

New Year rings in 293 new laws for Illinois residents

Capitol News Illinois Time to study up, Illinois. As of New Year's Day, 293 new state laws have taken effect.

Those include some of the defining bills of the 2024 legislative session and others that will change how people get IDs, evaluate job postings and even cancel gym memberships.

In addition to the laws taking effect on Jan. 1, the state's minimum wage will rise to \$15 to complete a ramp-up initiated during Gov. JB Pritzker's first month in office in 2019.

Digital driver's licenses

creating a process to issue digital driver's licenses and state IDs beginning in the new year after Pritzker signed House Bill 4592. Residents will still be required to receive a physical ID and agencies or private entities will not be required to accept digital IDs in place of physical IDs.

Providing a phone to police to show a digital ID also doesn't give police consent to search a person's cellphone.

Salary transparency

Employers with 15 or more employees must include information about benefits and the salary range on job postings, according The secretary of state can begin to House Bill 3129. The law will

also apply to businesses hiring for remote-work positions in Illinois.

"When employers aren't transparent about pay, gender and racial wage gaps widen, costing women and people of color valuable compensation," Lt. Gov. Juliana Stratton said in a news release. "Illinois' new Pay Transparency law is a resounding win for the working people who call our state home."

'Junk' health insurance

Short-term, limited-duration health insurance plans will be illegal in Illinois beginning Jan. 1. The plans, often called "junk insurance" by critics, do not meet the minimum standards of the federal Affordable Care Act.

The ban outlined in House Bill 2499 was part of Pritzker's health insurance overhaul that lawmakers passed in the spring. It was aimed at reducing barriers to care for patients and making health care more affordable by expanding coverage requirements for insurance companies. Short-term insurance plans are typically for people who have a

lapse in health insurance coverage such as when they lose or change jobs, but they are different from COBRA benefits, which most employers are required to offer under federal law.

Supporters of the bill argued the plans are deceptive and stick consumers with huge out-ofpocket costs, but others said the plans provide consumers with an affordable option to fill a gap in coverage.

Brimfield ups school levy

Several speak at tax hearing

For The Weekly Post BRIMFIELD – The Brimfield School Board approved an almost-10% increase in the district property-tax levy. But not without dissent.

The levy the board authorized Dec. 18 for the 2025 fiscal year was unchanged from what Superintendent Chad Jones proposed in November - \$6,052,347. It represents a rise of 9.32% from the previous levy, which was \$5,536,460.

Jones said the new levy is designed to maximize tax revenues, based on an 8.5% increase in the district's estimated equalized assessed valuation. That rationale didn't appear to sit well with most of the six or so people who addressed the board during a truth-in-taxation hearing. "You are asking for money just because you can, not because you need it to actually run the school district," George Continued on Page 2

For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE – The Princeville community is mourning the death of a teenager last weekend in a single-vehicle accident.

Grace Abbott, 17, of Princeville was pronounced dead at 1:40 p.m. Dec. 28 following the accident near Parks School and Elliott roads south of Monica. Abbott was a senior at Princeville High School

Visitation will be Friday, Jan. 3, from 3-7 p.m. at

Sunday, Princeville Superintendent Tony Shinall said Abbott had a bright future and was an integral part of the school community.

"Grace was a classmate, a co-worker, a friend, a sister and a daughter," Shinall stated. "Whenever a community loses a young person far too soon, it is remarkable how that community rallies together and finds strength and support. This is already happening in Princeville.



Cluskey said. "You've already got enough money to run the school. You guys need to back off here and stay within the budget you need instead of the budget you want."

Cluskey was among about 15 people who attended the board meeting, of which the 45-minute truth-in-taxation hearing was part. State law requires a hearing if a levy increase

is 5% or greater.

The new Brimfield levy is expected to add \$195 to the tax bill for a house valued at \$150,000.

Jones, who became superintendent in July 2023, said the district had not been requesting the full levy amount in recent years. Jason Snyder, board vice president, said some of the additional money is to pay for needed infrastruc-

ture improvements.

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catchup a little bit," Snyder said. He said uncertainty about

future property values also prompted the increase. So did an anticipated new contract with the Brimfield teachers' union, Board President Steve Updyke said.

Although she voted in November for the tentative levy, Board Member Rachel Blodgett offered a compromise for the final one - an increase of 6.47%. She and colleague Mark Bell voted to approve. The other members – Snyder, Updyke, Nick Butterfield, Katie Kappes and Constance Monk - voted no. Those five voted to authorize the final levy as Jones presented it. Bell and Blodgett disapproved. In November, Bell was the only member to oppose the proposed levy.

Not all the members of the public who spoke at the hearing opposed the hike. Marilyn Eberle supported a proposal to construct modular buildings to house additional preschool classrooms. Eight Brimfield preschool students are sent elsewhere for programs, according to Jones. "I don't want to have (my taxes) raised, but I think

we're headed in the right direction with it," Eberle said.

Fellow attendee Phil Molleck said the same regarding Jones and the current board. Blodgett, Butterfield and Monk were elected to it in 2023.

"It's 500% better," Molleck said. "You owe a lot to (Jones). That guy has turned this place around. They had some clowns in this school. You've got people up here now who are a lot more intelligent."

Among other business, the board OK'd a \$42,114.10 deal with Dell Technologies for 170 Chromebook computers. Also authorized were two overnight high school trips: Jan. 10-11 for a cheerleading tournament in Springfield, and Jan. 24-25 for a chess tournament in West Chicago.

The board tabled a \$169,200 contract from Fehr Graham Engineering & Environmental of East Peoria for services related to the proposed construction of a bus barn. Jones said he wanted more information about the offer.

In personnel, board members approved hiring Holden Fairfield as a maintenance worker and groundskeeper.

Continued from Page 1 firefighters and BYE Ambulance responded to the accident about 1 p.m. Dec. 28. It appeared Abbott was driving west on Parks School Road when her vehicle left the pavement at the crest of a hill and struck a tree. She was alone in the vehicle.

Abbott sustained multiple blunt-force injuries and died instantly, according to Peoria County Coroner Jamie Harwood. Toxicology is pending.

Harwood is a Princeville native. He did not know Abbott but knew her parents well, he told The Weekly Post. Abbott's accident reminded Harwood of when one of his high

school classmates, Sara Yager, was killed in a twovehicle wreck in December 1991 on Princeville-Jubilee Road.

"I'll never forget that day," Harwood stated. "The loss of Grace reminded me of how difficult it is going to be for those students to move forward. It's also going to be incredibly important for them to be supportive and loving and kind and caring to each other every day.

"It's an extremely difficult and traumatic thing for those students to go through."

Counselors for students and staff were to be available early this week at the high school. Princeville

schools are on winter break until Tuesday, Jan. 7.

"We will continually assess the need for support, particularly as we near the start of the second semester at school," Shinall stated.

A moment of silence for Abbott was held before the start of the Princeville Holiday Tournament title game between Brimfield and Princeville. The game began about six hours after Abbott was pronounced dead.

Postponed was a pregame ceremony to honor John Gross, the Princeville girls basketball coach. He coached his 900th career victory last week.


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

Unlike post-dominated Princeville teams of recent years, Gross switched to a pressure defense because that's what his players are better suited to run. Adaptability is the sign of a good coach and helps explain why Gross has been able to win so many games. So does his explanation of why, at age 75, he is still barking out instructions. LAWS: Work-talk limits on politics, religion

Continued from Page 1 responsibilities to the list of categories protected from discrimination and retaliation in the workplace. The new law prevents employers from taking adverse action against employees because of their responsibilities as a caregiver for a family member, which could cause them to miss work.

Bill sponsor Rep. Will Guzzardi, D-Chicago, told a House committee in April that pregnant women are a good example of who the bill is designed to help. He said pregnant women shouldn't be passed up for a promotion or face other consequences at work in anticipation that they will be taking time off to care for their baby.

Al regulations

New laws governing artificial intelligence take effect Jan. 1. It will be illegal to generate child pornography using AI, according to House Bill 4623. Supporters of the bill, including the Illinois Attorney General's Office, said it is becoming more difficult to distinguish between real and AI-generated images.

They said updating Illinois' child pornography laws was a necessary step to allow law enforcement to identify and prosecute child pornography cases. House Bill 4875 also

adds new protections to prohibit using AI to recreate a person's voice, image or likeness for commercial purposes without the person's consent. Recording artists can seek damages for violations of the law.

Politics/religion at work

Employees can't be required to sit through work meetings discussing religion or politics starting Jan. 1. Senate Bill 3649, an initiative of the Illinois AFL-CIO, creates new protections for employees who skip out on such meetings and prevents employers from retaliating against them.

The law does not prohibit discussing religion or politics at work, but employees are not required to participate in the discussions if such activities are not part of their job. The law excludes non-profit and advocacy groups where politics or religion may be part of job.

Coming later in 2025

Pritzker's signature health reform package goes into effect on Jan. 1, but most provisions don't have to be implemented until the beginning of 2026. House Bill 5395 bans "step therapy," which requires patients to try and fail treatments preferred by insurance companies before they can receive treatment recommended by their doctor.

It also bans insurance companies from requiring prior authorization for emergency in-patient mental health treatment, requires insurers to keep up-to-date lists of in-network providers and expands the power of the Illinois Department of Insurance to regulate premium rates.

Many hotels in Illinois will no longer be allowed to provide customers with single-use plastic soap and shampoo beginning July 1 under Senate Bill 2960. The move is designed to cut down on waste from single-use products. Hotels with fewer than 50 rooms have until 2026 to make the change.

Other new laws

• NIL money: Student athletes at NCAA universities can earn name, image and likeness money directly from their universities. House Bill 307 was an initiative of the University of Illinois.

• Hearing aids: Insurance providers must cover medically prescribed hearing

aids for all people under House Bill 2443. Coverage was previously only required for those under 18.

• Gym memberships: House Bill 4911 requires gyms and fitness centers to accept multiple ways for people to cancel their membership. Physical fitness locations also must now allow customers to cancel their membership by email or online. Customers will also be allowed to submit written notice by mail.

• Subscription renewals: Businesses that offer a free trial or promotional period for their product or service must notify customers at least three days before the subscription automatically renews at a paid rate under Senate Bill 2764. The law only applies to subscriptions longer than 15 days.

• Crime victim DNA: DNA evidence collected from a person who is the victim of a crime to aid a criminal investigation cannot be entered into a DNA database, according to House Bill 1168.

ENERGY: Legislators may discuss energy

Continued from Page 1 enough electricity is available – in the right place and at the right times of day.

"If we don't continue finding other ways of energy – making sure we can store it in some way – we're going to see that supply-and-demand kind of thing," Rep. Barbara Hernandez, an Aurora Democrat and sponsor of a bill to incentivize energy storage, told Capitol News Illinois. "We'll see a lot of demand, but the supply will not be there and it's going to create a lot of blackouts in our communities. But also, our families are going to be paying the price and we're going to see an increase in utilities."

Several factors contribute to the concern over the grid's future. A growing number of data centers in the U.S. and in Illinois is demanding massive amounts of energy. The state's fossil-fuel industry is – by design – in decline. And backlogs at regional grid operators have delayed renewable electricity generation from coming online. The state also isn't bringing renewable energy online quickly enough, according to a lead sponsor of the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act – Gov. JB Pritzker's marquee climate legislation that seeks to decarbonize the state's electric grid by 2045.

Lawmakers, meanwhile, are hurriedly working to find solutions that could be rolled out quickly to keep



electricity reliable and affordable.

A short lame-duck legislative session tentatively planned for Jan. 4-7 could become an energy-policy battleground with longterm consequences.

But the tight timeline could cause the legislative process to drag into Springfield's regular session as a new General Assembly is sworn in Jan. 8.

• **BRIMFIELD** – A woman and her teenage daughter were killed in a single-vehicle accident on Interstate 74 west of Brimfield.

Shortly before 4:30 a.m. Dec. 22, a 2005 Toyota Siena XLE left the westbound interstate at Bell School Road, crossed the eastbound lanes, struck a tree and caught fire, according to the Illinois State Police.

Pronounced dead at the scene were Leila Mohamad, 41, and Zilan Sino, 15, the Peoria County Coroner's Office stated. They were from Columbus, Ohio, and were traveling to Iowa to visit family. The other three occupants sustained serious injuries and were transported in stable condition to OSF Saint Francis Medical Center in Peoria. A 48-year-old man from Des Moines, Iowa, was the driver. The other passengers were 16and 15-year-old girls from Columbus and Des Moines, respectively.

State Police did not identify the injured nor know why the vehicle left the road. Brimfield firefighters and BYE Ambulance also responded.

• **DAHINDA** – An Iowa man was arrested following an hour-long standoff with law-enforcement officers at an Interstate 74 rest stop south of Dahinda.

The Knox County Sheriff's Office received a 911 call about 4 a.m. Dec. 6 regarding a man who was threatening to shoot someone at the eastbound Spoon River Rest Area, according to a report. Deputies responded and found Johnnie H. Lawver, 61, of Davenport walking in the parking lot.

When deputies told Lawver to stop, he ran behind the rest-area building and entered a 2003 Chevrolet. With guns drawn, the deputies ordered Lawver to emerge from the vehicle, but he refused. Officers repeated the commands via a public-address system and telephone.

After Illinois State Police and Galesburg officers arrived, Lawver exited the vehicle. He was transported to OSF Saint Mary Medical Center in Galesburg for evaluation. Eventually, Lawver was taken to the Knox County Jail in Galesburg.

Lawver was accused of resisting or obstructing a peace officer. He also was wanted in Scott County, Iowa, for a parole violation.

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• FARMINGTON - A single-vehicle accident north of Farmington led to an Elmwood man's arrest on illicit-drug charges. The wreck that involved 37-year-old Matthew D. Crew happened shortly before 10 p.m. Dec. 18 at Illinois Route 78 and Korth Road, according to Peoria County Sheriff's Office reports. Crew apparently was driving a 2008 Dodge Ram pickup truck north on Route 78 when he swerved to avoid a deer. The vehicle struck a tree. Farmington police and BYE Ambulance personnel were tending to Crew when a deputy arrived. The pickup truck was about 30-40 feet off the roadway to the west. A strong raw-cannabis odor was emanating from the vehicle, a report stated. Crew was accused of unlawful possession of a controlled substance, unlawful possession of methamphetamine and unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia. He was taken to the Peoria County Jail.

The bus hit the front-right side of a 2025 Honda Pilot driven by Cassandra L. McCorkle of Princeville. The bus sustained minor damage. Both vehicles were drivable.

• ELMWOOD – A Yates City teenager required hospital attention following a single-vehicle rollover accident south of Elmwood.

Shortly after 7 a.m. on Dec. 7, the 16-year-old girl was driving a 2002 Honda Civic south on Illinois Route 78 near Knox Road 250 North when she apparently fell asleep, according to a Knox County Sheriff's Office report. A witness said he heard a loud bang and saw the vehicle flip multiple times.

Princeville passes wind-turbine ordinance

For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE - Windenergy turbines probably won't be permitted within 1¹/₂ miles of Princeville in the foreseeable future.

An ordinance the Village Board approved Dec. 17 allows local government to regulate wind farms proposed in areas where the municipality has zoning jurisdiction. That authority extends 11/2 miles beyond village limits.

The ordinance prohibits wind farms in Princeville or in that buffer area unless village approval has been obtained. It doesn't appear such approval will be forthcoming anytime soon, should any wind-project developers ask for it.

"Unofficially, in a personal-opinion context, the majority if not all of the board is against them," Village President Jeff Troutman said after the board meeting. "But the village itself has never formally stated in a meeting that the Village Board will not allow that."

The meeting attracted

about 10 members of the public. Most of them were affiliated with a grassroots group opposed to two wind-energy projects proposed for northern and western Peoria County. Members of No To Peoria County Windmills distributed hats emblazoned with the group's logo.

Village Trustee Ron Delbridge wore one of those hats during the meeting. He has said he's opposed to the proposed wind farms, which might include turbines 700 feet tall.

The board vote regarding the ordinance was unanimous. It also received unanimous support from the village zoning board, Troutman said. A Rockford-based attorney for the no-windmills organization drafted the ordinance, according to group spokesman Dan Heinz of Kickapoo.

"It's a great thing," Heinz said. "It protects the people that live right on the edge or in the town, because these are nearly 700-foottall structures that you'll see forever, and it's going

to limit growth. Anything that these villages can do to protect that is a great thing."

The ordinance is identical to one the Brimfield Village Board approved, according to Heinz. He said other Peoria County municipalities are considering approval, but he declined to name them.

Among other things, the ordinance requires towers to be set back at least 5,000 feet from primary structures on land where the owner is participating in the wind-energy project. The setback is 2 miles from non-participant structures and from school property lines.


The only zoning district in which wind projects are allowed is agricultural, and only if allowed as a special use. That would require public hearings and a Village Board vote. The ordinance does not apply to decorative windmills.

According to Troutman, none of the turbines among the wind-farm proposals is within village zoning jurisdiction. The closest poten-

tial towers are about 3 miles to the southwest.

Peoria County officials are expected to consider wind-farm plans sometime in 2025. Troutman said he's informed County Board members about trustees' opposition.

In other business, the board approved the 2023-24 annual village financial report and the annual audit report. The board also authorized an ordinance change that states a village building inspector can be appointed only on an asneeded basis.

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Grand jury indicts Elmwood man **By NICK VLAHOS** For The Weekly Post

ELMWOOD - On the Saturday evening before Christmas, a usually quiet neighborhood in Elmwood was anything but that.

Following a five-hour standoff with at least 30 law-enforcement officers, an Elmwood man was arrested after neighbors provided video evidence he fired a gun from a residence.

Christopher R. Coulter, 27, surrendered about 9:30 p.m. Dec. 21 in the 200 block of N. Daniels St. After negotiations failed, authorities used a security vehicle to break open a door and enter the residence. Coulter didn't



put up a fight after that, according to Peoria County Sheriff Chris Watkins.

"It was one of those things where it really upset the neighbors," he said about the gunfire. "It would be different if he was in the country and he was a legal gun owner, but this was in a residential neighborhood. You can't do that."

On Monday, a Peoria County grand jury indicted Coulter for reckless discharge of a firearm and for violating an order of protection, WMBD-TV in Peoria reported. Each charge carries a maximum sentence of three years. Coulter is to appear in court Jan. 15.

On Dec. 21, deputies were dispatched about 4:15 p.m. to Elmwood and were shown video of Coulter shooting from the rear of his residence. Neighbors provided the video. It was not the first time Coulter had fired a gun in that manner, the neighbors told authorities.

Coulter was accused of firing five or six rounds Nov. 22, after which the Elmwood Police Department was summoned.

"The guy denied it. That incident scared the neighbors enough that they put up a camera, and they caught him shooting again," Watkins said. "You can see it. He shoots in the air in the direction of the neighbors, but over their house."

It didn't appear Coulter had a dispute with the neighbors, according to Watkins.

Detectives obtained a search warrant regarding the December incident, based on Coulter's criminal history. It's lengthy. Peoria County records list at least 19 lawenforcement encounters with Coulter, most of them traffic violations.

Coulter had an active order of protection against him, according to the sheriff's office. Peoria Heights police arrested Coulter three times in 2024. Charges included criminal damage to property, disorderly conduct, reckless driving and telephone harassment.

Police established a perimeter around the Daniels Street address, Watkins said. The Central Illinois Emergency Response Team helped negotiate with Coulter, but he refused to come outside. Coulter admitted to drinking alcohol, according to Watkins.

After about 90 minutes, authorities used an attachment on a Lenco BearCat SWAT vehicle to access the house.

"He lied to them. He said he was in Peoria, but they could hear the BearCat on the phone," Watkins said. "When he quit talking to them, that's when they decided to breach the door."

Authorities found the firearm and ammunition inside, although Coulter said he didn't have a gun and denied shooting one, according to Watkins.

"When we told him we have him on video, he wouldn't admit to it," the sheriff said.

Minimum wage up to \$15 an hour

By Capitol News Illinois The minimum wage in Illinois increased to \$15 an hour on Jan. 1, completing a six-year transition period since the increase was approved in 2019.

Beginning New Year's Day, Illinois workers making minimum wage saw wages rise by \$1 and tipped workers saw their paychecks bump to \$9 an hour.

Youth workers under 18 who work fewer than 650 hours a year will have a \$13 minimum wage.

The final increase, ending a six-year ramp that began with the minimum wage rising from \$8.25 to \$9.25 on Jan. 1, 2020, puts a bow on Gov. JB Pritzker's first major legislative victory. He signed the wage increase in February 2019 about a month after being sworn in for his first term, checking off a top campaign promise.

Illinois is one of 10 states with a minimum wage of \$15 or greater, according to the National Employment Law Project. Twenty-two other states increased their wages on Jan. 1.



Gross earns 900th win, ranks 4th in state

By JEFF LAMPE For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE – The milestone came Friday. The championship proved elusive on Saturday.

Overall, though, the 13th annual Lee Westerman Girls Tournament had to rank as a success for the improving Lady Princes (8-9), who placed second at their annual Christmas event and have won seven of the last 10.

The highlight came in a 44-38 semifinal win over Elmwood that handed John Gross his 900th career coaching victory. Gross ranks fourth on the all-time Illinois girls basketball coaching list behind only retired Chicago Marshall legend Dorothy Gaters (1,133 wins), former Oak Park Fenwick coach Dave Power (1,022 wins) and ex-Galesburg coach Evan Massey (1,018).

Gross, 75, began coaching in 1975 at Bartonville Limestone, where he won 544 games and had a secondplace finish in Class AA in 1992. He won 147 games and two state titles at Peoria Richwoods (2005 in Class AA and 2009 in Class 3A). He has won 209 games in 10 seasons at Princeville, including back-to-back 30-win campaigns in 2017 and 2018.

"I'll tell you what, the victory over

Elmwood today means more than No. 900 to me right now. Because a month ago they kicked the crap out of us and we came back today and the kids played hard," Gross said. "We're improving. We're young. We're going to be good in a few years."

That's clear comparing the semifinal to the Nov. 23 meeting, when Princeville lost to Elmwood, 46-29. The Lady Princes had not adopted their pressing defense fully at that point and Elmwood still had point guard Tinley Lemmerman, who did not play at the tournament and is out indefinitely with a knee injury. *Continued on Page 14*
