Pearson earns 100th win as coach

PRINCETON – Football and Toulon native Ryan Pearson have seemingly been inseparable from an early age.

He was Toulon-LaFayette High School's football manager at age 9, back in 1989, and has remained involved with the game ever since, albeit in a higher-profile position nowadays.

Pearson is in his eighth season as head coach at Princeton, where he won his 100th coaching game earlier this season. And on Saturday, Pearson's No. 4-seeded, 9-1 team will travel to face No. 12 Chicago King at Gately Stadium in Chicago for a Class 3A second-round playoff game at 3:30 p.m.

"One thing is, I've always gravitated toward football. I used to take my tee to Toulon's football field when I was little and would kick field goals, although I wasn't a kicker," Pearson said.

He has had an unquenchable thirst for all aspects of football, explaining, "I just love the game."

Pearson lists positive influential coaches as being Gary Johnson, Terry Kochis and Larry Freeman during his high school years.

"They were tough coaches and expected your best, which I respected. I didn't like coaches who wanted to be your friend," Pearson stated. "I preferred the hard-nosed coaches."

One legendary high school football coach who continues to in-

fluence Pearson is retired Manlius coach and athletic director Ken Bourquin. Bourquin was Toulon Township High School football coach in 1967-68 and took the Trojans from losing records to a 6-3 season that year.

"When he comes over to visit, I keep my mouth shut and let him talk because he's so knowledgeable about football," Pearson said.

Pearson was an all-state offensive and defensive lineman in his senior year of high school in 1997.

Stark, Henry counties mirror Trump support

Voters in Stark and
Henry counties mirrored a
national trend in voting
for U.S. president, even if
upstate Illinois did not
follow suit.

Republican Donald Trump received 61% of the vote in Henry County, earning 15,340 votes to 9,199 for Democrat Kamala Harris.

Stark County favored Trump by an even larger margin, selecting him on 71.7% of the ballots cast and by a 1,982-725 margin in total votes over Harris.

Overall, Trump won 89 of 102 Illinois counties. Notable downstate exceptions included Peoria County, which Harris carried by 4% thanks to a sizable edge in votes by mail.

Henry County voters favored Republican Joe McGraw in the 17th Con-



gressional District race, casting 52% of ballots for his unsuccessful bid against Democrat Eric Sorensen. Sorensen won with 53.8% of the vote, collecting 155,811 votes to McGraw's 134,003.

Voters in both counties favored retaining Judge William E. Holdridge in the 4th Judicial District.

Voters in the two counties differed on one of three statewide advisory questions. A total of 52% of Henry County voters favored creating an additional 3% tax on income greater than \$1,000,000 for the purpose of dedicating funds raised to property tax relief. Deck to remain incarcerated, deemed a threat due to explosive

TOULON – Caleb Deck pleaded not guilty to five felony charges on Nov. 1 in the Stark County Courthouse, but will remain incarcerated in the Bureau County Jail.

A preliminary hearing in Stark's Circuit Court, plus a review of a second case and order of protection against Deck was conducted on Nov. 1. Presiding Judge Paul E. Bauer determined detention was necessary after Stark County State's Attorney Austin King pointed out that Deck, 47, could potentially build another explosive device, like the one discovered when he was arrested Oct. 11. Deck was thereby deemed a persistent

threat

Stark County Deputy Sheriff Gary Bent was called to testify in the hearing by King as the only witness for the state.

Bent testified, "On Oct. 11 a (search) warrant was served on Deck. He was arrested for a break-in to Chase Anderson's motor home, white Chevy van and a storage unit. Deck was

found with a telescoping baton, a knife and some ball bearings.

"He was arrested outside of his West Williams Street apartment (in Wyoming). We found a Kenwood radio in the apartment from the Illinois Department of Transportation, meth paraphernalia and what was initially described as a 'pipe bomb,' but was a 6-inch-long, 1-inch diameter explosive device."

Bent said the Peoria Bomb Squad identified powder in the explosive device as either firecracker powder or ammunition powder. Bent further stated that Deck had threatened law-enforcement officers at the time of his arrest.

He played football for Monmouth College as an offensive lineman and was named an all-conference and All-Midwest Region player during those years from 1998 to 2002.

At Monmouth, Pearson earned a bachelor's degree in exercise science and physical education with teaching. He also has two master's degrees from Olivet Nazarene University in administration and curriculum instruction.

Pearson began his coaching career as defensive coordinator for one year at Streator-Woodland from 2003-04, was defensive coordinator at Cambridge High School from 2004-05 and then became head coach at age 25 at Gilman-Iroquois West in 2006, finishing with a 6-5 record.

Pearson moved on to become offensive coordinator and athletic director at Pontiac High School from 2007-2012, then coached Flanagan to an 8-3 record in 2013 before turning around a struggling program at Canton. Prior to his arrival in 2014, Canton had gone 3-42 in its five previous season.

In Pearson's first season, Canton was 8-3 and he finished with a 21-12 record in three years.

"It just took one year to get Canton

to a winning season," Pearson pointed out. "We went 8-3 in the 4A division and lost in the second round."

Princeton was Pearson's next stop in 2017 and he has remained there ever since. His 100th win as a head football coach was against Mercer County High School and he has a 65-18 record so far.

"I've been offered a Division 2 college head coaching position in Missouri about three to four years ago,

but college coaching is not conducive to raising a family. There's constant traveling, so I find high school coaching more gratifying," Pearson said.

"I tried out for the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs but didn't make the cut. I wasn't fast enough for professional playing. I was drafted to play football in the NFL-Europe organization by Austria in 2002 but I turned it down to become a high school football coach."

Pearson said one outstanding moment from his career so far was Canton's semifinal game in 2016 against eventual Class 4A champion Rochester. Better still, he said, "is getting the opportunity to coach my sons in football."

As a high school coach, he's perceived as a very serious individual, but at home the 44-year-old said he acts like a big kid. He and his sons collect autographs. His sons are Rhett, 16, Reece, 13, and Roman, 5. His daughter Sydney, 22, is currently attending college.

"I've been blessed to have so many people who have had such a positive impact on my life," Pearson said.

being handcuffed and led
to a squad car, Bent answered that Deck verbally
threatened the lives of
Toulon Police Officer Ron
Salisbury, Wyoming Police Officer Philip Wells
and Toulon Auxiliary Police Officer Kenny Lane.
The threat was recorded
by bodycam video footage, and Deck was not
under his Miranda Rights
when he allegedly made
it.

Public Defender Robert M. McBride questioned Bent, but Circuit Judge Paul E. Bauer found probable cause against Deck in charges of aggravated assault of peace officers, a Class 4 felony, and two counts of a felon in possession of the firearm ammunition, Class 3 felonies.

Deck pleaded not guilty

to the charges.

In his second case, Deck was charged by the state with burglary (Class 2 felony) and theft (Class 2 felony) for allegedly entering the IDOT facility in Wyoming and removing power tools, plus other IDOT property. Deck pleaded not guilty and waived his preliminary hearing in this case.

His first two cases were set for the next court date and no trial date was set at McBride's request.

Deck was also involved in an order of protection case. He was ordered to have no contact for two years with Chase Anderson and Amanda Stoner, with whom he had once cohabitated.

• Skog hearing – In another Stark County felony case, William K. Skog, 19, pleaded "not guilty" to five felony charges consisting of two counts of possession of a stolen vehicle, resisting arrest by a police officer, aggravated fleeing/bodily injury, aggravated fleeing/two plus traffic control devices (stop signs) and seven misdemeanor charges.

Skog, through his public defender Robert M.
McBride, waived his preliminary hearing and has a March 3, 2025, trial date set

On Oct. 10 in Marshall County Circuit Court, Skog was found to have probable cause for arrest, had been held in the Bureau County Jail before being granted release from detention on Oct. 16 with electronic monitoring ordered as a condition of that release.

Never-ending elections and Farm Bill fights

Election Day, Nov. 5, ended the the costliest, dirtiest American political campaign season in memory and it likely also marked Opening Day for what could be the costliest, dirtiest post-election fight in American history.

Hanging in the balance will be the White House, the House of Representatives, and – unlikely yet still possible – the Senate. And since the stakes of these ballot-box and courtroom fights

will be so very, very high, so too will be their fervor and deceit.

While all of this plays out, the now two-times-delayed 2024 Farm Bill remains captive to election engineering. The bipartisan House version, pushed through by Republican Ag Chair Glenn Thompson last May, sits unmoved in what forecasters predict will soon be the Democratic-controlled, lame-duck Senate.

Currently, there are no signs that Senate Ag Chair – and probable chief lame duck – Debbie Stabenow is ready to finish the bill before she retires to Michigan in early January.

Meanwhile, the Senate Ag's ranking Republican, Arkansan John Boozman, Stabenow's likely successor if the GOP retakes the upper chamber, holds a strong hand to pull the ever-weakening Stabenow into one or two lame-duck ag deals.

First, Stabenow, who reads the same gloomy Dem polls that Booz-

man happily reads, also knows if she's to have any of her ideas included in any Farm Bill, she needs to act quickly and boldly during the November-December lame-duck period.

That will be a tough steak for her to chew because she has steadfastly opposed the House bill's deep, \$30-billion cuts to food-assistance programs and its substantial boost to incomesupporting reference prices. Still, if there's a deal to be done with House negotiators - say, a midpoint on each element – Stabenow might take her half and walk away with a lukewarm compromise.

Compounding any simple deal, however, is who wins the House majority. If the GOP keeps (or builds on) its slim, two-vote control, any lameduck deal might become a dead duck because Republicans, in control of both the Senate and the House in early 2025, would have zero incentive to bargain with Stabenow in late 2024.

Then again, if today's Congressional roles reverse – a Democraticcontrolled House and a Republican-led Senate – the current Farm Bill stalemate might continue well into the new year.

That's where Boozman's second card may come in handy.

Since early September, Senate Republicans have been pushing for "emergency farm relief" to counter the delayed Farm Bill and this year's stumbling farm income. In mid-October, Trent Kelly, a Republican House Ag member from Mississippi, presented a formal bill - named FARM: the Farm Assistance and

Revenue Mitigation Act – that looks to give farmers about \$20 billion in direct income assistance this year.

It's a political crowbar Boozman, a skilled legislator, knows how to use. For example, soon after Nov. 5 Boozman might say to his about-todepart Democratic counterpart, "Would you like to compromise on the Farm Bill now or shall we just wait while you pack your bags and then write a new one - ours - when I get the gavel?"

Any hesitation on her part might encourage Boozman, the favorite to chair the committee in two months, to add, "Oh, by the way, Madame Chairman, we have the votes to pass the FARM Act now, too."

And it's a good bet that he does. After all, "The response to the proposed FARM Act has been positive, with large farm organizations such as the American Farm Bureau Federation, the National Corn Growers Association, and the American Soybean Association in support of it," Farm Journal reported Oct. 22.

Of course they are "in support of it" because, with the bitter campaign over, all its talk about government overspending will be over, too.

State seats show no change in early results

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - Preliminary, unofficial election results show no seats in the Illinois House or Senate have changed party hands, although a few races remained too close to call according to the Associated

That means Democrats will maintain supermajorities in each chamber of the General Assembly even as President Donald Trump appears to have vastly outperformed his previous two showings in the state in 2016 and 2020.

And in Cook County, early returns showed Democrats poised to sweep all county-level offices that were up for election, including state's attorney, while voters in Chicago cast ballots in their first-ever elections for local school board seats.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY

As of early Wednesday, unofficial results showed Democrats were poised to likely keep their 78-40 supermajority in the Illinois House and their 40-19 control of the Sen-

ate, although a few races proved to be highly competitive.

That was true in the 52nd House district, where incumbent Republican Rep. Martin McLaughlin, of Barrington Hills, was leading Democratic challenger Maria Peterson, 51% to 49%, a margin of fewer than 1,000 votes.

And in the 47th House District, incumbent Republican Rep. Amy Grant, of Wheaton, was leading Democrat Jackie Williamson, 50.4% to 49.6%, a margin of just 500 votes.

Another uncalled race is in the 76th District that includes parts of DeKalb, LaSalle and Bureau counties. Democrat Amy Briel led Republican Liz Bishop by less than 700 votes in the race to succeed retiring Democrat Lance Yednock.

The race was also too close to call for a pair of incumbents – 91st District Rep. Sharon Chung, D-Bloomington, and 104th District Rep. Brandun Schweizer, R-Danville, in two central Illinois races. As of Wednesday morning, the AP hadn't tallied all the votes in Champaign

or McLean counties. A Capitol News Illinois analysis 91st District data showed Chung handily winning that race by about 3,500 votes, while Schweizer had a lead of 771 votes in the 104th District with some mail votes outstanding.

In the 112th District in the Metro East area outside St. Louis, Democratic Rep. Katie Stuart, of Edwardsville, was leading Republican challenger Jay Keeven, also of Edwardsville, 54% to 46%.

And in the neighboring 114th District, former Democratic Rep. La-Toya Greenwood, of East St. Louis, appeared far behind in her attempt to retake the seat she lost following redistricting in 2022 to Republican Rep. Kevin Schmidt. Unofficial returns from that rematch showed Schmidt holding onto lead of less than 2,000 votes with 78% of votes counted. Although the AP had not called the race as of Wednesday, Schmidt issued a news release claiming victory.



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

Applications accepted for low-income heat aid

GALESBURG - The state's Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program is accepting applications for all households. The program offers

financial assistance for utility bills to low-income families. Other discounts are also available, even if someone is not enrolled in LIHEAP.

Applications opened on Oct. 1 for adults age 60 and older, individuals with a disability, families with children under age 5 and households that are disconnected from their utilities or energy vendors, have a disconnect date within seven days or whose propane tanks are less than 25% full.

Community action agencies – the local organizations that administer LIHEAP – accept applications on a first-come, first-served basis through the middle of August, although applications will close earlier if funds run out, so those interested in applying should do so sooner rather than later.

Households with incomes lower than double the federal poverty level are eligible for the program. That works out to \$2,510 in a 30-day period for individuals, \$3,407 for households with two members, \$4,303 for households with three individuals and higher for larger households. Higher income thresholds are available at the state's Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity website, dceo.illinois.gov.



Voters in both counties favored the other two advisory questions. One stipulated that there should be civil penalties if any Illinois candidate interferes or attempts to interfere with an election worker's official duties. The other question was whether "all medically appropriate assisted reproductive treatments, including, but not limited to, in vitro fertilization" be covered by any Illinois

health insurance plan that provides coverage for pregnancy benefits.

Turnout in Stark County was 76.8%, with 2,781 ballots cast out of a possible 3.623. A total of 1.962 ballots were cast on election day and 819 came via mail or in early voting.

Turnout in Henry County was 70%, with 25,295 ballots cast. Of those, 17,422 came on election day, 4,528 were mailed in and 3,345 were cast in early voting.



"That's a point they weren't even trying to get, but we kind of gave them the opportunity to get that extra point there," Noard said.

After that, the teams traded touchdowns, the last one a 4-yard run by Schumacher that cut the Stark County lead to 42-35. The Pirates then recovered an onside kick to set up their winning touchdown drive.

"They kicked about as perfect an onside kick as you can get," Noard said. "Once it got to our guys, it bounced 10 feet in the air over our heads. You could kick a hundred of them and they wouldn't be that perfectly done.

"It felt like in the last 6½ minutes there were seven or eight plays where if we could have made one of them, we probably win that game. But we didn't. They made the plays they needed to win, and we just couldn't get that stop."

The ironic part is that the Rebels played well overall, according to Noard. They had no turnovers. They didn't punt. Orwig ran for 135 yards, on 25 carries. Steelman passed for 120 yards and until the final minutes completed all his pass attempts.

Galena comes from a conference (the Northwest Upstate Illini) that is run oriented, but the Pirates showed some passing ability. Romer was 12for-21, for 203 yards. That was no surprise, Noard said.

"They were what we prepared for," he said. "But you can't give up three touchdowns in the last eight minutes. You just can't do that.

"I thought we did so many things well, and just the last six minutes are probably going to haunt us for a while."

Orwig finished his final high school football season with 1,356 rushing yards and 22 TDs in 145 attempts. Steelman, a senior, was 50for-97 passing, with 813 yards and

Stockton 60 Princeville 30

PRINCEVILLE - For the Princeville football team, bad things came in threes in a Class 1A playoffs opener.

Stockton broke open a close game on Nov. 2 by scoring after each of three third-period Princeville turnovers. That helped turn a two-point Stockton halftime lead into a 32-point lead 11 seconds into the fourth

The third-quarter turnovers – two fumbles and an interception - were among five for the Princes (7-3), the seventh seed in the 1A northern bracket. The Blackhawks (7-3) are

"It's tough to win good games if you lose the turnover battle, and that was one of the things that really hurt us," Princeville Coach Jon Carruthers said. "In games like this, you can't have that."

Stockton heads home for a secondround game Saturday (Nov. 9) against second-seeded Lena-Winslow.

The Blackhawks also won 20-7 in a 2019 playoff game in Princeville. This time, the pivotal period began with a 13-play Stockton drive that ended when Mark Detwiler scored from 1 yard with 5:34 to play.

Princeville still was in the game at that point, trailing 22-14 after a failed two-point attempt. But at midfield on the ensuing Princeville drive, senior quarterback Jake Williams was hit from behind as he prepared to pass, and the ball came loose. Stockton recovered to set up another 1-yard Detwiler scoring run at 2:18.

It took Stockton only two plays and 20 seconds to score again. From his own 25, Williams passed 10 yards to Kaden Blunier, who fumbled after a solid hit. On the next play, Detwiler scored for a 38-14 Stockton lead.

"That whole sequence kind of

turned the corner there a little bit," Stockton Coach Sean Downey said.

Princeville then had the ball for three plays before Arrison Bauer intercepted a Williams pass. After Detwiler ran 2 yards from the Stockton 36, the fourth quarter began and Carter Blair scored on a 62-yard run.

Just like that, Stockton led 46-14.

"They kind of just out-physicaled us up front," Williams said.

Detwiler ran for 165 yards on 21 carries. Blair, a sophomore, and Jack Mensendike, a junior, also exceeded 100 yards rushing.

The first half was true to the pregame billing - Stockton's groundgrinding style, typical of its Northwest Upstate Illini Conference, against a varied Princeville offense.

A first-quarter Princeville fumble led to an 11-play drive and an 8-0 Stockton lead two minutes into the second quarter. Stockton scored again before Princeville struck twice in the final 2:37, including a 47-yard pass from Williams to Hunter Johnson.

"We had some momentum building into halftime," Williams said. "We just felt like we needed to get a stop right away in the (second) half. But then they scored right away, and they just kind of controlled the clock."

That was Stockton's plan after halftime, according to Downey, who said Johnson and Williams were among the best players his team has faced.

Williams completed 11 of 22 passes for 206 yards on the year. He finished 106-for-185, for 1,820 yards and 28 TDs. He also ran for four scores. Johnson had a team-high 32 catches, 841 yards and 11 TDs. Junior Noah Geiger led rushers with eight TDs and 640 yards on 129 carries.

• **Elsewhere** – Despite playing home games, the LincolnLand small division suffered a wipeout in the Class 1A playoffs. Rushville-Industry (8-2) was first to go last Friday, losing 44-6 to Ottawa Marquette (6-4).

Heartbreaker

Noard ranks 43-42 playoff loss among worst ever for Rebels

WYOMING – In 20
years as Stark County
Football Coach, Jade
Noard hadn't seen anything quite like what he
saw last weekend.

He probably would prefer to wait at least another 20 years before he sees anything like it again.

Stark County led Galena by 15 points with 8:10 to play in a Class 1A stateplayoffs opener on Nov. 2. Then, after a Galena score, Stark County regained a 14-point lead with 6:34 remaining. But when time expired, Galena had the lead and the victory, 43-42.

Myles Schumacher's two-point conversion run following Roman Romer's touchdown with 1:32 remaining at Gary Johnson Field provided the margin of victory for Galena (6-4), which was seeded 12th in the 1A northern bracket. Stark County (8-2) was seeded fifth.

The Rebels had one last chance, when Dillon Steelman passed to Ben Browning in the Galena end zone, but the Pirates broke up the attempt.

When Noard pondered it all a few days later, he sounded as if he still couldn't believe it. Among the 16 postseason losses Noard has coached at Stark County, it wasn't hard to figure out where this one fit.

"If it's not No. 1, I don't know what No. 1 would be," he said. "Just because of giving up a two-score lead that late.

"A lot of times in the playoffs, if you're losing in the fourth quarter, you have time to come to terms with it. It was just so abrupt. It's a tough one to take, because it was right there for the taking and it felt like we were in control for a good portion of the game."

Indeed, following a 14-14 halftime tie, Stark

County asserted itself in the third quarter. It began with Nolan Orwig scoring on a 76-yard return of the second-half kickoff. Orwig scored again later in the third to give the Rebels a two-touchdown lead.

After a Galena scoring run, Orwig's 13-yard TD scamper four minutes into the fourth period made it 35-20 in Stark County's favor. But on the ensuing Galena drive, on fourth-down-and-10 from the Pi-

rates 33-yard line, Romer threw a 67-yard scoring pass to Braden Kevern.

"We knock that down and I think the game's probably over and we might have won by three scores," Noard said.

Particularly galling from Noard's perspective was a Stark County offsides penalty on the extra point. It prompted Galena to decide to run for two points instead of to kick for one.


Conference top-five, the fastest of whom was winner Emily Downing of Cambridge. Downing finished in 17:46.
