\$58 million addressing deferred maintenance

SPRINGFIELD - Construction crews and Illinois State Fair staff are working hard to finish renovations to the grounds as the countdown to the 2024 fair continues.

The Illinois State Fair hosts a plethora of construction projects, including a second phase of renovations to the Coliseum and restoration to the Multi-Purpose Arena.

Windows delayed

Brimfield Grade School repair schedule adjusted

For The Weekly Post BRIMFIELD - When the 2024-25 academic year begins, some areas of Brimfield Grade School might seem a bit claustrophobic.

New windows planned for the kindergarten-throughfourth-grade area of the school probably won't arrive in Brimfield until mid-August. According to Superintendent Chad Jones, the windows won't be installed in time for the start of classes, scheduled for Aug. 14.

Paneling is to cover the spaces where the windows are supposed to be. Window replacement elsewhere at the grade school already has been completed or is on schedule to be finished this summer, according to Jones.

"We'll not be able to start the school year with brandnew windows and everything looking perfectly pretty, like I envisioned it," he said. "We will get everything done, but it won't be Aug. 14, ready to go."

Jones put no timetable on completion but said it'll happen as soon as possible. He said he wasn't made aware of the delay until late in the week before the Brimfield School Board meeting May 8. Delaying the start of

Elmwood may help with sign for The Meadows

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD - The Elmwood City Council might consider helping residents of a local subdivision reconstruct a sign at its entrance.

No financial commitments were made during the council meeting May 7. But at least one alderman suggested the city bears some responsibility for replacing a sign that welcomed visitors to The Meadows subdivision. The sign that stood on a median on Southgate Drive at Illinois Route 78, at the north


edge of Elmwood, was removed when new sidewalks were being constructed in that area. The sign fell into disrepair while in the city's possession, according to Alderman Andrew Almasi.

"We moved it and we should put it back," he said. "It may be more than what they had, but there's a value there that I think we could contribute to." Meadows resident John Herman told the council about a private fundraising effort underway for a new Continued on Page 10

BRIMFIELD: Window installer to double shifts

Continued from Page 1 the school year wasn't an option, given the uncertainty about when installation might take place.

Asbestos abatement necessary in connection with the window replacement prevents maintaining the primary-wing status quo until installation is to begin, according to Jones. He said the primary wing is the oldest part of the building. Jones also said the paneling is intended to be watertight.

"They won't look nice, but they're supposed to be boarded up and then sealed," he said.

It's possible some classes will be moved for a day or two to other areas of the building when installation begins, Jones told the board. The installer is expected to work double shifts, with most of the potentially disruptive labor performed after students leave for the day.

Jones asked for flexibility and understanding. "It's going to be nice when it's all done," he said.

Board President Steve Updyke appeared to take the delay in stride.

"Just won't be able to look out the windows for a little while," he said.

In other business, the board:

• Approved a \$44,778 bid from BASe2 Group of Edwards and Galesburg to replace district heating, ventilation and air-conditioning controls.

• Authorized about a \$15,000 expense with Miller & Son Construction Co. of Mackinaw for grade-school downspout work. • OK'd implementation of the Amplify Core Knowledge Language Arts Program for kindergarten through fourth grades.

• Approved a 2025 fiscal-year audit contract with Gorenz and Associates, Ltd., of Peoria. The gross fee is not to exceed \$14,050.


• Agreed to move its next regular meeting from June 26 to June 20.

Following closed session, the board authorized hiring Brooke Norman as a second-grade teacher and approved 2024-25 grade-school and high school extracurricular assignments for fall and winter. No high school head-coaching changes were made.

Spring assignments are to be submitted for approval later this year, as is district custom, Jones said.



The outrage over 'White Rural Rage'

Early in my first year at the Big U, a new friend from Chicago's South Side asked me what he thought was an innocent question. "You're from southern Illinois," began Vince, "so why don't you talk like a hillbilly?" Like a what? I asked.

"You know," he explained, "why don't you talk with a drawl and say 'ain't' a lot?"

When I told him no one I knew in southern Illinois spoke like that,

Vince, a budding engineer, was unable to square his circle. For years thereafter he introduced me as "a farm boy from southern Illinois but not a hillbilly!"

Vince's unchanging under-

standing served his unchanging ignorance. Hillbilly, to him, was anything or anyone – including me – somehow connected to the word "southern."

He wasn't alone. Canadian rocker Neil Young made a similar leap in his 1970 anthem "Southern Man." In his 2012 autobiography, "Waging Heavy Peace," however, Young apologized for the mistake.

Others have made the jump and remain comfortable in their view of "southern" and "rural." J.D. Vance, a one-time venture capitalist and now U.S. senator from Ohio, won instant acclaim with his 2016 memoir, "Hillbilly Elegy," set in Appalachia. The New York Times called it "one of the six best books to understand Donald



Trump's win" later that year. Others – me included – read it and thought it was more Vince-like than Vance-like: hollow, shallow, and more commercial than cerebral.

Vance's fellow Appalachian, economist William Easterly, called the book a "sloppy analysis of collections of people – coastal elites, flyover America, Muslims, immigrants, people without college degrees."

I wouldn't have been so kind. Now comes another presidential election year, another election featuring Trump and another book to explain why me and my extended, white rural family are so enraged at our position in life that we are not just "a" but "the" biggest threat to our nation's survival.

Like most books about rural white folk these days, "White Rural Rage: The Threat to American Democracy," is also a New York Times bestseller. But dozens of critics, many whose research book co-authors, Paul Waldman and Thomas S. Schaller cite, are less thrilled. Several, like Nicholas F. Jacobs in his April 4 takedown for Politico, have made clear that the book's use of their scholarly work has been "misinterpreted and misunderstood."

Jacobs, a political scientist at Maine's Colby College, continues: "What the authors get wrong about rural America is exactly what many Democrats have been getting wrong for decades ... (T)hat rural political identity has morphed into resentment – a collective grievance against experts, bureaucrats, intellectuals, and the party that seeks to empower them, Democrats."

But resentment, Jacobs rightly points out, is not rage. "Resentment is rational, a reaction based on some sort of negative experience. ..." Rage, however, "implies irrationality, anger that is unjustified and out of proportion."

That's true for most rural voters that I know: They are rational, resentful and Republican because they see the institutions at the center of their lives – churches, schools, families and communities – rapidly changing, with only one political party, the GOP, consistently acknowledging the changes.

To them, it's about politics, not policy; practicality, not philosophy; empathy, not antipathy.

And sure, many GOP politicians have made an art of telling rural Americans exactly what they want to hear. Unlike so many Democratic politicians, however, at least they show up to ask.


Former Speaker of the House Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill often told the story of how after his initial election to Congress in 1952, he asked his mother if she had voted for him. Yes, she replied, but it was close.

Close? asked the wounded son. Why? "Because," she said, "you never asked me."

"I learned that night," O'Neill explained, "that all politics are local." Any rural American can tell you the same thing. Just come by and ask.

Good news on water, sewer rate for new plant

By NICK VLAHOS For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE - Providing water and sewer services to a proposed new manufacturing facility probably won't cost as much as Princeville village officials anticipated.

Greenfield Contractors is to build on the south side of about 151/2 acres Princeville annexed recently, according to Village President Jeff Troutman.

That means the village will have to extend a water line only about 60 or 70 feet, at a cost estimated between \$25,000 and \$40,000.

Water-line extension was projected at about \$300,000 had Greenfield built farther north on the property, located west of Santa Fe Avenue and south of Mendell Road. The south end is located closer to the rest of town.

Troutman said village sewer expenses also are expected to be significantly lower for Greenfield's proposed location on that plot. Sewer costs have yet to be estimated.

Municipal trustees are

expected to discuss waterline extension when they meet Tuesday night. If approved, work could begin soon, according to Troutman.

"It's already been engineered and ready to go," he said.

Construction on the new Greenfield complex is to commence next spring. The commercial- and agricultural-building specialist is operating from a Princeville facility smaller than the projected new digs. A vacant house on the annexed property has been demolished.

Not all the financial news village officials received recently has been positive.

During the Village Board meeting May 6, trustees were told about an unsuccessful effort regarding a federal grant that would help pay for a proposed water pipeline between Princeville and Edelstein. The village was among 98 applicants for 15 grant spots, according to Troutman.

The 7-mile pipeline is a possible solution to chronic water problems for Edelstein residents. Troutman said federal representatives are searching for other grants to help cover the cost, which is projected at about \$6 million.

But Troutman suggested such pursuits might be more successful if the Edelstein Water Works Co-Operative took the lead.

"We already have a treatment plant and good water lines, where they don't," Troutman said. "The way (the grant application) was put in, these people look at it like it is Princeville that wants an upgrade, and at the same time they'll agree to do Edelstein's water."

Peoria County Sheriff's Office Deputy Shawn Yarger is set to begin regular village patrols May 28, Troutman said. Yarger replaces Adam Bickett, who was fired from the force in March after an investigation revealed he violated department policy.

In other business, the board voted to continue the village Residential

Redevelopment Program in one tax-increment-financing district and create one in another, new TIF district.

The program provides TIF-funded reimbursements for improvements residential-property owners make.





Continued from Page 1 According to Clark, crews have also been working on road improvement projects throughout the fairgrounds. This is routine maintenance to prepare for the wear-and-tear of the upcoming show season. Additionally, she said various fair buildings are undergoing roofing projects.

"We also just finished putting the finishing touches on the Multi-Purpose Arena," she said.

The arena received an \$8.6 million facelift. Projects focused on repairing sidewalks, walls, steps and electrical systems, as well as readjusting the tension structure, installing a new canopy and rebuilding the retaining walls around the facility.

Clark said this year the Multi-Purpose Arena will have plenty of events, including a rodeo. Clark said the fair is utilizing a new company this year that will host nine rodeo event categories.

"It's a jam-packed show, great for those junior exhibitors who are going to be visiting with us during the State Fair," she said.

More than 10,000 visitors can be

seated at the Multi-Purpose Arena and tickets will go on sale as more events are announced.

"I'm really excited about all of the things that are happening here," Clark told FarmWeek. "I think our fair family is going to really see that excitement when the fair rolls around this August."

The Illinois State Fair will be Aug. 8-18 this year.

Elmwood locks down school after threats

ELMWOOD – An Elmwood man wanted by the military was arrested and accused of threatening his former girlfriend. The threats resulted in a brief soft lockdown of the Elmwood school building.

Peoria police took Morgan R. Ludolph, 18, into custody about 10 a.m. May 8 at McDonald's, 627 N. Western Ave. Ludolph was making homicidal and suicidal comments, according to Semone Roth, a policedepartment spokeswoman.

Law-enforcement authorities in multiple jurisdictions were searching for Ludolph after a 17-year-old female Elmwood High School junior said he threatened to kill her. The girl notified school administrators, according to an Elmwood Police Department report.

Also searching for Ludolph was the U.S. Army, which accused him of being absent without leave. An Army representative contacted school administrators to try to determine the whereabouts of Ludolph, a former Elmwood student.

The death threats came via text messages beginning May 1, according to the police report. That helped prompt the soft lockdown, which lasted from about 10 a.m. until about 10:30 a.m. May 8. Activities inside the building continued as usual, but nobody was allowed to leave or to enter.

Ludolph was transported to the Peoria County Jail and charged with disorderly conduct and threatening a school building or person. The Army planned to issue an AWOL warrant for Ludolph, the police report stated.

• ELMWOOD – A two-vehicle accident east of Elmwood left a Yates City man with an apparent minor injury.

Scott S. Vawter was driving a 2018 Chevrolet 1500 pickup truck at 4:30 p.m. May 4 in the 19300 block of Illinois Route 8 when another

pickup, this one a 2022 Ram, rearended it, according to a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report.

The other driver, Matthew J. Glenn of Elmwood, said he couldn't react quickly enough to avoid hitting Vawter's vehicle, which slowed to turn south at Pulsifer Road. It wasn't clear in which direction Glenn and Vawter were driving.

Vawter complained about his seatbelt causing a burning feeling in his left hip, but he refused ambulance transportation. Glenn said he was uninjured.

Glenn's vehicle sustained major damage to its front grille, hood, bumper and fenders but was drivable, the report stated. So was Vawter's vehicle, despite rear-bumper damage.

• **BELLEVUE** – A Yates City female sustained a minor injury in a two-vehicle accident in Bellevue.

About 6 p.m. May 3, Bobbi J. Ulm was driving a Ford Escape that was attempting to turn west on Plank Road from southbound Maxwell Road when a 2007 Dodge Caravan van rear-ended her vehicle, per a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report. Grant D. Wolland of Mackinaw was the other driver.



Continued from Page 1 sign. It's to include landscaping and intended to complement a sign across Route 78 at the entrance to the Fairground Acres subdivision.

"It's attractive to have that in town and to have that as you come in and out of the town," Herman said.

Alderman Adam Duvall, who also resides in The Meadows, suggested a sign might have a more practical purpose.

"I think it's important to have that sign," he said. "I have people come (visit) at nighttime and they often overturn into that median."

In other business, the council approved a twoyear lease with Mi Ranchito restaurant regarding



Mi Ranchito is to pay the city \$100 per month. Some of that money might be waived, depending on the cost of improvements Mi Ranchito is undertaking in that space. Two roofed pavilions, wroughtiron fencing and tables are among the improvements. Last month, the council

authorized up to \$6,000 in tax-increment-financing funds for the project. It's expected to cost between \$10,000 and \$12,000. The TIF grant is intended to cover half the final ex-

pense, according to Amy Davis, the city economicdevelopment director. The monthly lease would be rebated until it matched the rest of the expense. The city then would own the equipment for potential future restaurants at that site.

So long as it's in business, Mi Ranchito will be responsible for maintaining the patio and its improvements. The restaurant is to install a west-side gate and might install a door on the south side of its building, so customers can access the outdoor-dining area from inside, according to Davis.

The council also authorized a \$3,229.45 payment to TimbukTech Inc. of Canton for five years of computer firewall protection. The city pays TimbukTech an additional \$700 per month for other computer services.

Before the meeting, aldermen and other city officials conducted a cookies-and-punch reception that celebrated the retirement of Rebel, the Elmwood Police Department K-9 officer. Police Officer Mike Darrah has been Rebel's partner.

In retirement, the German Shepherd is to reside with Darrah.

"It's always rough to lose a partner, but we can truly say he's a good dog," Almasi said. "We're sorry to see him go."

Darrah said there's no timetable regarding a new K-9. A potential candidate did not complete training successfully. Another candidate probably will come from the Czech Republic or the Netherlands.







Source of Drinking Water

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The source water assessment for our supply has been completed by the Illinois EPA. If you would like a copy of this information, please stop by City Hall or call our water operator at 309-742-2351. Source of Water: ELMWOOD To determine Elmwood's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, a Well Site Survey, published in 1991 by the Illinois EPA, and a Source Water Assessment Program, were reviewed. Based on the information contained in these documents, twenty-one potential sources of groundwater contamination are present that could pose a hazard to groundwater pumped by the Elmwood community water supply wells. These include two stores/sales, a hardware store, five below ground fuel storages, a small engine repair, four above ground fuel storages, a warehouse, a manufacturing process, a ready mix/cement, a de-icing agent, a pile of material, a lagoon, a feed lot, and a mortuary. Based on information provided by Elmwood water supply officials, the following businesses, also indicated as potential sources in the site data table, are no longer present: J&J Oil, Maplelane Country Club, Elmwood Construction Co., Linder's Garage, Central Illinois Monument, Croziers Auto Parts, Blunier Concrete Co., Gorham Brothers, Knox Sunoco, and an unknown feedlot. Based upon this information, the Illinois EPA has determined that Elmwood Wells #1, #3, and #4 are not susceptible to IOC, VOC, or SOC contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and the available hydrogeologic data for the wells. In anticipation of the U.S. EPA's proposed Ground Water Rule, the Illinois EPA has determined that Elmwood's community water supply wells are not vulnerable to viral contamination. This determination is based upon the evaluation of the following criteria during the Vulnerability Waiver Process: the community's wells are properly constructed with sound integrity and proper site conditions; there is a hydrogeologic barrier that restricts pathogen movement; all potential routes and sanitary defects have been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a history of disease outbreak; and the sanitary survey of the water supply did not indicate a viral contamination threat. However, having stated this, the U.S. EPA is proposing to require States to identify systems in karst, gravel and fractured rock aquifer systems as sensitive. Water systems utilizing these aquifer types would be required to perform routine source water monitoring. Because the community's wells are constructed in a confined aquifer, which should provide an adequate degree of protection to prevent the movement of pathogens into the wells, well hydraulics were not considered to be a significant factor in the vulnerability determination.

Sectional survival

Area athletes earn berths in girls state track meet

For The Weekly Post KEWANEE – Sometimes, a track and field sectional is more about survival than personal records.

So it was last Thursday, when local girls track and field athletes battled on-and-off misty rain, wind and cool temperatures at the Kewanee Wethersfield Class 1A Sectional meet.

Despite the conditions, much of the cream of the local

track scene rose to the top.

For some like Elmwood-Brimfield junior Mya Strahm and senior Emma May, one attempt in their field event was

enough to earn a spot in the IHSA state meet. Class 1A competition starts today at Eastern Illinois University in Charleston and concludes Saturday.

Strahm, who is 16 and ranked first in the world among pole vaulters 18 or younger, cleared 10 feet, 0.75 inches in her lone attempt. That was good enough for first at the sectional and cleared the way for Strahm to defend her state pole vault title.

Her vault came despite headwinds blowing into the face of pole vaulters and despite Strahm using a practice pole and battling a sore calf muscle. "I brought all 13-7 poles, which is normally what I jump on," Strahm said, explaining that a shorter pole was needed since she was not going for a PR but just attempting the statequalifying height. "Thankfully I brought a warm-up pole."

Outdoors meets are still relatively new to Strahm, who estimates she has vaulted outdoors in competition only about 10-12 times.

The sectional scenario is similar to last season for Strahm, who battled injuries and missed nearly all of last year before vaulting once in sectional and then winning in Class 1A. But Strahm said she is feeling much healthier this spring.

"I go to the chiropractor once a week to stay fresh," she said. "I want to be fresh by state and feel good."

And the calf muscle didn't seem to be an issue after the pole vault, as Strahm qualified in four events overall, winning the 300-meter hurdles in 46.86 seconds and running a leg of E-B's state-bound 4x100 and 4x400 relays.

"For Mya to be in four events and qualify in all of them is a testament to her ability and willingness to do the little things to prepare," E-B Coach Kyle Anderson said.

Strahm is seeded fourth in hurdles after the sectional and is ninth in pole vault.

May also ran a leg in E-B's 4x100 relay and made state for the third straight year in long jump. But her win at sectional with a leap of 16-5.5 was her first championship.

"I have been a lot more relaxed this year," said May, whose best finish at state was 19th last year with a jump of 15-7.75. "It feels really good to go out a sectional champ."

Her winning jump didn't come without pain, though, as May stuck five spikes into her hand after landing.
