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# **Rhodes bucks election trend toward GOP in Fulton County**

For The Weekly Post Fulton County keeps trending toward Republicans in elections. But in the 2024 election, Austin Rhodes proved to be an outlier.

The incumbent Fulton County coroner, a Democrat, won his first election in that job. Appointed to the post in February 2023, Rhodes defeated Republican challenger Cole Murphy for a four-year term in balloting that culminated Nov. 5.

With all 44 county precincts re-

porting and the results unofficial, Rhodes received 8,689 votes, or 55%. Murphy received 7,074 votes, or 45%.

"I really thought this campaign went really well," Rhodes said. "From the start, we had great support across the county. It felt

really warm. Everyone graciously welcomed me in that position."

Rhodes was the only Democrat in the county to win a head-tohead matchup against a Republican. Donald Trump beat Kamala Harris 61-37% in the presidential race on his way to a nationwide victory. Joe McGraw took 56% of the county vote in a losing overall effort against U.S. Rep. Eric Sorensen.

Once a strongly Democratic county, Fulton has gravitated to-

ward Republicans in recent years, part of a general rural shift. But Rhodes believes oldfashioned retail politics and a strong relationship with county first responders and health-care agencies helped him counter the red tide.

"It was mentioned throughout this race," Rhodes said about Fulton's GOP tinge. "You have people who vote straight ticket either way. I think a lot of it was candidate driven. We had a lot of that cross-party support that I'm

very thankful for.

"Countywide, we did a lot of speaking events, two-three-four events per week since I was put into office. I was born and raised in Canton and have always been involved in our community. I think all those factors played into this."

A longtime volunteer firefighter and paramedic, Rhodes became a deputy coroner in 2017. The Fulton County Board appointed him to the top job after Continued on Page 10

# Sentencing of Artis delayed

Procedural issue leaves crowd and judge unhappy

PEORIA - A Princeville woman's convicted murderer is to be sentenced next week, 13 days behind schedule.

That the sentencing of Walter Artis Jr. didn't take place Nov. 7 as planned didn't appear to please the judge, the prosecuting attorneys and many of the more than 100 people who filled beyond seating capacity a Peoria County courtroom.

Most of the crowd was there to bolster the family of Alexis Boland. In September, 28-year-old Artis pleaded guilty to shooting 22-year-old Boland in April 2023 at a Dunlap apartment complex.

But because of issues regarding information used to help determine Artis' prison term, Judge Katherine Gorman delayed sentencing until 2 p.m. on Nov. 20.

In doing so, Gorman upbraided Artis and cautioned Boland's supporters, some of whom wore purple T-shirts emblazoned with "#loveforlexi." Gasps and sighs were

Vonda Brinker was appointed to the board earlier this year to fill a vacancy left when Mark Hostetler became village president. Brinker is also head of the park committee and says that she "just wants to get things done that need to be done."

Brinker grew up just south of Chicago in Peotone. She moved to Glasford and then to Yates City when her daughter, Nicole, was young, citing cheaper taxes in Knox County and the Farmington School District as her

# Williamsfield OKs sales tax

1% rate takes effect in 2026 By NICK VLAHOS

WILLIAMSFIELD - The Williamsfield Village Board has provided ample notice regarding implementation of an additional new sales tax.

When it met Monday night, the board approved a 1% sales tax state government allows non-home-rule communities to assess. The tax is applied to prepared foods and most tangible goods. Vehicles, medicines and some groceries are exempt.

The tax is to take effect in January 2026. Revenues are to help replace reductions in state funding and are to be used for repairs and infrastructure improvements, according to Village President Robert Johnson.

"If I buy a \$10 pack of cigarettes down here at the store, it costs the customer an extra dime," he said. "It's not much, but a million dimes adds up to a lot."

The board has spent the past three or so months considering whether to approve the tax and what it might be. Ultimately, trustees authorized the maximum rate allowed.

audible after Gorman announced the delay.

"I do not want reaction from anyone about this," Gorman said sternly. "This is emotionally charged. My heart is aching for all the people who have been adversely affected by this. And I want you to understand, Mr. Artis, that this is your last chance.

"If you do not cooperate the next time, we are proceeding. Period."

At issue appeared to be Artis' conduct regarding a pre-sentencing investigation. It is a detailed background check that includes information about a defendant's family, criminal history and social relationships, among other things.

The investigation is designed to assist judges in determining an appropriate sentence for the defendant. As the result of a plea bargain, Artis faces a minimum of 45 years and a maximum of 75 years in prison.

Defense attorney Chandra Justice said Artis had not complied with the investigation because she had filed on his behalf a motion to withdraw his guilty plea. That hap-

pened Oct. 8. Almost one month earlier, on the day his murder trial was to begin, Artis pleaded guilty.

The withdrawal motion stated Artis didn't believe he was ready for trial and felt pressure to plead, including from his family.

Artis believed the motion would be considered before the pre-sentencing investigation would begin, Justice suggested. Such motions usually are filed after sentencing. In court, Justice said she had just received letters of support for Artis and had yet to review them.

"It appears my client is just not cooperating and not wanting to be part of this process. That is not the case," Justice said.
"My client ... was under the impression his motion would be heard first. I think that is a legitimate reason why it appears he has not cooperated."

Prosecutor Dave Gast disagreed. He indirectly referenced the two times Artis' trial was postponed last summer, to allow Justice to consider additional discovery evidence.

"The defendant has been obstructionist throughout this entire process," a vehement Gast said. "We are ready for sentencing. The defendant is not. That being said, the defendant is never going to be ready for sentencing. Never."

Prosecutors and a witness alleged Artis forced his way into an apartment at the Brighton Woods complex, pulled out a handgun and shot Boland multiple times. Artis and Boland had two children together, according to authorities

Artis fled the apartment complex in a vehicle and was apprehended later the same day near a Morton gasoline station and convenience store. He possessed a gun. Bullets and shell casings found at the murder scene matched it, according to prosecutors.

Boland was a 2019 graduate of Princeville High School. Her family owns a local plumbing business. After Boland was shot, she was transported to OSF Saint Francis Medical Center in Peoria, where two days later she was declared brain dead.

# Of enrollments, pageants, XC & overthinking

Rambling through central Illinois, pondering whether more classes in prep sports has worsened the competitive balance between public and private schools.

Change could be coming to the method the Illinois High School Association uses to classify non-boundaried schools for athletic competition.

Public schools have long complained about advantages afforded non-boundaried private schools, which can attract students from a wider area than their enrollment might otherwise indicate.

The IHSA has held town-hall meetings across the state this month, including one on Nov. 13 in Morton. Among the topics of discussion is a proposal to drop the current 1.65 enrollment multiplier that is triggered by success in the state series.

In its place, Proposal 19 calls for enrollment of non-boundaried schools to be based on the average enrollment of all schools within a 30mile radius whose total number of students is above that of the nonboundaried school.

While that seems like a very complicated system, the proposal so far has passed the straw-poll stage with member schools. Some principals believe it will be part of the all-school voting process, which is scheduled for Dec. 4-18. Stay tuned.

Reclassification talks won't come fast enough for the Farmington football team, which this year could face non-boundaried foes Palos Heights Chicago Christian (10-1) and Quincy Notre Dame (10-1) in its quest to win a Class 2A state title. Then again, the Farmers will have their hands full this week with Dwight/Gardner-South Wilmington, a big, physical team that is built to stop the run. Farmington fans should hope for better weather this Saturday than last, since their success in the quarterfinals could well hinge on the aerial attack. ... 

# Buy more deck chairs or chart a new course

Calls for \$20 billion in "emergency" farm-program payments won't go away now that the proposal's principal audience, voters, has done its duty. The idea's chief promoters, Congressional Republicans. have built a wobbly case for the aid and, lame ducks

or loud winners, their quacking will continue.

Should they succeed, federal ag subsidies tied to the 2024 crop will total a whopping \$30.4 billion - the new \$20 billion added

to the current \$10.4 billion already authorized by the Farm Bill, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

That sum would make 2024 the second-largest ag subsidy year in American history.

The record, 2020's \$45.6 billion, marked the peak giveaway of the Trump Administration's export loss "indemnification" program after the White House jumped into a tariff war with America's biggest ag export customer at that time, China.

One of Congress's more interesting pitches for emergency payments came Sept. 9, shortly after USDA released its updated 2024 farm income estimate. That report confirmed what sinking grain and commodity markets had indicated most of the summer: 2024 net farm income, estimated at \$140 billion, would fall 4% compared to a year ago and a sharp 24% compared to

two years ago.

A significant portion of the twoyear drop can be tied to 2022's record-smashing, \$182 billion net farm income. Despite this year's forecast of \$42 billion less, 2024 will still be the fourth-largest net farm income on record and only modestly less than 2021 and 2023's almost identical (\$146.3 billion and \$146.5 billion, respectively) higher

So how does a year that brings home the fourth-largest net farm income on record become an occasion for a \$20 billion emergency bail-

The short answer is to de-emphasize USDA numbers that weaken your pitch - like net farm income while spotlighting numbers like "net farm cash income" to make your arguments appear more dire.

The problem with that approach, however, is that every number has its own story. Net farm cash income, says USDA, is "a measure of income available to farm business owners for living expenses, reinvestment, and other obligations" while net farm income is "income after expenses from production in the calendar year."

Of the two measures, net farm income – like net income for any business - delivers a rock-hard bottom line. That's why policymakers, academics and lenders use it and not the more fluid net cash income to more accurately measure on-theground conditions.

Shortly after USDA released its September farm finance forecast, however, Senate Republicans

pointed out that 2024's net cash farm income, at \$154 billion, was "down 7% from 2023, and down 27%, or \$56 billion, from the highs reached in 2022."

And, they added, "When adjusted for inflation, the two-year decline... represent(s) the steepest drop in U.S. net cash income of all time."

True, but net cash income isn't the best metric to show actual farm income - net farm income is - unless, of course, you're trying to sell "emergency" aid to Congress.

Lost in the lopsided request is the fundamental question of why American taxpayers should fork over another \$20 billion without getting one farm program reform to head off more "emergency" bailouts.

After all, U.S. agriculture is facing massive structural changes – ag export deficits, a fading ethanol industry, the industrial takeover of its meat sectors, the rise of South American production – with farm policies still stuck in the 1990s.

Throwing more taxpayer money at failing farm programs is like the Titanic buying more deck chairs after hitting the fatal iceberg: Getting comfortable with your fate doesn't mean you're not sinking.

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

# Lawsuits likely in Princeville woman's death

For The Weekly Post PEORIA - Civil legal action might expand on behalf of a Princeville-area woman killed in a two-vehicle crash in May.

The City of Peoria could be a target of additional litigation connected with the death of Neveah Mitchell, according to attorneys. The 18-year-old died May 4 when her vehicle collided head-on with another on Orange Prairie Road north of War Memorial Drive in Peoria.

An attorney representing Mitchell's family has sued the other driver, Levi Dietz, a former Stark County resident. Dietz's attorney, Kevin Sullivan, told The Weekly Post last week that case might be headed for an out-of-court settlement with his client's insurance company.

Sullivan also said lighting along Orange Prairie Road in the accident area was inadequate and defective and contributed to the collision. That might result in a civil lawsuit against the city.

"That is under consideration by the attorney for the family of the young girl," Sullivan said.

That attorney, Shaun Cusack, corroborated Sullivan's comments.

"We are exploring legal action against anybody we think may have been involved in it and if the city so happens to be a target, then, yeah, we're going to

take the shot," Cusack told the Peoria Journal Star.

Additional legalities against Dietz are unlikely. The 25-year-old appeared Nov. 7 in Peoria County traffic court, where he pleaded guilty to driving the wrong way on a divided highway. It's considered a petty offense, according to court records. Dietz's plea was negotiated.

Wearing a gray pullover and mustard-colored trousers, the bearded Dietz said little during a brief hearing in front of Judge Katherine Legge. Cusack and members of Mitchell's family were in the audience.

Legge sentenced Dietz to pay \$1,230 in fines and fees and to complete 100 public-service hours by May 7. Dietz will be on his honor to complete the public-service hours. The Peoria County State's Attorney's Office did not ask for Dietz to be placed on probation.

If Dietz deliberately avoids completing public service, he could be jailed for contempt of court. Sullivan deemed that improb-

"My client is way too conscientious a guy. He feels terrible about it," Sullivan said following the court hearing. "He's cooperated with Shaun Cusack and their firm in trying to help them get the civil matter resolved. My client's otherwise a very

conscientious young man who's very broken up about this."

Dietz almost lost his right leg because of the accident and has undergone multiple surgeries, according to his attorney. A former resident of Wyoming, Dietz has moved to Peoria, where he works as an engineer.

"He's obviously suffered physically, mentally, emotionally," Sullivan said. "And I think he's on the path to recovery, but he's got a ways to go yet."

According to Sullivan, Dietz was unfamiliar with Orange Prairie Road, which in the accident area is a four-lane divided highway. As Dietz was leaving an apartment complex the night of the crash, he

turned south onto the road.

But Dietz headed south in the northbound lanes, not the southbound ones on the other side of the median. Mitchell, a Dunlap High School student, was driving north on her way home from work at a Peoria movie theater.

They collided at the speed limit, 45 mph, according to Sullivan, who cited an accident-reconstruction report. He said alcohol and medications were not factors, and cellphone use didn't appear to be one, either.

"She apparently didn't see him in her lane, and she didn't brake, and he didn't see her," Sullivan said. "They just didn't see each other, for some reason."

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

# Pick your poison with this tropical bean plant

I remember many years ago reading about an unfortunate accident. A woman had saved seeds from a plant in her garden to sow the following spring. She placed the seeds on the windowsill above her kitchen counter and went about preparing dinner for her husband.

Unnoticed by the woman, the seeds were knocked off the windowsill, possibly by a breeze blowing through the curtains. They landed in the dish she was preparing and a couple of days later her husband was dead.

In 1978, another incident occurred in which the victim's death was no accident. Georgi Markov was a Bulgarian dissident and prize-winning writer working for the BBC World Service in London. He was an outspoken critic of the Bulgarian communist regime.

Markov was waiting for a bus on a London street when he felt a sharp sting at the back of his thigh. He turned around expecting the person behind him to apologize for poking him with an umbrella. Instead, the individual ran off.

Later that evening, Markov developed a high fever and went to the hospital. He told the doctor, Bernard Riley, "I was warned three months ago that they're out to get me. I've been poisoned by the KGB and I'm going to die and there's nothing you can do about

Ruling out cyanide and arsenic, Dr. Riley suspected some sort of toxin for which there might be an antidote.

He went home and mentioned Markov's case to his wife and told her he was stumped. She said, "You should read more Agatha Christie."

Coincidentally, his wife had just finished reading

the Lurking Death" in which ricin, an extremely potent toxin, dispatches four members of the same household.

During a post-mortem examination of Markov's body, doctors found a metal pellet smaller than a sesame seed embedded in his thigh. Mrs. Riley was right. Tiny cavities in the pellet contained ricin. According to the CDC and Mayo Clinic, ricin poisoning is untreatable. There was nothing the doctors could have done to save Markov.

Ricin poisoning causes severe diarrhea and vomiting followed by hallucinations, seizures and liver and kidney failure. Death ends the misery in just a couple days.

Ricin is found in the seeds of the castor bean plant, Ricinus communis. Commonly called castor bean plant, it is a native of tropical Africa. Non-homicidal gardeners value the plant for its tall stature and bold outline, oversized tropical leaves and its unique, spiny round seed capsules. A seed or starter plant set out in late spring will be 6-10 feet tall by summer's end.

Castor bean plants thrive in rich moist soil and full sun or light shade but don't hold up well in windy locations. The plant makes a bold statement in a Victorian-style garden or mixed border.

Although the common species of castor bean plant is attractive in itself, many colorful cultivars, dwarf and large, are available that gardeners find especially appealing. 'Carmencita Bright Red' has rich red leaves, flowers and seed pods. 'Carmencita Rose' has blue-green leaves and scarlet-orange seed pods. 'Gibsonii' grows just 5 feet tall and bears red leaves and pink seed pods.

The castor bean plant produces more than poison. The seeds also contain castor oil. Egyptians were using castor oil 6,000 years ago as a lubricating laxative to relieve constipation. Users of castor oil need not worry about getting poisoned. Ricin is insoluble in oil.

Castor oil works in mod-



While garden centers and nurseries offer castor bean plants for sale, it's best not to plant them if you have children, pets or livestock. Continued from Page 1 longtime Coroner Steve Hines retired. Hines still works part time in the coroner's office, according to Rhodes.

"There's always that sense in the back of your mind that our retired coroner did such a good job for so long I have huge shoes to fill," Rhodes said. "Having him at my disposal the last year and half has got me up to speed."

At the same time Rhodes was winning, Republicans were expanding their majority on the County Board.

GOP candidates Andy Steck (3,398 votes) and Susie Berry (2,712) won the two board seats available in a four-candidate race in District 3, which includes Farmington. Incumbent Lisa Thompson finished third (1,975), and fellow Democrat Meredith Hinchee was fourth (1,736).

Republicans also picked up a seat in District 1, which includes Canton. The new board is to have 10 Republicans and five Democrats, a two-member GOP gain. In 2022, Republicans took the majority on the board for the first time in at least 40 years.

# Peoria County state's attorney

Incumbent Democrat Jodi Hoos rode overwhelming vote-by-mail results to a second full term in office.

Overall, Hoos received 41,409 votes (54%) to 34,950 votes (46%) for Republican challenger Robert Boucher in totals released Nov. 7.

Boucher won election-day voting 52-48% and had a 49-vote majority out of almost 23,000 early votes cast. But Hoos swamped Boucher among almost 20,000 mail votes, which she won 69-31%.

Hoos was appointed to her current job in 2019 following the death of Jerry Brady. She was unopposed in her first state's attorney election, in 2020.

### Knox County coroner

A strong showing in rural Knox County gave Republican Jacque Dare the victory in an open race for coroner.

Overall, with almost all precincts reporting, Dare received 11,860 votes (56%) to 9,229 votes (44%) for her opponent, Democrat Doug Sampson. In Galesburg, Sampson's winning margin was 54-46%. But Dare took two-thirds of the vote in the rest of the county.

Dare is a Knox County Sheriff's Office deputy. She is to succeed Mark Thomas, a Democrat who did not seek a sixth term.

### Peoria County Circuit Court judge

This race between incumbent Republican Frank Ierulli and Democratic challenger John Spears probably won't be decided until at least Nov. 19, the deadline for mail-in ballots to arrive.

As of Tuesday, Spears had a 53-vote lead over Ierulli out of more than 76,000 votes tabulated. Spears had 38,028 votes, Ierulli 37,975.

Spears' margin was

seven votes on election night and 13 votes late last week.

Ierulli won election-day and early voting, but Spears was ahead in mail voting, 62-38%.

Candidates can request a partial recount, for which they would have to pay.

Ierulli was an associate judge until two years ago, when he was appointed to replace the retired Michael Risinger. Spears is an assistant public defender in Tazewell County.

### **Peoria County Board**

While Fulton County is shifting toward the right in much of its politics, the Peoria County Board saw Democrats pick up another seat in the last election.

Republican Nathan Hoerr lost a reelection bid to Marcia McCann. He received 46.5% of the vote to McCann's 53.5% in the District 8 seat that covers much of northwest Peoria.

Democrats will now hold an 11-7 advantage on the County Board.

# BILLTOWN: Trustee wanted a referendum

State law permits quarter-percent increments up to 1%.

Stu Hickerson was the only trustee present Monday night to vote against the tax. Colleagues Nancy Everett, Andrew Scott, Trudy Self and Julie Van Dran formed the majority. Trustee Lucas Leckrone was absent.

Hickerson said he believes Billtown registered voters should be asked by referendum to approve or reject the tax.

"That's a whole new tax," Hickerson said. "It is something that's going to affect everybody. There has to be a balance between tax makers and tax takers."

Village officials have been investigating new revenue streams, in part to help pare a \$60,000 budget deficit and to pay for unexpected waterplant expenses.

Public outcry earlier this year regarding appropriate use of land caused the board not to consider one possible stream, a proposal to install

a solar-energy project on 20 acres of village-owned property. The village stood to gain at least \$40,000 annually from the solar farm.

"We have to act, and this is a small piece of what we need to do," Scott said about new-tax approval. "We did shoot down the big idea. That would have helped us out tremendously. What other options do we have?"

Hickerson and the others voted to maintain a 1% grocery sales tax once a state tax of that percentage is repealed. The repeal and the replacement tax are effective New Year's Day 2026. Hickerson said he had no problem approving this tax, because it perpetuates an existing one at the same rate.

The state has been collecting the grocery tax and distributing the revenues to municipalities.

In other business, the board authorized a 2.2% increase in the property-tax levy for the 2025 fiscal year. The total levy is \$55,230. The increase keeps pace with inflation,

according to Johnson.

Also approved were:

- Spending no more than \$1,000 on new computer equipment for the Williamsfield Police Department.
- Spending no more than \$200 on a computer tablet for the water department.
- A grant of \$500 to local parents who are raising funds to take 7th and 8th grade students to Washington, D.C., on a field trip. The Williamsfield School District does not sponsor the trip, which first was made last year.

Hickerson and Scott also said they will not seek reelection in 2025. Leckrone doesn't plan to run for a full four-year term, according to Johnson and other trustees. Leckrone was appointed to the board last year to fill a vacancy.

A caucus to solicit candidates for the three available board positions is scheduled for 6 p.m. on Dec. 2 at the village hall, one hour before the December regular board meeting. The municipal election is April 1



FARMINGTON - The Farmington School Board on Monday voted to approve the purchase of three new buses.

The board OK'd buying two Bluebird 83-passenger diesel extended Type C buses for \$174,960 apiece from Central State Bus Sales, Inc., of Fenton, Mo.

Board members discussed additional storage capacity of the new buses, expected to be delivered in October 2025, and how the new buses may help consolidate some routes.

The third vehicle is a 14passenger Type A activity bus for \$112,900.

The board also approved a resolution for the tentative 2024 tax levy. Superintendent Zac Chatterton said while the district tax rate is expected to "stay about the same" at 5%, the equalized assessed value of homes in the district has increased by 6.6%.

"We've seen two years in a row for pretty sizeable jumps for EAV," Chatterton said.





# E-B loses 12-6 to Dwight on TD pass with 2.8 seconds left

DWIGHT – In a muddy

DWIGHT – In a muddy playoff football game filled with nearly all running plays, a pass or two proved to be the difference.

Dwight/Gardner South Wilmington's 6-yard pass from Collin Bachand to Evan Cox with 2.8 seconds left delivered a 12-6 victory over Elmwood-Brimfield (9-2) in a Class 2A secondround playoff game Nov. 9.

"I thought we were going to get an overtime there," E-B Coach Todd Hollis said.

The same thought was on the minds of many after Dwight (8-3) was assessed a 5-yard penalty for delay of game with 11 seconds left. Dwight had driven to the E-B 1-yard line, where it faced first-and-goal with 11.1 seconds left.

But Coach Luke Standiford, believing E-B had called a timeout, huddled with his team on the field as the play clock expired.

"That was a coaching error on my part," Standiford said. "I thought Elmwood had called a timeout to get their defense set. The next thing I know there's a flag on the ground, we got a delay of game, so I'm scrambling trying to get the next play in. It ended up working out for us."

Instead of running the quarterback up the middle on a tush-push play, as Standiford had initially intended, Dwight attempted two passes. The first fell incomplete. The second pass found Cox open in the flat

after going in motion.

Cox walked in untouched for a score that moved Dwight to the quarterfinals for the first time in school history. The winning team will play host Saturday at 1 p.m. to unbeaten Farmington (11-0).

"There were a couple of things here and there, and when you're in really close competition and ability level, that's what it comes down to," Hollis said. "Our kids busted their butts the whole game. The whole year, really. They was no quit in this group."

D/G-SW started its winning drive from its own 27yard line with 1:23 remaining. But a series of wide pitches, a double-reverse Philly Special pass play and the final TD pass

allowed the hosts to drive down the field.

E-B had a final play from its 31-yard line, but a pass from CJ Ramirez to Bo Windish fell incomplete.

The normally potent E-B ground game struggled to find traction all afternoon against an imposing Dwight defensive line that Standiford said is the strength of his team.

Among the standouts is 6-foot-3, 260-pound lineman Graham Meister, who was first in the state in Class 1A shot put as a freshman.

"Our run defense has been solid," Standiford said. "Up front we have four really good defensive linemen and right behind them are some good linebackers. We felt pretty good going into this one based on where the strength of our defense was."

E-B managed just 156 yards on the ground and 3.2 per carry, well below its season averages of 417 yards per game and 7.4 per carry. Senior Bo Windish led E-B with 111 yards on 23 carries. But aside from a 35-yard Windish run, E-B had no plays of longer than 9 yards.

"We switched our defensive game plan to a 4-3," Dwight linebacker Dylan Crouch told the Pontiac Daily Leader. "They threw me into the box and we had a two-high safety look. It's something we hadn't done before."

"It was another game where I felt like if halftime didn't come we were going to roll," Hollis said. "In the second half we didn't get that sustained drive we really needed."

It didn't help E-B that Sawyer Janson – a twoyear starter at center – missed the game after injuring his knee in practice on Wednesday. E-B's lone score came on a 5-yard run by Matthew Glenn with 42.5 seconds left in the third quarter. Senior lineman Aaron Brown set up the score by recovering a fumble at Dwight's 20.

Dwight struck first, taking the first possession of the second half 65 yards on a sustained drive aided by delayed handoffs and wide pitch plays. One such play yielded a 9-yard scoring run by Cox with 6:06 left in the third quarter on third-and-4.

Dwight finished with 258 yards of total offense, 232 on the ground. Cox led with 89 yards on 17 carries.

"We had a blast this season. They guys enjoyed being around each other and we enjoyed coaching them," Hollis said. "And I wish I could keep coaching them. It was a really good group to be around."

Windish finished the year with 1,822 rushing yard sand 26 TDs. Glenn ran for 1,727 yards and 22 scores.

"I've never been to Dwight. I'm not sure where that's at," smiling Farmington Coach Toby Vallas said after Rockridge was vanquished. "We'll figure it out."

Some Farmington players figure their defense's performance against Rockridge should put to rest any ambiguity. Senior running back Logan Utt said a recent high school football podcast questioned the Farmers' schedule and defense.

"I think our defense should be talked about more," Utt said. "There's a lot of people who really doubt our defense. They came in here saying Rockridge had a better defense than us. We showed them that that's not true."

When Farmington needed to stop Rockridge and standout sophomore quarterback Cullen Schwigen, it did. Sometimes the Rockets stopped themselves.

On fourth-down-and-6 at the Farmington 15 on the opening drive, prolificpasser Schwigen completed one to Liam Steele, but he managed only a 5yard gain. In the second quarter, Steele lost a fumble just short of the goal line.

Early in the fourth quarter, Farmington defender Jerett Fauser recovered Thomas Sowards' fumble at the Farmers 5. In the final seconds of the game, Fauser intercepted a Schwigen pass at midfield.

"I think our defense was lights out this game," Farmington senior tight end/linebacker Carter Lambin said. "Everyone always talks about our offense and how good it is, but I think our defense has been key. We had to stop that quarterback, and that's what we did."

Schwigen was 11-for-28 passing, for 103 yards. He ran for 25 of the Rockets' 117 rushing yards. Schwigen finished the season with more than 2,500 all-purpose yards.

Farmington has allowed only 22 points over its last five games, including two shutouts. Still, Rockridge Coach Sam Graves – whose father, Steve, once coached at Canton – didn't sound convinced.

"Unfortunately, I think weather conditions beat us today," Graves said. "I don't think that's a team that we should lose to. If we played 100 times, I think we could beat them 98. So I think playing at a slop field was at our disadvantage.

"In our conference, we play some really tough defenses – Sterling Newman, Princeton, Monmouth-Roseville. This wasn't a step up in competition for us. We made a lot of self-inflicting errors today. I feel like if it was regular conditions, we'd come out on that one."

After a few weeks of idleness or limited use because of an ankle injury, Wheelwright came out fine in this meeting of old Olympic Conference foes.

On the Farmers' first play, from their own 15, Wheelwright scrambled in vain for a bad snap that rolled out of the end zone for a safety and a 2-0 Rockets lead. But Wheelwright handled other low snaps and overcame two of his own fumbles and an interception, all in the first half.

Wheelwright carried or passed six times on the decisive, seven-play drive. A 13-yard Rockridge passinterference penalty helped. The winning drive answered Schwigen's 10-yard scoring pass to Owen Steele at 4:42 of the third that put Rockridge ahead 10-7.

"When he's focused, the whole team's dialed in," Vallas said about Wheelwright. "Lane's a baller. Whenever Lane wants to do something, it gets done."

One of Wheelwright's favorite targets, wide receiver/defensive back Jack Gronewold, didn't play after he sustained a sprained ankle in the final minutes of a first-round victory over Deer Creek-Mackinaw.

Whether Gronewold plays Saturday is a 50-50, game-time decision, according to Vallas.

Despite running its best race of the year in last Saturday's season finale at Detweiller Park, E-B finished second to Niles Northridge Prep by 30 points, 126-156. Eureka was third at 165 points.

"We ran great. They did everything we thought we needed to do get a trophy, and we did," E-B Coach Gregg Meyers said. "It's just one of those things

their last three state titles. But Northridge Prep had six runners at 15:46 or better on a fast, compacted track that was not impacted by the day's rain. Leading E-B was junior Aiden Faulkner, who earned all-state honors in a personal-record time of 15:19. Faulkner passed eight runners in the final mile to place 25th. Junior Chaz Oberkfell of Gillespie was race winner in 14:31.

"It's bittersweet," Faulkner said. "We raced amazing, but it's crazy that Niles beat us. Winning would have been great, but second place is also amazing. You can't complain about that."

E-B's other top-five runners were senior Mika Nelson (27th, 15:22), senior Reed Florey (32nd, 15:25), junior Darwin Herman (40th, 15:36) and freshman Kai Nelson (100th, 16:05). All but Her-

The Farmers' defense looks legit, even when the field is muddy and sloppy. And Farmington quarterback Lane Wheelwright appears to be recovered from injury.


Farmington and field conditions neutralized Taylor Ridge Rockridge and its high-powered offense in a 14-10 Class 2A playoff victory Nov. 9.
