Bishop Hill celebrating new fence

BISHOP HILL - In addition to the arrival of its annual Julmarknad festival, which continues this weekend and Dec. 7-8, there is another reason to celebrate in this quaint Henry County community.

Recent completion of a new white picket fence around the village park gives hope for the future of the Bishop Hill community while also honoring the past.

"This project was personal to several of us as descendants." said Joella Krause, a Bishop Hill preservation advocate and a descendant of colonists. "Originally, there was a ravine in the park where our ancestors lived, died and were born the first winter in Bishop Hill. The park was always a place to gather, socialize, and remember the founding day. This collaborative project has restored the fence back to a respectable beauty."

State Rep. Travis Weaver (R-Edwards) and other state and community partners will celebrate completion of the fence Monday, Dec. 2, at the Colony School during an event hosted by the Bishop Hill Old Settlers' Association. The school is scheduled to open at 12:30 p.m., with officials arriving around 1 p.m.

for a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

The fence project came about thanks to a collaboration between the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Kewanee Life Skills Re-Entry Center, Rotary Community Corps and the Rotary Club of Galva. With coordination by Rotary groups, the project involved more than 50 inmates who created materials and fencing to be put up around the park. Inmates also helped put up the fencing.

"The Bishop Hill community has gone above and beyond to advocate for their beloved properties," Weaver said in a press release. "We're all inspired to see

Facelift needed

Community House fundraiser underway

For The Prairie News OSCEOLA GROVE -Tucked away down a secluded gravel lane south of Illinois Route 93, a white building is snuggled

among the trees adjacent to a cemetery.

Entry to the lane is almost one mile east of the Osceola Spur on Route 93 and is marked only with a small sign that says "Cemetery."

The building located next to the cemetery is the Osceola Grove Community House, which was

constructed by volunteers 107 years ago for approximately \$2,000. Olando Dunn donated the one acre of land where the building was constructed by a newly formed Coun-

try Research Club. The Country Research Club still exists today and is seeking donations and possibly a grant to refurbish the Community

Plans include painting the inside and outside of the building, replacing some wooden siding, installing new windows, repairing or replacing entry

Deck released by Marshall Co. judge

A man facing several felony charges in Stark County was released from jail after a ruling Monday by Marshall County Circuit Judge James A. Mack.

Caleb A. Deck, 47, has been released from jail with GPS monitoring and under the

condition he must stay in his Wyoming apartment on West Williams Street from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. Deck is also to seek medical attention for an inguinal hernia.

Deck had been in the custody of the Stark County Sheriff's Office in the Bureau County Jail since his Oct. 11 arrest in downtown Wyoming. He was arrested during a Stark County multi-task police raid on preliminary charges of criminal trespass to statesupported property, theft and burglary, possession of meth and drug paraphernalia and possession of ammo by a felon.

Deck appeared in Stark County Circuit Court on Nov. 22 with his public defender, Robert M. McBride. This was Deck's third court appearance after his arrest and arraignment.

McBride filed a late motion just prior to Deck's Continued on Page 2



Their purpose was to encourage better farm-home conditions, improve educational and spiritual wellbeing of farm mothers and children and promote neighborhood sociability among members. Over the years, events held at the Community House include funerals, chicken suppers, chili suppers and weddings.

The club continues to hold a Memorial Day service every year. The program consists of musicians, singers and a keynote speaker. After-

wards, there's a short walk to the adjacent cemetery for a salute to veterans interred there.

The Bradford Legion conducts the salute and then people are invited for a luncheon back at the Community House. Loudenburg's son, Jason, is in charge of the separate cemetery.

To help keep that tradition alive and to refurbish the building, club members are asking for \$50 donations to place names on a memorial board. Watson said any donation is welcome because the club has no source of income other than donations, memorials and fundraisers.

There is no charge for the use of

the building, but donations are accepted. Inside the Community House are rows of pews and a raised platform for speakers. Behind the pews is a small food preparation area.

Seeking grants is a new idea being pursued with the help of State Rep. Travis Weaver, who has agreed to speak at the 2025 memorial service.

cases being heard by Circuit Court Judge Paul E. Bauer. The motion was for Deck's pretrial release from custody. Also, McBride said Deck requires surgery for his hernia.

McBride requested that Deck's release motion be heard in Lacon's Marshall County Circuit Court. This was after Stark County State's Attorney Austin King requested time to present a written response to the release motion.

Stated reason for the temporary change of venue was to have the motion acted upon by a circuit court judge before the Thanksgiving holiday and to possibly obtain a surgery date for Deck.

custody by Bauer on Nov. 1 and Nov. 8 because King said Deck could potentially build another explosive device like the one discovered in his apartment on Oct. 11. King has suggested and Bauer agreed that Deck is a possible threat to the public.

Charges filed against Deck are a Class 4 felony for aggravated assault of a peace officer, two Class 3 felonies of a felon in possession of a weapon/firearm and two Class 2 felonies of burglary and theft. He also faces a Class A misdemeanor for criminal trespass to state land and 10 violations ranging from fleeing or attempting to elude police to two driving on a revoked license charges.





Just how expensive is U.S. food?

Nearly every autopsy of Vice President Kamala Harris's stinging White House defeat begins with some variation of the phrase, "Voters pointed to the rising price of food as their chief concern."

True or not – and more on that later - the Trump campaign tied that tin

can so tightly to Harris that everywhere she went complaints like "the high price of eggs," "failed Bidenomics," and "wouldn't change a thing" got there long

before she did. Try as she might, the Harris campaign didn't mount an effective response – either in person or through its unprecedented \$1.4 billion advertising budget – to counter the damaging claims.

And the complaints had traction; for a month they rolled right over Harris.

The Trump campaign wasn't wrong about rising food costs in the Biden years; it was wrong, however, to blame it entirely on Biden Administration policies. The stage was set for higher prices – and not just in food - during the first Trump Administration's painfully slow initial response to the COVID-19 pandemic that took root in Jan. 2020.

At least that's what the best food price analysts on the planet, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service, noted in

their latest "Food Prices and Spending" report on Nov. 1.

According to ERS, "From 2019 to 2023, the all-food Consumer Price Index (CPI) rose by 25.0% - ahigher increase than the all-items CPI, which grew at 19.2% over the same period." While food prices increased less than transportation costs, "(T)hey rose faster than housing, medical care, and all other major categories."

So, yes, food prices soared during the Biden Administration but the rise wasn't because Democrats lived in the White House, the ERS report continues. Instead, "Food price increases in 2020-21 were largely driven by shifting consumption patterns and supply chain disruptions resulting from the Coronavirus pandemic," explains ERS.

Recall the spring of 2020 when COVID hit the food market like a meteor. It knocked everything - production, delivery, sales, worker safety - miles from any semblance of normal. Hoarding then quickly undermined the food sector even more.

Then two big shocks, neither related to American politics, slammed the slowly recovering food sector in 2022: an outbreak of deadly avian influenza (which, to date, has killed 71 million egg-laying hens and 14 million turkeys in the U.S.) and Russia's invasion of Ukraine, a global leader in food exports.

"In 2022, food prices increased faster than any year since 1979," given the impact of both events, "which compounded other economywide inflationary pressures," ERS

says. Afterwards, however, "Food price growth slowed in 2023 and wholesale food prices and these other inflationary factors eased."

So, according to ERS, food prices spiked 25% between President Trump's second to last year, 2019, and President Biden's second year, 2022, due to a human pandemic, a poultry pandemic and a bloody regional war between a global food superpower, Ukraine, and a global nuclear superpower, Russia.

And that's just one side – the grocery side - of a fluid, worldwide ag commodity market that "regularly rises or falls by more than 10% from one year to the next," explains ERS's food-price report.

For example, "In 2023 the production-weighted price" of corn, soybeans, and wheat "fell by 12.1%, while food prices increased by 5.8%."

In other words, food sellers boosted their prices by almost 6% while the collective price for "the top three U.S. field crops (that) comprise the majority of field crop inputs" in U.S. food dropped more than twice that amount.

If the Trump campaign knew these facts, they simply ignored them and, instead, wisely began stockpiling tin cans and string.







Bradford board OKs truck purchase

For The Prairie News BRADFORD - The Bradford Village Board approved the purchase of a new village maintenance truck at its meeting on Nov. 20.

Cost of the truck is estimated at \$66,200 with a snow plow setup expected to cost between \$7,000

and \$9,000.

The board heard that using a \$600 state credit for the purchase of new vehicles makes the purchase more affordable than by going through an actual dealership.

Money from Bradford's TIF will pay for 57% of the total cost, with the village expected to pay as

little as \$31,500 with the plow package.

Maintenance Supervisor James Chadwick said there is also a program through the Illinois Motor Fuel Tax fund that allows for a \$20 per hour reimbursement if the new truck is used for work involving city streets, water, or sewer as long as the work is documented and turned in.

The board also approved \$15,000 toward the purchase and installation of a new water pump for the water and sewer plant.

Normally, there are two pumps at the plant in Bradford, but recently, one gave out. This purchase will provide the village with two high-service pumps so that if one pump fails, there is a backup. TIF will pay 100% of the costs associated with this project.

Labor and material is estimated to cost \$12,500, but that value does not include freight, so the village added another \$2,500 to the allocation.

Work is expected to be completed by late February.

Watchdog finds \$7.2M in PPP fraud

CHICAGO – A state
watchdog has identified at
least \$7.2 million in fraudulent claims and more than
275 instances of misconduct by state employees
accused of bilking a federal program designed to
help businesses during the
COVID-19 pandemic.

Since 2022, the Office of the Executive Inspector General has been investigating allegations that state employees fraudulently claimed Paycheck Protection Program loans for small businesses they didn't disclose or entirely fabricated. State workers may engage in secondary employment, but only if it's disclosed and permission is granted.

Employees from 13 different state agencies are involved in the fraud and have illegally taken these federal public funds, according to the OEIG, which is charged with investigating allegations of misconduct within state government. As of April, more than 60% of those implicated to date worked for the Illinois Department of Human Services, which operates mental health hospitals and developmental centers across the state.

PPP was an initiative es-

tablished by the federal CARES Act in 2020. The Small Business Administration oversaw the implementation of the PPP to provide forgivable loans to cover payroll costs or other expenses for small businesses struggling during the COVID-19 pandemic. By October 2022, the program gave out \$786 billion in loans and forgave 93% of them, according to the SBA.

Quickly, PPP loans led to "unprecedented fraud levels," according to the SBA inspector general. Applicants self-certified their small business status and income. The OEIG is investigating only public employees who received more than approximately \$20,000 from the program. To receive a \$20,000 loan, businesses investigated by the OEIG typically declared \$100,000 or more of net profit or gross income on the loan application.

The OEIG could not comment on whether this investigation was close to the end. Due to the sheer size of this fraud, investigations involve many different agencies. In May 2023, the Illinois legislature passed House Bill 3304, which allows criminal prosecutions for COVID-19 related fraud to

start up to five years after authorities discover the fraud.


Rep. Fred Crespo, D-Hoffman Estates, who filed the bill, said most routine checks such as cross-referencing data on the loan forms with other agency databases were suspended for PPP.

A large issue was also the lack of personnel. According to Crespo, between April 2020 and April 2022, the fraud hotline of the SBA received millions of calls, of which a large number went unanswered.





Expecting progress

New coach expects improvement from Stark Co. boys BKB

Kane Mastin's expectations aren't terribly high right now for his Stark County boys basketball team. But he'll be expecting more as the season progresses.

The first-year Stark County head coach realizes most of the productivity from a 2023-24 team that finished 19-13 no longer is on the roster. But Mastin plans to build around two returning starters, seniors Ross Saner and Dillon Steelman, and some promising underclassmen.

"I think once we learn to effectively communicate and collaborate in real time, we could be really fun to watch and really dangerous to play against," Mastin stated.

So far, the Rebels have gone 0-2 in the Wally Keller Invitational at Kewanee.

In the season opener Monday, Bureau Valley defeated Stark County 78-50. On Tuesday, Stark County led host Wethersfield by four points after three periods but lost 46-44 despite 13 points from

Saner and 12 from Steelman. A potential tying layup for Stark County rolled out at the end.

Mastin was an assistant coach last season, when Stark County tied for third in the Lincoln Trail Conference. He ascended when Dusty Browning resigned following the season. Leading scorer Luke Rewerts (13.8 ppg) and rebounder Will Rumbold (5.6 rpg) were among the graduates.

Saner averaged 9.4 points, 4.8 rebounds and 1.2 steals last season. Joining him and Steelman as starters this season are junior guards Connor Daum and Ben Browning. This season, Daum had a team-high 17 points vs. Bureau Valley.

"It's only natural to have a slow start," Mastin stated. "You have a new system and players with limited varsity experience. I do believe that when players get used to our style of play and buy into what we are trying to accomplish, we have the
