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Few contested races locally for November election

While Presidential campaigns grab headlines hourly, there's not so much buzz for the handful of contested local races as the Nov. 5 election draws closer.

The highest-profile race impacting local voters is in the 17th Congressional District between Democratic incumbent Rep. Eric Sorensen and Republican challenger Joe McGraw (see story below right).

State's attorney and coroner races are also scheduled for this election cycle and offer some

In the Peoria County state's attorney race, Democratic incumbent Jodi Hoos is facing challenger Robert W. Boucher, a Republican.

Hoos is seeking a second full term after being appointed to replace the late Jerry Brady in 2019. Boucher is a trial attorney who grew up on the south side of Peoria and said one of his primary focuses in on crime and safety.

The coroner position is being contested in Knox and Fulton counties. In Knox County, voters will pick a successor to Coroner Mark Thomas, who opted not to run after 20 years in the position. Democrat Douglas A. Sampson is running against Republican Jacque Dare.

Sampson, 52, of Abingdon was a Knox County Sheriff's deputy from 1995-2017, has been a parttime police officer in Yates City

and was EMS coordinator for Galesburg Cottage Hospital from 2017 until its closing in 2022.

Dare, of Galesburg, has worked as a patrol officer for the Knox County Sheriff's Office for the past 19 years.

In Fulton County, Cole Murphy

is the Republican challenger for coroner and is a longtime funeral director and embalmer with Sedgwick Funeral Homes.

Austin Rhodes was appointed as Fulton County coroner in August 2023 after the retirement of Steve Hines. Rhodes worked under Hines as deputy coroner and still serves as a part-time paramedic with the Fulton County Emergency Medical Association in Canton.

Four candidates are vying for two seats in District 3 of the Fulton County Board. Republican

BUMPER CROP

Harvest is great, but not prices

Harvest is going very well across central Illinois.

Dry conditions and mature crops have many farmers well ahead of the normal pace. Yields have so far been generally good, with most of the state's corn and soybean crop rated good or excellent.

But as is often the case in agriculture, there's always something to foul up a perfect fall. This year that something is low commodity prices, with typical per-bushel cash payments on Tuesday around \$3.90 for corn and \$9.85 for soybeans delivered to an elevator.

That's a far cry from the \$7 per bushel of corn back in 2022. But

while prices for commodities have dropped in the past two years, the same is not true for inputs such as fertilizer, seed and chemicals.

"The price of inputs is up and the price of the crop is low," Tom Shissler of Elmwood said Tuesday while combining beans in Mason County. "You've got about four bucks in the crop in corn (per

bushel) and right at \$10 in beans. If you're cash renting, you've got all of that in it. If you own the ground, it's a little different."

That combination has farmers lamenting what shapes up as a difficult year despite a strong crop that should be out of the field in a timely manner – unless storage

Congressional race

Incumbent Sorensen faces challenge

Competitive races for the 17th Congressional District seat are typical. This year appears no different, despite an incumbent being one of the candidates.

U.S. Rep. Eric Sorensen is running for a second two-year term in the House. The Democrat from Moline is facing Joe McGraw, a Republican from Rockford who is a retired judge and former prosecutor.

The C-shaped 17th District extends from Rockford to the Quad Cities, then south to Galesburg before it snakes to Peoria and Bloomington-Normal. Local communities in the district include Elmwood, Farmington, Galva, Oak Run, Williamsfield and Yates City.

Sorensen first won election in 2022, when he defeated Republican Esther Joy King 52% to 48%. Close margins are typical in the 17th, which was reconfigured after the 2020 U.S. Census. Sorensen's 10-year predecessor, Cheri Bustos, beat King by a similar result in 2020.

In 2024, The Cook Political Report and Sabato's Crystal Ball rate the 17th District race as leaning Democratic. That means the Democrats have a small edge, but the race is competitive. It's among about 40 races the National Republican Congressional Committee has targeted.

Before he became a Congressman, Sorensen was a television meteorologist in Rockford and the Quad

"I earned the trust of my neighbors by telling the truth every day and keeping our communities safe from severe weather," Sorensen told WTTW-TV in Chicago. "I am running for re-election to continue to be a trusted voice for my neighbors on the issues that impact their everyday lives."

Among first-term accomplishments Sorensen cited were working to help reopen the Chrysler Belvidere Assembly Plant. He supported legislation to preserve jobs at the Rock

Island Arsenal and to increase funding for local law enforcement and substance-abuse treatment.

Sorensen also supports national abortion-rights legislation and increases in Social Security benefits for senior citizens. He serves on the House Agriculture Committee and the Science, Space and Technology Committee.

Referred to in his campaign materials as "Judge Joe," McGraw served 20-some years on the felony division of the Illinois 17th Judicial Circuit Court. He retired in 2023.


"Instead of going to Florida, like a lot of other Illinoisans, I decided to stick around and fight the fight in the 17th," McGraw told WQAD-TV in Moline.
"Being on the bench all those years, I saw lots of the effects of the Biden open-border policy—worse each year."

Efforts to build a border wall and expand border controls are among McGraw's priorities. He also supports banning legislators from becoming lobbyists, as well as a more aggressive policy toward China. He opposes a national right-to-work law; he believes that is a state issue, not a federal one.

McGraw and his wife, Gail, have five children. According to his website, McGraw's endorsees include Knox County Sheriff Jack Harlan, Fulton County Sheriff Jon Webb, Elmwood Police Chief Aaron Bean and Farmington Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam.

In the neighboring 16th District, incumbent U.S. Rep. Darin LaHood is running unopposed for his fifth two-year term. LaHood is a Republican from Peoria

The 16th District extends from the far-north end of Peoria to the Wisconsin border and east-northeast to the Pontiac area. Local communities in the district include Brimfield, Princeville, Kickapoo, Toulon and Wyoming.



- · Should all medically appropriate assisted reproductive treatments, including, but not limited to, in vitro fertilization, be covered by any health insurance plan in Illinois that provides coverage for pregnancy benefits, without limitation on the number of treatments?

HARVEST: Soybeans, corn ahead of schedule

Continued from Page 1 problems arise.

"That's farming. We just take what they give us," said Dick Johnson of Brimfield. "I don't worry about it until I get a check in the mail when I'm done."

Through Sept. 29, Illinois farmers had harvested 21% of the corn crop, well ahead of the five-year average of 16%. Soybean harvest was further ahead of schedule, with 24% of beans in the bin vs. the five-year average of 11%.

All that is despite a bumper crop that has bins filling fast. Yields of 80 bushels of beans per acre are not uncommon in the area, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture has predicted an average soybean yield of 65 bushels per acre.

Similarly, the USDApredicted corn yield of 222 bushels per acre is something many producers are already surpassing.

Shissler has completed soybean harvest in Knox and Peoria counties and is now focusing on Mason County with his son Adam. In all three locations, yields have been very

"This is on pretty light sand here (in Mason County) and they are running mid-70s," Shissler said. "Now these beans were all planted in April. Whether the later beans are as strong, I don't know."

Earlier this month while discussing the lack of rain State Climatologist Trent Ford told Successful Farming, "The late-planted stuff wasn't quite at maturity when we had this dry spell hit, so it may have had some yield affected. It's likely the best stuff is

going to come out first, so we'll see how yields change as we get deeper into the harvest season."

Illinois is No. 1 producer of soybeans in the U.S. and the No. 2 producer of corn, behind only Iowa.

"I think he's a stud," Vallas said.

Not long after its first touchdown, Farmington blocked a punt by E-B (4-1, 3-1) to set up Wheelwright for a 1-yard scoring plunge with 2:02 left in the opening quarter.

Farmington's first drive of the second quarter resulted in the 91-yard pass to Gronewold for a 20-0 lead.

Princes perfect, but not celebrating yet

MONMOUTH – For the
second consecutive year,
Princeville has put itself in
position to play in the football postseason. But
Princeville Coach Jon Carruthers isn't quite ready to
celebrate.

If the Princes win Friday night (Oct. 4) at home against South Fulton, they'll be 6-0 and assured of a state-playoffs berth. Princeville became playoff eligible Sept. 27, when it beat Monmouth United 40-8 to go to 5-0 overall and 4-0 in the LincolnLand Conference small-school division.

But South Fulton's first victory of the season, which came that same night against a highly regarded ROWVA-Williamsfield squad, did not go unnoticed in Princeville.

"That was a huge upset. I think that got the kids' attention," said Carruthers, whose team is tied with Stark County for first place in the league. "It'll definitely help me assure them the need to buckle down this week.

"I've had teams that were 5-0 before and not win another game all season. I reminded the kids of that. You haven't clinched a playoff spot. Until we clinch something, it's still not there. We really want to get that sixth win, get that tied down and then we can worry about everything else from there."

Worries were few against winless United, which didn't score until 26 seconds were left in the game. Princeville gained 474 yards of total offense, including 283 yards passing from Jake Williams. His second-half touchdown passes to Hunter Johnson went for 84 and 74 yards.

Johnson finished with 187 yards on just four pass receptions. Jett Benningfield also caught a pass for a touchdown that gave Princeville a 21-0 lead 1:14 before halftime.
