# **Henry-Stark** purchasing new facility

Special ed classes moving to Kewanee

WYOMING - The Henry-Stark Counties Special Education District is preparing to move to a new home.

Stark County Board of Education Member Emily Leezer gave an overview of the change during a school board meeting Tuesday.

Leezer reported that the Henry-Stark board was planning to purchase the former Kewanee American Legion building at 1509 Railroad Ave.

The building was listed for

\$349,900 last October but, according to The Kewanee Voice, the district will purchase the building for \$300,000.

Currently the board is located at 107 S. State St. in Atkinson. The new office will provide a space to educate students with autism and other learning difficulties.

Currently, those students from

Henry and Stark counties are bused to Peoria or to the Quad Cities.

T. Greg Wertheim, executive director of the special education district, told The Kewanee Voice he expects the sale to close in March. He said plans call for eight classrooms in the 10,000-square-foot building.

# Trump bashing

Gov. Pritzker critical of new president for courting CEOs, communication

Capitol News Illinois CHICAGO — A wave of executive orders and bold pronouncements of his vision for the country highlighted President Donald Trump's first day back in the White House Monday.

In Illinois, Trump's ascension back to power kicked off new frustrations for Gov. JB Pritzker, who ripped into the new president at an unrelated news conference Tuesday for a lack of communication with the states, executive actions, and who he chose to surround himself with at inaugural events.

Pritzker, whose net worth is estimated at \$3.7 billion by Forbes, is one of the 1,000 wealthiest people in

the world. As one of the richest politicians in U.S. history, he largely selffunded his two campaigns for governor. But on Tuesday, he raised concerns about the prominent appearance of several large tech company CEOs at Trump's inauguration.

Meta founder Mark Zuckerburg, Apple CEO Tim Cook, Amazon founder Jeff Bezos and TikTok CEO Shou Chew were among those seated behind Trump's family during Monday's festivities at the U.S. Capitol.

"These are the wealthiest people in the country who essentially Donald Trump feels better about having them around than having Continued on Page 2

# Grants will offer aid for substance abusers

Stark County residents with substance-abuse problems will have additional resources to turn to in the upcoming year.

A \$900,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice is funding the launch of an adult drug court in Stark, Putnam and Marshall counties. Similar courts exist in Peoria and Tazewell counties, where they are designed as a way to help stop the cycle of addiction.

Those responsible for generating grant money for the new drug court include Megan Spradling, the Marshall, Putnam and Stark Probation District chief; Samantha McAvoy,

CEO of the Society for Growth; the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts; and others.

Organizers aim to increase resources for adults within the judicial system who require treatment for substance use or for mentalhealth issues. Drug court will offer treatment services, case management, probation supervision, recovery support and incentives and sanctions.

The grant runs through September 2028 and organizers hope services will be available starting in

McAvoy helped write another \$1 million grant awarded to Putnam County from the Bureau of Justice Assistance from its Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant and Substance Use Program. The award also covers residents of Stark and Marshall counties.

McAvoy said that grant does not require someone to be involved in the justice system to get help.

"Referrals can come from law enforcement, the ambulance service or from other emergency services," said McAvoy, who has a Society for Growth office in Wyoming. "Or somebody can just walk in and say, 'I need help."

The Stark board heard a proposed 2025-26 school calendar to be approved in February. Board President Ann Orwig gave a description of the calendar committee's meeting on Jan. 16. The group chose the first of two options.

Later in the meeting, Superintendent Brett Elliott presented a reading of the proposed calendar for 2025-26. Highlights are: First day of school for students on Aug. 14; No school on Labor Day, Sept. 1; Thanksgiving break Nov. 26-28; Winter break Dec. 19 to Jan. 2, 2026; Students and staff return from winter

break Jan. 6; Spring break, April 3-10; Graduation, May 17.

Other dates include 8th grade promotion, May 13, 2026; Last day of school, May 21; Early release Wednesdays at 1:45 p.m.. School will be in session next school year on Columbus Day and Veterans' Day.

In his report, Elliott said, "The school district has received authority from the federal government to move into Tier II of the solar bus grant. This grant is for a new bus barn and solar installation for our first electric bus. Funding is all covered by the

# TRUMP: State Republicans expect lower costs

Continued from Page 1 ordinary Americans backing him up or standing with him," Pritzker said at an unrelated news conference. "And I think it's just an indication of what this

administration is really all about. It isn't about what he ran on."

Pritzker, who has been floated as a future presidential hopeful in the Democratic Party, reserved more specific criticism for Elon Musk, the Tesla and SpaceX CEO who Trump has tapped to lead a "Department of Government Efficiency." While speaking at Trump's rally Monday, Musk gave a gesture to the crowd that has been criticized as a Nazi salute, though the Anti-Defamation League said that is not the case. Pritzker, who is Jewish, said he was "disgusted" by the act and Trump should condemn it.

"They hope to become greater than billionaires," Pritzker said of Trump's wealthy guests. "They hope to double what they already have. That is why they're making nice. That's all I can imagine. I mean, maybe some of them have delusions of becoming dictators themselves."

The governor said he saw no evidence in Trump's executive orders that the president was following through on campaign promises to lower costs for Americans.

Illinois Republicans expressed hope that Trump's presidency would improve costs for Americans.

"Illinois families can sigh a breath of relief knowing that the chaos and instability of the last four years is behind us, and a new reality of unity, prosperity and peace through strength begins," Illinois Republican Party Chair

Kathy Salvi said in a statement. "Illinois Republicans look forward to working with President Trump to restore liberty, lower costs, and create safer communities for Illinois families."

House Republican Leader Tony McCombie, R-Savanna, echoed that sentiment in a statement.

"Together, we can deliver relief to families, bring peace to divided communities, and restore economic success by focusing on policies that get people back to work, lower the cost of living, and strengthen our nation's standing at home and abroad," McCombie said.


Pritzker argued Trump turned against the Republican Party's values when he pardoned or commuted sentences for more than 1,000 people convicted of crimes related to the Jan. 6, 2021, U.S. Capitol riot.

"What used to be the party of law and order is now the party of chaos and disorder, and that stands against law enforcement," Pritzker said.

Spokespeople for McCombie and Salvi did not respond to requests for comment about the pardons and commutations.







# Pardons color optics of presidential transfer

The United States uses far less pomp and pageantry than our European friends. Inauguration Day is the one time the U.S. gives its European friends a run for the money.

From a formal church service, to an intimate tea, to the full ritual of a swearing in ceremony, the U.S. goes for glory on the day that demonstrates the peaceful passing of power in a democracy. It's a sight to behold and well worth the time I gave to it on Monday.

However, there were some optics that need mentioning.

Both President Biden and President Trump were on a pardon Richard frenzy over the **KORITZ** 

inaugural event.

Biden granted pardons or commutations to more than 1,500 individuals in the days leading up to his leaving

The pardons that will create the most commentary he left until the hours and minutes before he left office. Biden gave preemptive pardons to several members of the Jan. 6 Commission and to Gen. Mark A. Milley. Then in the hour before he left office, Biden granted preemptive pardons to his siblings.

As a note, a preemptive pardon is a pardon given a person before a criminal charge is even filed. While I am not personally challenging Biden's authority to grant the preemptive pardons, the optics are

terrible for Biden's legacy. Biden allowed for no public commentary on the issue while he was in office.

Add to this it was mostly family members pardoned during his last hours in office. Even though Biden clearly stated he did not view those given preemptive pardons had committed a crime, the natural assumption is that a pardon is granted for a crime committed. Whatever Biden achieved as president, the granting of preemptive pardons will leave a pall over his legacy.

Not to be outdone, President Trump on his first day in office pardons 1,500 individuals charged in the Jan. 6 riots during his first term of office. The majority of those pardoned had not been charged with causing bodily harm to others, but the charged offenses were serious.

Again, I do not question Trump's authority to grant the pardons and fully acknowledge that Trump stated during the campaign that he would issue the pardons if elected. There is simply something that bothers the general mindset when so many are pardoned for actions on one of the most infamous days in American history. For Trump the optics may not be as bad, because so much is happening during the first few weeks of a presidency that the event may well go away in the public's mind.

Biden welcomed Trump to the White House, with, "Welcome

home." That civility is worth noting. Trump's speech at the swearing in was a very thinly-veiled attack on Biden's presidency, with Trump laying out his agenda.

Biden was having none of it and was looking at his watch wondering when it would end. Biden and Trump simply do not like each other. But to both of their credit, neither went to any length to disparage the other personally.

The optic that I believe sets the tone for Trump's presidency was the new president signing executive orders in the Oval Office. We all knew Trump was going to sign numerous executive orders his first day in office. We just didn't know the logistics of the event.

Trump's performance at the oval office was very telling. Trump for two years now has been complaining of Biden not answering reporter's questions in an unscripted manner. While signing executive orders, Trump answered reporter's questions for 40 minutes. Trump was responsive to all questions and answered them in a very relaxed manner.

The confidence Trump exhibited in answering questions is something world leaders and this nation noticed. That optic told the world more than any speech on Monday.



Changes approved by the board set the stage for baseball and softball to follow suit with single-weekend state final formats beginning in 2026.


The hosting contract for softball finals at Louisville Slugger in Peoria runs through 2025.

### Rebels guard Daum tallies 24 in back-to-back victories

Say this for Connor Daum: He's been consistent recently.

Daum had 24 points Tuesday night to lead Stark County to a 55-39 Lincoln Trail Conference boys basketball victory over ROWVA-Williamsfield. That matched the junior guard's point total Jan. 17 in the Rebels' 67-16 beating of Biggsville West

Against visiting R-W (5-14, 1-4), Daum had 17 second-half points as Stark County (6-12, 3-2) expanded a 24-15 lead. Teammate Ross Saner finished with 22 points.

"We played well at times," Stark County Coach Kane Mastin stated afterward. "We still need to be able to play better off the ball if we want to compete with upper-tier teams. We just had superior athletes tonight."

Against West Central, Stark County led 43-4 at intermission behind 17 points from Daum and 14 from Saner, who finished

with 17. Ben Browning had 11 points for the Rebels.

"We had the momentum from the get-go and I think they ran out of steam quickly," Mastin stated. "They are a well-coached team. We just had the right stuff."


Stark County is to travel tonight (Jan. 24) to Ridgewood.


