# Motorcycle chase nets bike, thief

CASTLETON – The Stark County Sheriff's office captured a stolen motorcycle and made an arrest on Sept. 20 after an early morning chase.

At approximately 1:45 a.m., Stark County Sheriff's Deputy Calib Ingel radioed that he was following a blue motorcycle that was allegedly stolen from Kewanee. The slow-speed chase was initiated in the Castleton area and the motorcycle driver cut through numerous bean fields headed toward Illinois Route 40.

Assisting Ingel was Sheriff Steven Sloan who radioed for a Marshall County Sheriff's deputy to be dispatched. Later, the Marshall County deputy was told to disregard the call.

Pursuit of the motorcycle led Ingel back and forth from the *Continued on Page 2*

## Galva OKs budget

Enrollment increases over previous year

GALVA – The Galva
school board approved a
deficit budget showing
\$8,606,633 in expenses and
\$7,590,320 in revenue at its
meeting on Sept. 23.

The board held a budget hearing at 6:55 p.m. with no comments made concerning the deficit of \$1,021,941.

Superintendent Joe Becker reported that Galva has received a \$150,000 grant to be used for mental health. The grant will fund a therapist who can assist students and families who request help. Becker said the hope is that the therapist can also work in the community.

Becker said he has applied and received a \$10,000 breakfast improvement grant for Fiscal Year 2025 that would update the cafeteria. Galva has also applied for a school mainte-

nance matching grant up to \$50,000.

Galva's enrollment this year is 473 students, which marks an increase of 11 students over last school year.

The largest classes are second grade, with 45 students; 10th grade, with 43 students and Kindergarten with 38 students.

In other business, the board approved two seniors to finish their high school careers in December at the end of the first semester.

Elementary Principal Adam Norway and Junior-Senior Principal Kurtis Smyth gave a presentation on school-improvement

### A battle over wind turbines is brewing

When hundreds of people sit in

a steamy hall for more than three hours, you know the subject matter is compelling. Or at least you know the crowd feels strongly about the subject.

So it was on Sept. 17 in Brimfield's American Legion hall, where more than 250 gathered for a presentation on the negative aspects of wind turbines.

The event was organized by Dan Heinz of Kickapoo, who has spearheaded a grassroots group called No To Peoria County

Heinz became involved after learning about two wind farms proposed for Peoria County, one of which borders his family farm southwest of Laura. Heinz said his parents still live on the farm and he had at one point hoped to build a home there.

"I'm not going to do that if these things happen," he said.

Rather than just sit back and complain, Heinz and his group have attracted enough financial backing to advertise, create a website, print signs and hire legal representation. About 200 of those signs were snapped up last week. Another 200 will arrive Friday. Those interested in a sign can

### Stark Co. schools pass budget, seek grant

For The Prairie News WYOMING - The Stark County School board passed its Fiscal Year 2025 budget without public comment during its meeting on Sept. 23

The board presented the budget at a public hearing held just prior to the regular scheduled monthly meeting. No one from the public was present.

Superintendent Brett Elliott commented that the district added \$7 million to the funding balances, which is the same for the past four

Later, during the regular meeting, the budget was approved with the possibility of covering the remainder of the costs for the final track and gym projects.

There was only one bid for fuel and it was by AgView, with gasoline at \$2.89 per gallon and diesel fuel at \$3.29 per gallon – both less than the 2024 cost when gasoline was \$3.16 per gallon and diesel was \$4.10 per gallon. This bid was unanimously approved.

Enrollment of students for the school district declined to 675 students, down 14 students.

The board approved Elliott to pursue a \$50,000 matching grant from the Illinois State Boad of Education. This is the fifth year in a row for this grant, which can be used for building maintenance. Elliott said he plans to use the funds to offset costs to complete the high school's south parking lot.

During his report, Elliott welcomed Thomas Blumer as the acting high/junior high principal. Blumer will be at the schools while Principal Megan McGann is on maternity leave until approximately mid-December.

Blumer has 40 years in education as a teacher and administrator. He worked in Peoria public schools for 30 years as a middle-school teacher and principal at numerous schools. He retired this past spring after his last assignment at Lincoln K-8

After closed executive session, the board approved hiring Preston Parrish for P.M. supervisor, Andrew Collins as assistant junior high school football coach, Emma Miller as detention supervisor, Taylor Libby as elementary school after care supervisor and Kali Breese as high school cheer coach.

The board also accepted the resignation of Sandra Carter as cheer coach and of elementary school second-shift custodian Christine Cole. Finally, the board approved terminating Annabelle Young's employment on the kitchen staff.

Signs are one thing, but a good lawyer matters more. The group's attorney, Richard Porter of Hinshaw & Culbertson, LLP, of Rockford, was the main speaker last week. Porter had two clear messages.

• Wind turbines are not the "green" sources of energy that wind-energy businesses want you to

"These are not windmills," Porter said. "This is like a coal plant or a nuclear plant. It is literally industry use that is going to be in an agricultural-urban area."

• The Peoria County Board can stop the proposed Four Creeks Wind Farm and the proposed Goldrush Apple Wind Farm.

"This is not a done deal," Porter said several times. "These can be denied."

Specifically, Porter said the county board can vote against special-use permits wind developers

How the Peoria County Board's decision could impact the Goldrush Apple Wind Farm in terms of its plans for Stark County is unknown. So far, there does not seem to be a similar groundswell of opposition to the project in Stark County.

That's not the case in Peoria County, though, where the relative merits of wind turbines are a hot topic.

To make his case against wind power, attorney Porter brought along a cadre of experts who testified about what they see as negative impacts of wind turbines on property values, sleep cycles, health and quality of living.

"A lot of people were thankful we brought the experts so they could hear the testimonies," Heinz said. "We still find there are a ton of people in the area that don't know about the project."

The picture painted last Tuesday was not the same often portrayed by folks touting "green energy."

Then again, to some landowners, the "green energy" element in all of this is the money they are paid for leasing land to the wind companies. And certainly, landowners have a right to make money on their prop-

Where that right becomes a little less unalienable is when the moneymaking involves a 700-foot-tall wind turbine that towers over everything else in an otherwise quiet, rural area.

Porter drew plenty of nods from the crowd when he said people who live between Brimfield and Princeville – the part of Peoria County most impacted by the proposed wind farms – probably live there because they enjoy the peace and

"The overwhelming response is that nobody is in favor of them," Heinz said.

That brings me to the evening's most compelling speaker, Ted Hartke, who along with his wife and two children briefly lived in close proximity to several wind turbines south of Champaign.

Before the turbines went up, Hartke said he was in favor of the wind development. He grew up on a hog farm. He knows about making money in ways that don't always please neighbors. He even took his family to an existing wind farm, where they stood, watched and listened. The impact seemed minimal, he recalls.

"See kids, it's no big deal," Hartke told his family.

Only it was.

"As soon as they turned the turbines on, we were having sleep problems," Hartke said. "It's just an unsettling thing. It wakes you up from a deep sleep."

Eventually, the Hartkes moved

their beds out of bedrooms and into the living room, where they slept for three months. Hartke's daughter even put on headphones to help her

"My kids shouldn't have to wear headphones to bed," Hartke said. That was one of several times in his talk he became emotional.

Finally, the Hartkes moved into a trailer before finding another home. It took three years to sell their house in the wind farm – to a woman who was being paid for leases on three wind turbines, Hartke said.

Hartke's emotional testimony was a good balance to the dry science. But Heinz said science will matter more with the county board.

"This is more than just feelings, there's actual science to this and health reasons why houses are being abandoned" near wind farms, Heinz said.

Heinz has already spoken with 16 of 18 board members, two of whom were in attendance on Sept. 17. Members of the grassroots group have started attending meetings of the county board and the Zoning Board of Appeals and plan to con-

"They are going to gather information and try to make the best educated decision they can," Heinz said of the boards. "We can't say no. They most certainly can.

"If the majority of people in a community aren't in favor of it, that should be a big indicator of how they vote."

That doesn't mean the wind turbines won't be approved. But Heinz is up for the struggle.

"You've got a lot of people who say they don't want (wind turbines), but are you willing to step up and fight?" he asked. "Now's the time. Once they get passed, it's too late." Contact Jeff Lampe at (309) 231-6040 or via email at jeff@wklypost.com



### **FOID** revocation without conviction reinstated

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois Supreme Court last week vacated a lower court ruling and reinstated a statute that authorizes the state to revoke a person's Firearm Owners Identification card once they've been charged with a felony, even if they haven't yet been convicted.

The case involved Aaron and Charles Davis, a father and son who were charged with reckless discharge of a firearm, a felony, for allegedly shooting their rifles into the air over the Fourth of July weekend in 2016.

The Illinois State Police revoked their FOID cards pursuant to a provision of the law that authorizes the agency to revoke permits from anyone "who is prohibited from acquiring or possessing firearms or firearm ammunition by any Illinois State statute or by federal law."

ISP relied on a federal law that makes it illegal "for any person who is under indictment for a crime punishable by imprisonment for a term exceeding one year to ship or transport in interstate or foreign commerce any firearm or ammunition or receive any firearm or ammunition which has been shipped or transported in interstate or foreign commerce."

The charges were later reduced to misdemeanors and the defendants had their FOID cards reissued after pleading guilty. After receiving their new cards, the Davises sued, arguing they were denied their constitutional right to keep and bear arms for self-defense.

They sought a declaration that the FOID Card Act is unconstitutional as it applies to people who have been charged with, but not convicted of, a felony.

In March 2023, Madison County Judge Ronald Foster granted the Davises' motion and declared the law unconstitutional as it applied to people charged with, but not convicted of, felonies. He issued a permanent injunction barring the state from enforcing that provision of the law.

The state appealed directly to the Supreme Court, which stayed the lower court order while the appeal was pending. And in a unanimous opinion Thursday, the high court reversed the lower court decision, saying because the Davises had already had their FOID cards reissued, they no longer had standing to sue and claim they were being injured by the law.

Hospital room privacy The Illinois Supreme Court last week unanimously ruled that patients

admitted to a hospital should not have a universal expectation of privacy that would prevent law enforcement from entering a hospital room to question them or search their belongings.

The case stretches back to October 2016, when Cortez Turner arrived at St. Joseph Memorial Hospital in Murphysboro with a gunshot wound to the leg

Emergency room staff had already been notified that a gunshot victim would be arriving via ambulance, but Turner was dropped off by a friend two minutes before the ambulance arrived carrying Detrick Rogers, who was fatally wounded by a gunshot to the head.

Detectives showed up to the trauma room in which Turner was being treated. Turner agreed to the officers' request to seize his blood-stained clothing, which was on the counter in the room.

Eventually, Turner was implicated in Rogers' death and was sentenced to 30 years in prison.

After trial, Turner Began arguing the evidence should have been suppressed because the detectives should have first obtained a warrant.

On appeal, however, Illinois' 5th District Appellate Court did not agree.

1992 Illinois Supreme Court opinion and a 1990 U.S. Supreme Court ruling, Justice Elizabeth K. Rochford wrote that Fourth Amendment protections against unreasonable searches and seizures "offer protection to people, not places ... but the extent to which they protect people depends upon where the people are."

Turner's attorneys tried to argue that he should have the same expectation of privacy, but the justices rejected that reasoning, noting that Illinois law requires hospital personnel to call the police when a gunshot victim enters the emergency room.

Rochford noted appellate courts have previously ruled in favor of a defendant's expectation of privacy. But those rulings "depend on the totality of the circumstances and those circumstances will vary from person to person and from case to case."

One of those newcomers is junior Blake Stahl, who caught two touchdown passes from Cyrus Hurd and passed for another to Tommy Funke.

Stahl finished with six catches for 120 yards as Galva passed for 204 yards total and Hurd went 14-for-28 for 184 yards and two scores. Stahl also led Galva with 10 tackles.

"We've got the size and the guys that know the playbook, so adding four new skill guys to the lineup makes a big difference," Coach Mark Jeffrey said. "They're very athletic. They're basketball players. So that adds a whole other dynamic when you put those guys in."

Galva (4-0) was down just 16-8 after the first quarter but ultimately the influx of players was not enough to top an unbeaten West Central (4-0) squad that racked up 386 rushing yard and averaged 9.2 yards per carry.

Jeffrey is hopeful the bolstered lineup can boost the Wildcats to a win in the next two weeks. Galva is at Peoria Heights this Friday for the Patriots' homecoming. Then the same two foes square off on Oct. 4 for Galva's homecoming.

"We feel like it's just our time now," Jeffrey said.

#### Princeville 26 **ROWVA-Williamsfield 14**

ONEIDA – When opportunity knocked, Cayden Allen answered. So did his Princeville football team-

The Princes took full advantage of ROWVA-Williamsfield mistakes Sept. 20 in a showdown of undefeated teams. Princeville (4-0) went to 3-0 in the LincolnLand smallschool division to take sole possession of second place.

Quarterback Jake Williams passed for four touchdowns, including three to cap drives that resulted from R-W turnovers. The final one, a fumble at the R-W 42-yard line, came with about five minutes left in the game

as the Cougars (3-1, 2-1) trailed 20-14 and were trying to extend secondhalf momentum.

"Coming over here and pulling out a win like this, this is a statement game for our kids," said Princeville Coach Jon Carruthers, whose team led 20-0 at intermission.

In his first varsity start at center, sophomore Allen was among those stepper-uppers. Usual starter Logan Olshawsky sustained a knee injury the previous week toward the end of the Princes' 48-19 victory over Knoxville. Olshawsky is expected to return, although Carruthers wasn't sure when.

Allen snapped for one play against Knoxville, on a two-point conversion. That helped him acclimate a little to varsity action, he said. But on the opening drive against R-W, a bad snap resulted in a 12-yard Princeville

"After that, I felt a lot more comfortable," Allen said.

So did Williams, who passed for 178 yards.

"I was a little nervous without Logan this week," Williams said about his fellow senior. "He takes a lot off my chest and makes a lot of pass calls. I think Cayden Allen did a great job."

Princeville established itself following the first R-W drive, which ended with a lost fumble at the Princeville 16. Williams passed on eight of the ensuing nine plays, including a 6-yard touchdown to Brady Day with 9.1 seconds remaining in the quarter. The drive featured a 41yard completion to Day.

Another R-W lost fumble, this one at midfield early in the second period, led to another Williams TD pass, this one for 17 yards to Jett Benningfield. With 10.6 seconds left in the half, they connected for another score, from 16 yards.

"We had a bad first half. Way too many mistakes," said R-W Coach Grant Gullstrand, whose team plays today (Sept. 27) at South Fulton.

R-W rebounded behind 12 secondhalf carries from senior Talan Hull.

He ran 14 yards midway through the third quarter for the first R-W score, then caught an 11-yard pass from Drake DeJaynes at 9:50 of the fourth to cut Princeville's lead to one TD.

But on the next R-W drive, a penalty negated a 40-plus-yard Hull gain, then Princeville defender Hunter Johnson recovered a fumble. Seven plays later, with 3:24 remaining, Williams found Day in the end zone again to put the game out of the Cougars' reach.

Princeville travels today to Monmouth United.



### **Late scores lift Rebels**

### Stark County tops Havana 33-13 to stay unbeaten

WYOMING - Stark County football shook off whatever was ailing it in the first half last week. And for part of the second half, for that matter.

The Rebels had three consecutive touchdowns against Havana to break a late third-quarter tie on the way to a 33-13 victory Sept. 20 at Gary Johnson Field. Nolan Orwig ran for three touchdowns and 145 yards.

Ranked No. 6 in the latest AP Class 1A poll, Stark County remained undefeated in four games overall and in the LincolnLand Conference small-school division. The Rebels face a 125-mile, two-plus-hour journey tonight (Sept. 27) to Warsaw to play pass-happy West Hancock in a league-crossover game.

"We know they're going to throw it around a ton," Stark County Coach Jade Noard said. "Not only does it take forever to get down there, the game's going to take forever, too. We'll be back sometime Saturday."

If that game ends like the one the previous week did for Stark County, the trip will be worth the effort. Noard probably will be happier if the start this time is a little different, however.

Orwig scored with 7:05 left in the first quarter for Stark County, but Carter Brooks' 14-yard reception from Kaden Olson with 1:56 remaining in the half allowed Havana (1-3, 1-3) to tie it headed into the break.

according to Noard, who couldn't quite put his finger on it.

"Offensively, we were just out of sorts," he said. "They did some things to us, but we were out of sorts until we got to regroup at halftime. ... We kind of caught our breath, got our feet back underneath us and did some things that we have confidence in and do well.

"They're not a pushover anymore, for sure," Noard said about Havana. "If you're not ready to go, they're going to hurt you. I thought the way we started, it seemed like we were focused in. But we hit a lull all of the second quarter offensively."

The teams traded touchdowns in the opening minutes of the third period. Stark County allowed a big gain following a kickoff return that led to Havana tying things again, 13-13.

"But after that, I feel like we controlled the rest of the game," Noard said.


