Towering turbines

Wind turbines proposed for Peoria Co. would be state's tallest

Residents of Brimfield and townships north of the village will share the neighborhood with a flock of 640-foot wind turbines if the Four Creeks Wind Project is approved by the Peoria County Board.

The proposed turbines will be the tallest in Illinois, the same height as a 43-turbine field near San Jose, and 50 feet taller than 17 turbines along the Galva-Atkinson blacktop north of Galva.


Two other projects are also in the works in the county. The Four Creeks South project covers an area south and west of Brimfield and north and

east of Elmwood. Brimfield literally will be surrounded by a forest of whirling wind turbines if the two projects come to fruition.

Princeville-area residents should also take note. The Goldrush Apple Wind Project plans to harvest breezes in the area north of Princeville to Wyoming, south to Dunlap and east just past Route 40. Although it's still in the early stages, several landowners have already signed leases.

Wind developers are expected to seek County Board approval later this year or in early 2025.

Some residents in the area are concerned about the impact of turbines spinning near their homes and com-

munities. A group of citizens from the Brimfield, Princeville, Dunlap and Elmwood areas has formed a coalition to inform and educate the community and the County Board about the possible effects of a wind

project. The group's website is NoToPeoriaCounty-Windmills.com.

Group members have also placed petitions at businesses throughout the county seeking signatures

Elmwood CUSD 322 facing FY 2025 deficit

ELMWOOD – Declining enrollment and a deficit budget were among the headlines of new Superintendent Joel Schmieg's first budget presentation Monday at a meeting of the Elmwood School Board.

But the bottom line, Schmieg said, is that the district remains fiscally solvent and has enough cash on hand to weather 5.89 months without income.

Unlike last year's \$752,697 budget shortfall – due largely to construction costs of a new industrial arts building – the Fiscal Year 2025 deficit is linked to stagnant revenue and increasing costs.

"Everything across the board has really gone up," Schmieg said.

District electricity costs are up \$60,000, insurance premiums went up \$9,000, certified staff salaries increased 5.25%, non-certified staff wages increased, bond repayments are up, special-education costs are rising rapidly and Elmwood has added 1.5 new staff positions, Schmieg said.

On a positive note, Schmieg said the equalized assessed value of homes in the district increased 6.4% for tax year 2023 to boost tax revenues and added that the district received a \$78,000 grant for small rural schools.

The end result is a projected FY 2025

deficit of \$540,390, which Schmieg said reflects him being conservative on revenue estimates while also projecting costs at the high end of the scale.

With that in mind, he said the board will need to consider changes that could include raising the tax rate, reducing staff, issuing revenue bonds or other options.

Schmieg also said he wants to find ways to bring more students into the district, noting that since 2015-16, enrollment has dropped from 696 students to 617 this year. Extend similar 11% declines over the next decade and enrollment would dip to 549.

PRINCEVILLE - Movement toward a potential new use for the old Alcoa Building Products location in Princeville can proceed.

On Aug. 20, the Princeville Village Board approved a redevelopment-and-cooperation agreement with FPM Properties. The local group is expected to take possession of the vacant property at 917 N. Santa Fe Ave. and negotiate with a potential buyer that has not been identified publicly.

If negotiations are successful, a parts-distribution warehouse might fill space Alcoa shuttered 23 years ago. The projected use is specified in the agreement. A timeline is not, other than FPM taking

control of the property before the end of 2025. A Princeville resident, Earl W. Feucht, is the cur-

rent property owner, Peoria County tax records stated. No money will be exchanged between FPM and the current owner, according to village officials. Liens against the current owner are to be re-

The agreement requires FPM to submit for village approval preliminary project plans and specifications, among other things.


"It's kind of a form to protect the village, to have a say-so as to what goes in out there," Village President Jeff Troutman said.

All six village trustees voted to authorize the agreement. They attended the three-member property-committee meeting Aug. 19, when and where the agreement was presented.

Trustees discussed several other items Aug. 20 but took no action. Among the topics was a gravel access road developers of a solar array in northwest Princeville want to construct. The road would allow Ameren Illinois to repair and service power poles, if needed.

Acceess to the road would be from Shawn Street. It is at the northeast edge of the planned solar Continued on Page 2

Some trustees appeared wary of allowing heavy vehicles on Shawn Street, which they said might not be able to handle the weight. They also said the access-road proposal appears to deviate from a plan the board authorized

in January with Trajectory Energy Partners, a solarproject overseer.

"I don't think anyone originally signed off on that or agreed to it,"
Trustee Ron Delbridge said. "It got changed without any knowledge from us. Someone somewhere should have given us a heads-up, but none of that's been given."

A Trajectory representa-

tive might attend the board meeting Sept. 3 to discuss the issue. Troutman indicated a change would require the board to amend

the original agreement.


"We signed off on a plan, but if it's different, it's null and void until they present it," he said.

Also possible at that meeting is a vote regarding village imposition of a 1% grocery tax to replace the same tax the state is charging currently. The state tax is to end in 2026. Troutman said the tax provides the village with about \$250,000 in annual

evenue.

In other business, the board approved three Residential Rehabilitation Program grants: \$2,500 each for window replacement at 216 E. North St. and for a new roof at 114 W. South St., and \$1,706.75 for exterior updates at 430 N. Walnut Ave.

Building permits were issued for window replacement at 102 E. High St., a front-porch remodel at 1019 N. Larson Lane and a 6-foot white vinyl privacy fence in a back yard at 410 N. Santa Fe

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

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Alternative diesel fuels unitendend results

In our increasingly urgent quest to clean our climate-altering, carbonfueled culture, biodiesel and renewable diesel have become two darlings of alternative-fuel advocates.

While diesel fuel may be diesel fuel, biodiesel and renewable diesel are not the same thing. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, both are "produced from the same renewable feed-

stocks such as vegetable oils, animal fats or used cooking oil."

The key "difference is that renewable diesel is produced using a hydrogen treatment, which makes it chemi-

cally equivalent to petroleum diesel." That means renewable diesel "can be blended at higher levels and transported using existing pipelines."

Production of U.S. biodiesel peaked at 1.8 billion gallons in 2018-19 while renewable-diesel production just 40 million gallons in 2010 passed 2.3 billion gallons in 2022-23.

That rapid rise also increased U.S. soybean oil use; 46 percent of all U.S. soybean oil in 2022-23 was used in the production of alternative diesel fuels. Also, "imports of animal fats and vegetable oils ... to use as feedstocks for renewable-diesel production" increased, notes USDA.

Other U.S. trade operations were

impacted, too. As "U.S. soybean crush expanded to produce more (soybean) oil, driven by high soybean oil prices fueling strong crush margins ... U.S. soybean exports declined on expanding Brazilian supplies."

In addition to that surprising development, the "United States became a net soybean oil importer for the first time in 2023."

Few market watchers saw either price-rattling change coming.

Likewise, few predicted California's adoption of a Low Carbon Fuel Standard in 2007 would create "a flood of credits from renewable diesel and manure biomethane" digesters. That means the Golden State "now consumes more than half of the national [biodiesel] supply even though California consumes only 7% of the nation's overall diesel fuel."

It's a modern example of the Law of Unintended Consequences: California's highly incentivized alternative diesel program is so lucrative that it sucks up half the nation's vegetable- and tallow-based diesel supply and all but ensures other states' air will become dirtier because very few have similar incentives to create renewable diesel markets.

Here's another unintended consequence: According to reporting by the Food & Environment Reporting Network, "The United States imported near-record volumes of renewable diesel each of the first five months of this year ... which were

29% higher than in the same period in 2023." Moreover, "The imports ... came from one producer, Neste, and were shipped almost wholly to the West Coast."


In other words, California's renewable-diesel markets - and now Oregon and Washington's similar programs – are so subsidy lucrative that one company, Neste, based in Helsinki, sends an average of 30,000 barrels of renewable diesel per day to the West Coast to meet the government-generated demand.

Also, according to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, "the larger imports were probably driven by the expansion of Neste's plant in Singapore and increased storage capacity at a terminal in Los Angeles."

So Neste, a tightly held company where the "Prime Minister's Office in Finland ... own(s) 35.91% of the shares," has sent an average of 3 million gallons of renewable diesel fuel 7,600 miles from Singapore to Los Angeles every day for nearly half of 2024. Additionally, according to Finnish reports, "Neste consumes 1-2% of the world's palm oil production" in its alternative-fuels program.

As such, if any aspect of the California alternative-diesel game is green, it's likely due to the U.S. dollars underwriting it, not any environmental benefits generated by it. © 2024 ag comm

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TURBINES: Flicker and sound-level concerns

Continued from Page 1 against the projects.

Common concerns involve shadow flicker, blade noise, ice throws, low-level hums and whistling. State law sets requirements for flicker and sound levels, but some homeowners near existing wind turbines say the regulations are weak.

Residents and non-participating landowners are also concerned about turbines catching fire and spreading flames to nearby corn and soybean fields, especially when crops are dry. Last month, a farm outside Mechanicsville, Iowa, suffered its third wind-turbine fire in less than 18 months. All were caused by lightning strikes. Tornadoes also toppled turbines this spring in Iowa, causing fires.

Four Creeks Wind Project began signing up area landowners in 2021 but didn't hold public meetings until three years later. At the meetings held in Brimfield earlier this summer, a map was available outlining the proposed Four Creeks project north of

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town. The map showed the proposed area, but not the specific location of each of the proposed 124 turbines.

The company had to receive approval from several government agencies, such as the U.S. Defense Department and the Federal Aviation Administration, because the project intrudes into critical airspace. In that agreement, which is available online, there is a map showing the proposed locations of the turbines.

You can view the map by Googling "Four Creeks FAA DOD." The map is on page 17. These are proposed locations. Although 124 turbines are proposed, company representatives say the actual number will be somewhere north of 100, depending on how many landowners commit.

In that same agreement, the company requested permission for a maximum turbine height of 698 feet. However, local company officials say the turbines will only be 640 feet tall.

Other wind-project companies in Illinois have re-

powered by replacing older turbines with larger, more efficient equipment. It appears that such an option would be available to the Four Creeks project, given that federal agencies have already approved a taller maximum height.

One such re-powering occurred in the Bradford area several years ago. Smaller turbines were taken down and replaced. How it was done is remarkable. Rather than disassembling the structures, the company dynamited towers, sending them crashing into surrounding

cropland. Even after cleanup, blade fragments were found later by combines as crops were being harvested, sources say.

Larger towers and blades often require a whole new concrete foundation. Representatives of the Four Creeks Wind Project say each of their larger turbines will require a foundation 30 feet deep and 60 feet wide and shaped like an inverted suction cup. Each foundation will consist of 900 yards of concrete. That's at least 100 truckloads for each turbine, depending on truck capacity.

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

• **ELMORE** – An Elmore-area man was accused of multiple sexualabuse crimes against minors.

• ELMWOOD – A driver crashed his vehicle into a Peoria County Sheriff's Office squad car parked on an Elmwood thoroughfare.

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Farmington, A-W favored

Beyond the two clear favorites, LincolnLand prospects are less clear

Oct. 11 has the look of a must-see game heading into this football season. That's the Friday evening that Farmington and Annawan-Wethersfield – preseason favorites in the LincolnLand Conference large and small divisions, respectively - are scheduled to face off at Farmington.

After years of relying on predictions from the Swami, or worse yet from me, we wised up and put that task to LincolnLand coaches. Results of our first preseason poll of league coaches are at right. The Farmers and A-W received the maximum points possible, given that coaches were asked to not vote for their own team.

Farmington lost at A-W last season, 33-15, a fact Farmers Coach Toby Vallas brings up often this preseason.

"They've got almost everybody back and they kicked our butts last year," Vallas said. "And the kid they've got coming in at QB is just

as good."

Defense should be a strength for A-W, which yielded 6.7 points per game outside a 30-0 loss to Lena-Winslow in the Class 1A quarterfinals. Back are three starting linebackers, two starting defensive backs and five defensive linemen who started or saw significant time.

Beyond those two league leaders, though, things are quite a bit murkier, with a quartet of teams in each division capable of taking the No. 2 spot.

In the large division, Elmwood-Brimfield should be much improved but faces a tough opener against a Knoxville team that lost plenty to graduation but is well-versed in play-

"Our division looks stronger this year," Vallas said. "There's a lot of good teams up there."

Illini West has 16 starters returning from a 4-5 finisher and is led by 17 seniors. Macomb is strong in the skill positions and went 4-5 last year despite starting three freshmen and two sophomores.

West Hancock, which had been a popular pick to move up, will be without prolific quarterback Gavin Grothaus, who passed for 2,223 yards and 23 touchdowns last year but has opted not to play this fall.

In the small division, ROWVA-Williamsfield and Stark County were hit hard by graduation, while Princeville and Rushville-Industry took their lumps with youngsters last year.

"After Wethersfield, it looks like there's a bunch of us who could beat up on each other," Princeville Coach Jon Carruthers said.

Bureau Valley – The mystery team for many is the Storm, who joined the Lincoln Trail and the Lincoln-Land large division after leaving the Three Rivers.

After an 0-9 season two years ago, BV went 4-5 and is looking for another bump this season. Coach

Mat Pistole has six starters back on defense and five back on offense. The latter group includes quarterback Bryce Helms and running backs Brady Hartz and Elijah Endress (740 yards rushing and 14 TDs last year).

"We have tremendous kids finally buying into doing things the right way," Pistole said. "Our weight room is starting to transform kids.

"Every week is going to have a playoff feel to it, because every week we don't know what we're walking into."

St. Teresa – Another mystery team that matters to the Farmers and Trojans is Decatur St. Teresa, which two years ago rolled to a Class 2A state title but last year won just one game.


Part of that dropoff was St. T getting voted out of the Central Illinois Conference in 2021 and becoming an independent. Last year's schedule included matchups with eight players from ESPN's high school top 20, according to St. Teresa Coach Brit Miller. This year is similarly rugged, with three games against Missouri teams, an opener against Urbana (enrollment 1,126) and a finale at Highland (enrollment 897).

But Miller, who played linebacker at the University of Illinois and had a 4.5-year NFL career as a fullback, said his team should be improved.

"We're in much better shape. I have a line full of seniors and a senior quarterback and a few juniors sprinkled on the offensive and defensive sides," Miller said. "Our base is we want to be a spread team. We do have guys that can get downhill and grind, but you don't need to do that every play."

Et cetera – Preseason scrimmages are now allowed by the IHSA, with certain stipulations including a maximum of 48 total plays. But among area teams, so far only R-W has played one. The Cougars faced off against Mercer County on Aug. 23 at home. ... Former Normal assistant Andrew Goodwin has replaced David Milroy as head coach at Monmouth United.





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



ELMWOOD - Aaron Brown is super good at Superpower, a run play formally known as GT 36 Superpower that is a staple of the Elmwood-Brimfield offense.

That four-year starter Brown is paving the way for a fellow four-year starter in Bo Windish bodes well for the Trojans this season.

"When he's pulling on 36, he's pulling tackle on that side and he gets it done," said Windish, who last year ran for many of his yards behind the 6-foot-3, 330-pound Brown. "He's pretty quick for how big he is."

Said Brown: "I like pulling because I get the chance to smoke somebody."










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

Farmers planning on more explosive attack

FARMINGTON – There is better speed in this year's Farmington football lineup, Coach Toby Vallas says.

Team size is also better.

Returning quarterback Lane Wheelwright is more focused on football and is processing things much faster than one year ago, when he passed for 1,328 yards and ran for another 1,015.

And with 19 starters back, there's plenty of experience to build from though there's also a group of underclassmen pushing those returnees.

No wonder Wheelwright did not hold back when saying this squad is better than the 9-2 group that fell 27-12 at Bloomington Central Catholic in the second round of the playoffs.

"We're way better," Wheelwright said. "I think this is the year. All the

"I feel like that's the mentality most people have this year," senior Carter Lambin agreed.

Pumping the brakes on that sentiment is Vallas – somewhat.

"This is a group that really has to keep their heads. They like to flow with the momentum of the game, but when the momentum takes you in the wrong direction, are you going to be ready to bring it back?" he said. "Can we be unselfish? Can we not care who is getting the ball and making the big plays? That's always a problem you can have with so many talented kids."

But, Vallas admitted, "I think we'll be more explosive for sure. You'll see more of what you've seen from me. It will be worth your ticket money."

After spreading foes to run last year, the Farmers look poised for more pass plays called by Offensive Coordinator Dylan Hayden – a former Farmers QB. The return to more of an aerial attack is largely because Wheelwright has taken big steps in his second year at QB. A baseball player who enjoyed football one year ago, Wheelwright said football is now the sport he hopes to play in college.

"He's really bought in and taken on a leadership role," Vallas said. "His study of what to do ... he's picked up on it much faster and he's put more time in on the field."

It helps that Wheelwright has experienced receivers, two strong running backs and five players back who saw starting time on the offensive line.

"Our passing game will be the biggest change, because I think we'll be more effective," Vallas said. "Last



Princes hope new weight room lifts team

PRINCEVILLE – The revamped weight room at Princeville has been worth the wait, at least according to initial reviews. The final word might have to wait until November.

As Princeville attempts back-to-back football postseason appearances for the first time since 2018-19, every little advantage helps. Coach Jon Carruthers and his players appear to believe the reemphasized weight room could give the Princes that extra push needed to advance past the first round.

That might not necessarily manifest itself solely in additional brute strength among Princeville players, according to Carruthers. He is entering his 14th season as head coach after a 5-5 record in 2023, capped with a loss to Stark County in the first round of the Class 1A state playoffs.

"Huge," Carruthers said about the weight-room influence. "It's not just how strong they get, it's the dedication part. It's lifting together, the togetherness as a team. You push yourself. You find ways to compete against each other, but you're also competing against yourself.

"The best football teams I've had at Princeville have been my best weightlifters. It just seems to go hand in hand, the dedication and the love for it."

Count senior Logan Olshawsky, a third-year starter at center who also plays defense, among those who love the upgrade.

"I think that weight room was a big change and I think it needed to happen, and I'm glad it happened," said Olshawsky, whose team begins play Friday night (Aug. 30) at Abingdon-Avon.

The new weightlifting equipment was installed in early summer, according to Princeville Superintendent Tony Shinall. The cost was a little more than \$25,000. A fundraiser paid for about \$10,000. The school board sees the renewed space as a classroom from which all students can benefit, Shinall stated

Among the new gear are seven power racks, rubber weights, four adjustable box-jump platforms and a rack that holds 18 medicine balls. But a mostimportant addition might have been human.

Jack Arnett, a former Princeville player and current full-time substitute teacher, has been overseeing the football team's lifting program. A recent Eureka College graduate, Arnett interned with the University of Cincinnati strength program.



"He came in and just kind of gave us something to believe in," senior quarterback Jake Williams said. "He's obviously had experience with Division I people, so you've got to trust and believe that he knows what he's talking about. We just all bought in."

Shinall credits Arnett, who also will assist the Princeville volleyball program, with bringing knowledge and enthusiasm to the weight room.

Carruthers concurred.

"I did all my own weight programs for 23 years," he said. "I said, 'Let's see what you can do, because you're impressing me.' He's young. He's got a lot of energy. I'm not young anymore."

Princeville, however, is young, although it returns starters at 10 positions, evenly split between both sides of the football. Olshawsky and Williams are among only six seniors on the 50-some Princeville roster. Freshmen and sophomores constitute more than half

An all-LincolnLand Conference pick last season as a receiver, Williams is to take over at quarterback for Logan Carruthers, the coach's graduated son. In five games at QB last season, some while the younger Carruthers was injured, Williams passed for six touchdowns and almost 600 yards.

Classmate Jack Lied was injured in the 2023 season opener and didn't play again, but this season the running back/linebacker is expected to contribute, according to Coach Carruthers. Other seniors are Ethan Cunningham, a returning starter at linebacker, and linemen Mason Hillard and Jaden Pool.

"We'll have a younger team, but a lot of those juniors were playing as sophomores," Carruthers said. "They're going to have experience, and that'll help."

In that junior group are running back/linebacker Eli Christianson, lineman Collin Lowery and receivers Jett Benningfield, Kaden Blunier, Brady Day and Hunter Johnson. The receivers are expected to help Princeville become multidimensional on offense, Carruthers said.

They're also expected to help Williams achieve his primary goal – a postseason victory. That hasn't happened yet, he said. Neither Williams nor Olshawsky believe their team gave its best effort last season against Stark County, the Princes' northern neighbor.

As for possible postseason redemption, the waiting and the winning might be the hardest part. By comparison, the weightlifting might be easy.

"It was really outdated," Olshawsky said about the old weight-room setup. "I feel like we almost demanded that change, because we all wanted to be there so much and we needed new weights. I think it's also a big motivator, because we got what we wanted."

R-W will rely on strength in the trenches

ONEIDA – As Jaxson Strom sees it, offensive linemen form the foundation of successful football. Of course, he's a little biased.

Strom is expected to be a building block on the line for ROWVA-Williamsfield this season. R-W Coach Grant Gullstrand considers the lines the strongest part of his team, which is aiming for the program's third consecutive postseason berth.

According to Gullstrand, this team isn't deep at skill positions. That might mean the O-line will be relied on a fair amount, particularly early in the season. Strom doesn't appear to mind.

"The play cannot form without the linemen up front," the 6-foot-3, 230pound senior said. "The center snaps the ball, we do our blocking jobs ... that's where it all starts. If you don't do that correctly, then the play never happens. I think we do a very good job of that."

So does Gullstrand. But after a week of preseason practice and a week before the Cougars' season opener, at home Friday (Aug. 30) against Havana, the foundation still needed reinforcement.

"We're not game-ready yet," the sixth-year coach said. "We're still working some things out. But (during games), we'll hopefully move some people, open up some lanes and protect the quarterback."

R-W certainly has plenty of heft and strength in that regard.

Besides Strom, the offensive line includes the Sanders twins, Ayden (6-0, 250) and Cayden (6-2, 195). Will Blender (6-1, 220) returns after he missed two seasons because of back trouble. Jeremiah Johnson (6-4, 320) is a transfer from United Township in East Moline. All are seniors.

Classmate Max Main won't be eligi-

ble to play in the season opener, but he has a good reason. The tight end/linebacker spent most of the summer in South Carolina in U.S. Army basic training, where he was a platoon leader. Main's experiences in uniform included camping outdoors for a week in the middle of Hurricane Debby, according to Gullstrand.

"I would guess that it's not something that's very pleasant," he said. "The fact that he is a platoon leader, leading 40 or 50 guys that are probably his age or even a little bit older, probably speaks volumes about what kind of person he

Main was to return home last week, then participate in enough practices to be able to play Sept. 6. He is to return to the Army after graduation.

"He's going to be the best in-shape kid in the state," R-W Assistant Coach Jason Lydic said.

Cayden Sanders didn't go to boot camp this summer, but he did work at a Galesburg-area hog farm. Sanders appreciated the physical labor, but it had a point beyond the paycheck.

"You're out there in the sun all day. You're sweating. You're hot. You're sore. It's going to apply to Friday nights," Sanders said. "You're going to be hot. You're going to be sweaty. You're going to be going the whole time."

Said Strom: "Linemen have got to do the dirty work."

That's not to say the rest of the Cou-

gars are going to have spotless uniforms as they attempt to return to the Class 1A playoffs. They lost to Chicago Hope Academy last November in the quarterfinals to finish 9-3 but return starters at nine positions.

R-W defensive strength is evident in its linebackers, Gullstrand said. Among them are Main and seniors Talan Hull and Preston Schroeder. Junior Carter Smith also is in that mix. Senior Kole Miller, the Cougars' kicker the past few seasons, is adding receiver and safety duties this season.

The R-W offense probably will feature Hull (four touchdowns, 738 yards in 2023 at tight end) and senior running back Jack Cordle. A state-track qualifier in sprints, Cordle will inherit top-back status from the graduated Bryan Bertlshofer (1,366 yards, 16 TDs).

Replacing three-year quarterback Riley Danner, who passed for almost 1,900 yards last season, is junior Drake DeJaynes or senior Preston Schroeder. Gullstrand said he would not reveal a decision publicly last week.

Gullstrand was more effusive about how his program has progressed from 2-7 records in his first two full seasons. The coaching staff is at its numerical high (eight), almost 50 boys are in the program and almost 90 are playing in the local Junior Football League.

"We're pretty excited about where the program's going, but it's small-school football, so obviously you need numbers," Gullstrand said.



Farmington was scheduled to be home Monday, but the meet was moved to Wednesday due to the heat. The Farmers will also run Saturday at Limestone.




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Hill to climb

E-B XC boys return 3 of top 5

There is no replacing a runner like Isaiah Hill.
That's the hard reality for the Elmwood-Brimfield boys cross country team after seeing Hill graduate last spring.

E-B was a third-place team finisher last fall thanks in large part to Hill's fifth-place finish in the Class 1A state meet – far and away the best placement by a Trojans runner last season.

But all is never lost for E-B, which returns three of its top five and has promising runners poised to move up. The Trojans are ranked fourth in the MileSplit Illinois preseason poll and are rated eighth by Illinois Running News.

E-B's top returnees are junior Aiden Faulkner, who was 40th at state in 15:46.86, and seniors Mika Nelson (42nd, 15:48.51) and Reed Florey (51st, 15:51.08). Also graduated is last year's fifth-man, L.J. Higgs.

For replacements, Coach Gregg Meyers will look to juniors Darwin Herman (154th at state, 16:53.40), Garrett Webster (195th at state, 17:22.58) and Kam Stevenson (personal record of 17:04.7 at Deweiller Park last September).

The challenge for Meyers will be getting that group to run faster and finding a seventh man out of a group of six newcomers.

"If we can continue to keep our mileage up, complete our hard practices, develop a good race mentality and stay healthy, I think we have a chance to win both a regional and sectional championship and we could have ourselves in a good position to take a run at a state trophy," Meyers said.

One rumored change that is not happening is a move of the cross country sectional from Maple Lane Country Club in Elmwood to Farmington. E-B will continue to host the sectional, as it has for the past

three decades.

E-B's girls team is also ranked in preseason polls, projected at No. 9 by MileSplit and No. 10 by Illinois Running News despite graduating top runner Addie Symonds.

E-B has five returnees from a team that just missed qualifying for state: senior Olivia Stage, juniors Addy Turner and Abby Dawson and sophomores Taylor Forney and Brooke McGinn. All have run 22:00 or faster, with Stage the fastest, having posted a 19:19 last fall.

Stage, Forney and Turner were on E-B's state-qualifying 4x800-meter relay and Forney ran 5:38.51 in the 1,600 last spring.

By adding seven incomning freshmen, Coach Kyle Anderson will also enjoy rare depth in his girls program. Several of the newcomers have enjoyed an impressive run at the junior-high level, where Brimfield has won three
