OSF expects to have new clinic in Brimfield by 2026

For The Weekly Post BRIMFIELD - Dr. Robert Bevill re-

Recruiting another doctor to Brimfield will take more than a ride in a convertible. But Bevill said that's less of a worry after last Thursday's announcement that OSF HealthCare will build a new primary-care clinic east of town on a corner lot at U.S. Route 150 and North Maher Road.

facility will provide that. So I'm very excited about that."

OSF HealthCare Chief Operating Officer Dr. Mike Cruz, a Brimfield resident, was on hand at the press conference to thank local business owner Rita Kress for donating 3.6 acres for the clinic and to lay out plans.

"We're grateful to Rita and her family for this most generous donation," Cruz said. "It's a super exciting time and there's more to come."

Cruz said planning what to build will take up most of 2025 and construction

Storm damage

Trees down, power out after high winds

For The Weekly Post The eerie sound of tornado sirens wailing Monday night were a precursor to high winds that left damage in their wake across the area. Storms felled trees, flooded roads and disrupted electricity service for thousands.

Farmington was among the hardest-hit communities. Power poles on Main Street, Knox Road 2300 East and Industry Road were broken, according to the Fulton County Emergency Services and Disaster Agency. Power lines and tree branches also



Continued from Page 1 is expected to be completed in 2026. He said OSF expects to use local contractors for as much of the work as possible.

"It doesn't mean a hospital being built on this corner; we have access to what we need for that probably 22 minutes from here," Cruz said. "Know full well, this is the beginning and there's possibility and potential (for more than a primary-care practice) based on the demand."

Cruz said the clinic will have the latest in technology and noted that installing new equipment is easier at a new facility than at OSF's current clinic at 111 E. Knoxville St. He said the possibility of providing diagnostic testing and therapy at the clinic also exists, depending on demand.

Referred to several times as a "seasoned care provider," Bevill said he has no plans to retire immediately, but doesn't expect to be working in

10 years.

"It's like being part of family here and I look forward to several more years of being able to continue that relationship," said Bevill, who has worked for OSF HealthCare for the past seven years.

For Kress, the announcement caps five years of trying to develop the corner lot, which formerly housed the Farmer's Table restaurant but sat vacant for years. Kress said she bought the parcel five years ago.

"It was always with the intention of doing something philanthropic. Something that would give back to the community, something for everyone," she said. "And I wanted something that could grow with the community."

One delay leading up to Thursday's announcement was inability to work out a deal with the Village of Brimfield for water service. For 15 years, Kress has been asking the village to extend water lines east to serve subdivisions in that area, some of which she helped develop.

The village has been unwilling to expand its water service.

Finally, Kress said, the good of a clinic outweighed her quest for village water. Kress said she had a well drilled on the corner site and has had water tested at OSF's request.

She stressed that the size of the parcel and the location will allow OSF to expand and will provide easy access.

"Kress family, thank you for leaving a legacy," Bevill said. "OSF has been great at being able to provide care for all levels of our society, especially in rural America. And we are like that here in Brimfield. It's so important that the access to care is going to continue for decades with this state-of-the art building here for primary care."





Immunizations: One chickenpox/varicella vaccination is required for Pre-School and proof of having had two chickenpox/varicella vaccinations is required for students entering Kindergarten, 6th and 9th grades or a letter from their physician stating they've had the chicken pox. All students entering 6th grade are required to have proof of completion of the Hepatitis B series shots. All students entering, transferring, or advancing into 6th through 12th grades will be required to show proof of receipt of one dose of DTap vaccine (tetanus, diphtheria, acellular pertussis) and proof of receipt of two doses of MMR (measles, mumps, Rubella). All students entering 6th & 7th grades will be required to show proof of one dose of Meningococcal Meningitis vaccine given on or after their 11th birthday. All students entering 12th grade will be required to show proof of two Meningococcal Meningitis vaccines with the second dose being given on or after their 16th birthday. (Only one dose is needed IF the student's first dose was given at age sixteen years or later).

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

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Of sirens, BBQ, postal woes and philanthropy

Rambling through central Illinois, pondering how much better snow is than damaging wind.

Sitting in the basement after the sirens wail is so much more serious since 2010. That June day we watched a tornado come hard from the northwest – and only at the last minute hustled down to join the kids

and my parents in the cellar. Just in time. Never again. When they say take shelter, I listen. Last year we had 118 tornadoes in Illinois – the most of any state. And while Monday night

Monday night didn't seem bad at first, the damage showed up soon after we emerged. Limbs down. A camper crushed. Fremont Street closed. Power out to the east side of town. Shingles off in Havana, where one boy lives. Kids toys scattered here and there. A measured gust of 105 mph at Tanners Orchard. Grill covers off. Power poles snapped. The randomness of it all is crazy.

Tony Bitten is a busy man. Brave, too. Having successfully brought his Underground Backyard BBQ to a restaurant in Williamsfield from a

tent in Elmwood, Bitten is moving forward with plans to open a second restaurant. In addition to keeping the Williamsfield business active at 102 E. Gale St., he's returning to Elmwood to the Parkside Building at 118 E. Main St. Bitten hopes to do what recent restauranteurs have been able to pull off in that spot - make an extended run. We'll have more details on his operation as opening day nears. On Monday, Bitten was still busy pursuing his liquor license, as he plans to have a full-service bar in the Elmwood location. Having sampled the Bitten's food during his pop-up days in Elmwood's Central Park, I'm eager to eat more in a sitdown setting.

The U.S. Postal Service is killing us. Not the local folks, who are very helpful in making sure our paper gets delivered every week. The problem is in the cost of delivering our paper, which keeps increasing. As you may well know, the USPS recently ushered in 8% rate increases for first-class mail and marketing mail and an almost 10% increase for periodicals. That's the sixth increase in three years. No wonder, then, that postage is the second-most expensive part of our production costs. Only payroll is more costly on a perissue basis and I'd much rather pay employees than the USPS. To avoid

raising ad rates, we plan to start emailing more bills and trying to find ways to avoid postal charges wherever possible.

Rita Kress doesn't sleep much, I'm guessing. Moments after an announcement that OSF HealthCare will build a new clinic near Brimfield, on land Kress donated for that cause, she was making new plans. "I want to bring a senior-living facility to town," she said. "It's something we need here in Brimfield." That makes total sense. Having a place for elderly citizens to call home near their families is important. So don't be surprised to see Kress get that done, possibly even somewhere out east near that new medical facility. ... Not lost in the discussion of Brimfield and doctors is the huge role the Brimfield Area Men's Club played in recruiting a doctor back in the early 1980s and providing a clinic in town. ... The next time somebody tells me, "Well that person can afford to donate, they're rich," I want to see a bank statement showing the speaker donates the same percentage of their income to charity. ... Parting shot: Monsoon season is so crazy around here that farmers were recently overheard complaining about too much rain. In July.



Is more oversight by Congress, courts good?

The U.S. Supreme Court's June 28 ruling to overturn the Chevron deference was a business-favoring decision to upend 40 years of legal precedent and redirect federal power from agencies like the Department of Agriculture to the courts and Congress.

Big Ag loved the news. The National Cattlemen's Beef Association "celebrated the ruling," and Big

Meat's lobbyist saw it as the bullet to defeat the Biden Administration's "misguided and damaging proposed rules" to reform the Packers and

Stockyards Act. House Ag

Chairman Glenn Thompson (R-Pa.) thanked the court for "reaffirming a core principle of our Constitution: the power to legislate rests with Congress."

True, but also true is that the power to legislate always rested with Congress. It doesn't need Chevron gutted to do its job better. It just needs to do its job better, period.

Moreover, it's pretty rich for any current ag committee member to comment on their inherent power to legislate given the fact that this Congress is nearly two years late on legislating anything that passably resembles a Farm Bill.

The irony of the court's Chevron decision is that it gives both Congress and the federal court system a larger role – in short, more work

and a new bureaucracy – to write and interpret legislation when neither institution has shown an interest or ability to do either.

Ian Millhiser, a Vox senior correspondent and the long-time U.S Supreme Court watcher, explains this legislative trap in a lengthy, July 8 post titled "The Supreme Incompetents." In it he takes a measure of the court's recent decisions and finds most either incomplete, un-

workable, unsuitable or all three. "All of the United States' most important governing institutions are failing at once," he begins. "Congress, of course, has barely been able to function ... The Republican Party has atrophied into a cult of personality" and the "Democratic Party ... may be unable to dislodge a senescent leader."

"And then there's the Supreme Court," Millhiser, a Duke University Law School graduate continues, that if "the justices did not wield such awesome power ... most ... would be laughingstocks. Few people this famous are so ostentatiously bad at their jobs."

But they better get better and in a hurry, he explains, because six of them just made "the Supreme Court the final word on hundreds, and even thousands, of policy questions that Congress delegated to federal agencies like the EPA or Department of Labor."

And, of course, USDA.

That means there's a good chance that this Court's judges - eight of whom graduated from either Harvard or Yale law schools – might very well determine whether your crop insurance claim is valid or if

your neighbor can legally spread manure on his hilly pasture next to your family's well.

That's if they ever get around to it, suggests Millhiser, because the Supreme Court has become decidedly unproductive.

In fact, "As a young Reagan White House lawyer in the 1980s," he explains, Chief Justice John Roberts joked that the court "can hear only roughly 150 cases each term," suggesting that this limit kept "the Constitution ... safe for the summer."

The joke, as it turns out, is on us: The Roberts-led court decided only 59 cases this term. This limited, hand-picked docket means the "Court ... no longer really functions as a court" because it spends "more and more time resolving political questions that often should be decided by people who hold elective office."

Going forward that likely means "(f)ederal judges will now have the first and final word about what statutes mean," Craig Green, a Temple University law professor, told the Associated Press.

Not economists, doctors, chemists, agronomists, veterinarians or any expert. Instead, a federal judge - whose docket already is backlogged by years - will be the "first and final word."

That simply won't work, and that's this court's plan.

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Yates City weighs options on funding new

YATES CITY - The Yates City Village Board is considering two options for the funding of a new well.

Currently, the village plans to use a Community Block Development Grant and has already received \$8,750 from the grant to survey the well site. That will need to be reimbursed if the board does not continue with the grant program, according to Jarrod Dexter of the Western Illinois Regional Council.

A second option is an Illinois Environmental Protection Agency forgivable loan. Kevin Cooper of Bruner, Cooper & Zuck, Inc., made it clear that the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency will not release a loan agreement until bids for the project have been received.

Dexter said both programs cannot be used concurrently, meaning the board must make a choice. At its July 10 meeting, the board decided to explore the Illinois EPA loan program but not to withdraw from the grant program until after bids are re-

ceived. This allows the board time to better assess the value of each program for this specific program.

The board also approved a consent -to-assignment agreement for its waste management services with GFL Environmental of Peoria until the expiration of a contract set to run through January 2025 with G&O Disposal of Elmwood. The contract requires approval from the village for any new management.

GFL Spokesman Eric Shangraw attended the meeting and said the sale of G&O will close on July 31. GFL will take over waste-management service on Aug. 1.

Shangraw assured the board that "the days of buying businesses and cutting people out is over." He said all G&O employees will be retained by GFL.

"The idea is to not change anything" for the duration of the contract, Shangraw said.

Yates City is actively searching for a new village clerk after the resignation of Debra Canier. Susan Hostetler is serving as the temporary clerk but is not interested in a permanent

assignment. The village hired Neely Carr to assist Hostetler until the search is complete, with the understanding that - should no other applications be received - Carr will take over the role.

Carr, who also runs the community center for the Elba-Salem Park District, was hired as a trainee at \$15 an hour.

A few village renovations were also approved. The Board approved paying \$6,000 to Ace In The Hole of Hanna City to spray patch in July. The board also approved buying 21 tons of pea gravel for spray patching from Burgess Brothers Trucking for \$500. Payment will be taken from the road/bridge account as the purchase did not qualify to be included in Motor Fuel Tax expenses.

The sewer shed will be getting its roof patched and new gutters installed at an expected cost of \$1,262.50. Nathan Blankenship was hired to perform these repairs at a cost not to exceed \$1,500.

Elmwood city employees get pay raises

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD – At least eight full-time Elmwood city employees are to receive 7% pay raises, but a few will get a little extra.

Police Chief Aaron Bean is to receive about an additional \$4 an hour and Officer Mike Darrah is to receive about an additional \$2 under terms the City Council approved July 9. The pay bumps supplement their standard raises.

Alderman Andrew Almasi, who helps oversee public safety, said the extra money is based on duties performed and on pay in comparable communities. The raises are in line with what the city budgeted.

"He could probably make a lot more anywhere else," Almasi said regarding Bean. "These guys do a good job and deserve to be paid fairly."

Regarding Darrah, Almasi said his workload is more substantial than that of the other full-time officer, Stu Ingersoll. Darrah oversees the department K-9 officer, among other things. A new K-9 officer to replace the retired Rebel is expected to begin fulltime duty by the end of August, according to Bean. Ingersoll is the school resource officer. The Elmwood School District is responsible for most of his compensation. When school is not in session, Ingersoll works sporadically for the police department and the city handles his pay and benefits.

"Stu's job, while serious, is not as labor intensive as Mike's," Almasi said.

Hourly pay for all three officers is in the \$20-30 range. So is the new pay rate for City Clerk Bethany Livengood, who is to receive roughly a \$2 hourly bump above the 7% standard.

Livengood also is the city collector for water bills and other payments. Alderman Nathan Brunnelson, who helps oversee public works, suggested her duties warrant additional compensation.

A trio of public-works employees and Economic Development Director Amy Davis also are to receive 7% pay hikes. Council members also approved a raise for part-time workers to correspond with the state-mandated minimum wage, which on Jan. 1 is to increase by \$1 an hour, to \$15.

In other business, the council decided to limit who can park commercial semi-trailer trucks overnight at Sweetwater Park. Only city residents will be allowed to do so, and they must notify city officials.

"If you're going to park there, you certainly should have to stop at City Hall to let them know who you are and how you can be contacted," Almasi said.

Parking of semis on city streets is prohibited.

The council also accepted a \$20,000 bid from Ace In The Hole construction of Hanna City to purchase a 2013 Total Patcher Vortex Injection Spray Patcher. The city is to split the proceeds with Elmwood Township.

Discussed but not acted upon was a possible city financial contribution for a new entrance sign at The Meadows subdivision, on the north edge of town. An estimate Alderman Adam Duvall provided was for almost \$25,000, including landscaping.

"We're constantly trying to beautify Elmwood, and I think this is kind of an important step to continuing that," said Duvall,



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who resides in The Meadows.

The new sign would be erected in a median on Southgate Drive at Illinois Route 78. It would replace one removed when new sidewalks were being constructed in that area.

Mayor JD Hulslander balked at funding the entire cost of the new sign as estimated but appeared willing to negotiate a smaller contribution. No date regarding a final decision was mentioned.



Continued from Page 1 their Four Creeks Wind Project to be built in northern Peoria County. I attended the first meeting and hustled to get there because I was sure it would be standing room only.

Much to my surprise there was no crowd, maybe a dozen or so while I was there. The atmosphere was friendly and cordial, although some folks there were less than enthusiastic about the project coming to their neighborhood.

As the open-house announcement in the June 13 issue of The Weekly Post said, there was no formal presentation. Instead, company representatives were on hand to discuss the project and answer questions. Large maps showing the land area for the project were on display. Copies of the maps, along with handouts explaining the project's long-term economic benefits to area citizens and taxing districts, were there for the taking.

A sheet explaining the terms of their land-lease agreements was available, too.

"Expression of Interest" forms were available for



Repsol expects to construct more than 100 turbines in the fields north of Brimfield, east of Williamsfield and west of Princeville. The area encompasses more than 25,000 participating acres in Brimfield, Millbrook and Princeville-Jubilee

A second project, Four Creeks South, is in the development stages for the area south and west of Brimfield, bounded by Interstate 74 on the north and Illinois Route 8 on the south, just north of Elmwood.

A third project, the Goldrush Apple Wind project by developer Apex Clean Energy, is in the planning stages for southern Stark County and northern Peoria County. The area is south of Wyoming and north of Princeville.

Apex development manager Shelley Schwab told WCBU-FM radio's Tim Shelley that transmission upgrades in the Princeville area have made room for larger projects. She added

that landowners' positive reception and Illinois' favorable zoning ordinances make the area attractive to wind developers. More than 50,000 acres have already been signed up by Apex, according to Schwab.

Now let's check your answers to the quiz. If you guessed the shortest structure to be Peoria's St. Mary's Cathedral, give yourself a cigar. Its spires reach a mere 230 feet toward the heavens. Next are downtown Peoria's Twin Towers condominiums on Fulton Street standing tall at 308 feet.

Runner-up for the title of the tallest structure, believe it or not, is the Gateway Arch in St. Louis, the tallest monument in the United States. The arch rises 630 feet from base to peak. On a clear day the Arch is visible from locations 30 miles away.

The tallest of the four contestants is the proposed Four Creeks Wind turbines. Measured to the tip of the blades at their highest point, the giant turbines will stand 640 feet tall, the equivalent of more than 60 stories.



Continued from Page 1 Power in most of Farmington went out about 8:30 p.m., Darsham said. As of Tuesday afternoon, electricity in the western twothirds of the city had not been restored.

Ameren Illinois suggested power might not return to 80% of Farmington customers until 10 p.m. Wednesday, according to Darsham.

"We're struggling trying to charge our batteries for our radios, trying to keep our phones charged," he said from his darkened offices. "A lot of people in town are losing their food, because their freezers are not going to keep it cold that long.

"It's probably one of our worst storms we've had in a long time. We haven't been without power for this long."

Dozens of Elmwood residents also were without power Tuesday afternoon, as were Ameren rural customers. Ameren reported

power outages in just about every area community.

Regarding storm damage, a large maple tree split and fell onto the west side of the BYE Ambulance garage in Elmwood and rendered three bays unusable because of roof damage.

Peggy Gibson of BYE said CAD Construction of Tremont, which built the garage, had been contacted and was planning to replace three roof trusses. Sagging was evident inside the garage.

Elsewhere, a wind gust

of 105 mph was reported near Tanners Orchard south of Camp Grove, according to the Weather Service. The wind destroyed a corn crib. Winds of 71 mph in Elmwood and 58 mph in Trivoli also were reported.

Authorities in Galva reported widespread tree damage and at least four power lines downed. Felled tree limbs blocked U.S. Route 34. Other limbs fell on at least three residences; one of them sustained roof damage, a

broken window and a gas leak, according to the Weather Service. It reported Galva received about three-quarters of an inch of rain.

Trees and power lines were reported on the ground in Wyoming and Toulon, which was without power as of noon Tuesday. Kewanee was also hit hard by the storm.

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

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

ILLINOIS QUICK HITS Earthquake, cicadas and a sinkhole

Parts of northern Illinois shook Monday as a 3.4 magnitude earthquake struck in the early-morning hours. The earthquake was centered northwest of the DeKalb County village of Somonauk.

According to the United States Geological Survey, the temblor had an estimated depth of about 6 miles. The earthquake could be felt as far as Joliet.

• Cicada research – With a rare, double emergence of cicada broods in Illinois completed, researchers are now looking at the damage caused by the phenomenon. Researchers at the University of Illinois Department of Crop Sciences are requesting that fruit growers report any sustained damage done to trees, bushes or vines.

The most visible damage are slits on small branches. Researchers say the slits would weaken a branch to the point that it would snap off during windy conditions. • Sinkhole sinking – A massive sinkhole

that swallowed part of a soccer field in Alton continues to grow. The field at Gordon Moore Park was partially swallowed two weeks ago. The park has since been closed, but officials said the problem appears to be getting worse.

The city received approval from the Mine Health and Safety Administration to drill under the park access road to help determine what actions need to be taken.

• Storm damage – The National Weather Service issued 13 tornado warnings Monday in the Chicago area alone. A tornado has been confirmed in Oswego, where residents woke up to major storm damage. In Will County, Interstate 55 remains closed after several vehicles became entangled in downed power lines. Thousands of Illinoisans remained without power Tuesday morning.
