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New arrest in Maquon murder

78-year-old Doubet faces charges

GALESBURG – At first glance, it might not be clear what role a 78-year-old Maquon woman had in the apparent murder of that village's former police chief.

But an affidavit filed last year revealed additional information, and a court hearing later this month might reveal even more.



Doubet

Karen J. Doubet was arrested Oct. 4 at her residence. She was charged with first-degree murder regarding the death of 71-year-old Richard Young. Law-enforcement authorities found his body in a box inside a Maquon storage locker in

October 2022.

On Monday, during her first appearance in Knox County Circuit Court, Doubet also was charged with attempted first-degree murder, aggravated battery by administering a dangerous substance, concealment of a homicidal death and concealment of a death.

Coroner candidates

Contested races in Fulton, Knox counties

Multiple candidates are running for coroner in Fulton and Knox counties this election season. Perhaps it's because there is no incumbent in one race and a relatively new incumbent in the other.

In the Nov. 5 election, Fulton County voters will choose between Democratic officeholder Austin Rhodes and Republican challenger Cole Murphy. Candidates in Knox County are Republican Jacque Dare and Democrat Doug Sampson.

Knox County Coroner Mark Thomas, a Democrat, is not seeking a sixth four-year term. The Fulton County Board appointed Rhodes last February to succeed longtime Coroner Steve Hines, a Democrat



who retired.

Here's a look at the candidates in each coroner's race, including answers to a questionnaire The Weekly Post submitted to each of them. Peoria County Coroner Jamie Harwood, a Democrat, is unopposed for a third term.

FULTON COUNTY

Murphy, 42, is a licensed funeral director and embalmer who has 21 years of experience. He works for Sedgwick Funeral Homes, which has locations in Bartonville, Canton and Farmington. He is a graduate of the Carl Sandburg College mortuary-science program. Murphy

Princeville asked to regulate wind turbines

PRINCEVILLE – Opponents of two proposed wind-energy installations in Peoria County are taking their cause to local municipal boards. In Princeville, at least, it appears they might have some support.

Representatives of No to Peoria County Windmills attended the Princeville Village Board meeting Monday night. They asked the board to consider adopting an ordinance that regulates wind turbines within village zoning jurisdictions. Zoning authority extends 1½ miles beyond village limits.

The proposed Four Creeks and Goldrush Apple wind farms might feature dozens of wind turbines on farmland in northern and western Peoria County. Developers are expected to ask county officials next year for zoning variances to accommodate their projects.

Boards in Brimfield, Dunlap and Elmwood are among those the grassroots no-windmills group is beseeching. As for Princeville, it's to be determined if or when the board might act. But if it does, Trustee Ron Delbridge made it clear what he dis-favors.

"I, personally, am against them," he

said. "The people out here live out here for a reason. We like our landscape. I don't like the idea of them littering our landscape.

"I don't know how much good it'll do, but if all the little towns out here said the same thing, they would get the hint that we don't want them."

A presentation the anti-wind-farm group made Sept. 17 in Brimfield attracted more than 250 people. Some of the proposed windmills are to be 700 feet tall. That's about the same height as the Gateway Arch in St. Louis, Delbridge noted.

"I don't want to see (those) things

from five or seven miles away," he said. "It will force people to move."

Village President Jeff Troutman said he hasn't made up his mind regarding the wind farms, but he also said he isn't opposed to the board considering a zoning ordinance.

Among items trustees approved Monday was an ordinance that regulates construction and maintenance of carports. They must be affixed permanently to the ground and have a durable roof, among

other stipulations. Owners of non-compliant carports will have nine months to rectify the situation.

The board also OK'd a five-year, full-service animal-control contract effective Jan. 1 with Peoria County Animal Protective Services. The village is to pay \$4,090 in 2025, \$4,253.60 in 2026, \$4,417.20 in 2027 and \$4,580.80 in 2028 and 2029.

Annexation of a property at 820 N. Town Ave. also was authorized. So were residential-rehabili-

tation reimbursements of \$2,500 for a new roof at 519 E. Main St. and \$2,369.28 for a front-porch renovation at 319 S. Walnut Ave.

Board members also approved a \$5 increase, to \$50, to sponsor a Christmas tree this year in the annual village display at Stevens Square Park. The fee covers the cost of the tree and disposal.

Tabled indefinitely was a proposal for the village to use tax-increment-financing money to repair part of the parking lot at Princeville Pharmacy, 206 E. Main St. According to Troutman, village vehicles damaged a remote section of the lot when they dumped plowed

snow on it.

Delbridge and Trustee Donald Peterson Jr. objected to a village-initiated TIF grant. They said the lot is private property and pharmacy owners can apply for TIF money.

"I just don't want to open up a can of worms," Peterson said.

In years past, the pharmacy received TIF funding for parking-lot renovations.

Building permits were issued for installation of residential solar panels at 318 S. Santa Fe Ave. and for replacement of dugout roofs at Troutman Park. A recent storm damaged the roofs. Trustees agreed to waive the dugout-work permit fee.

A tough 2024 gets tougher for farmers

A late-September, 200-mile drive through the sunny center of northern and central Illinois revealed blue sky, yellowing fields and not one roaring red, green or silver combine gathering in any of the anticipated abundant crops.

"We're a solid 10 days from corn harvest," a central Illinois farmer related in conversation later that day. "Delayed planting and a wet May put everything back."

An early-week moisture test on his corn showed "27, 28%, so we'll wait."

And for good reason. With local cash corn prices hovering in the \$3.80-per-bushel area, few need a hefty grain-drying bill to bite into already-pinched profits. Thus the standing corn sunny mile after sunny mile: It's old-school drying in the field.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture agrees with the waiting farmers. Its September World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates ratcheted anticipated 2024-25 average corn price down a dime to \$4.10 per bushel, or about 75 cents per bushel less than 2023's season average.

For this year's estimated 15.2-billion bushel crop, the forecasted year-to-year drop means 2024's crop will generate an estimated \$11.4 billion less in gross farm income. That's a hard hit to the wallet.

The outlook is equally tough for Midwest farmers' other top crop, soybeans. Central Illinois cash prices hover in the \$10-per-bushel range, a solid \$2 under June prices just three hopeful months ago. That, too, will cut into 2024-25 gross income.

According to USDA's September price forecast, farmers can anticipate an average price of \$10.80 per bushel this coming year, or \$1.70 per bushel less than the 2023-24 soybean crop. If that estimate holds - and nothing on the horizon suggests it won't - collective gross receipts for American soybean growers will drop by \$7.5 billion this year over last.

None of these headed-south prices, however, will bring lower food prices. In late August, USDA estimated "prices for all food are predicted to increase 2.3%" in 2024 and 2% in 2025. The biggest increase will be in "food-away-from-home ... predicted to increase 4.1%."

The building gloom in today's ag commodity markets - wheat, barley, oats and cotton farmers all face increased production and decreased prices - has caught the attention of a long-distracted Congress. Two Republican senators recently said they are interested in adding a request for some level of "ad-hoc relief" to must-pass legislation yet this fall.

In early September, the USDA stoked the move by noting the 2024 net income forecast will again drop, this time from \$146.5 billion in 2023 to \$140 billion this year. That modest 4.4% drop, however, comes

on the heels of 19.5% plunge in 2023.

Moreover, the University of Missouri's Food and Agricultural Policy Research Institute predicts the two-year tumble will carry into 2025 when, it noted in mid-September, net farm income will drop to \$129 billion "before a modest recovery in 2026."

Today's falling grain prices, falling net farm income and falling farm spirit, however, have combined to reignite Congress' waning interest in completing the long-delayed 2024 - 2025? - Farm Bill.

Although disagreements over proposed House cuts to food aid, USDA's green-energy programs and current conservation spending all remain unresolved, the current push centers on raising "reference prices," the mechanism that triggers crop-insurance subsidies - the Farm Bill's main income-support element.

Private reports suggest that Republicans hope to raise the reference prices "15%+ ... while (Debbie) Stabenow," the Democratic Senate Ag Committee boss, "suggests 5%."

That points to a likely split-the-difference, 10% deal, right?

Sure, but what's likely in any harvest season is most unlikely in any election season.

Charges against Doubet are similar to those filed against Marcy Oglesby, 52, a Maquon woman also implicated in Young's death. Prosecutors allege Oglesby poisoned Young, then hid his remains.

Knox County State's Attorney Sherry Lawson-Weaver would not tell The Weekly Post additional information regarding Doubet. But documents filed on Oglesby's behalf last November with a state appellate court offer clues.

Doubet had been residing with Oglesby and Young, according to the affidavit. Doubet was aware of Oglesby's plan to use over-the-counter eye drops to poison Young's food and beverages. Doubet would visit various Dollar General store locations, including one in Elmwood, to purchase the

eye drops.

The affidavit stated Doubet told investigators how the eye drops were administered. She also indicated that she and Oglesby wanted Young to move elsewhere, but he refused to leave. Doubet was like a stepmother to Oglesby, the court documents stated.

A preliminary hearing in Doubet's case was scheduled for 2 p.m. Oct. 30. Testimony might provide more details then, according to Lawson-Weaver.

Prosecutors did not ask for Doubet to remain in custody, according to court records. That also was the case for Oglesby, whose next court appearance is scheduled for Dec. 10. Doubet is to undergo a mental-health evaluation, court records stated.

Lawson-Weaver has been state's attorney for

about a month. The Knox County Board appointed her to replace Jeremy Karlin, who resigned effective Sept. 5 to join the Galesburg office of a Peoria-based law firm.

The appointee to fill the state's-attorney vacancy was required to belong to the same political party as Karlin.

Karlin, a Democrat, first was elected in 2020. Last July, he declared he was running for re-election, but four months later he changed his mind. The Republican candidate, Ashley Worby, is unopposed.

Worby is to succeed Lawson-Weaver following the election Nov. 5.

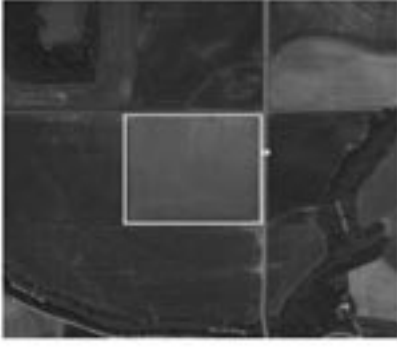

Illinois offers support for energy assistance

CHICAGO – The Illinois Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program will accept applications for energy assistance through Aug. 15, 2025.

The energy-bill assistance program offered through Help Illinois Families will provide \$226 million to eligible families to assist with natural gas, propane, electricity bills and furnace assistance.

Families can apply online by visiting helpillinoisfamilies.com, by visiting a local agency or by calling 1-833-711-0374 for assistance in 30 languages. Applications are currently being accepted from adults age 60 and over, individuals with a disability, families with children 5 or younger and households that are disconnected from their utilities, have a disconnection notice or have less than 25% in their propane tank.

All other income-eligible house-

holds can start applying Nov. 1.

LIHEAP provides one-time payments directly to energy service providers on behalf of recipients.

Families that earn up to two times the federal poverty level are eligible to receive support through LIHEAP. For instance, a family of five that makes under \$6,097 in gross income per month is eligible for assistance, as is a family of three that has gross income of under \$4,303.

Last year's LIHEAP funding provided assistance to 333,738 households.

ADM halts CO2 injection after second anomaly

DECATUR – After identifying an underground carbon dioxide leak earlier this year, agribusiness giant ADM found a further anomaly in one of the wells at its Decatur carbon dioxide sequestration plant last week.

ADM has temporarily paused carbon dioxide injections as it conducts

additional testing, according to company spokesperson Jackie Anderson.

As part of the company's ongoing diagnostic efforts, it found evidence of brine – salty water – moving between the underground rock formations it uses for carbon dioxide storage, according to a letter from ADM to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

This creates the potential for other underground material to escape its containment zones, although the company's letter said it has not collected any data indicating that has happened.

Public water systems in the area have been advised to monitor water for taste and odor.

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Farmington elected officials to get raise

FARMINGTON – Officials elected to the Farmington City Council in the future received a raise Monday night. The Farmington City Council voted unanimously to approve an ordinance raising pay rates for some elected officials.

Effective after next April's election, the mayor of Farmington will be paid \$10,000 per year, plus \$500 for serving as liquor commissioner and reimbursement for loss of work at his/her place of employment not to exceed \$300.

Aldermen will receive \$100 per meeting, with no attendance penalty, plus reimbursement for loss of work not to exceed \$300.

The city treasurer will be paid \$1,000 per year.

In other business, the council discussed creating an ordinance for food trucks and approved accepting a donation of Lot No. 1 in the Wasson Ridge subdivision from Ken Bagnana.

"I think there could be some benefits of owning this piece," Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam said. "And if they get somebody who want to buy it someday, we could sell it to them."

The council also approved CEDS recommendations on four residential redevelopment projects. In-TIF payments are \$2,475 to Robert Campbell for front door and deck replacement, \$1,000 to Matt Rose for window replace-

ment and \$1,275 to Kim Viano for window replacement. The out-of-TIF payment was \$2,500 to Greg Holloway for driveway and sidewalk replacement.

Police Chief Chris Darsham said he plans to hire a full-time police officer. Darsham has interviewed one applicant with experience as an officer in Knoxville, where they rave about him, Darsham said.

The police department is also poised to receive a \$12,000 grant to purchase five new Tasers. The city will pay for holsters and cartridges for the Tasers. Darsham reported the

following activity for his department in September: 312 business checks, 4,290 building checks, 340 total calls, 19 traffic stops, 13 assists to other police departments, two arrests, three crashes, two property crimes, two traffic tickets issued, two ordinance violations, two crimes against people and three miscellaneous incidents.

In other business, the council approved: • Selling a lot at 99 E. Vernon St. to Todd Abraham for \$3,950. Proceeds benefit the Farmington Community Center. Stufflebeam said Abraham

plans to build a duplex.

• Donating \$1,000 per year for three years to a high school curriculum to be offered at all Fulton County schools except Astoria. A group of 35 supporters is paying \$1,000 each per year for the Creating Entrepreneurial Opportunities program, designed to stimulate leadership and entrepreneurial skills in students.

Starting this fall, students will meet before school to learn from instructors hired by the program and from local business leaders.

phy resides in Canton.

Rhodes, 30, was hired in 2017 as a Fulton County deputy coroner. He has been a volunteer firefighter and a registered paramedic. He still works part time for the Fulton County Emergency Medical Association in Canton. Rhodes resides in St. David.

• *Question: Why are you running?*

Murphy: As a licensed funeral director/embalmer of 21 years, I have guided families through the loss of a loved one. If elected, I promise to continue serving grieving families with the utmost care, dignity and respect. Serving people during a difficult time has been my life's work.

Rhodes: To continue to provide Fulton County with experienced death investigations. My entire career, I have been involved in public service as a first responder. I always felt this (office) is a way to continue to give back and serve the people within my community.

• *Q: What do you see as the biggest issues in the coroner's office and how do you plan to address them?*

Murphy: One of my primary goals is to relocate the coroner's office to a dedicated, neutral space, free from the influence of a local funeral home. (The office currently is based at Oaks-Hines Funeral Home in Canton.) Having the coroner's office within a funeral home creates a conflict of interest that undermines our mission to serve the public impartially. The coroner's role is to investigate deaths objectively, and we must operate in an environment that guarantees transparency and trust.

My platform centers on three vital initiatives. I will prioritize educating families about the Gift of Hope Organ & Tissue Donor Network. I believe in the importance of emotional support during the most difficult moments in life, which is why I'm committed to providing chaplain services to families. And I am unwavering in my commitment to uphold the highest standards of professionalism and training.

Rhodes: I am going to continue to run this office in the same manner in

I would have deputy coroners placed throughout Knox County, using all funeral homes and EMS personnel to help provide quicker responses. I deal with budgets every day. There are needs and wants, but we must stay focused on what we need over what we want, until we have the money for it.

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Williamsfield hires third treasurer in a year

WILLIAMSFIELD – The Williamsfield Village Board swore in its third treasurer in the past year at Monday’s meeting, welcoming April Bouchez.

Bouchez, also a member of the Williamsfield School Board, replaces Linda Baker. She resigned from the job in September after eight months in the position.

Baker was hired Jan. 6 to replace longtime Treasurer Mary Rice, who resigned three days earlier. Rice and Board President Robert Johnson differ regarding the circumstances. Rice said she was forced out of the job. Johnson said she resigned rather than learn the new computer systems.

Baker summarized her accomplishments at the end of Monday’s meeting, saying she helped catch up on audits that were past due, which should allow the village to apply for grants, and modernized the accounting system while also working a full-time job.

Baker said she was not paid in full for her last paycheck and is owed \$691.20 plus mileage reimbursement for a village-related trip to Springfield. She said those payments were assured to her by Johnson via text messages.

Baker said she expected this to happen after the reaction she received when her resignation was submitted. She said she has yet to receive either a paystub explaining the discrepancy or an explanation from the board.

Baker said while she did not work the entire month of September, she was also never paid extra during previous months when she spent extra hours working on treasurer tasks.

“For seven months, it didn’t matter how many hours I worked over, I still got \$952,” she said Tuesday. “I should have got the same amount for the last month I worked.”

The water department at Williamsfield is still experiencing power glitches, an estimated 400 in the last two months. Ameren Illinois sent a lineman to remove a ground strap that is no longer necessary and checked everything from the transformer to the building.

A meter was replaced and equipment to analyze the problem was installed last Friday. The board hopes an engineer will be calling in the next few days with an update.

Altfer performed a simulated power outage and found nothing wrong with the generator, though

the generator itself only sounded an alarm and didn’t power up during the last outage. These glitches reset the entire plant and have to be handled manually each time they occur.

The water department is also waiting on a solenoid to power a line for the chlorine at the water plant. The cause of buildup on the pumps was discovered to be the chlorine injection line being installed in the wrong place and everything needed to be re-piped to correct the issue.

While they wait for the solenoid, everything remains backed up, but the pumps only need to be cleaned about once a week instead of every few days.

Williamsfield will also be developing a source-water protection plan to be submitted to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency by Nov. 30 as mandated by the state. BCZ Engineering was hired for \$7,500 to develop

this plan.

The board also approved a 5.5% loan with Integrity Community Bank for the purchase of a new truck with a hydraulic dump. The truck will cost upwards of \$105,000. The interest rate will be reevaluated after five years of the 10-year loan.


Ordinances to implement both a non-home rule local tax and a grocery tax are written and will be discussed at the next board meeting.

In addition, the board approved having an ordinance drawn up to raise the annual tax levy to the 2025

projected inflation rate of 2.2%.

Williamsfield FFA will lease 5 acres of farm ground next to Doubet-Benjamin Park to use for test plots. A price per acre will be determined at a later date after a farm-management service is contacted to determine the value of the land.

Three board positions are up for reelection in 2025: Andrew Scott, Lucas Lekrone and Stuart Hickerson. A caucus will be held on Dec. 2 at the Village Hall at 6 p.m., with the regular board meeting to follow at 7 p.m.

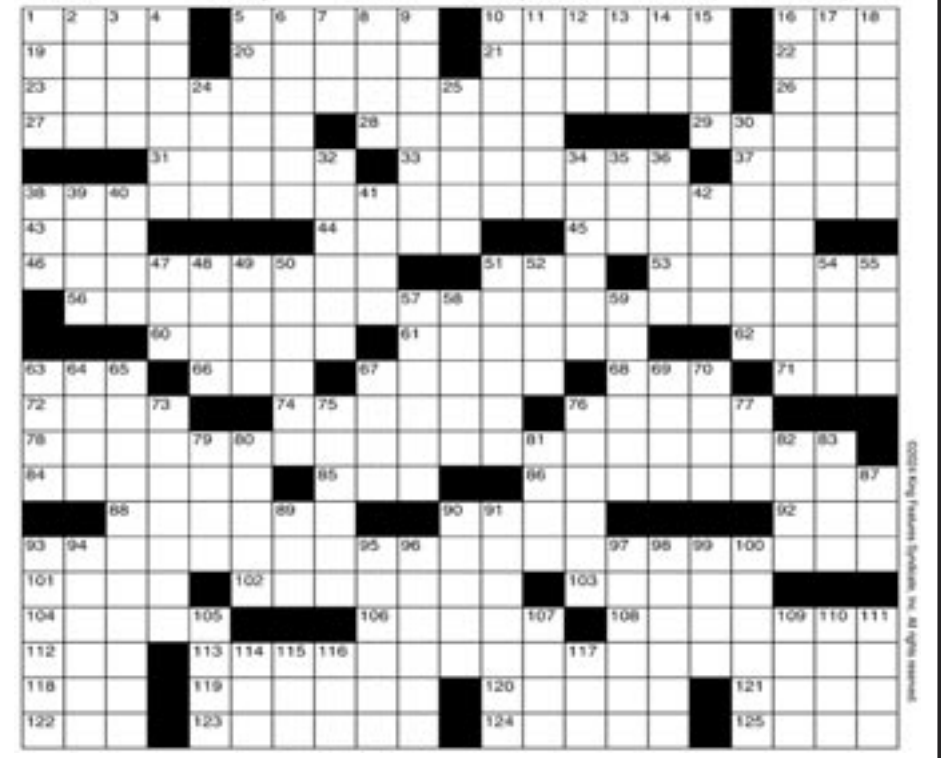

game leading up to this week. Sometimes kids can look ahead to the big game, but I thought they did a good job focusing all week.”

WYOMING – Following three victories to begin the season, the Cougars fell to 3-3 overall and 2-3 in the conference.

Stark County led this one 35-6 at halftime. As has been true other times during this losing streak, the Cougars hurt themselves, according to Coach Grant Gullstrand.

A bad snap stymied the first R-W drive. On the second, Stark

County senior Nolan Orwig intercepted a pass and returned it 40 yards for a touchdown that made it 14-0 midway through the first period.

“It’s tough to convert a second (down)-and-38,” Gullstrand said about the bad snap. “It was just self-inflicted wounds on offense, and on defense we struggled to contain Orwig and (Chris) Barnwell.”

Barnwell gained 178 of almost 400 Stark County rushing yards. He had one touchdown. Orwig (127 yards) had three touchdowns, as did QB Dillon Steelman.

“They’re dynamic, and their quarterback is a pretty good

weapon in the run game as well,” Gullstrand said. “They’re not as good as in the past with the passing game, but they’re phenomenal on the ground.”

Linemen injuries haven’t helped R-W. The wounded include seniors Will Blender (out for the season) and Cayden Sanders and Jaxson Strom. Sanders and Strom missed the Stark County game and aren’t likely to play Friday at home against Rushville-Industry, according to Gullstrand.

“It’s just kind of hard to see those kids work their butts off to get in position to play, and unfortunately they can’t play,” he said.

Things improved for R-W in the second half against Stark County, when Talan Hull had two of his three TDs.

But things in general don’t get easier for the Cougars, not this week nor Oct. 18 against Annawan-Wethersfield. R-W must win at least two of its remaining three games to be eligible for a third straight postseason berth. The regular-season finale is Oct. 25 against Abingdon-Avon.

“We’re going through some tough times right now, but that doesn’t mean you have to hang your head,” Gullstrand said. “Just stick together and keep improving during practice and try to put our best foot forward

on Friday night and try to put yourself in a position to win a game.”

• **Elsewhere** – Rushville-Industry (5-1, 4-1) beat visiting nonconference foe Heyworth (2-4), 42-26. The Rockets ran for 410 yards and 10.5 yards per carry behind Brady Downs (150 yards rushing, two TDs), Ryan Reimolds (148 yards, two TDs) and Jordan McGinnis (116 yards, two TDs).

B-V finished with 328 yards to 333 for the Trojans, who got 159 rushing yards from Glenn and 101 from Windish.

The Brimfield boys golf team put it all together at the right time last week, winning a Class 1A golf regional in the process.

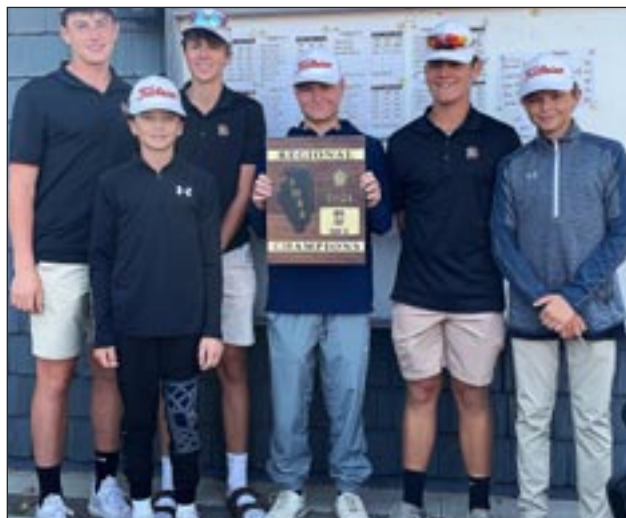
