Italian Fest returns to Farmington

Event expands beyond just Jacobs Park

FARMINGTON – After a nine-year absence and at least nine months of preparation, Italian Fest is returning to Farmington. Unlike last time, it's returning all over Farmington.

The all-day celebration Saturday (Sept. 7) is to encompass four locations in the city. Previous Italian Fests were held at Jacobs Park. Traffic concerns there helped prompt some location changes, according to City Administrator Bettina Bohanan.

"I kind of wanted to showcase all of our community, not just Jacobs Park," she said. "We decided to spread it out. There's so many different pieces to it."

Jacobs Park still will play host to some events. It'll be the starting point for a 5-kilometer run set to begin with registration at 7 a.m. Kickball and bocce-ball tournaments are to commence there afterward.

The Farmington Moose Lodge, Reed Park and the intersection of Fort and Main streets downtown also are to be Italian Fest sites.

A sausage-and-pancake breakfast at 7 a.m., followed by a Side-by-Side run, are to be at the Moose Lodge. Starting at 10 a.m. and continuing until at least 3 p.m., Reed Park is to be the site of a talent

Elmwood Fall Festival opens tonight

ELMWOOD – Boden Amusements has had youngsters here salivating for days in anticipation of the start of the Fall Festival.

Set-up for the carnival portion of the annual three-day event started Monday, leaving plenty of time for kids to prepare to ride tonight, 6-9 p.m.

In addition to rides, live music starts Friday from 7-10 p.m. with the band Press Play. Saturday's of-

ferings are Minivan Morrissey from 4-6 p.m. and Common Ground from 8-11 p.m.

Other festival favorites are the food, bingo in the park and Saturday's 12:30 p.m. parade, which offers cash prizes and has the theme of Medieval Times.

To cap off the festival weekend, Williamsfield has its Ag Fest at Doubet-Benjamin Park on Sunday from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The winner of the biggest-tomato contest – "Grande Pomodoro," in Italian – also is to be announced. Grand prize is \$1,000, Bohanan said.

Downtown activities are to com-

mence at 8 a.m. and continue through 11 p.m. Food trucks, a kids bounce house, a classic-car show and a bags tournament are among the lures. Live musical entertainment is to be featured in a downtown beer garden.

A 50-50 raffle also is to be held.

Ask and receive

Answers to common gardening queries

Once again it's time to answer questions from loyal readers.

The first inquiry is from concerned gardener Tara Bull who writes, "I recently picked up a few hosta at a garden club plant sale. When I removed the plants from the pot, I found a number of really wriggly earthworms and I'm afraid they might be those jumping worms I've been reading about. What can I do?"

First let's make sure they're jumping worms. The jumping worm has a

dark body with a cream-colored band near its head. They get very active and wiggly when disturbed.

Regular earthworms are pink with a darker head. They tend to coil up in a ball or stretch out flat when disturbed. If yours are jumping worms, my advice is to put the plants, pots and soil in a plastic bag and toss them in the garbage.

Another invasive Asian species coming soon to a garden near you is the hammerhead worm. It's not a worm. It's a planar-

But it's a long season. Some weeks are better than others, for memories and for jerseys. The worst I recall was several years ago at Peoria Heights – a



Some of the events this year, like the spaghetti-eating contest, were on the previous Italian Fest schedule. Some, like food trucks, are new.

Blending the past with the present was part of the aim of the Italian Fest revival, according to Bohanan. So was a way to raise money to operate and renovate the nascent Farmington Community Center.

Most of the festival proceeds go to the community center. The rest is to help fund a new K-9 officer for the city police department

and a cardiopulmonary-resuscitation device for the fire department.

"We don't know exactly what we're going to bring in," Bohanan said about money. "Our first and foremost goal was to get it off the ground and running."

It'll be the first event of its kind since 2015, when the name and dates changed. A Summer Festival in June replaced Italian Fest, which began in 2003. Away went the Grande Pododoro. In came a "Find the Farmer" contest, a search for an icon hidden on public property in the

city.

Lack of volunteers was the prime culprit in the festival's disappearance, according to Bohanan, who assumed office in early 2023. Among her goals then was a festival renewal. She had help from retired Farmington educator and longtime civic institution Dave Giagnoni.

"We kind of hand-picked some committee members, got the word out and some others came forward," Bohanan said. "It kind of snowballed from there. (Giagnoni) knew the process from last time, so that's where the hand-pick-

ing came from — a lot of people who were involved before or who knew how it ran."

As Bohanan sees it, this year's event might be a dress rehearsal for another long Italian Fest run.

"I'm not expecting huge, huge things for the first year," she said. "We are learning a lot as we're going through the process of getting everything set up and how times have changed in nine years.

"We're just hoping for a good turnout, getting the word out and hoping that next year is going to be way bigger."

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

Wind turbines will disturb the peace and quiet

To the Editor:

Have you ever driven through the countryside and come upon fields of wind turbines and said to yourself, "Gee, I wish I lived here." Neither have I.

Last spring I drove my son to LaSalle-Peru for weekly rugby practice. Our drive would take us past a wind farm in Marshall County. Each time we neared the big wind turbines I'd think, "Thank God we don't live around here."

I'd heard rumors about a wind farm possibly coming to our area, but I didn't want to listen. I'm not outspoken and didn't think I had a place to speak about what other people could build on their property. But when the U.S. Department of Defense and the Federal Aviation Administration need to have a say in what is being built in my community, then I do too.

The proposed wind turbines will have effects that reach far beyond the acre of ground on which they stand. I don't want to live in an industrial wind park. We moved to rural Brimfield for the open skies, peace and quiet.

The proposed wind turbines of the Four Creeks wind farm will put northwest Peoria County in the looming, flickering shadows of over 100 60-



story tall wind towers, among the largest in the nation. The spinning blades will generate not only electricity but also noise, sub-audible sounds, stray voltages and possible disruption of cell phone, internet, GPS and television signals.

There are downsides to wind farms, besides negative affects on property values. The rich black soil given up to build the turbines' foundations, the access roads, the landing areas for construction equipment and turbine components and the land trenched and backfilled for energy transmission cables will never be the same. Birds and bats are known to be killed by the spinning blades. Hopefully the bald eagles and hawks I see in our area won't fall victim to the huge turbines.

Once wind turbines are no longer profitable, they are demolished and buried in landfills, giant wind-turbine graveyards. Large debris is removed, but who ensures that the cropland is clean and safely usable again?

Wind turbines catch fire

from lightning and mechanical malfunction. There is no way to fight a fire burning 600 feet in the air. Falling, burning debris damages the surrounding fields. From that height, how far will winds carry the toxic ash and debris?

No one really knows what we're getting into — there is no research on the effects of wind turbines of this size on rural communities. Problems caused by smaller wind turbines and high-voltage transmission lines are well known but somehow easily dismissed by those who mistakenly believe this project to be inevitable.

If you are not in favor of the Four Creeks wind

farm, now is the time to voice your objection. If citizens do not want this project in their community, the Peoria County Board can and should vote no.

There is a group opposing the Four Creeks Wind Project, NoToPeoria-CountyWindmills.org. Petitions are available to sign. Make sure County Board members know how you feel. Time is of the essence.

ian and is easily identified by its triangular shovel-like head. The good thing about them is that they devour jumping worms. They also dine on snails and slugs. The bad thing about them is that they also eat earthworms, the gardener's friends.

The ugly thing about them is the slimy mucus on their bodies, which contains tetrodotoxin, the same potent neurotoxin found in pufferfish. Planarians kill their prey by wrapping around them and then paralyzing them with the toxic slime.

Don't try to kill planarians by cutting them up, because some of the pieces become new planarians. If you find them, put on some gloves, place the suspects in a baggie containing vinegar and salt, freeze them and call your extension office.

Seventy-three of these things have been identified in Illinois so far this year. These creatures are another reason to carefully inspect the root-ball of newly purchased perennials and shrubs.

The next question is from local arborist Tim Burr, who asks, "My Rose of Sharon has gotten out of hand and is growing out over the sidewalk. Can I cut it back to reduce its size?"

Yes you can, but it's best to do it in stages and at the right time of year. If you whack it back now to just a foot or 18 inches above the ground, it might not survive the haircut. So let's assume you have some patience.

The best time to prune your Rose of Sharon is in the spring before it leafs out. You'll have plenty of time to do it since the shrub is slow to wake up, sometimes not leafing out until late May.

With no foliage in the way, you can begin by pruning out the three Ds: That's any dead, diseased, or damaged branches.

Then, prune away some of the bigger branches, stepping back every so often to view the shrub's overall shape. Remove no more than one-third of the shrub's branches. The next year, do the same thing.

This is called renewal pruning. You'll find good instructions on YouTube. Good luck.

Mrs. Ima Itchin writes, "A day or so after being outside this summer, I would develop a very itchy spot or two, like an insect bite. I don't think it's a mosquito or a chigger bite because those usually start itching pretty quick. This has happened to

me several times. Any idea what these rashes could be?"

Dear Ima, I've had the same thing happen to me. Several times this summer I've awakened in the morning with an itchy rash.

I think the bites are the work of oak-leaf itch mites. These microscopic mites feed on the larva of other insects, especially those living on the edges of oak-tree leaves. They also feed on cicada eggs, which is why these tiny mites are more common this year.

The experts say it might be 10-15 hours after you're bitten before the itch and rash develop. The itchy rash can last up to two weeks.

There's not much you can do to prevent a bite. The mites are so small they can penetrate clothing. The repellent Deet doesn't keep them away.

In non-cicada years, you're most likely to get a bite while raking leaves in the fall. Staying indoors is one way to avoid bites, but keep the windows closed. Screens are no barrier to the mites. I find that if I put a bandage over insect bites, they're less likely to itch.



with no R-W timeouts remaining. "He rolled out left and nothing was open, so he decided to tuck it in and run," Gullstrand said about DeJaynes, who succeeded three-year starter Riley Danner. "He cut through the teeth of the defense. ... An option for him is always to run, because he's pretty athletic and a good runner."

That final run accounted for all but two of DeJaynes' rushing yards. He passed for 74 yards and one touchdown in the LincolnLand Conference small-division game.

DeJaynes also made some mistakes, according to Gullstrand, who said a friend of the coach's father made the baseball analogy.

"He had some nerves. We had some dropped snaps," Gullstrand said about DeJaynes. "It was a resilient effort. He easily could have gotten down on himself, but we stuck together and in the end, he made the biggest play of the game."

Dawson Traphagan intercepted a Havana pass on the final play. Havana tied it at 36 with about six minutes to go, on the last of junior Cayden Green's four touchdowns.

In his first game as the Cougars' primary running back, Jack Cordle scored three times and gained a total of 235 yards, including 214 on the ground. Gullstrand credited the R-W

offensive line.

Gullstrand also credited inexperienced players for helping when regulars had to sit with cramps. Among the substitutes were senior linebacker Connor Wilson and sophomores Mekhi Jones (special teams), Max Nichols (safety) and Noah Soper (fullback). Less desirable were turnovers (four), which are among the things R-W hopes to rectify before playing Friday at Cuba against the LVC co-op.

KNOXVILLE – Fumbles, a problem in last year's 1-4 start for the Elmwood-Brimfield football team, ended a promising opening drive last Friday at Knoxville.

But not again. Led by individual contributions from several seniors and a strong showing by the offensive line, E-B pounded Knoxville, 48-21, in a LincolnLand Conference large-division opener.

Seniors Bo Windish, Matthew Glenn and Landon Kline all topped 100 yards rushing and senior quarterback CJ Ramirez was 3-for-3 passing.

"The story is not Bo or Matthew, it is the O-line, four of whom started their first varsity game, that blocked for three 100-yard rushers and 400 yards total and gave their QB a clean pocket," E-B Coach Todd Hollis stated.

That being said, Windish didn't need much daylight on two of his four scores. He started a rally for E-B

after Knoxville grabbed a 6-0 lead on a 46-yard run up the middle by Bo Laws. Just 44 seconds later, Windish broke two tackles on a 67-yard scoring run.

Windish then had two tackles to spark a defensive stop and, after E-B took possession, pulled off a 55-yard highlight-reel run. At one point he came to a standing stop near the sideline, let eight defenders overpursue, then cut back across the field to score.

Windish added a 16-yard touchdown reception from Ramirez on the next E-B possession and ran for another 9-yard TD in the third quarter for a 33-21 lead. He finished with 184 yards rushing and three receptions for 54 yards.

Glenn scored twice, once on fourth down from the 1-yard line, and ran for 111 yards while Kline carried 12 times for 108 yards.

"We knew Bo would be what he was, but the way Matthew ran ... he decided to turn into a three-back in the off-season and he ran angry," Hollis said.

"There's a stable back there. Landon had some big runs and Lane Johnson got some big carries."

Laws hurt E-B with three rushing scores and 214 yards on the ground in 17 carries. Knoxville also got a 61-yard scoring pass from Bradley Cummings to Jesse Wallace before E-B put the game away.

"We're going to see on film we made some mistakes on defense," said

Hollis, who also credited senior Jonnie Lance with a strong outing.

Next up for E-B is a long drive to Carthage to face Illini West on Friday.


