a tax hike on sportsbooks and businesses, to balance the \$53.1 billion spending plan for fiscal year 2025.

"This year's \$53 billion budget is 32% larger than it was in 2020. Our spending spree is simply unsustainable," Rep. Travis Weaver, R-Edwards, said. "I am a firm believer that Illinois's brightest days can still be ahead, but only if we tighten our belts, cut waste and start respecting the taxpayer."

The spending plan passed 65-45, with seven Democrats joining Republicans in opposition. The revenue plan that capped

the voting on the budget-related

bills was more of a challenge. House Bill 4951 fell one vote short of passage twice after 4 a.m. due to attendance issues. On the third try – after about an hour of procedural maneuvering by Republicans - the bill passed at 4:43 a.m. with the minimum 60 votes necessary.

"I think it should be clear to everyone in the state what this supermajority is willing to do to ram a tax increase down the throats of the citizens of Illinois at 4:30 in the morning," Rep. Patrick Windhorst, R-Metropolis, said.

Democrats had earlier highlighted that despite a tight fiscal year, the budget would send \$198 million to the state's "rainy day" fund and make the full payment into the state's pension systems that is required by law.

Rep. Jehan Gordon-Booth, a Peoria Democrat and lead budget negotiator in the House, pointed to the state's nine credit upgrades of the past four years. And she noted a backlog of unpaid bills that reached nearly \$17 billion under Republican Gov. Bruce Rauner has shrunk to a payment cycle that lasts "mere days."

Gov. JB Pritzker says he'll sign the plan for the fiscal year that begins July 1, which spends about \$400 million more than what he requested in his February budget address. In a statement after its passage, the governor claimed investments made in the budget will grow Illinois' economy.

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The budget cleared the General Assembly five days after lawmakers had scheduled their spring session's adjournment, although the May 24 "deadline" was a largely arbitrary date that **Continued on Page 2**

## **Pipeline pause** Bill puts 2-year halt on CO2 pipelines

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD – After state regulators rebuffed several proposed carbon transport projects over the past year, lawmakers moved to ban new projects until the federal government sets forth new safety rules.

The measure, part of a package regulating the developing technology, was the fruit of extended negotiations among lawmakers, environmentalists, business groups and the governor's office.

Senate Bill 1289 passed the House 78-29 and the Senate 43-12, with two senators voting present. Gov. JB Pritzker said Sunday evening he plans what proponents call some of the strongest CO2-related safety protections in the nation.

The bill requires monitoring injection wells for at least 30 years after they close, a process that must be approved by the state and federal government. It also grants the Illinois Commerce Commission expanded authority to impose fees and require safety models for carbon sequestration and transportation projects.

Fees would go into a group of newly created state funds to train first responders and provide equipment to manage potential emergency situations.

Critics of the bill, including the Illinois Farm Bureau, dis-

to sign the bill.

The moratorium would expire on July 1, 2026, if the U.S. Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration doesn't finalize safety rules by then. In addition, the bill has

like provisions that allow the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to issue a binding order on "nonconsenting" landowners to force them to let carbon sequestration companies use their land.

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## BUDGET: Critics say 2026 will be even tighter

Continued from Page 1 left a week on the calendar as a contingency plan. Negotiations were complicated by inflation and other spending pressures driving up the expected cost of government, while economists predict the state's economy will slow in the upcoming fiscal year.

Still, Democrats approved the spending plan with several votes to spare

but no Republican support - as they've done every year in Pritzker's tenure except the first in 2019.

Republicans argued the pace of spending growth and the fact that some of the revenues raised to pay for it are temporary – set the state on pace for an even tighter fiscal year 2026.

Overall, state spending grew by about 5 percent from last year's enacted plan, or about 1.6 percent above expected end-ofyear expenditures following a supplemental spending plan's inclusion in the budget package this week.

Democrats highlighted a \$50 million appropriation for a child tax credit for children under 12 if their



household qualifies for the state's Earned Income Tax Credit. The plan contains \$200 million for afterschool and summer youth programs and \$45 million for grants through the Reimagine Public Safety Act.

But Republicans accused Democrats of having misplaced priorities, pointing to hundreds of millions of dollars for programs serving noncitizens.

The budget includes \$182 million to provide shelter, health care and other services for recently arrived migrants, many of whom have been bused to the state from Texas. And it includes \$440 million from the GRF for two programs providing state-funded Medicaid-like benefits to noncitizens, with \$189 mil-

lion from other state funds as well. More than \$1.1 billion in

added revenue was needed to balance the books, so lawmakers extended an expiring cap on corporate net operating losses to ensure that \$526 million in tax dollars wouldn't disappear in FY25. Another \$25 million will be raised by subjecting "re-renters" of hotel rooms to a state hotel tax.

Sportsbooks will see their current 15% tax rate on profits increase via a new graduated structure that will tax between 20-40%, based on profits. The change is projected to bring in about \$200 million to the state's General Revenue Fund. A 1% point increase to the tax on the state's video gambling industry would generate an additional \$35 million.

The revenue plan also caps a tax discount claimed by retailers at \$1,000 monthly, generating \$101 million for state coffers and about \$85 million for municipalities.

The budget also freed up about \$200 million by redirecting \$150 million from the Road Fund and \$50 million from the Leaking Underground Storage Fund to public transit.

Despite the diversion of money from the Road Fund, the budget includes \$3.5 billion for infrastructure – about \$500 million more than what Pritzker had outlined in his February budget proposal.

## Neither party has a monopoly on the right answers

To The Editor:

I enjoyed Alan Guebert's essay on rural language, mores and politics in the May 17 Prairie News. It was thoughtful, well-written and sometimes delightfully funny.

My own roots are embedded in Toulon, as many know, and I also left town for the same "Big U" that Mr. Guebert attended. Urban students there sometimes made fun of my farm-country accent, which wasn't quite hillbilly but certainly not metropolitan.

When I moved to Chicago for law school nearly a lifetime ago, almost everyone recognized my accent and country slang from "car wrecks" to "roast-n-ears." I didn't think I had an accent, but clearly was wrong. It has largely blended into the accents around me by now, but small snippets still come through. I don't mind.

I especially liked Mr. Guebert's anecdote about former House Speaker Tip O'Neill, a Democrat, who recounted how his own mother could not vote for him without a good deal of thought. Yes, all politics is local to a large degree.

I also agree that the term white rural rage may overstate and misidentify local concerns and to some extent rural resentment. But I would also point out that O'Neill worked with President Ronald Reagan to hammer out legislation via compromise, which requires each side to understand where the other was coming from.



I actually voted for Reagan - twice - because above all else I felt he loved America and was often willing to compromise to move forward. He expressed as much, according to many accounts.

In the May 24 Prairie News, I read about the U.S. Department of Agriculture grant to Stark County allowing local schools to offer free meals to all students for four years. That sounds great for Toulon and Stark County families. But I have seen one political party rail against, target and ridicule such kindness as government interference and overreach.

Other countries value their schools and students and lunches are often not only free, but are nutritious and well-planned. No one minds.

Meanwhile, the party opposed to free lunches for school kids also chides those who want better healthcare for people, yet it favors government regulation over schools and libraries and what books are allowed and what teachers can say. This party also fights healthcare availability and attacks individual rights to privacy and access to voting.

Neither party has a monopoly on

the right answers. O'Neill knew that, and that made all the difference in his day.

I haven't voted Republican in a while, so I can't speak for Republicans. But the current crop does not act or sound like those from my past. My family was involved in local Republican politics during my youth. Plus, in the 1960s our young Illinois representative Jim Nowlan authored legislation to require strip-mining companies to restore land. I hope I have not misstated that.

Today, this act would seem like a very liberal thing. Back then, it just seemed like something good for Stark County and the whole state. That's how it should be.

Governments can't do everything well. But some things are best done by government: national defense, airline safety, major disaster relief, managing the Federal Reserve, healthcare standards, Social Security and education support are a few.

Meanwhile, I can speak for many Democrats I know. All of them at least approach major issues from a lens of kindness, making things better and trying to do good for our neighbors. It doesn't always work out well, but I'm on board with a starting point like that. Especially the parts about being kind to each other.

### Illinois turkey hunters post record harvest

SPRINGFIELD – Illinois hunters harvested a preliminary statewide record total of 17,208 wild turkeys during the 2024 spring season.

This year's total compares with the 2023 statewide harvest of 16,123 and the previous harvest record total of 16,569, set in 2006.

The top five counties for the 2024 spring turkey harvest were Jo Daviess 654, Jefferson 472, Marion 435, Pope 397 and Randolph 395.

The 2024 total includes a record youth turkey harvest of 2,009 birds,

which compares with the 2023 youth harvest of 1,309. The previous youth season record of 1,733 was set in 2020.

This year, hunters purchased 86,083 permits compared to 80,642 last year. Spring turkey hunting was open in 100 of Illinois' 102 counties.

When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Based on information obtained in a Well Site Survey published in 1991 by the Illinois EPA, several potential sources are located within 1,000 feet of the wells.

The Illinois EPA has determined that the Bradford Community Water Supply's source water is not susceptible to contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and available hydrogeologic data on the wells.

Furthermore, in anticipation of the U.S. EPA's proposed Ground Water Rule, the Illinois EPA has determined that the Bradford Community Water Supply is not vulnerable to viral contamination. This determination is based upon the evaluation of the following criteria during the Vulnerability Waiver Process: the community's wells are properly constructed with sound integrity and proper siting conditions; a hydraulic barrier exists which should prevent pathogen movement; all potential routes and sanitary defects have been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a history of disease outbreak; and the sanitary survey of the water supply did not indicate a viral contamination threat. Because the community's wells are constructed in a confined aquifer, which should preven the movement of pathogens into the wells, well hydraulics were not considered to be a significant factor in the susceptibility determination. Hence, well hydraulics were not evaluated for this system's ground water supply.

## **Orwig places 8th in 300 hurdles**

For The Prairie News CHARLESTON – Keep moving up and getting faster. That's been Nolan Orwig's goal all track season and it paid off last Saturday for the Stark County High School junior with an eighth-place medal in the 300-meter hurdles.

"We haven't had a running medal in 10 years in our school and my coach (Bart Frey) has put a lot of work in for me and I didn't want to let him down," Orwig said. "I didn't think I'd get eighth, but I'm more than happy to get what I got."

Seeded 18th heading into state after running 42.48 seconds in the Farmington Sectional, Orwig moved up to ninth in prelims on May 23 after a 41.73 clocking. He moved up one more spot in Saturday's finals, posting a time of 41.87. Dominic Martin of Colfax Ridgeview won the 300 hurdles in 38.87.

Somewhere close to Martin's time is where Orwig hopes to be next year. He said the current Stark County High School record is 38.7 seconds in the 300 hurdles and 14.7 in the 110 hurdles.

"I've already taken the school record in the 200," with a time of 22.67 seconds, Orwig said. "I want to keep knocking them down. I'm definitely here to leave a legendary footprint statistic wise."

Orwig said he was one of three juniors in the Saturday's race, noting that six seniors who competed will be graduating.

"My first race this year was a 43.5. It wasn't impressive," Orwig said. "I came here and shaved off and got in the 41s and

I just want to keep on improving."

With his medal, Orwig becomes the fifth Stark County athlete to win a boys state track medal, according to Illinois High School Association records. Other medal winners are Tanner Ewing, who was fifth in the 300 hurdles in 2008 and second in 2009; Leo Helleberg, seventh in 2015 triple jump; Keagan Newton, fifth in 2022 triple jump; and Blake Orwig, eighth in 2022 shot put.

Orwig did not advance to finals in the 100 hurdles, standing in 18th after a 16.45 clocking in the May 23 prelims.

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
