But that's what EB Buildings & Lumber Co. has become since its humble start.

Paul Streitmatter and his brothers grew up in Princeville. Paul initially worked for Stahl Lumber Company in Wyoming and later sold Tazewell Buildings. Brothers Jeff and Don farmed.

In 1960, they decided to work together in a construction venture they called Economy Builders and Supply Company Inc. Their building company soon evolved into a lumber company as well.

In 2011, the brothers opened a hardware store, entering a co-op with Do It Best as a supplier.

Alfred, another Streitmatter brother and also a farmer, came to Economy Builders as a salesman. Eventually he bought out Jeff and Don.

Alfred's son Doug Streitmatter graduated high school in 1980 and came to work with the building crews. Doug later married his wife, Cindy, earned a bachelor's degree in

construction technology from Bradley University and bought out his father and his father's business partner, Dick Stubbs.

Flash forward a few decades to today and the process is repeating. Doug's son Blake is in the process of buying out his father – ensuring a third generation of Streitmatters will be involved in EB.

Blake, who has been with

the family business for about five years, hadn't initially planned on taking over but said he always knew it was an option. Doug counseled his son about the decision, not wanting him to feel pressured.

Young trustee

20-year-old among Billtown board candidates

WILLIAMSFIELD – Dylan Tucker isn't old enough to drink alcohol legally, but he almost certainly will be helping to govern Williamsfield.

The 20-year-old Tucker was among three Peoples Party candidates selected Monday night to run for the Williamsfield Village Board in the 2025 municipal election. A caucus of about 20 Billtown residents determined candidates for the three available seats on the six-member board.

Also selected were newcomer Kyle Gibbs and incumbent Trustee Lucas Leckrone. Barring unforeseen circumstances or successful challenges from write-in candidates, the three Peoples Party picks are to win four-year board terms. The election is April 1.

"I grew up here and I'd like to build it back up," Tucker said about his motivation for running. "Billtown back in the day used to be pretty big. I'd just like to see everything built back up."

State board certifies election results, confirms decline in turnout

ident Kamala Harris won Illinois by nearly 11 points as turnout dipped in 2024, according to official election results certified by the State Board of Elections.

The board met Monday to certify the results of the 2024 election and released final vote totals for races around the state, including locking in several close legislative races. The results also reflected shifts in turnout and

voting behavior.

Illinois saw turnout dip in 2024 compared to recent presidential contests. About 5.7 million people participated in this year's election, representing 70.42% of the state's 8.1 million registered voters. That's a decline from 2020, when 72.92% of voters participated in the largest turnout for a presidential election in Illinois since 1992, according to the board.

This year's turnout was the fourth lowest of the last 40 years,

according to the board. Turnout was slightly below President-elect Donald Trump's first victory in 2016 but higher than former President Barack Obama's victory in 2012. Chicago Board of Election officials reported last month the city saw the second-lowest turnout in a presidential race in 80 years.

Voting by mail also remained a popular option for many voters, with more than 1 million people casting their ballot in the mail. That's down from more than 2

million people in 2020, but it represents the third consecutive statewide election in which more than 15% of voters used a mailin ballot.


A greater portion of the electorate cast early in-person ballots this year than ever, however. Board of Elections data shows 34.65% of votes were cast in person before Election Day this year, surpassing 2020's record of 32.89%.

This year's election was the second time most voters did not

vote on Election Day. Data shows 46.69% of ballots were cast on Election Day itself, compared to about two-thirds in recent years. Most voters during the pandemic election in 2020 also participated early, either in person or by mail.

In the presidential race, Harris received 3,062,863 votes in Illinois, or 54.37% of the vote, to receive Illinois' 19 electoral votes. That's 409,052 fewer votes than President Joe Biden received in 2020.


home to Gibbs. The 40-year-old grew up outside the village and graduated from Williamsfield High School and Monmouth College. Gibbs is a manager at G&M Distributors, Inc., in Galesburg. He and his wife, Laura, have three children, aged 8, 6 and 3.

"I've got 15 years left for my children going through the school district," Gibbs said. "I just want to make sure that the town's in good hands, that we're kind of catching up to the times."


Incumbent Trustees Stu Hickerson and Andrew Scott did not seek re-nomination. Leckrone, who was appointed to the board last year, indicated he didn't intend to seek a full term. He reiterated that position during the caucus, held before the board's regular December meeting.


Still, Trustee Nancy Everett nominated Leckrone. Also nominated were Gibbs, Tucker and former Trustee Michael Gray.

Gibbs won the first round of balloting, with 16 votes. Tucker received 13. Gray and Leckrone each received 10 votes. In the runoff for the final trustee berth, Leckrone defeated Gray 10-8.

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



Teeth in? Or teeth out?

Once upon a time, I was a naive new business owner who thought everybody paid their bills. That was back when we started printing the magazine Heartland Outdoors. As part of the purchase, we inherited a stack of past-due invoices.

I figured a few weeks of tracking down non-payers would end that problem. But non-payers have never disappeared, even as we moved on from the magazine to our current weekly newspapers. Lately, unpaid debt has reached a level that has raised my ire and rekindled memories of past col-

lection forays. One such expedition ranged far and wide across Illinois and included an associate who would ask at each stop, "Teeth in or teeth out?" His reasoning was that he looked tougher with his false teeth out, which would

help if we needed intimidation to loosen purse strings.

That proved unecessary. When you show up at somebody's door with a bill, most people pay - even if barter is required. That's why some customers paid with a new 15-hp boat motor, fishing rods and reels, lures, hats, hunting clothes and more. Unfortunately, that created more headaches, since we had to resell the stuff to get money.

Please understand, 90% of our advertisters are quick to pay and apologetic when an invoice is missed. Mistakes happen. Mail gets lost. Bills get misplaced. Life happens. That's understandable.

But when people promise to pay and never follow through, that's maddening. That's also why smarter business owners get paid up front. So our policy in 2025 is to require payment in advance for obituaries, birthday

ads, lost dogs, classifieds, political ads, single-run ads and from new customers. We will also charge interest on pastdue accounts, since it costs us in manpower, postage and brain power to keep sending statements and making calls.

That's also why between now and the end of January, **LAMPE** I'll spend time each week visiting the handful of folks

whose bills are long past due.

Parting shot: A proposal to change the way non-boundaried schools are classified by enrollment for sporting events did not receive enough votes to make the all-school ballot the Illinois High School Association sent to schools this week. That's a shame, because the IHSA's current classification system for private and nonboundaried schools is not working. Look no further than this year's football title games for proof.

Lena-Winslow, Maroa-Forsyth, Monticello and Mount Zion field toptier public-schools programs, but all were routed in title games by nonboundaried schools that next year will likely be pushed up two classes. That change comes too late. Belleville Althoff should never be in Class 1A, nor should Lombard Montini compete in 3A. But they did this season because the IHSA's "success factor" is flawed.

The only public winner in eight title games was East St. Louis in 6A. Cumulative score in the other games was 283-76 in favor of non-boundaried schools – whose membership accounts for just 10% of football schools that are playoff eligible.

But this is not limited to football. This fall, 17 of 30 state champions in 10 sports came from private or nonboundaried schools, even though those schools make up just 25% of the IHSA membership.

A disproportionate number of titles for non-boundaried schools is not a new development. Nor is the IHSA's lack of a good answer.



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

Farmington OKs Lexipol service for police

FARMINGTON - The Farmington Police Department will soon have a new way to remain compliant with changing law-enforcement regulations.

The Farmington City Council on Monday voted to approve an agreement with Lexipol, an online service that provides upto-date, state-specific policing policies and training opportunities.

Farmington will pay \$2,172 for the remainder of this fiscal year (through April 30) and \$5,212.80 for Fiscal Year 2025 serv-

"Our general orders need

to be revamped either using Lexipol or a local attorney," Farmington Chief Chris Darsham said before the vote.

Farmington Attorney Bill Connor advised that the service was worthwhile.

"It's an industry that gets a lot of pressure on it and it's a good idea for the city to get this," he said.

Following a closed session, the City Council approved bonuses for city staff: \$500 for full-time employees and \$250 for part-timers.

Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam noted "this is the end of the ARPA, COVID-era money" and said future bonuses may be scaled back.

The council also discussed the possible purchase of a skid steer for city operations staff. A decision was made to rent equipment as needed or to hire local contractor Keith Dollar, who recently completed a earthmoving project for the city.

"It's hard to justify buying a skid steer and all the attachments you would need," Alderman Alex Gilles said.

During committee reports, the council heard that leaf collection will continue in Farmington for the first two weeks of De-

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



Continued from Page 1 you're doing," Doug told his son.

Blake graduated with a bachelor's degree in construction management from Illinois State University, with a minor in business.

"That was pretty much geared towards here," says Blake, who currently owns about 20% of the business.

EB has four main income streams: post-frame buildings, equipment rental, the hardware store and the lumber yard.

"The revenue streams all complement each other," Doug explains. "When one's down, one might be up. It's good to diversified, especially in this day and

"We've been pretty blessed here with good employees and a good customer base. You can only offer so many things: good customer service, price and knowledge. I think we offer all three."

One of those employees is General Manager Mark Heinz, who contacted Doug about a job while the hardware store was still being built.

Heinz had been building houses with his brother locally for about 10 years but knew he couldn't do that forever. Heinz had switched to construction because it was better for his situation as a single father raising two young children.

But Heinz's background was in direct marketing, working for companies like Foster & Gallagher and others. When Doug realized Heinz had a background in marketing and construction, he brought him aboard.

"Next thing you know, I'm running the store," Heinz recalls.

EB's customer base is drawn from a wide area that stretches across Stark County to Williamsfield and south through Peoria County. That helps the business thrive in a village with a population of just 1,600 residents.

Doug is also confident about the customer experience for those coming to his Princeville store - even customers from the Peoria area.

"If we can get people to come to our store from over that way, they'll come back because they get a better experience," he says. sider changing EB's locapeople would come here," Blake said.

Added Doug, "People were home, they were bored, so they started doing more home projects and cooking at home more often. We had our best grill sales by a lot.

"And our toilet paper sales went up probably 50,000%, too."

One casualty of COVID was a 60th anniversary celebration for the business. But 2025 will mark the 65th anniversary of the company.

What's next for EB? Another hardware store and lumberyard could be on the horizon, but that won't happen for awhile. Blake plans to continue slowly buying the business from his father.

In the meantime, EB will aim to continue a family tradition of excellent customer service, well-built buildings and an inventory of quality pro-

tion to attract more business, Doug responded with a hard "no."

"That would not be an option. We are in a great community," he says. "Everybody knows we're here. I would never want to move it."

"We didn't know what to think, but it was almost like a switch got turned on," Heinz says. "We had some of our best years for sales during COVID."

He said the impact on sales was because of local people supporting local businesses.

Princeville to collect water samples for tests

PRINCEVILLE - Starting in January, Princeville will be collecting water samples for the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to test for lead and copper.

There are 13 sites in town fed with lead pipes. Princeville is hoping to replace all 13 plus upstream and downstream pipes if the project will fit in this year's budget. If they are unable to fit it in the budget, the project could be done over two years.

Village President Jeff Troutman met with U.S. Rep. Darin LaHood on Nov. 25 about a proposed Edelstein water project. Troutman said LaHood advised the board to get upgrade costs ready and to begin applying for grants. He said Edelstein isn't close to being ready yet.

Grant applications would be due in February, but the board does not anticipate being able to have all necessary documents ready and submitted

in that time frame. Grants are available every year, and the board hopes to be able to apply for one next year. – Molly Richeson

Illinois' seven-day firearm deer season will conclude Dec. 5-8.

Local totals showed 1,317 deer shot in Fulton County (up 21 from 2023), 715 in Knox County (down 106) and 554 in Peoria County (down 27).

Wolf Carbon withdraws pipeline application

Wolf Carbon Solutions U.S., LLC has filed a request to withdraw its petition for a Hazardous Liquid Pipeline permit with the Iowa Utilities Commission. The company cited delays and regulatory uncertainties as key factors in its decision.





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

Billtown considering security cameras

For The Weekly Post WILLIAMSFIELD - Police soon might have another means of documenting or even preventing crime in Williamsfield.

The Village Board is expected to consider whether to install security cameras in various sections of town. The template is the camera installation in Yates City.

According to Williamsfield Village President Robert Johnson, Yates City has cameras at its entrances and in its downtown. The cameras helped solve a recent burglary at a Yates City tavern.

"If they didn't have the cameras, they wouldn't have known," Johnson told the board Monday night.

Johnson said his Yates City counterpart, Mark Hostetler, wants to discuss the topic with him. Johnson suggested security camera costs aren't excessive and could be eligible for grants.

"Since we don't have a full-time patrol here, it's the next best thing," Johnson said. "It might be a deterrent, too."

Security cameras were part of a larger board discussion regarding needs for the police department. The village is expected to seek prices for bodycams, a patrol-vehicle camera, a laptop computer and data-storage capability.

"We don't have to have a police force here all the time. We're a very lucky community in that way,' Trustee Lucas Leckrone said. "But if there's something our police officers need, I think we should support them."

The Williamsfield police

force has two officers. Both are part time.

The board took action on two items Monday. It approved a \$175 Christmas bonus for each village employee. It also authorized \$100 in door prizes for the 2024 Williamsfield Winterfest, Saturday (Dec. 7).




