

# Local museum brings the past to life

TOULON – History came alive June 8 at an open house of the Stark County Historical Society's impressive three-building campus.

The 10 exhibit spaces include those featuring Native Americans, a frontier cabin, multiple carriages, the original 1840s office of the first physician between Peoria and Rock Island, a lovingly restored Victorian home, farm equipment, interactive opportunities for youngsters and more.

Each exhibit also featured a knowledgeable docent in period attire. There were also videos to accompany several exhibits.

The hundreds, maybe thousands, of items on display date back to the 1600s. Correct that: The spectacular collections of arrowheads and Native American tools of nationally known collector/appraiser Gary Hulin of Modena date back thousands of years.

Near a replica covered wagon is a priceless piece of 1850s farm equipment – invented by a 14-year-old Elmira resident. James Armstrong of Elmira invented and built from wood a mechanical corn planter. Armstrong patented the planter, which was later mass produced. His descendants, the Wilkinsons, still live in the county.

At the open house, youngsters helped Marian Purtscher make, roll and bake old-fashioned biscuits from scratch, as well as hand-crank butter. And they typed on – guess what? – a typewriter, though not on the 1800s typewriter owned by The Stark County News, which is also on display. Local historian Don Schmidt

held forth on Stark County in the Civil War. With a population of 10,000 at the start of the war (twice its present total), Stark County provided 1,000 men for the horrendous conflict, in units such as the Elmira and LaFayette Rifles, as well as the 112th Regiment of the 33rd Division. A minister lamented that, "There wasn't an able-bodied man left in the

pews on Sunday."

# **Residents respond**

County asked to go elsewhere for building site

TOULON – A group of
Toulon residents made it
clear to the Stark County
Board of Supervisors Tuesday that they do not want a
county maintenance building at the end of their street.

The county has spent several years searching for a new location to house heavy equipment, trucks and other items. At its May meeting, the board began discussion but took no action on purchasing 7 acres of farm land at the south end of South Union Street for a new county highway building.

Residents who attended Monday's meeting say their quiet, narrow street is not suited for a building that will bring heavy vehicles and commotion to the neighborhood – particularly when other options exist.

"There's a lot of better places to build a showcase county garage where everyone can see where their tax dollars are going rather that tucking it into a small neighborhood," said Andy Colgan, who lives at 227 S. Union St. "We're asking you to abandon the idea of purchasing this property on a quiet street that is not made for heavy truck traffic."

Other residents voiced similar concerns.

Whether their wishes will be heeded is unclear. After a 25-minute closed session, the board took no action be-

# **COUNTY BOARD:** Progress slow on MFT work

Continued from Page 1 fore adjourning.

After the meeting, Chairman Kari Bush said only, "No decision was made. Most likely it will be on the next agenda. I'm not certain."

Among the South Union Street residents who spoke was Bill Price, who noted that the sewer lines running under the street are clay tile that could break under a heavy load.

Colgan, who is also Toulon's fire chief, said a water line dead ends at the end of South Union Street and the hydrant there is inoperable.

Colgan said the City of Toulon was not aware of the possible purchase.

"We take pride in our neighborhood, which I think is one of the best in town," Colgan said. "This would completely upend the south side of Toulon."

Added Kenny Lane, who lives on the corner of South Union and East Jefferson streets, "There's quite a few little kids that play on the street. I don't want to see heavy equipment going up and down that road."

In other business, the board approved paying bills and heard various reports from officials.

Chief Deputy Chuck Demetreon gave the Sheriff's report and said the office will move forward on a bid from Saw-N-Logs to spend \$950 to remove a tree next to the new E911 communications center.

Demetreon introduced the county's new K-9 officer, Hunter, and Officer Caleb Ingels and K-9 Alex. Ingels said that just prior to the meeting, Alex had located 8.7 grams of methamphetamine in a vehicle during a traffic stop.

"We have made a lot of drug arrests" together, Ingels said. "We're going to try to clean the streets and to do our best."

Demetreon was also asked why the sheriff's secretary had 13 hours of overtime one pay period and 17 on another in May. He said he would ask Sheriff Steve Sloan.

Bush reported that the new First Choice Healthcare office in Toulon will help the school district resume

drug testing in the junior and senior high schools for students in sports and other activities. Bush said drug testing went by the wayside during the COVID pandemic.

County Engineer Judd Giffin said he is waiting to move forward with Motor Fuel Tax work but continues to have problems in getting answers from the Illinois Department of Transportation. Giffin said he has reached out to Peoria County Engineer Amy McLaren for assistance.

Bush asked that she and Robin Nowlan be included on all future correspondence with IDOT.

Board Member Tom House suggested Giffin enlist the help of State's Attorney Austin King. Giffin said he would "use that as a last resort."

Treasurer Paula Leezer reported the county has collected about 60-65 percent of real estate taxes which are "in the bank earning interest."

Board Member Bill Loane asked Demetreon to tell Sloan to report back on a column in the front of the courthouse that Loane said is rotting.


# Of a fine track, Thermonators & a week off

#### Land of 8,500 units of local government

To The Editor:

Illinois is the land of 8,500 units of local government, by far the most in the nation. This is extreme tax waste which does not need to be on the backs of over-taxed families.

Example One: Stark County's population of just 5,345 encompasses all or parts of 40 taxing districts, about one for every 133 citizens.

Example Two: Dolton residents pay taxes to the village, Thornton Township, Thornton Township Road District, as well as a park district, a public library, a water reclamation district, a forest preserve, a mosquito abatement district, five school districts, a community college district and Cook County.

Layers upon layers of unnecessary layers of government are draining



taxpayers dry. Illinois has the highest overall tax burden of all 50 states.

Forty-Six states function with fewer than 2,500 units of local government. How does Illinois compare? If Illinois eliminated 5,000 units of local government, it would still have 1,000 more units than 46 states!

Illinoisans are forced to fund a nation leading local government system designed for the 1800s, a bygone era.


Travel is now by car, not horse and buggy.

Make government consolidation a priority, doing away with the township form of government should be at the top of the list. 
#### Et cetera

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

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# **GALVA'S CLEAN UP 2024**

# Gardening for a hummingbird's travels

URBANA – Hummingbirds are unlike any other bird. Spanning the Americas with over 330 species, hummingbirds belong to Trochilidae, the secondlargest bird family in the world.

However, only the rubythroated hummingbird (Archilochus colubris) inhabits the Midwest. This hummingbird migrates south in late summer, with the males migrating first, typically in August. Before the non-stop flight to overwintering sites, this bird needs abundant food sources to fuel its journey to Florida, Texas, Central America or Mexico.

Often, hummingbirds prefer open habitats along forest edges or areas with scattered trees, including urban areas. So it is possible to have them visit any urban or suburban property if the locations have plants they prefer. Once a hummingbird detects those plants, it often returns around the same time each year.

They typically nest in

Princeville, IL

trees or other protected areas, though some have been spotted nesting on top of a wind chime. Moss and lichens are used to camouflage nests made of hairs, spider silk and plant fibers.

#### Planting for Hummingbirds

There are many ways to support hummingbirds. A container of their preferred plants will invite them to a patio or balcony. Growing plants vertically, including vines, can maximize any space. If you have space, plan to incorporate a steady supply of nectar blooms during each season, especially during migration. Plant species in clumps of at least three so hummingbirds will recognize the blocks of color.

With their long beaks, hummingbirds feed on the

nectar of tubular flowers. They have a preference for red, orange and pink blooms but can be seen visiting other types of flower structures and colors. For instance, black and blue salvia is a favorite tubular flower, although it is purple. Also, remember that all flowers are not created equally. Double flowers and some cultivars do not produce valuable nectar.

A few suggested plants native to Illinois and the U.S. that they prefer include red columbine (Aquilegia canadensis), cardinal flower (Lobelia cardinalis), trumpet honeysuckle (Lonicera sempervirens) and Bee Balm (Monarda didyma).





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

# Year-round work makes lavender season bloom

Lavender season is here. It's something sisters, Kim Hansen and Kris Straub, work for all year at Tenderloin Farms Lavender in Edwardsville.

Hansen said over the winter they made 200 Farm in a Jar items (aromatic and textural collections of farm items including lavender, pinecones and sometimes soybeans), 300 candles and 700 bottles of lavender ex-

tract

Last year the sisters added culinary items including lavender extract and syrup, which was a hit with visiting culinaryschool students. The sisters also share recipes that feature their food-grade lavender grown using organic principles.

Near their busy store in a reclaimed dairy barn stands a greenhouse where they grow 1,500 plants for sale this time of year.

50 varieties of the potential 450 lavender varieties available. The selected 50 are constantly changing as they find the best for the growing conditions in southwestern Illinois.

The main attraction is the aromatic plants featuring vivid purple blooms. At the U-pick farm, visitors can pick their own bouquets.


Straub and Hansen took over the farm in 2016 after their father died. They farm about 300 acres, with corn and soybeans as their mainstays.

Visitors often ask why the fields are not all planted with lavender. The sisters explain corn and soybeans provide the largest part of their income. Lavender, not a traditional Midwest crop, takes a lot of management but works well as an income supplement. The lavender crop is about three weeks early, but the sisters were still able to get their field crops planted and the farm shipshape for opening in mid-May.

# Fungicides help treat corn tar spot

**FarmWeek** 

Tar spot was first discovered in the U.S. in 2015, making this the 10th season farmers and researchers have battled the corn dis-

In the beginning, there were a lot of unknowns, Jim Donnelly, technical agronomist with DEKALB/Asgrow based in Lee County, told the RFD Radio Network

"One thing that that we've learned and researched is that fungicides work. They work very well and especially some of the

newer fungicides with multiple modes of action," Donnelly said.

Fast forward to today, Bayer researchers can artificially inoculate tar spot in field test plots, which will advance research in both crop protection and genetic tolerance.

"We need the disease in our trials so that we know which ones are good and which ones are bad and to date it's been hard to get that consistent disease level," he said.

"With this we can consistently deliver it where we want it and that essentially

speeds up our ability to characterize and deliver new products to the market."

He said while there is good potential for genetic tolerance, farmers are still reliant on fungicides.

"I think that it will allow us to select products that are close to commercial availability and allow us to prioritize those," he said.



# Shot clock coming in 2026-27

#### IHSA changes state hoops schedule, moves bass finals

BLOOMINGTON – The
Illinois High School Association will require shot
clocks for varsity basketball starting with the
2026-27 season.

The IHSA Board of Directors approved that at its Monday meeting and also approved a new schedule for the state boys basketball tournament and a new venue for the state bassfishing tournament.

A 35-second shot clock will be used in varsity girls and boys basketball games, but use of the shot clock for lower-level (freshman, sophomore, junior varsity) contests will be determined by conferences and via mutual agreement by teams in nonconference games.

"The IHSA has allowed the shot clock to be used in tournaments and shootouts the past two seasons, and the overwhelming feedback we have received from coaches is that it is time to embrace the shot clock in all varsity contests," said IHSA Executive Director Craig Anderson. "We believe the two-season lead time will provide our schools with ample opportunity to

install the shot clocks and get comfortable with hem from both a coaching and game administration perspective."

The board also approved a recommended schedule change from the basketball advisory committee to guarantee each semifinal team a two-day experience at the state finals.

High school bass anglers will next spring be fishing Lake Shelbyville for their state championship after spending the past 15 years

on Carlyle Lake. The IHSA is committed to Lake Shelbyville for five years, from 2025-29.

The bass final has been at Carlyle Lake since 2009, though windy conditions often make fishing challenging on that fairly wide-open body of water.

The board of directors also approved rules for the 2024 girls flag football season. State finals will be held at Willowbrook High School in Villa Park this fall.
