# Moles tough on lawns and earthworms

If your lawn adjoins a woodland, prairie or other undeveloped area, it has probably been invaded by Scalopus aquaticus, the dreaded Eastern mole. If this critter hasn't torn up your yard yet, just you wait.

If it happens, or rather when it happens, you'll no doubt head to the internet for an easy, quick fix. There you're likely to run across articles touting all the wonderful benefits of hav-

ing moles in your lawn. They spin yarns about how these wonderful little creatures devour great gobs of grubs and big batches of beetles. Some even claim the furry little fellas are effective soil aerators. Isn't

that precious.

Don't you believe it. Sure, they will dine on Japanese beetle grubs and other subterranean species. But the real truth is moles much prefer munching on our valuable earthworms. In fact one "harmless" little mole will devour nearly half its body weight in earthworms daily. That's not good for the gardener or

for the worms either, for that matter.

Moles kill earthworms by biting them behind the head. How can they tell one end of a worm from the other? Anyway, they haul the worms back to their pantry for later dining. Researchers have found mole food chambers stuffed with more than 400 earthworms. Holy

# Trial delayed

Boland murder trial moved to Aug. 19

PEORIA – The trial of a Peoria man accused last year of killing a Princeville woman was supposed to have begun Monday. For at least seven reasons, it didn't.

The delay Peoria County Chief Circuit Judge Katherine Gorman granted Monday – reluctantly, she said – is to give defense attorney Chandra Justice more time to review additional discovery evidence she received July 26.

The body-cam footage depicts the arrest of Artis, near a gasoline station in Morton. Artis, 28, was apprehended April 14, 2023, a few hours after he was accused of shooting 22-year-old Boland at the Brighton Woods apartment complex in Dunlap. Boland died two days later.

Clad in a white dress shirt, Artis sat beside Justice in court. She said she

# Storm damage, terrain made rescue difficult

ELMORE – John Dubaic spent his final moments in one of the most remote areas of Peoria County. But his rescuers appeared to take at least some comfort in making sure he didn't spend them alone.

Dubaic, a 77-year-old man from upstate New York, died July 23 shortly after he was found barely alive in brush along the Spoon River near Cedar Bluff Road. In an attempt to save his life, first responders carried Dubaic about 600 yards up a steep hill and over trees felled by recent, significant storms.

According to authorities, Dubaic was driving a brand-new recreational vehicle to Las Vegas when he strayed well off the beaten path. It's probable Dubaic was stranded for a week without nourishment after his RV became disabled south of Elmore, almost 1,000 miles from home.

How Dubaic ended up in the far-northwest corner of Peoria County probably always will be a mystery, according to Sheriff Chris Watkins.

"Zero. No idea. His family doesn't know. Nobody knows," he said. "His family saw him drive off. He was 77 years old and had some health issues, not very mobile. It was just an unfortunate accident."

Dubaic's journey began with no apparent problems. On July 13, he left his home in Green Island, N.Y., located near Albany. His family kept in touch with him until July 15, when he was in Wisconsin, according to Watkins.

About 1 p.m. July 15, Dubaic was spotted in Bureau County, headed south on Illinois Route 40 toward Peoria. Exactly eight days later, the sheriff's office received a telephone call from New York law-enforcement authorities who traced

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# TRIAL: Artis' mother seeks visitation rights

Continued from Page 1 reviewed most of the new discovery evidence but had not been able to show Artis the body-cam videos.

"They're extremely important," Justice said.
"They provide objective evidence instead of subjective evidence. Obviously, the late tendering of the (evidence) has brought even more distrust to the system by my client. I told him I didn't think it was intentional, but ultimately, that was the result of that.

"To do this 2½ days before trial really puts my

client in a position where he feels this is not due process for him."

The newly released evidence left Justice unprepared for trial, she said. She also suggested it's rare for a murder case to progress as quickly as this one has.

Prosecuting attorneys acknowledged the lateness of the release and appeared to blame the Peoria Police Department for at least some of the delay. But they said the items complemented previous releases and revealed

nothing new. The videos show Artis on the ground being handcuffed.

"Nothing in this discovery had not already been known to the defendant," prosecutor Dave Gast said. "It's not that this information was a surprise to the defense. It is what it is "

Gorman didn't appear pleased about the situation, which she said was rather unusual. She also said she trusted the most recent discovery-evidence release was the final one.

"While the court is anxious to have this matter tried to keep things moving, I want to be sure that all the information has been provided and that both sides can ... explore any issues that are necessary to put on a defense so that there are not any issues that can be raised at a later date," Gorman said.

Boland was a 2019

graduate of Princeville High School. Her family owns a local plumbing business. She and Artis had children in common, according to authorities.

Prosecutors and a witness allege Artis forced his way into the Brighton Woods apartment, pulled out a handgun and fired multiple shots at Boland. Bullets struck Boland in the head and torso. Artis then fled in a vehicle. He possessed a gun when he was arrested.

If convicted of murder, Artis might face a life sentence. He also was accused of home invasion and aggravated battery.

In a related court matter, a case before Judge Dan Cordis filed on April 3 shows that Gloria A. Artis of Peoria has petitioned for visitation of the Artis-Boland children. Gloria is the mother of Walter Artis In









# New bill will help veterans find better housing

# Billtown updates school dress code

For The Weekly Post WILLIAMSFIELD -The Williamsfield School District dress code might have had too many shades of gray. A recent update makes the code a bit more black and white.

The revised dress code received school-board approval last month, as part of the 2024-25 student handbook. Among other things, the code prohibits students in all grades from wearing clothing that advertises drugs, alcohol or tobacco, or has suggestive or obscene messages.

Also prohibited are shortshorts; clothing with excessive holes or slits that are in poor taste; and apparel made of tight-fitting or revealing spandex, unless other clothing is worn over it from shoulder to mid-thigh. Trousers must be worn at the waist.

Violators might be sent to the principal's office and barred from classes until they change into acceptable attire. Repeated violations can lead to parental

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notification and out-ofschool suspension.

The first day of classes in Billtown is Aug. 13. The dress code is the first item in the "Standards of Conduct" section of the student handbook.

Williamsfield Principal Zack Binder said this is the most specific and comprehensive the student handbook has been in recent years, at least, regarding student attire. Previously, the appropriateness of the apparel students wore to class was open to administrative discretion.

"(We) wanted to have a very clear code that parents could understand," Binder said. "A lot of families are out shopping for school clothes and getting ready for the year. We wanted something very objective and clear cut that families will be able to follow.

"I just think as years go by, there's more of a gray area about what's acceptable at school. ... Overall, students shall dress in a manner that reflects selfrespect."

Variation from the code will not be tolerated,

Binder said. A committee developed the code, which Binder termed fair. He told the board the code is to be applied during the school day and athletics-team uniforms won't be monitored.

"I don't remember an occasion where I've seen a cheerleader inappropriately dressed," Binder said.

The student handbook is scheduled to be available at the district website, www.billtown.org.

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# **MOLES:** Trapping offers best form of control

Earthworms are essential for a healthy lawn. They are masters at reducing thatch, that layer of dead and living plant material that builds up on the soil surface of a lawn. If thatch gets too thick, it prevents moisture from reaching the soil and encourages shallow grass-root growth. When lawns are fertilized, grass grows faster than clippings can be broken down and a buildup of thatch results.

The Greek philosopher Aristotle called earthworms "intestines of the earth," and for good reason. They break up thatch material, digest it and return nutrients to the soil. In doing so, they mix soil into the thatch, increasing the microbial activity necessary for decomposition. As they tunnel through soil, they create pathways for air and water.

If pesticides must be applied to a lawn to control

grubs, be sure the chemical is non-toxic to earthworms. Most earthworms are slow growers and have low reproductive rates. It takes a long time for populations to re-establish after a toxic pesticide has been applied.

I've been told by some folks that they treated their grass for grubs in order to starve out the moles, but the critters continued to plow up the yard. "Why is that?" they ask. I'm willing to bet that their lawncare company correctly applied a chemical toxic to grubs but relatively harmless to earthworms, the moles' preferred diet. On the other hand, had the mole damage ceased after the lawn was treated, it could be that the applied chemical killed not only the grubs but the earthworm population as well. Of course it's also possible the mole simply died or moved on to wormier pastures.

So if chemicals are not the answer, how do you eliminate moles from your lawn? I've checked with the extension folks at four different universities, including Illinois. All of their advice boils down to trapping. I know from experience that trapping requires diligence and persistence. It's a real pain, but the joy of finding a mole's carcass is beyond measure.

Some gardeners say certain plants will repel moles when planted as the border between the woods or meadow and the lawn. Daffodils, castor bean plant and mole plant (Euphorbia lathyris) are most often mentioned. Of the three, only daffodils are perennial. Marigolds are listed, but I know they don't work.

Moles are solitary animals and very territorial. They will fight to the death any other mole that wanders into their tunnels. Females have one litter of three or four young per year in the spring. By summer, mom kicks them out to go find a home of

their own. This means that usually if you trap a mole in a particular run this time of year, there won't be another in that same run.

Currently you can trap moles in Illinois without a permit. The University of Minnesota Extension website has detailed instructions on how to set a harpoon-style mole trap. It's worth a look. Visit extension.umn.edu/plantingand-growing-guides/how-t rap-moles.

# **RESCUE:** Lifesaving measures proved futile

Continued from Page 1 the missing Dubaic to the Elmore area.

The RV was fitted with a trackable GPS device. According to Watkins, Dubaic didn't have a conventional cellphone.

"Usually when we have missing people, we can ping the phone," Watkins said about tracking. "That was another hurdle law enforcement out East had. Obviously if they had pinged the phone, we probably would have been notified within a few days."

As Watkins was notified, so was Knox County Sheriff Jack Harlan; the Elmore area straddles the county line. Also alerted were volunteer search-and-rescue teams from the sheriffs' counties and from McLean, Mercer, Tazewell and Woodford counties. At least 50 people partici-

nated.

The Knox County sheriff's maritime unit set sail in the Spoon River. The Peoria County sheriff and the Galesburg Police Department launched drones. Within about 20 minutes, a Peoria County drone located Dubaic's RV along a narrow trail.

"We're amazed that the guy got the RV down to where he did," Watkins said.

Trees blocked the path to the RV, and one crushed the passenger side of it – the result of storms July 15 that spawned a tornado in that area. It appeared Dubaic tried to extricate the RV, then set off on foot.

About 2½ hours after the drone located the RV, a Knox County deputy and a search-and-rescue volunteer located Dubaic.

"The gentleman was

breathing. He kind of responded in moans, if that makes any sense," Harlan said.

"It was going to be a tough extraction to get him out. It was a very, very treacherous area to get to, and it took a lot of manpower. It was hot. Guys had been working out there for a couple of hours."

Conveying a gurney in that area was impractical. Rescuers wrapped a reflective vest and one deputy's shirt around Dubaic and carried him up the hill and through thickets toward an area where Brimfield firefighters and an OSF HealthCare helicopter were waiting.

A group of seven, including Harlan, transported Dubaic.

"We had to lift the subject over trees and get people on the other side to continue to move him," Harlan said. "He was alive, but we were carrying dead weight. ... There were a couple of times we had to stop a little bit because all of us started to get a little tuckered out."

Lifesaving measures were futile, and Dubaic was pronounced dead not long after he was found. Harlan and Watkins praised first-responders' efforts and said they were not in vain.

"In our minds, it was a search-and-rescue. It was not a recovery mission," Harlan said. "You don't know who you're dealing with. You may grow up as a farm boy and know how to forage, how to conserve water. The quicker we can find you, the better off it is.

"We found him, but unfortunately he ended up passing once we got him into the (medical) area."

Removing Dubaic's RV was expected to take several days. Even after trees were cleared, a tow truck wouldn't be able to access the area, according to Watkins. Nor was it likely any canoers or kayakers on the river would have been able to see Dubaic or his vehicle.

"This is a very remote area," he said. "That's why no one came across him, because it's such a rural part of the area and he's down by the river. We've had some tough rescues, and this is definitely at the top of the list. We've had some odd incidents, and this is one of them."

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

SPRINGFIELD – As the flow of billions of dollars in federal pandemic-related aid is about to end, many students in Illinois are still struggling to catch up academically from the learning loss that occurred when schools were forced to

A new study from the University of Illinois System says only about one-fourth of all public-school students are back to prepandemic performance levels in English language arts while even fewer have returned to pre-pandemic levels in math.

Learning recovery has been especially slow at the high school level, where test scores have been declining, the study found. And recovery in math scores has lagged English language arts scores across grade levels.

The study was conducted by the Illinois Workforce and Education Research Collaborative, which is part of the University of Illinois System's Discovery Partners Institute.

Findings suggest school officials face difficult decisions as they look for ways to continue their recovery efforts without the federal resources on which they've been relying.

"Of course, we are concerned about the loss of things like high-dosage tutoring and the extendedday programs," IWERC Director Meg Bates said.

Bates said IWERC conducted the study in partnership with the Illinois State Board of Education.

One of the key findings of the study, Bates said, is that recovery has been uneven, both across grade levels and among socioeconomic groups. Overall, academic performance has improved more quickly at the elementary school level than for high school.

Districts with high concentrations of black, Latino and low-income students, however, remain furthest from their pre-pandemic performance levels. Those districts also tend to be the ones that relied the most on remote learning during the pandemic.


The study also found schools have not yet recovered from the enrollment declines that occurred at

the height of the pandemic. And for those students who are still enrolled, chronic absenteeism has risen sharply.

From 2019-21, state-wide enrollment fell by nearly 60,000 students, to 1.71 million. Enrollment had been trending downward even before the pandemic, due largely to declining birth rates in Illinois, but Bates said these declines were beyond what would otherwise be expected.

To help schools deal with the effects of the pandemic, Congress approved three separate federal relief packages that included billions of dollars in emergency education funds. Illinois' share totaled just over \$7.8 billion.

The flow of those funds, however, will end when the current federal fiscal year ends Sept. 30.











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# **Opposition growing to Chinese** battery maker locating in Illinois

As more revelations arise about a Chinese company that plans to build a battery plant in Kankakee County, opposition is building.

Gotion is slated to receive over \$8 billion in federal and state subsidies for its Manteno plant. The company plans to build a facility in Michigan as well, where Illinois U.S. Rep. Darin LaHood, R-Peoria, took part in a roundtable discussion on Gotion's ties to the Chinese Communist Party.

"While I believe it's important that we incentivize business growth, it is simply unacceptable that governors like J.B. Pritzker and Gretchen Whitmer have decided to leave taxpayers on the hook for billions in federal subsidies funneling the companies beholden to maligned actors like the CCP," said La-Hood.

A plant designed to supply parts to the Manteno project has faced opposition in Michigan. A recall election in Green Charter Township threw out five local board members who backed tax breaks for Gotion.

"People are in favor of jobs coming into their area, but not when there's a link to the Chinese Communist Party," said U.S. Rep. John Moolenaar, R-Michigan.

A congressional committee has presented evidence alleging Gotion benefits from forced labor in China.

LaHood and Moolenaar have introduced the No Official Giveaways Of Taxpayers' Income to Oppressive Nations (NO GOTION) Act. The bill would prohibit companies affiliated with the Chinese Communist Party from reduction tax credits implemented by the Biden Administration in the Inflation Reduction Act.

Chuck Thelen, vice president of North American Operations, has denied Gotion is tied to the Chinese Communist Party.

"Gotion High-Tech is an independently operated international private enterprise. The political affiliation of any employee does not affect the company's business decisionmaking process," Thelen said in a statement.

A lawsuit to stop the Manteno plant is being heard by a judge. A decision on whether to allow the lawsuit to proceed is

After graduating from Yates City High School in 1985, he attended Illinois State University where he was active in his fraternity, Sigma Tau Gamma, and graduated with a









# Summer hoops update

Strong summer for Brimfield boys has future looking bright

Scott Carlson has had a good summer. The Brimfield boys basketball coach might also have a good winter.

Brimfield went 4-0 in a one-day shootout June 22 at Olivet Nazarene University in Bourbonnais, the centerpiece of the Indians' summer-basketball efforts.

At ONU, Brimfield defeated Grant Park, MCC Academy of Morton Grove and a school from Indiana before a final-game victory against Arlington Heights Christian Liberty. Carlson said that was the championship game, although there was little fanfare.

"We just won and walked off," he said. "But it was a good day. Long day, but if you're going to make it a long day, you might as well play well, and we did."

The victories probably made Carlson's ensuing vacation, a cruise to Alaska, more enjoyable. But once Brimfield gets back to serious basketball work this autumn, the fun might really begin.

Incoming junior Connor Doe appears to be recovering well from a knee injury he sustained in a Class 1A regional opener last season. Brimfield lost that game to finish 12-17. Doe
