Princeville patrol

Yarger third Princeville deputy in a year; hopes to stick around

For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE -Shawn Yarger's initial goal as the new law-enforcement representative in Princeville isn't lofty. He wants to be in that job longer than his two immediate predecessors.

That probably won't take much.

Yarger began his new Peoria County Sheriff's Office duties June 3. The 18-year veteran of the force is to spend 40 hours a week in Princeville. That's in keeping with the contract the sheriff's office has with the village.

"I know a lot of

people from Princeville, and I'm at the age now where I'm ready to start doing my own thing," the 47-year-old Yarger said during his initial night on duty. "It was time for a change, so I came up here."

Yarger replaced Adam Bickett, who had been on Princeville patrol only about a month before he was fired from the department in March. An internal investigation revealed Bickett violated sheriff's-office policy, as alleged by his peers. In late February, Bickett was placed on paid administrative leave.

Bickett's predecessor was Vince Cogdal, who served Princeville for about a year before he resigned from the force. A variety of deputies patrolled Princeville temporarily between Bickett's departure and Continued on Page 8

interim superintendent of schools. Sivertsen retired after five years as superintendent of Canton schools in June 2021 and was also superintendent at Midland CUSD 7 for 23 years.

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a big help facilitating the transition to a full-time superintendent," said Chad Goff, Williamsfield School Board president. "He even said, 'One of the most important things we need to do is to get you a good full-time superintendent.""

Sivertsen replaces Tim Farquer, who last Friday accepted a position as superintendent of Aledo-based Mercer County CUSD 404.

"I'm now working for seven people that agreed they want me there. That's a big difference," Farquer said. "It's really more of a stereo-Continued on Page 2

Deadly Peoria crash leads to lawsuit

PEORIA – Law-enforcement authorities in Peoria have been silent, for the most part, regarding a traffic accident in May that killed a Princeville-area

A lawsuit filed Monday in Peoria County Circuit Court might lead to more information becoming public.

The lawsuit alleges a Stark County man was negligent when his vehicle collided headon with Nevaeh Mitchell's ve-

hicle about 11:30 p.m. May 4 in the 8400 block of Orange Prairie Rd.

Levi B. Dietz, 25, of Wyoming was driving a 2012 Ford Fusion south in the left northbound lane. That was the same

lane in which 18-year-old Mitchell was driving north in a 2012 Nissan Versa, according

to authorities.

Mitchell, who was on her way home from her job at a Peoria movie theater, was pronounced dead at the scene. An ambulance transported Dietz to OSF Saint Francis Medical Center, where he underwent surgery to repair severe injuries.

In each direction in the accident area, Orange Prairie Road is two lanes. A concrete-andgrass median separates each pair.

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

Continued from Page 1 typical district-superintendent job where I manage business operations out of the business office and then work with the principals and various directors to try to realize the vision and strategic plan the board puts in place.

"I probably won't be mowing the infield grass."

That's one job Farquer, 51, did willingly at Williamsfield but will not have time for at a district that is roughly three times larger than Billtown and has five buildings, including a district office.

Farquer said payment in the new job is probably a wash due to a different structure of his contract,

which features a higher base salary but added costs for health insurance. Farquer also said that being in charge of a district in which he did not grow up will be a different experience.

"I'll be personally invested in everything I do, but I don't have 50 years of history in the district," he said. "Which sometimes is an asset and sometimes is not."

Farquer said he plans to rent a dwelling initially.

"Our youngest is off to college soon, so we've got a lot of things to get squared away," Farquer said.

Sivertsen is a Peoria native who graduated from Illinois State University and earned graduate degrees at Illinois State and Western Illinois.

Goff said he is excited about working with Siv-

ertsen and has already started planning for the hiring process of a fulltime superintendent.

Williamsfield will again receive assistance in the process from the Illinois Association of School Boards, which is expected to post the position on July 1. That is Sivertsen's first day on the job in Billtown and Farquer's first day at Mercer County.

"I believe we are planning on a fall interview session," Goff said. "But if somebody throws their hat in over the summer or something along those lines, that's obviously something we would look at."

Williamsfield's initial IASB search yielded three finalists earlier this spring, but negotiations fell through with the board's top choice.







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

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
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


Of bowling alleys, Bachtolds, bison & bluebirds



New faces, roles on Yates City Village Board

YATES CITY - The Yates City Village Board has some new faces and new roles.

At its June 12 meeting, Mark Hostetler was sworn in as the new village president to replace Ken Vallas and Voinda Brinker was sworn in as a new trustee to fill Hostetler's vacated position. Also, Joy Mahr was sworn in again as village treasurer.

Brinker was made committee head for technology and public grounds, Ron Smith was put in charge of

streets and alleys and Matt Ehens was made committee head for police.

Susan Hostetler is currently filling in as village clerk for Debbie Canier, who is taking time off for bereavement. The board voted to reimburse Susan Hostetler for her services at Canier's usual rate. The board also voted to split this month's pay in half for outgoing president Vallas and Mark Hostetler.

In other business, the board is seeking an estimate from Nathan Blankenship for repair of the sewer-plant roof. The expectation is that patching

and shingle replacement is needed, with a possible need for plywood replacement. Gutters and rainspouts will also be installed. If the entire roof needs to be replaced, a second opinion will be sought.

The board also renewed its contract with Central Illinois Pest Control to treat for termites in the white shed for \$612 per year, approved refilling of the butane tank at the sewer plant for a cost of \$430-480 and confirmed that Kevin Cooper will put down new oil chip in two weeks.

Continued from Page 1 Mitchell's parents, Matthew Mitchell and Danielle Courteau, are plaintiffs accuses Dietz of guilt for driving in the wrong direction, failure to look out for other vehicles and failure to stop to avoid a collision.

"He should have seen that it was impending and (he) had ample time and opportunity to avoid it," the lawsuit stated.

Authorities have not

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charged Dietz with any crimes. Toxicology results are pending.

No dollar amount regarding damages was requested in the lawsuit, filed by the Peoria law firm of Cusack & Gilfillan. The lawsuit lists Courteau and Matthew Mitchell as administrators of Nevaeh Mitchell's estate.

The plaintiffs requested a jury trial. A management conference was

scheduled for 9:30 a.m. Nov. 22.

Details about the accident are likely to be discussed in court, as attorneys gather evidence and present it. Those details have not yet been forthcoming from the Peoria Police Department.

In response to an Illi-

nois Freedom of Information Act request from The Weekly Post and The Prairie News, the police department released a basic report about the accident. But other reports, which might shed more light on the investigation, were redacted almost entirely.

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




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Elmwood school board OKs personnel moves



nent position, according to Sheriff Chris Watkins.

"He will exemplify community policing in that community," Chief

said. "He's very down to earth. Those are his people. He has a lot of life experience."

A Chillicothe native, Yarger was a police officer in Henry before he joined the sheriff's department. He also has worked in non-police private busi-

Yarger's most recent pre-Princeville assignment, for about 21/2 years, was as a process server. That job included evictions, orders of protection and court summonses.

"We would knock on the door and if nobody answered, we'd break in," Yarger said. "It was scary. Sometimes they're hiding in the closet, hiding in the attic, hiding in the crawlspace. It was a horrible experience for a lot of people."

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Among other sheriff'soffice duties, Yarger was a deputy at the Peoria County Courthouse and worked in traffic-accident reconstruction and fieldofficer training. He also was the regular deputy in Medina Township, an assignment similar to his current one.

"It was good," he said about those days. "I'm good at getting to know people. I'm good at talking to people and getting information. It was a good experience. I liked it, and I think I can apply it here, some of the stuff I've learned.

"I want to be approachable. I want people to be able to be comfortable coming to see me and talk to me, and I want the community to know that it's going to be the same person every time you see the police, five days a week."

The new-job flexibility also will benefit Yarger's family, as he sees it. His four children range in age from 20 to 1. Before work on his first day in Princeville, he was able to watch one of his sons play baseball. But Yarger suggested family obligations won't conflict with his new assignment.

"I'll be seen," he said. "The sheriff wants somebody up here who's consistent. The sheriff wants somebody up here who's good to the people, who's fair. And that's me."

"It's a strong push of wind out of the storm straight to the ground," Copple said. "Whenever it pushes out, the wind accelerates. Usually whenever there is a strong downburst, it's localized."

The only tornadoes the Weather Service reported from that storm were in McLean County, Copple

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Farmington improving cemetery, gym and city

city is making improvements and plans for more.

The City Council heard Monday that Oak Ridge Cemetery has received touch ups, including concrete for a sidewalk and new entrance and landscaping by J.D. Landscaping.

Looking forward, the cemetery board plans to erect a wall down Vernon Street later this month that will be 3 feet off of the roadway and 4 feet wide. The board is also looking for bids to update the roof on the mausoleum; to rehang newly powder-coated gates in July; to update a tool shed with new trim, window glass, fascia, soffit and gutters; to contract for repairs of 100 grave markers; and to place a flagpole in front of Vernon Street that will be illuminated.

The city intends to trade a truck for one that does not require a CDL license so that it can be used by employees. City staff have power-washed graffiti up and down Fort and Dement streets, on the tables and benches at both parks and on the mausoleum and ADA stairs.

Sidewalk repairs are coming soon and stormbasin repairs have already been started. Power has been installed at the Jacobs Park garage and spray patching will begin this week or early next week.

Bids are currently being collected for an air-conditioning unit in the community center gym to address floor humidity hazards, the card-entry system is in place and repairs for a hydraulic door on the east side of the building are in motion. Solar and roof work will begin the week of July 8.

USA Basketball Camp has completed its second of eight sessions with about 150 kids participating. Another session of the camp starts July 18.

There have been about 70 kids a day attending summer recreation camp at Jacobs Park, with a total of 116 children registered.

In other business, the city approved a \$250 donation to FFA as well as a \$250 donation to the July 4 parade.

City Administrator Bettina Bohanan said she will take over organizing farmer's markets on Fridays. Bohanan and Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam have begun attending quarterly meetings with all towns in Fulton County to exchange thoughts and ideas.

The Council also approved a storm-sewer easement agreement with John and Monica Yard and TIF redevelopment agreements with the Farmington Masonic Lodge, Reflective Properties, LLC, Creative Designs by Casandra, Inc., and David Nichols.

The council also approved spending an additional \$6,500 for road maintenance under the Illinois Highway Code, as the TIF-fund amount previously approved did not cover the entire project.




