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Rising property values prompt tax hearings for many entities

ELMWOOD - The Elmwood School Board on Monday approved the same 5.23% tax rate for Fiscal Year 2025 as was levied last fiscal year.

But because home and farmland values in the district are predicted to increase by 6.4%, taxpayers will be paying more and the board had to hold a truth-in-taxation hearing.

Similar hearings are also required for many other local

taxing bodies, many of whom are adjusting their levies to match the predicted increase in equalized assessed value. Some are also raising tax rates.

In the pages of this edition are ads for truth-in-taxation hearings for the Elba-Salem Rural Fire Protection District, the Elmwood Rural Fire Protection District and Brimfield CUSD 309. Increases for those bodies are all greater than the Elmwood School District's 6.4% raise and, in the case of the rural fire protection districts, are due largely to an increase in the levy for BYE Ambulance Service.

That's not the same case for the Elmwood School District.

"We're not raising the tax rate. We've only raised it once in my 12 years here," Board President Mark Davis explained at Monday's meeting. "We're just taking advantage of that (EAV) increase. We're going with the

That didn't satisfy one taxpayer at the meeting, who said,

"For what it's worth, I'm against it. The trouble is (taxes) go up and they don't go down.'

Elmwood Superintendent Joel Schmieg said homeowners still have time to protest increases in assessed value of their property.

After the hearing, the board unanimously approved the 2025 levy. Also approved was a resolution to refinance a 2022 bond that funded renovation of the gymnasium and locker rooms. Instead of using money from property taxes to pay for the new bond, which has a more favorable interest rate, Elmwood will continue to use funds from the Peoria County school facilities sales tax. That decision requires a resolution be passed annually.

An estimated \$100,000 of sales-tax money will help pay for an estimated \$150,000 renovation of the elementary school gym. Another \$50,000 will come from a state school maintenance grant. Work will include installation of a new floor, painting and Continued on Page 2

Yates City working to secure well loan

For The Weekly Post YATES CITY - The Yates City Village Board is working to meet all Illinois EPA requirements in order to receive loan money to finance its new well.

At the board meeting on Nov. 13, the board approved a \$5,000 fixed fee for Bruner, Cooper & Zuck of Galesburg to do engineering work on source-water protection plan requirements.

The board also approved two new ordinances. One prohibits cross-water connections to prevent contaminants from other water sources ending up in the village's water system. The other is a new maximum setback ordinance enforcing EPA requirements of how close certain activities can occur to a water source.

The board approved up to \$11,714 to replace a fire hydrant on the Elizabeth Street alley. Installation is to be performed by Kinsel Trucking & Excavating LLC of Canton, and has required periodic water shutoffs this week.

The village board will hold a truth-in-taxation hearing prior to its Dec. 11 meeting regarding a proposed 18.59% increase in the village tax levy. The hearing will be advertised prior to the meeting.

Brian Efnor was hired at a rate of \$21 per hour as a public-works employee. The board voted down a \$25 payment increase for trustees for meetings.

In other business, the village clerk will replace the office computer for \$925 and spend \$464.74 on checks and envelopes for the water department.

Williamsfield schools expected to hire Mills as superintendent

WILLIAMSFIELD - Selection of a new Williamsfield School District superintendent appears to be imminent.

David Mills is expected to receive Williamsfield School Board approval when it meets in special session at 5:30 p.m. Monday (Nov. 25). Mills is principal at Morrison High School, located in Whiteside County near Sterling.

Mills' possible Billtown employment, effective July 1, is the only action item on the board-meeting agenda. Interim Superintendent Rolf Sivertsen issued the agenda Tuesday morning. Later that Mills day, Board Chairman Chad Goff confirmed Mills' selection.

At the start of the meeting, Schmieg recognized the work of staff in Elmwood Elementary School, which recently earned a second straight exemplary designation on the Illinois State Board of Education's annual report card. A group of about 17 staff members, many wearing orange, received a round of applause.

"It's hard to accomplish that once and very hard to do it two years in a row, as you have," Schmieg said. "We just want to thank you for that."

In other business, the board approved PRESS policy changes and updates and OK'd hiring Alex Coulter as junior high assistant boys basketball coach, Tiffany Bell as junior high scholastic bowl coach, Dash Anderson as elementary physical education teacher (starting Jan. 6) and Tiffany Rath as a high school aide.

Schmieg reported there was to be a public hearing Tuesday regarding a five-year tuition waiver for

children of non-resident full-time staff.

Schmieg also said the first of four strategic-planning meetings for the district will be held on Dec. 5. And he and board members Dustin Funk, Katie Vaughan, Jessica Reyling and Heather Windish will attend an IASB/IASA annual conference Nov. 22-24.

Schmieg said the Elmwood district is not eligible for school-wide free lunches, because it does not qualify as a district.

Looking ahead to the April 2025 election, Grant Strom will be on the ballot seeking to join the board and Vaughan will vie for reelection. PDavis will not run, nor will Kevin Windish, leaving one board position with no candidate.

Davis said anyone interested in running as a write-in candidate should contact Schmieg before Dec. 30.

Farmington halts Wilson St. extension plan

For The Weekly Post FARMINGTON - A proposed extension of East Wilson Street looks unlikely based on the latest cost estimates presented during Monday's meeting of the Farmington City Council.

Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam presented new figures for the proposed expansion, which would have extended East Wilson Street from its current endpoint at Jacobs Park east to Lightfoot Road.

Stufflebeam described the proposed costs as having grown exponentially from initial estimates. Stufflebeam said that although the numbers include a 20% overage, the estimated cost of \$530,000 to the city is prohibitive.

He said the estimate only includes curbs and gutters on one side of the street, not both. The council believes that the project would make more sense if the town was expanding in that direction. As a result,

the project has been tabled for now.

The council heard that 13 graves in Farmington's Oak Ridge Cemetery will be recognized for the contributions to end slavery by those buried there. On May 20 The Sangamon County Historical Society will visit Farmington to present special grave markers to recognize conductors of the Underground Railroad.

Members of the historical society will present a program and answer questions that day at the Farmington Moose Lodge starting at 5:30 p.m.

In other business, the council approved buying two junior backboard adaptors for biddy-ball basketball at the Farmington Community Center. Adaptors allow the backboards to be lowered to 8 feet. Cost is \$1,670.50, with money to come from proceeds raised by biddyball registrations.

The city also amended its TIF agreement with Dana Cardenas of Elmwood to make an upfront payment of \$14,500 out of a \$29,000 grant. Funds will be used for development of the former Tri-County Senior Center at 88 E. Fort St. Plans for that building are not yet final and work will continue through December.

Cardenas has also purchased the former Crave buildings at 94 and 100 East Fort St. and said she plans to open a Mexican restaurant in that space by Dec. 5, if not sooner. Cardenas also operates the Mi Ranchito restaurant in Elmwood.

The city plans to begin looking for a grant to help replace faded street signs, citing them as a safety concern. Alderman Leslye Smith believes that whennew signs were last purchased 10 years ago, they cost approximately \$12,000.

Princeville board OKs new English curriculum

PRINCEVILLE - The Princeville School Board voted to approve purchase of a new English curriculum at its meeting on Nov. 12.

The board approved spending up to \$14,578.90 for the ELA Amplify program, though the expectation is the actual cost will be lower.

Teachers have spent a significant amount of time researching this curriculum and described it during the board meeting as "dynamic" and "adaptable to individual needs of the students."

Superintendent Tony Shinall emphasized how proud he was of the students and staff in the Princeville School District after grades 6-12 received an "exemplary" status and Pre-K through fifth grade received a "commendable" status on the annual report card created by the Illinois State Board of Education.

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



BILLTOWN: District taxing for need, not for want

The Weekly Post sent Mills an email Tuesday morning. As of lunchtime Tuesday, the newspaper had not received a reply.

Following the board's regular meeting Nov. 12, Goff said the number of superintendent candidates had been winnowed to two. He would not say if the board made either remaining candidate a job offer.

"I think we've got two great candidates that fill everything like the board wants – the right person to move the district forward," Goff said.

The Illinois Association of School Boards conducted a search that produced seven applicants, according to Goff. Of those, three interviewed with the Billtown board initially, and one candidate was eliminated after the first round.

Board members met in closed session Oct. 22,

Oct. 31 and Nov. 8.

This was the third superintendent search the IASB conducted for Williamsfield in the past year. The first was to replace Tim Farquer, who by mutual agreement with the board left his job June 30 after a decade as superintendent.

When negotiations with a potential Farquer replacement fell through, the board decided to appoint Sivertsen as interim superintendent. Sivertsen retired about three years ago as Canton superintendent and previously led the Varna-based Midland district.

Through all the searches, the board criteria for a new superintendent did not change, according to Goff.

"We want somebody that's going to come in and be transparent," he said. "You've got to have somebody that's got the passion and the desire and the want-to."

During the meeting last week, the board authorized the first step in a planned \$1.1 million working-cash bond issue. The money is to help the district eliminate a projected operating-fund defi-

cit of about \$400,000 for

the 2025 fiscal year.

Sivertsen suggested the district has been too dependent on cannibalizing future revenues to cover current deficits. He, district auditors and board members have said that cannot continue if the district is to remain solvent.

"We make this one-time payment to change the behavior," Board Member Brian Howard said about the bond issue. "It's a behavioral change."

About \$100,000 in savings has been realized through restrictions on supplies purchases and allowing job vacancies to go unfilled, according to Sivertsen.

Final bond-issue approval is possible in January, following a public hearing when the board

meets next month.

Before the bond vote last week, the board approved a tentative 2025 property-tax levy of \$4,755,621. The 2024 levy was \$4,530,115. The tentative levy is below the maximum for which the district can ask, according to Sivertsen.

"There's not a lot of districts that do that. And that's a good thing," he said. "We are taxing for need and not want."

Among other items, the board authorized the senior class trip next year, to Chicago and Michigan. The board also approved a two-year lease for 5 acres of village-owned property, at \$1,150 annually.

The Williamsfield FFA chapter is to operate and manage a farm on the land, as an educational tool. The land on the north edge of town is part of a plot for which the Village Board has considered several uses. A solar-energy array and an apple orchard have been among them.

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

against a program that until this season hadn't won a playoff game in 41 years. Logan Utt's 18-yard touchdown run with 11:02 remaining in the first half led to a 22-0 Trojans deficit.

D/G-SW (8-4) moved to the Farmers' 15-yard line on its 15-play ensuing possession. But in the end zone, Jerett Fauser intercepted a pass – the first of the drive – from sophomore quarterback Collin Bachand. That ended the only serious threat by D/G-SW, which scored with 1:36 left in the game.

On its four possessions between the interception and the touchdown, D/G-SW advanced no farther than midfield. Meanwhile, Farmington scored three more times. That included a TD to make it 30-0 four plays after Tristan Passmore stripped the ball from D/G-SW junior Evan Cox early in the third quarter.

"They're young, and they're going to be a heck of a team in a year or two," Farmington Coach Toby Vallas said of the Trojans. "They did a great job. I think that they're sophomores and our kids are seniors, and we've been here and done that. I really think that was the difference."

Farmington held D/G-SW to 181 yards rushing and 38 yards passing. But D/G-SW Coach Luke Standiford suggested the Farmington offense gave his team plenty of trouble. First-team all-stater Wheelwright finished with 200 passing yards, and Utt ran for 132.

"The gameplan coming in was to stop their run first and make them throw the ball," Standiford said. "Unfortunately, we weren't able to stop the run the way we wanted to. They're just so good at every position, whether it's their offensive line or their skill players.

"It's a hard offense to stop, and

probably the best defense that we faced all year. In a game like this, if you're going to beat the No. 1 team in the state, you have to play your best game that you have all year. Unfortunately, today wasn't that day."

Wheelwright joined the praise of the offensive line: right tackle Slader Warren, right guard Carter Gavelys, center Bryce Hunter, left guard Caden Mowen, left tackle Noah Passmore and tight end Carter Lambin. This was Passmore's third start after usual starter Jacob Cecil sustained a broken collarbone.

"We were told Dwight is a very physical team, and they weren't lying," said Mowen, a 6-foot-4, 320-pound senior. "They're some strong guys, but we're just a little bit stronger."

The Farmers will need strength and other attributes to stop Chicago Christian senior Christian Flutman. Against B-H-R-A, he threw three touchdown passes and ran 69 yards for another score. As a defensive

back, Flutman had a school-record seven interceptions in the regular season.

"He's elusive. He's an athlete. He's a gamer," Chicago Christian Coach CJ Cesario told the Daily Southtown of Tinley Park. "He's stepped into so much confidence, and when he's confident, man, he makes really good decisions."

Before the quarterfinal, Flutman was 95-for-141 for 1,530 passing yards and 19 touchdowns. His favorite targets are Eddie Van Dellen (17 catches, 406 yards, seven TDs) and Jared Hall (20 catches, 381 yards, one TD). Teammate Kenny Jager, an honorable-mention all-stater, had 21 rushing TDs and 1,444 yards on 165 carries.

Farmington junior receiver Jack Gronewold was dressed but didn't play against D/G-SW as he continues to convalesce from an ankle injury. Vallas said the status of his honorable-mention all-stater for Saturday is uncertain. But Vallas, in his 11th season at Farmington, was much surer about his emotions following an unprecedented Farmington achievement.

"It feels good," Vallas said amid happy Farmers on the Dwight field. "I always thought (about) how it would feel. But you just look at these kids' faces, and it's all worth it. You look at these kids hugging their dads and their moms, and it's worth it."

Farmington teams had reached the quarterfinals in 1987 under Dan Dillard, in 2013 under Casey Martin and in 2016 and 2021 under Vallas. The latter two ended otherwise unbeaten seasons for the Farmers: in 2016 at Monticello in a 48-17 loss and in 2021 to Downs Tri-Valley, 34-12.




Windish, a senior, ran for 1,822 yards and 26 touchdowns to make the Class 2A first team.


