# 'Is farming worth it?'

# Ag groups testify on ag economy

For fourth-generation farmer Jennifer James, last year was her family's most financially difficult year. And the Arkansas farmer is even more worried about what's to come.

"Just last week, we had one of the most difficult business conversations my family has had. Is farming really worth it?" James told U.S. Senate Ag Committee members as her voice trembled. "What scares me is we are only one farm family of thousands having these conversations."

James was one of a dozen witnesses during the committee's first in a series of hearings on the current state of America's rural economy. Representatives from several commodity and ag groups testified

Feb. 5, reiterating that coupled with ongoing challenges of high input prices, low commodity prices and the lack of a new farm bill, new barriers are emerging, including possible tariffs.

While thankful for \$31 billion in economic and disaster aid approved late last year by Congress for farmers, witnesses agreed farmers need stability of a new farm bill rather than ad hoc assistance.

USDA's latest forecast for net farm income shows an increase in 2025, however, that bump is driven by higher government payments.

Released Feb. 6, the Economic Research Service's report forecasts government farm payments at \$42.4 billion for 2025, a \$33.1 billion increase from 2024.

Net farm income, a broad measure of profits, is forecast to increase Continued on Page 2

# Wyoming council **OKs 3 ordinances**

WYOMING - The Wyoming City Council passed three resolutions at Tuesday's meeting, including one to fund repairs on a downtown building.

The council voted to sign a contract with Force Masonry Construction of Pekin for an amount not to exceed \$54,021 to rebuild the brick front of the building at 104 E. Williams Street with a new wall.

The building's front façade of brick is crumbling and could fall down, posing an imminent threat to health and safety.

The council also discussed outstanding property taxes on the building and will vote on a resolution next month to purchase three years of past taxes on the building.

City Attorney Zac Less-

ard said that the 2022 taxes were \$661.94 with fees and interest. For 2023, taxes were \$626.71 with fees and interest. If 2024 taxes are approximately \$650, then the city would pay under \$2,000 to purchase the building.

The two other resolutions passed were to donate \$1,000 to the Stark County After Prom event on April 26 and to donate \$750 to the Stark County 4H Equine Speed Show to be held on June 14, July 26 and Aug. 16 according to Jessica Jackson.

Jessica and Andy Jackson asked the council about placing a dumpster in front of the Paramount Theater on South 7th Street for a week so they can place material in it during reconstruction of the building north and adjacent to

# Pritzker proposes spending growth, no new taxes

SPRINGFIELD – Gov. JB Pritzker has proposed growing spending by about \$2 billion without new income or service taxes in the upcoming fiscal year – though his administration acknowledged policy changes by the Trump administration could drastically alter the fiscal landscape.

Spending and revenues would each grow by about 3% under the proposal laid out Wednesday during the governor's annual budget address,

with total general revenue fund spending growing to \$55.2 billion.

The proposal is balanced, in part, because the governor's budgeting office expects to collect about \$1.5 billion more in base tax revenue than it did when it issued its first fiscal year 2026 forecast in November.

That November forecast from the Governor's Office of Management and Budget had projected revenues to remain flat, driving a deficit of \$3.2 billion. But it relied on a September economic forecast from the

financial services company S&P Global. The governor's office says S&P has since revised its forecasts but the numbers released Wednesday are ultimately likely to fluctuate amid the rapid pace of policy changes happening in Washington,

The governor's proposal would increase K-12 funding by \$350 million and boost higher education funding by 3%. He'd keep funding flat for the Early Childhood Block Grant,

however, which is a major driver of his effort to increase access to publicly supported preschool in Illinois.

Ultimately, lawmakers and the governor will have to come to an agreement on a spending plan by the end of May. But the governor's opening salvo could meet opposition from Democratic lawmakers in the General Assembly – especially members of the Illinois Legislative Latino Caucus – due to what it doesn't fund.

The proposal would eliminate a health care program for low-income noncitizens aged 42-64 who are in the U.S. without legal permission. The Health Benefits for Immigrant Adults program, implemented in 2022, provided Medicaid-like and

costs the state general revenue fund roughly \$330 million, or less than 1% of the overall budget.

"As always, I stand ready to work with members of the General Assembly to deliberate and negotiate the final budget, but let's be clear, I will only sign a balanced budget. If you come to the table, looking to spend more, I'm going to ask you where you want to cut," Pritzker said in his address.

Advocates say that program is a key public health measure that drives down emergency room care costs and ultimately saves money. The governor's office says its decision not to propose funding reflects the state's fiscal reality.

The budget proposal maintains funding for a similar program serving immigrants aged 65 and older, passed by the legislature during the early months of the pandemic in 2020.

The governor's plan would raise another \$469 million in revenue through other changes to law, including adjusting tax rates on electronic gambling and table games at casinos to generate \$100 million in revenue. The plan also calls for pausing the transfer of \$171 million in sales tax collected on motor fuel to the road fund, and raising \$198 million by providing temporary amnesty for individuals making delinquent tax payments.

Continued from Page 1 in 2025 after declining in 2023 and 2024 from a record high in 2022.

While government payments are expected to grow, farm cash receipts are forecast to decrease by \$1.8 billion from 2024 to \$515 billion in 2025 in nominal dollars. Total crop receipts are forecast to decrease by \$5.6 billion from 2024 levels to \$239.6 billion following lower receipts for soybeans and corn. Conversely, total animal/animal product receipts are projected to increase by \$3.8 billion to \$275.4 billion in 2025.

In good news, total production expenses, including those associated with operator dwellings, are forecast to decrease by \$2.5 billion from 2024 to \$450.4 billion in 2025.

During committee testimony, ag leaders noted that a growing number of farmers are struggling to obtain operating loans for the 2025 planting season, and some likely won't qualifv for those loans.

National Corn Growers Association President Kenneth Hartman Jr. said corn farmers are facing losses of more than \$160 per acre for the 2025 crop year.

American Soybean Association Chairman Josh Gackle pointed to shifts in supply and demand as underpinning uncertainty by soybean

Even with the U.S.'s abundant soy harvest, Brazil is anticipating a record harvest and Argentina is looking at its largest harvest in years. At the same time, the world's largest buyer of soybeans - China - continues to face economic woes and is shifting purchases toward Brazil amid tariff uncertainty.

Both the Senate and House ag committees are gearing up for renewed farm bill talks by holding hearings in February.

# Galva 7th, Rebels 9th at LTC

Stark County won both its games in the Lincoln Trail Conference boys basketball tournament at Princeville.

Connor Daum had 22 points Monday and Ross Saner scored 15 to lead the Rebels to a 60-38 victory over 11th-seeded Knoxville for ninth place. Daum had 10 points and Saner hit two 3-pointers in the second quarter, which ended with ninth-seeded Stark County (9-18) ahead 44-22.

In the tournament's opening round Feb. 15, Stark County beat West Central 48-36 behind 24 points from Saner and 15 from Daum. Saner had 11 fourth-quarter points, including 5-for-5 on free throws as Stark County expanded a three-point lead.

Princeville was to play Wednesday against Abingdon-Avon for first place. Bureau Valley and Annawan were to meet for third.

Fifth-seeded Galva finished in seventh place by beating No. 6 Monmouth United 62-52 on Monday. Blake Stahl had 20 points and nine rebounds for the Wildcats (21-7). JP Sloan had 11 points, and Reid Harris had 10 points and 10 rebounds.

In the opening round Feb. 15, eighthseeded Ridgewood upset Galva 69-65. JP Sloan had 19 points, Blake Stahl 17 and MJ Louck 16. Sloan and Stahl each had six rebounds, but Ridgewood outrebounded Galva 37-28.

"We gave up too many second-chance points," Galva Coach Jake McClintic stated

Ridgewood also was 17-for-23 on free throws, and Galva was 3-for-5. Roy Sandberg of Ridgewood had 38 points and 18 rebounds.

"We wanted to work on some things that we have not been very good at this season and start getting ready for regionals," McClintic stated. "We tried some new things defensively and offensively to see how they would work in game situations. Some things looked good and other we still need to work on."

Class 1A regional play for Galva, which was assigned to the Pecatonica Sectional, begins at 6 p.m. Feb. 24 at home against Kewanee Wethersfield. Galva is seeded fourth in its sub-sectional and Wethersfield is 13th.

Victory sends Galva to a regional semifinal at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 26, with a title game set for 7 p.m. Feb. 28, both at Savanna West Carroll.

Stark County is seeded 13th in its Brimfield sub-sectional and begins regional play at 6 p.m. Feb. 24 at third-seeded *Continued on Page 5* 




