Stark County Board approves police contract, tentative budget

TOULON – The Stark
County Board approved a contract for sheriff's department
staff after a lengthy discussion
on Nov. 12.

Salaries and insurance costs increased for the sheriff's office staff, with insurance increasing from \$70,000 to \$82,500 for coverage. Hourly rates for deputies increase \$4 per hour in the

first year of the contract, \$1 the second and \$0 in the third.

Board member Tom Howes repeatedly asked, "How much is this contract going to cost (the county)?"

The answer given was that the third year of the contract was not predictable in terms of costs.

"I think this is a fair contract," Board Member Bill Loane said. "It sounds reasonable." After approving the sheriff's department contract, the board approved a tentative county budget for Fiscal Year 2024 through a resolution. The budget has to be on public display for 15 days before it can be formally approved, which will be at a special meeting on Nov. 27 at 7:30 a.m. at the court-

One significant item was allocation of the remaining

\$508,816 in American Rescue Plan Act funds that must be completed before the end of the year. The board approved spending that \$508,816 toward a new county highway maintenance and administrative building that currently has an unknown total cost.

Discussion about purchasing a location for the new building was again tabled.

John Leezer, of Toulon's

Leezer Insurance Agency, presented a new county insurance package that shows an increased premium cost of \$13,121, due mainly to increases of building coverages. The total premium is \$155,728, which is an 11.5% increase.

Board Member Joe Orwig said he wants to provide county employees with insurance coverage and pay the insurance pre-Continued on Page 2

Keeping a promise

Father, son cherish annual combine ride together

For 35 years, Gary Brelsfoard spent countless hours in the combine seat during harvest, often with his son, Jason, by his side.

Fast forward and their roles have reversed.

In 2020, when Gary's health prevented him from climbing the ladder on his own, Jason promised him an annual combine ride together, just like when they were younger.

Now retired and dependent on a wheelchair, the elder Brelsfoard looks forward to that day each year.

"I feel like I owe that to him to give him some time in the combine so he can feel like he's a part of the operation," Jason said.

While it takes a lot of time, coordination and help to hoist his dad into the machine, Jason said the smile on his face makes the delay in harvest worth it.

"That crop will be there tomorrow. If I don't get that extra 10 or 20 acres out because we took time to get dad in the combine, there will be another day for that," Jason said. "One of these days there might not be another day to get him in the combine. So, we make that our priority."

The younger Brelsfoard shared a video of his father entering the combine this year on so-

State legislators face \$3.2B budget deficit

SPRINGFIELD – Illinois
lawmakers returned to
Springfield Tuesday for the
first time since May following news earlier this
month that they're facing a
projected \$3.2 billion
budget deficit for the fiscal
year that begins July 1.

The news didn't surprise Republicans, who condemned "drunken spending" policies, but the Senate's top Democratic budget leader defended the state's spending priorities and cautioned next year's budget is still more than six months away from passage.

"This was not unexpected and certainly there's a long time between now and the end of the fiscal year and we'll be prepared," Sen. Elgie Sims, D-Chicago, said.

The Governor's Office of Management and Budget

released a report on Nov. 1 projecting the state will face a \$3.2 billion deficit for fiscal year 2026, which begins July 1. The annual report from the governor's budget office typically sets a benchmark for state law-makers as they begin budget talks early in the year.

How this shortfall will be addressed, either through spending cuts or new revenue increases, will be the focus of lawmakers and Gov. JB Pritzker during the spring session that begins in January.

The General Assembly was to be in town this week and next for their annual fall veto session, and Senate Republicans held a news conference about the projected deficit.

Republicans said Democrats should start by cutting out programs for noncitizens and migrants. *Continued on Page 2*

"These are tradeoffs. So when Gov. Pritzker supports spending over \$1 billion on illegal immigrants, that means that schools aren't being properly funded in Illinois, that means developmentally disabled aren't being properly funded in Illinois," Senate Republicans' budget leader Sen. Chapin Rose, R-Mahomet, told Capitol News Illinois. "That's a choice the Democrats are making."

Preliminary estimates show the state is on pace to spend \$568 million this year on a program that provides health care to undocumented immigrants, according to the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services. State lawmakers appropriated \$629 million in the spring for the programs, which are currently paused to new enrollment, plus \$182 million to pay for services for mi-

grants sent to Illinois from Texas. Senate Republican Leader John Curran also demanded Democrats spend more time negotiating with

Sims noted recent budgets have also increased education funding.

Republicans on the budget.

"If they want to classify investments in education and making investments in health care as overspending, I'll let them make that case," Sims said.

Pritzker declined to give many details when asked how he plans to propose closing the deficit when he presents his budget in February.

"It's kind of a flat projection forecast. It's been wrong every year, I guess you might say, or we've defeated it every year," Pritzker said, adding the budget he will present to lawmakers is going to be balanced.

The Illinois Constitution requires

the General Assembly to pass a budget that is balanced on paper.

But Pritzker also received some of his first significant pushback to a budget in May when multiple Democrats in the House and Senate voted against parts of the spending plan.

This year's \$53.1 billion budget is currently expected to meet spending and revenue expectations and run a \$16 million surplus when accounting for contributions to the state's "rainy day" fund, according to the report. Lawmakers chose to raise about \$1 billion of new revenue to support this year's spending, such as by raising taxes on sportsbooks and video gambling and capping a sales tax discount for retailers.

Sims said there have been no discussions about tax increases. Curran said Democrats should pledge not to hike any taxes to balance the budget.

Continued from Page 1 miums for employees. Currently, employees are offered insurance but there was no incentive to aid in paying the premiums. Employees would have to pay out-of-pocket the costs. This is set for future discussion.

The board passed a resolution for the county to pay \$3,500 toward paying the state's attorney appellate prosecutor, if necessary to have that individual available for legal cases.

The board also approved a county federalaid matching tax fund that requires the county to levy at a minimum rate of .045 percent in order to receive state matching funds.

Funds can be used to pay up to 80% of eligible project costs. Stark County's tax rate was too low, which required a transfer of \$2,904 from the county's general fund.

Giffin said he is still working on estimated costs for multiple options for a new county highway maintenance building.

Giffin said he also is continuing to obtain bids for a surveyor to conduct a county property survey that is possibly in a dispute with a landowner who alleges that a county building is 1.4 feet on his property.





Buy more deck chairs or chart a new course

Calls for \$20 billion in "emergency" farm-program payments won't go away now that the proposal's principal audience, voters, has done its duty. The idea's chief promoters, Congressional Republicans, have built a wobbly case for the aid and, lame ducks

or loud winners, their quacking will continue.

Should they succeed, federal ag subsidies tied to the 2024 crop will total a whopping \$30.4 billion – the new \$20 billion added

to the current \$10.4 billion already authorized by the Farm Bill, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

That sum would make 2024 the second-largest ag subsidy year in American history.

The record, 2020's \$45.6 billion, marked the peak giveaway of the Trump Administration's export loss "indemnification" program after the White House jumped into a tariff war with America's biggest ag export customer at that time, China.

One of Congress's more interesting pitches for emergency payments came Sept. 9, shortly after USDA released its updated 2024 farm income estimate. That report confirmed what sinking grain and commodity markets had indicated most of the summer: 2024 net farm income, estimated at \$140 billion,

would fall 4% compared to a year ago and a sharp 24% compared to two years ago.

A significant portion of the two-year drop can be tied to 2022's record-smashing, \$182 billion net farm income. Despite this year's forecast of \$42 billion less, 2024 will still be the fourth-largest net farm income on record and only modestly less than 2021 and 2023's almost identical (\$146.3 billion and \$146.5 billion, respectively) higher marks.

So how does a year that brings home the fourth-largest net farm income on record become an occasion for a \$20 billion emergency bailout?

The short answer is to de-emphasize USDA numbers that weaken your pitch – like net farm income – while spotlighting numbers like "net farm cash income" to make your arguments appear more dire.

The problem with that approach, however, is that every number has its own story. Net farm cash income, says USDA, is "a measure of income available to farm business owners for living expenses, reinvestment, and other obligations" while net farm income is "income after expenses from production in the calendar year."

Of the two measures, net farm income – like net income for any business – delivers a rock-hard bottom line. That's why policymakers, academics and lenders use it and not the more fluid net cash income to more accurately measure on-the-

ground conditions.

Shortly after USDA released its September farm finance forecast, however, Senate Republicans pointed out that 2024's net cash farm income, at \$154 billion, was "down 7% from 2023, and down 27%, or \$56 billion, from the highs reached in 2022."

And, they added, "When adjusted for inflation, the two-year decline... represent(s) the steepest drop in U.S. net cash income of all time."

True, but net cash income isn't the best metric to show actual farm income – net farm income is – unless, of course, you're trying to sell "emergency" aid to Congress.

Lost in the lopsided request is the fundamental question of why American taxpayers should fork over another \$20 billion without getting one farm program reform to head off more "emergency" bailouts.

After all, U.S. agriculture is facing massive structural changes – ag export deficits, a fading ethanol industry, the industrial takeover of its meat sectors, the rise of South American production – with farm policies still stuck in the 1990s.

Throwing more taxpayer money at failing farm programs is like the Titanic buying more deck chairs after hitting the fatal iceberg: Getting comfortable with your fate doesn't mean you're not sinking.



"I think when people saw that video, they realized there are better things out there in life if you stay true to your roots and take care of your parents," he said.

The comments from neighbors and strangers alike were overwhelming.

"People were saying 'You don't see that very often anymore," Jason said. "You don't see kids taking care of their father or a lot of family farm actions like that."

The Brelsfoards said the conversations in the cab during their annual rides are just as memorable, usually centered around yields. "When dad was farming, the yields weren't near as good as they are

now with all the new genetics and hybrids they have out," Jason said.

And Gary enjoys watching the yield monitor from the buddy seat, two things they didn't have back when he was driving the combine.

"Dad can see the numbers pop up on there and how the yield changes throughout the field," Jason said. "I think that maybe amazes him a little bit."

The Brelsfoards grow corn and soybeans with a cover crop rotation near Maroa in Macon County. Jason Brelsfoard took over the farm in 2015 and his 20-year-old son, Mason, helps out. Their goal is to obtain more ground so Mason can join the farm full-time soon.

When asked about the future of the operation, Gary Brelsfoard shared his vision with Jason and Mason.

"Just keep it together and keep farming, but adding to it every year," he said. But for now, they look forward to continuing the harvest ride-along tradition in 2025.

"I want to do that for him every year and keep him as much of a part of the farm

as I can, for as long as I can," Jason concluded. "I owe that to him for all that he's taught me."




