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Yates City vet honored with Memorial Day medal ceremony

YATES CITY – Roy Swanson doesn't remember much from the night of Aug. 28, 1971, when shrapnel ripped into his foot after enemy rockets hit his U.S. Army sleeping quarters near Chu Lai, Vietnam.

Monday helped bring some closure, though, as Swanson was honored during a special ceremony that attracted more than 75 people to the Yates City Community Center.

On hand to make a formal presentation of the Purple Heart and Bronze Star to Swanson were U.S. Rep. Eric



Sorensen (D-Moline) and a contingent of uniformed military officers that included Maj. Gen. David Wilson, commanding general of the U.S. Army Sustainment Command at the Rock Island Arsenal.

Though Swanson received medals while recovering in a hospital bed not long after the attack, he never had a ceremony or an explanation of how he earned the honors. And there was no record of the medals on his discharge record.

After Swanson called the Veterans Affairs office about the oversight, which affected his eligibility for disability payments, Sorensen stepped up and helped set the record straight.

It turns out Swanson saved a life during that 1971 attack, dragging fellow soldier Ken Meaney of New Jer-Continued on Page 10

Ownership could be transferred in June

PRINCEVILLE – Sometime in June, the village might authorize transferring ownership of its decommissioned aquatic center to a Princeville not-for-profit

But some details need to be clarified, according to Princeville Village officials.

"Everyone's trying to come to an agreement here," Village Trustee Ron Delbridge said. "If we can get a few things worked out, my honest feeling is next meeting, we can vote on it."

That next Village Board meeting is scheduled for Monday, June 3. But the main topic of discussion during the meeting May 21 was the Princeville Aquatic Center. That's the name of the facility the board voted last year to close permanently.

It's also the name of the

newly formed organization that wants to resurrect it.

Pat Stahl, a leader of that group, estimated it would cost about \$1 million to get the pool facility operating again. The pool has been inactive since the end of the 2022 season. Much of the fundraising and other work, like reactivating pool pumps, can't take place until after ownership is transferred.

"We're not going to be operating on wing and a prayer," said Peoria County Board Member Brian Elsasser, a pool supporter. "We've already written letters *Continued on Page 2*

Continued from Page 1 to bigger donors. We'll be very aggressive. I know there's people who have said they'll donate money. I'm not talking about just 5-10 dollars."

Princeville Aquatic
Center submitted a letter of
intent May 13 to the village. The letter states the
group will perform due diligence regarding whether
it's feasible economically
to reopen the facility. But
the letter also states the
aquatic-center property
would be returned to the
village if no viable path is
found.

During initial discussions with the save-the-pool group, that didn't appear to be a sticking point. But upon further review, some

officials, including Village President Jeff Troutman, said they're uncomfortable with that provision.

"We were ready to spend the money to demolish this pool," Delbridge said. "Someone else came in and wanted it. Fine. Take it. If it's going to somebody else, it'll be their responsibility, not ours."

Princeville resident
Spencer Wilson suggested
it's still the village's responsibility to maintain the
aquatic-center property.
Wilson, who lives next
door to it, told the board he
believes the pool is a
health hazard because of
stagnant water and dead
animals, including tree
from

"I think I've been more

than patient," Wilson said.
"I loved it when the pool was open. I loved hearing the kids play. It was awesome. But something needs to be done. It is really creating a nuisance behind my property.

"I'm just saying clean it, folks. I'm not saying drain it or fill it up with sand."

Chad Gardner, the village superintendent of public works, said he'll attempt to respond to Wilson's request. Regarding the letter of intent, attorneys are to review it again. Final consideration during the board meeting June 18 might be an option if the process isn't completed by Monday.

Kathy Sullivan, a savethe-pool representative, pleaded for additional patience

"I know it's been grindingly slow," she said.

Correction

In an article in the May 23 edition of The Weekly Post, it was incorrectly reported that Brandon Porter resigned from teaching physical education in the Brimfield school system. Porter said he is not resigning. The newspaper erred.

"Every step has taken way longer than any of us would like."

In other business, the board discussed briefly but did not vote regarding a proposal to increase sewer rates by \$1 per 1,000 gallons per household. The increase is to help keep pace with inflation and help pay for ongoing sewer improvements, according to Gardner. A decision is possible next month.

Last week, the board authorized:

- A \$1,000 donation to the upcoming St. Jude Princeville-to-Peoria Run.
- A \$2,500 Residential Rehabilitation Program reimbursement for roof repairs at 215 W. Main St.
- Implementing a Commercial Exterior Beautification and Renovation Program for a newly created village tax-increment-financing district. The grant fund is to be \$20,000.

Initial approval also was given for two TIF redevelopment grants – \$7,500 to Princeville Pharmacy for parking-lot blacktopping and sealcoating, and \$10,000 to EB Buildings & Lumber Co. for construction of a new addition. Final approval is expected Monday.

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

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

Of dodging cicadas, E-B XC alums & a life saver

Rambling through central Illinois, still itching after having cicadas crawling over me for a full day.

About a week ago, **Ron Cluskey** of Elmwood stopped by the office and

noted that, by his estimation, maps showing the expected emergence of cicada breeds in Illinois did not include Peoria County. Lo and behold, Cluskey was correct.

Boy, did we dodge a bullet.

Despite notable emergences in Jubilee College State Park and at Forest Park Nature Center, cicada sightings in Elmwood, Brimfield and other Peoria County urban areas have been limited.

The same is true west of us in Warren County, according to anecdotal reports. While the soil is warm enough, we're just not in the epicenter of the two-brood emergence.

That's not the case in Charleston, home to the IHSA state track meet. From the moment I got out of my car at Eastern Illinois University last Saturday, those little red-eyed rascals were everywhere, their song echoing through the air and their bodies colliding with everything.

The blue EIU track was littered with smooshed cicadas and competitors dodged them all day, particularly in the track's northwest corner and anywhere there was dirt or bushes.

After he won the 1,600-meter race, Elmwood-Brimfield's **Isaiah Hill** even had a cicada perched on his back (photo, upper right). Did the bug tag along during his winning run? It's possible.

Also uncomfortably possible was the chance a Kamikaze bug could wind up in the mouth of a runner. Can you imagine losing a state medal because you swallowed a cicada? I can, after seeing Saturday's carnage.

When cicadas landed on me every few minutes, I'd grab them gently by their wings – prompting a squeak – and let them fly off. Let some hungry critter eat them.

And while real-estate tax bills may say otherwise, in terms of cicadas, living in Peoria County is paying off.

One day after a memorable state meet for the Elmwood-Brimfield track and field program, E-B runners enjoyed another memorable event. On Sunday morning, Trojans cross country alumni gathered at Elmwood's track for the first Trojan Alumni Mile reunion. A crowd of more than 60 showed up and 43 were timed. Recent grads Luke Hoffmann (4:29.2), Thomas Harmon (4:31.8)and Hill (4:37.4) led the way, though there were impressive finishes by veteran runners like 2011 graduate **Ryan Bybee** (4:45.6) and 1986 grad Michael Heffron (5:34.1). "Seeing all the alumni, all the guys you coached or ran with, I loved it," E-B Coach **Gregg Meyers** said. "My plan is to do this every year. I hope they all enjoyed it and want to come back." Unlike football alumni games that were popular a few years back, there were no major injuries reported at the alumni mile, just plenty of sore muscles on Monday.

Kudos are in order for several local residents and officials. Praise goes first to Deputy **Jacque Dare** of the Knox County Sheriff's office. The coordinator of TRIAD, Dare saved a life in early March during an event at the Galesburg VFW. Yates City resident **Tom Plack**, former TRIAD president, became unresponsive at the event. "I did four (chest) com-



pressions and he started to come around," Dare said. Dare had only recently received CPR training with the Henderson Township Fire Protection District. ... Kudos also goes to Jim Ralston of Yates City, who for years has done a great job making improvements at the Yates City Community Center and at Harvest Home Park. Ralston said he is dialing back his volunteer efforts to spend more time enjoying his seven grandchildren, all of whom are under the age of 12. ... Gayla Taylor earns a Good Samaritan award for helping an elderly resident get home the other day. ... Adding bicyclists to the Ruck 22 John Pettit III Memorial Walk held last Saturday in Elmwood helped boost participation to over 100 walkers and riders. While totals are not final, organizers will be able to make healthy contributions to Freedom Paws Service Dogs and the John & Kimi Pettit Memorial Scholarship. ... Parting shot: Folks, we live in a state where the law now states that people in the Adult Redeploy Illinois program should be called "justice-impacted individuals" instead of "offenders."

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Let's clear up the confusing trade talk

The Biden Administration's trade agenda - mostly forgotten after three years of Covid, inflation, war in Ukraine, brutality in the Middle East, and a cantankerous Congress - recently surfaced and, wow, is it a mess.

For example, both presumptive presidential candidates, Democrat Joe Biden and Republican Donald Trump, recently argued over how high U.S. tariffs on electric vehicles from China should be. Biden imposed a 100% import fee; Trump claimed a 200% tariff was needed.

It's a fight few saw coming. Biden, who spent years promoting free trade and EVs, is now imposing trade barriers to keep out cost-

competitive vehicles that many Americans can afford and want.

The protectionist move was all the more surprising given that just four weeks prior, the White

House publicly poked Mexico, our largest trading partner, after it made a similar move against genetically modified U.S. corn used in "Mexico's dough and tortilla production."

By itself, the GM corn ban in Mexico's food sector is almost meaningless because white corn dominates its maize-centered food sector. The bigger problem is that the same ban "called for (GM corn) to be phased out from other food products and animal feed," explained Inside Trade on May 8.

That's an existential threat to the U.S. corn industry because, as Reuters reported, Mexico "accounts for 47% of the current total sales of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's full-year (corn) export forecast of 53.3 million tons for 2023-24."

That's not only big, it's dominant; Mexico is "easily the top (U.S. corn) buyer with Japan a distant second at 14%."

In many ways, Mexico's stand against the now-flood of imported American GM corn – corn, Mexico maintains, that harms both its domestic producers and its food culture – resembles the White House's stand against Chinese EVs.

Both see the need to legally defend sovereign markets and domestic producers against government-subsidized, global mercantilists like China and, Mexico believes, the U.S. They point to our government-mandated ethanol markets and subsidized federal crop insurance as clear proof.

Besides, they argue, no one is advocating against non-GM corn exports to Mexico, a massive, lucrative market to any corn-growing nation, America or others.

All of this confusing trade talk was not lost on the Senate Finance Committee, which held a mid-April hearing to rake U.S. Trade Representative Katherine Tai and the Biden Administration over the legislative coals for not playing enough "offense" on free trade.

Committee Chairman and Oregon Democrat Ron Wyden chided Tai for not initiating "formal trade talks

for a free-trade agreement anywhere." His committee counterpart, Ranking Republican Mike Crapo of Idaho, complained that the White House "has yet to take a single enforcement action against China."

Little did Crapo know he'd get his wish on May 17 when, in a unanimous 4-0 vote, the U.S. International Trade Commission ruled "there is a reasonable indication that a U.S. industry is materially injured by ... imports of ... 2,4-D from China and India that are ... subsidized by the governments of China and India."

But trade policy, even with a finding as definitive as the ITC's, is a roiling, rocky sea to navigate.

Shortly after the finding went public, "The National Corn Growers Association said it was 'disappointed that ITC did not listen to ... farmers' about ... the adverse impact if countervailing or antidumping tariffs were imposed on the imported herbicide."

Translation: The corn group is "disappointed" because the subsidized, imported 2,4-D from China and India (with our subsidized crop insurance) helps members produce corn more cheaply for the mandated U.S. ethanol and now-under-siege Mexican corn markets.

In other words, trade rules that make us money are good but trade rules that cost us money are bad.

Well, I'm glad we finally cleared that up.

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



Growing carrots can be tricky but worthwhile

Of the many cartoon characters appearing on TV back in the 1950s, one of the most popular was Looney Tunes' Bugs Bunny. The smartalecky rabbit was famous for non-chalantly taking a bite out of a carrot and saying, "Ehh, what's up, Doc?"

It seemed like no kid back then could chomp on a carrot without quoting the "wascally wabbit."

If you have ever tasted a carrot fresh from the garden, you know the sweetness and flavor is way better than that of any grocery-store version. Yet a common lamentation expressed by even experienced gardeners is that carrots are so difficult to grow. Even university horticulturists say carrots are one of the most challenging garden vegetables. Why is that?

For one thing, carrots are slow. From planting to harvest it can take as long as three months to grow a carrot. And they're prima donnas. Everything has to be just right during that time to get a nice yield of healthy, well-formed carrots. If you've struggled with getting a good crop, the following suggestions may help.

First, prepare a friable seedbed free of rocks and stones. Carrots demand loose soil to produce straight, sturdy roots. A growing carrot root won't push a stone aside but will grow around it instead, sometimes forking into two roots to straddle the obstruction. Avoid using high-nitrogen fertilizer. Excess nitrogen grows foliage and flowers at the expense of roots.

It's easy to sow carrot seeds too deeply. They should be planted just a quarter-inch deep. That can be tricky because you feel like they're barely planted. Try this. Start with a level seedbed and sow the seeds in a row, spacing them about an inch or two apart. Carrot seeds are small and it's not easy to space them exactly but don't worry. You'll thin them out later anyway. Cover the seeds with a thin layer of lump-free soil. Some folks use a mix of soil and sand to provide a quarter-inch cover. Such a mix is less likely to form a crust.

Consistent moisture during the long germination period is crucial. To keep the sun from drying the soil surface, lay a board over the row and leave it in place until the tiny seedlings begin to appear. Set the board on small stones or blocks to suspend it about an inch above the surface of the row. The thin cedar pickets sold at box stores are perfect for such a job. They're a half-inch thick, 4 inches wide and 6 feet long, lightweight and easy to set aside temporarily while watering.

After sowing, check the soil at least daily and water with a soft spray to maintain a moist but not wet growing medium. This is most important. Drying out for even just one day can severely impair germination. Keep

that sprinkling can handy.

Once you see the tiny green shoots, remove the boards. Continue to keep the soil moist. When the plants are 1 to 2 inches tall, thin them out so that the remaining plants are 2 to 3 inches apart. A light layer of mulch applied after the carrots are couple inches tall will help maintain consistent soil moisture.

The thinning process causes psychological trauma for some folks. They feel guilty pulling out perfectly healthy little carrot plants, but the remaining plants will have room to grow into long thick healthy specimens. To feel better, you can wash the plants you pulled and add the tops to your salads.

My two youngest grandsons, when they were about 4-6, loved to go out to our garden to help plant potatoes, peas, beans and carrots. As the crops came on, the boys would head to the garden whenever they visited to eat peas and beans fresh from the vine and pull a couple carrots to munch right there on the spot. Thanks to my CD collection of Looney Tunes, the lads would utter Bugs' famous words while they grinned and chomped on fresh carrots. The wittle wascals.

The boys are older now (sigh) and not so much for planting, but they still make trips out to the garden for fresh veggie snacks. Hopefully while harvesting snacks their minds are gathering fond memories of visiting grandma and grandpa's garden.

SWANSON: Memories of rescue are vague

Continued from Page 1 sey to safety, according to Wilson.

The memories are vague for Swanson, an artilleryman from Rock Island who was 30 days from leaving Vietnam when he was hit by a Viet Cong rocket and suffered a chipped bone and nerve and artery damage in his foot. Overall, 33 were killed and 83 were wounded in the attack.

"I was in a blackout most of the time. The pain was intense," Swanson said. "I remember heading back to pick up Ken Meaney. I could hear him calling for help. I blacked out before I got there, I think. The next thing I remember is laying out on the helipad, waiting for a medevac chopper."

Wilson said Meaney was there alongside Swanson.

"Despite facing life-threatening injuries himself, Roy saved the life of a fellow soldier himself that day," Wilson said. "Your actions on that day in 1971 have upheld the highest traditions of military service and the armed forces. In facing danger you demonstrate the self-

lessness that inspires us all. Your actions serve as an example of the indelible spirit of the United States of America.

"We honor your bravery."

Swanson, 74, moved to Yates City five years ago from Aledo with his wife, Pauline. He said they moved to the area to be closer to one of his four sons and his only granddaughter, who both live in Canton.

After the ceremony, Swanson said he was moved by the sizable crowd, which included nearly a dozen Elba-Salem Fire Department members in uniform, Knox County Sheriff Jack Harlan and several other uniformed police officers and deputies.


"I never expected this kind of a turnout," Swanson said. "This is really something."

That would seem to achieve part of Sorensen's stated goal for the ceremony.

"Our veterans represent the best that Yates City and our entire nation has to offer," the congressman said. "And I'm committed to making sure that every veteran is shown an appreciation and thanks. Not only through the benefits that are so rightly earned, but through these ceremonies where we come together as neighbors to give the recognition that has been many years in the making."

Even with the medals and the ceremony, Swanson said Vietnam will still be on his mind frequently.

"I don't suffer from flashbacks or anything, but I do think about Vietnam every day," he said, "just because whenever I step on my foot there it is, a big old lump on the bottom, and I still limp a little bit, especially when I get tired."

Illinois turkey hunters post record harvest

SPRINGFIELD – Illinois hunters harvested a preliminary statewide record total of 17,208 wild turkeys during the 2024 spring season.

This year's total compares with the 2023 statewide harvest of 16,123 and the previous harvest record total of 16,569, set in 2006.

The top five counties for the 2024 spring turkey harvest were Jo Daviess 654, Jefferson 472, Marion 435, Pope 397 and Randolph 395.

The 2024 total includes a record youth turkey harvest of 2,009 birds, which compares with the 2023 youth harvest of 1,309. The previous youth season record of 1,733 was set in 2020.

This year, hunters purchased 86,083 permits compared to 80,642 last year. Spring turkey hunting was

Lawmakers move to pause pipeline projects

SPRINGFIELD - After state regulators rebuffed several proposed carbon transport projects over the past year, lawmakers have moved to formally ban new projects until the federal government sets forth new safety rules.

The technology is used to take carbon dioxide – a powerful greenhouse gas – and move it through pipelines before storing it deep underground. While proponents say it is key to addressing climate change, the practice is often criticized for risks involved.

The measure, part of a package regulating the developing technology, was the fruit of extended negotiations among lawmakers, environmentalists, business groups and the governor's office.

Senate Bill 1289 passed the House 78-29 and the Senate 43-12, with two senators voting present. Gov. JB Pritzker said Sunday evening he plans to sign the bill.

The moratorium would expire on July 1, 2026, if the U.S. Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration doesn't finalize safety rules by then. In addition, the bill has what proponents call some of the strongest carbon dioxide-related safety protections in the nation.

The bill requires monitoring injection wells for at least 30 years after they close, a process that must be approved by the state and federal government. It also grants the Illinois Commerce Commission expanded authority to impose fees and require safety models for carbon sequestration and transportation projects.

Fees would go into a group of newly created state funds that will help train first responders and provide equipment to manage potential emergency situations associated with carbon-capture technology.

Environmentalists have fought hard against carbon sequestration projects. But several environmental groups eventually supported the bill because

the technology already exists and is in use in Illinois and more sequestration projects are likely to be proposed.Representatives of the Coalition to Stop CO2 Pipelines, Earthjustice and the Illinois Environmental Council all applauded aspects of the bill, such as safety requirements and language ensuring projects do not increase pollution.

Other groups remained opposed, including the Illinois Farm Bureau, largely because of how the bill handles eminent domain.

Under the proposal, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources can issue a binding order on "nonconsenting" landowners to force them to let carbon sequestration companies use their land – specifically, the "pore space" thousands of feet underground - to store carbon dioxide.

Companies would be required to give just compensation in exchange, but the method presented in the bill to calculate compensation drew bipartisan criticism.



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



The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural live-

stock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farmino.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

Source of Water: Princeville. To determine Princeville's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, a Well Site Survey, published in 1989 by the Illinois EPA, and a Source Water Protection Plan were reviewed. During the survey of Princeville's source water protection area, Illinois EPA staff recorded fourteen potential sources of groundwater contamination that could pose a hazard to groundwater pumped by the Princeville community water supply wells. One potential source, route, or possible problem site is located within the combined 200 foot minimum setback zones of wells #1 and #2. A total of ten potential sources or problem sites are located within the 1,000 foot survey radius of these wells. Four potential sources or problem sites are located within the 1,000 foot survey radius of well #3. These sites include two treated wood/lumber yards, a construction/demolition company, a mortuary, three below ground fuel storages, an auto repair shop, an auto body shop, two machine shops/sheds, two businesses that manufacture/process chemicals, and an above ground fuel storage. The Illinois EPA has determined that Princeville wells #1 and #2 are susceptible to IOC, VOC, and SOC contamination. Well #3 is not susceptible to IOC or SOC contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including monitoring conducted at the entry point in the distribution system, and the available hydrogeologic data for the wells.

"I was just worried he was going to come back and get me," Hill said. "But to my surprise, and my delight, he was not right behind me."

Second in the mile last year at state - his 4:19.93 time was just behind the 4:19.24 of Tommy Murray of Port Byron Riverdale - Hill now owns an E-B-best six IHSA state track medals and had his best finish as an individual last fall in cross country, placing fifth in Class 1A.

"This is my senior year and first-time ever being a state champion and it means so much," Hill said.

Meyers said Hill had entered the 800 hoping to break a state record but ran a more strategic race in the mile.

"After you go for a record and come up short and get second, that can ruin you as far as your mental focus," Meyers said. "I thought he did a fantastic job getting his focus back."

Hill will attend the University of Iowa this fall and said he may run on a club team but may also opt to train for a half-marathon. As for the training involved during high school, Hill said, "I'll miss it and I won't miss it at the same time. It's been a lot."

The E-B track team also earned a ninth-place medal in the 4x800 relay, but only after a

runner for Winnebago threw the baton at the finish, resulting in a disqualification.

That moved E-B from 10th onto the podium with a seasonbest finish of 8:13.45 for seniors Reed Florey (2:01.14 split) and LJ Higgs (2:01.97) and sophomores Aiden Faulkner (2:05.31) and Kam Stevenson (2:05.11). "Everybody ran their fastest times," Meyers saud.

Sterling Newman Central Catholic won the relay in 7:53.72, just off a state record.

E-B junior Mika Nelson was two spots from a medal in the 3,200 on Saturday, finishing 11th with a PR of 10:00.66. Will Foltz of Tuscola won in 9:18.86.

E-B finished 10th as a team with 19 points while Winnebago took first with 57 points, three ahead of runner-up Tuscola.

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Fulfilling finale

E-B's Hill wins 1A 1,600 state title

For The Weekly Post CHARLESTON – Isaiah Hill has won an impressive number of races as an Elmwood-Brimfield runner. He's got enough medals to fill a closet.

But when he crossed the O'Brien Stadium finish line first Saturday afternoon at the Class 1A state track meet, dodging cicadas and tilting his head to yell after a mile well run, Hill exclaimed, "I finally got one."

The state title he so fervently wanted was his after finishing the 1,600-meter race in a personal-best time of 4:17.02. The track and field championship is the first by an Elmwood or Brimfield boys athlete since 1926.

"It feels like I can rest easy now," Hill said. "I can say goodbye to my high school career with pride. I finally did it. No more regrets."

Rest did not come easy Friday night, though. While Hill posted the fastest times in the 800 and 1,600 during Thursday's Class 1A prelims, that meant nothing come Saturday. Hill knew that. He felt the pressure.

"Last night I woke up at 3 and then at 5 and couldn't go back to sleep," he said. "My head was so stressed. I was just thinking about the races and going over how they could end up."

By the time the gun sounded to start the mile Saturday, Hill was ready. He stayed in fourth most of the way while keeping within striking distance of the leaders. Only in the final 200 meters did Hill start his victorious sprint.

"I was ready to go with 300 to go, but (Coach Gregg Meyers) had told me beforehand, 'Wait to go until 200.' I tried to be patient for coach and it worked out perfectly," Hill said. "I'm a sit-and-kicker. I like to hunt people down. I'm much more comfortable that way."

His sprint placed Hill

ahead of runner-up Nicolai Martino of Winnebago (4:18.13) and Tuscola nemesis Josiah Hortin

(4:20.19), who was third. A few hours earlier, Hortin had sprinted past Hill in the final 200 meters of the 800 to win that championship. Hortin also edged Hill to win the Illinois Top Times 800 this indoor season and was one spot ahead at last year's state meet when Hill finished fourth in the 800.
