Wyoming police chief tells board about problems, answers

For The Prairie News WYOMING – Wyoming's Police Chief Jim Tiller spoke to the City Council at Tuesday's meeting about drug dealers, citizen apathy and criminal prosecutions.

"We still have some drug issues going on in town. We have The Society of Growth (representatives Amy Henderson and Samatha McAvoy) present here tonight. Arrests aren't always the answers," Tiller said.

He said counseling through and by The Society of Growth will help break the cycle of drug use, thefts for money to buy drugs and arrests and releases.

"The ones we do have to go after are the dealers. I've asked the Task Force to go beyond our boundaries **Continued on Page 2**

Stark Co. teachers OK 3-year contract

For The Prairie News WYOMING – The Stark County School Board and Teacher Association last Friday ratified a three-year collective bargaining agreement that the board approved at its Monday meeting.

Under the new deal, all first-year teachers will receive a flat \$7,000 pay increase and a 4% increase in years two and three of the contract.

Additionally, teachers will receive a 6% retirement incentive and the salary schedule was expanded from 20 to 21 steps. After closed session, the board voted to increase pay rate increases for support staff in Fiscal Year 2026. No details of those rate increases were disclosed except the \$20 to \$22 per-hour pay. Support staff pay has increased 60-80% in the past five years.

The board also approved the annual Illinois High School Association contract to continue participation in athletics and activities.

Discussed but tabled due to a lack of a motion, were fee increases for students. Proposed is a \$5-per-tier increase that would result in \$50 fees for elementary students, \$60 for junior high and \$70 for high schoolers. Under the tabled proposal, athletic/activity fees would increase \$10 to \$70 per student or \$140 Continued on Page 2

Galva schools approve improvements

By CAROL TOWNSEND For The Prairie News GALVA – The Galva School Board on Monday approved \$323,045 in school improvements.

The board approved the low bid from Valley Commercial Construction for \$285,370 to replace all exterior doors in the junior-senior high school. Galva will receive a grant which will pay for \$50,000. After this project, the school will have all new windows and exterior doors as well as a new gym roof. The board also approved a quote from Stalker Sports Floor Sanding and Refinishing for sanding, sealing and lining the

Galva Junior-Senior high school gym floor for \$37,675.

In other business, the board approved membership in Illinois High School Association, changed its next meeting from April 14 to April 28 at 7 p.m. in the school library and OK'd a 2025-26 school calendar with a starting day for students on Aug. 14. Dismissal through Aug. 22 will be at 1:55 p.m.





Continued from Page 1 into Kewanee and Peoria," Tiller said. "What's going on now are electronic transfers (of drug money)."

He said whatever it takes will be done to turn old Wyoming into new Wyoming, again.

"We have citizens who allow (drug dealing) to happen by looking blindly in the other direction. Those citizens will be spoken with and will have an option to be on-board or be a part of that enterprise," Tiller said. "It's their choice."

He continued by saying The Task Force, Stark County Sheriff's Office, and local police departments will work together.

"We need help. We have not gotten that from the (Stark County) State's Attorney office. I've heard that people have complained we are dropping cases," Tiller said. "Police departments do not have the power to drop cases. That case dropping lies solely in the hands of the

State's Attorney office and prosecutor."

To help in securing Wyoming, Kerry Copeland was sworn into office as a parttime police officer.

The council also passed resolutions to donate \$1,000 to the Wyoming Chamber of Commerce for Christmas in the Park and to contract with Harn R/O Systems, Inc. of Venice, Fla., for a quote not to exceed \$76,398 to replace 60 damaged filter membranes at the water-treatment plant. An Ameren Illinois franchise agreement with Wyoming was also approved.

Mayor Pat Maher said that a city CD that is maturing shortly will be put into the sewer account.

During reports by aldermen, it was stated that the city-wide cleanup is scheduled for May 19-20. Additionally, Alderman Dan Hardman said the city's clock located at the Seventh and Williams streets intersection requires repair quotes for an internal mechanism that is broken and needs replacing.

"We are working on (repairing) it," Maher said.

Of shed-hunting females & lactating squirrels

Rambling through central Illinois, old enough to appreciate an outdoors uppercut from a skilled sparring partner.

Loud female noises emanated from east of me on a recent glorious Sunday afternoon hike. Snake, already?

Skunk? Or had our little white coon-lab rousted another sleepy raccoon

from its den? Even better.

"Is this what we are looking for," my wife said, smiling, coyly, while holding up a matched set of shed antlers each one complete with a crab claw at the end.

What a classic moment. Despite me telling her we were going shed hunting, she claims to have had no actual concept what that meant. Or

did she? She and her sister, who was visiting from Wisconsin, spent most of their time in the woods chatting and catching up on important things.

Meanwhile, we males were scouring the ground, looking for elusive, late-winter whitetail gifts. Deer grow new antlers each year after shedding their old ones. When they shed is a matter of much conjecture and intrigue. Suffice to say, bucks

start showing up with antlers missing in January and are usually totally antler-bald by the end of March.

Finding the antlers they shed is a last chance for deer hunters to prove their prowess - not to mention a great excuse to get out and tromp through the late-winter woods.

Myself, I've never been very good at finding antlers. On most shed hunts, I spend 10 minutes scouring the ground like a hawk. Then, my mind and eyes wander up to the trees ... and the shed hunt is over.


Somehow though, last Sunday I was dialed in. Maybe that's because of the success from a few days earlier when the oldest boy joined me. "Are they hard to find?" he asked.

"For me, yes," I said.

Then, two feet into our first trail, there sat a shiny antler the mice and squirrels had already been nibbling. We laughed at the ease of it while lamenting the eaten antler points.

Unfortunately, rodents also search for antlers in the spring, since sheds provides nutrients and minerals that those critters crave. Scientists have actually studied this and determined that calcium and phosphorous are beneficial for lactating female squirrels as they raise their young.

I'm glad my wife didn't know that last part, or she probably would have hid the antlers she found. Besides, even after Sunday's success,

"What do you do with these?" her sister asked.

"Oh, we put them on dressers and bookcases and shelves so they can collect dust," my wife replied.

Tell that to a female squirrel. As it was, my beloved clued into the whole shed thing after the youngest boy found a nice fivepointer. That antler was right where it should have been - along a southfacing rub line that the buck had probably walked for years.

Moments after the boy found his shed and was congratulated and feted as a fine fellow, the missus found hers, while walking back over a well-tended trail she had already covered.

"This is not hard now that I know what we are looking for," she said. "We had to have walked right past these."

That's how the day went. Three sheds in two minutes and a wife who now has yet another entry on her resume: expert shed hunter.

Actually, that's great. I'll gladly bring her next time. Hey, she made sandwiches, found antlers and smiled prettier than any shed-hunting companion I've ever been around.

Award-winning vegetables, flowers for 2025

By BRUCE BLACK

U of I Extension URBANA - With winter officially over and spring here, thoughts are turning to planting - even if the ground is still covered with snow now and then.

One good source for new plants is All-America Selections, a non-profit organization that releases several trialed plants each year as AAS Winners. AAS tests new varieties every year at their private and public trial sites located around the U.S. and Canada.

Currently, there are four trial locations in Illinois, with three northern and one central. Independent judges who are professional horticulturists in geographically diverse areas evaluate trial entries against comparison plants.

For the best plants suited to the area, Illinois residents should look for Great Lakes winners or National winners on the AAS Winners lists.

This year, there are 15 AAS winners. Out of the total, 14 are suited for Illinois, including four vegetables, and 10 flowers.

Vegetables

 Kohlrabi Konstance F1 (Brassica oleracea var. Konstance F1): This is a purple kohlrabi with a longer harvest window, improved skin for crackresistant, long-lasting and sweet yet peppery, crunchy bulbs.

• Pepper Pick-N-Pop Yellow F1 (Capsicum annuum var. Pick-N-Pop Yellow F1): This is an extra-sweet, snack-sized mini pepper, produced continually with 50-100 peppers per plant with bacterial leaf spot resistance. The plant produces canary-yellow peppers of uniform shape.

• Squash Green Lightning F1 (Cucurbita pepo var. Green Lightning F1): This is a light green, medium-sized, early-maturing Pattypan squash. For

consumption or decoration, this glossy squash has a small seed cavity with more flesh.

• Squash Thriller F1 (Cucurbita pepo var. Thriller F1): This is an orange-dumpling squash that has cream and green variegation. For consumption or decoration, this trailing squash will add color to fall gardens and is resistant to powdery mildew.

Flowers

• Dahlia Black Forest Ruby (Dahlia pinnata var. Black Forest Ruby): This is a stunning, ruby-red flower set against deep black foliage. This semidouble to double-blooming dahlia has durable pinnate leaves and is sturdy and disease-free during the growing season.

• Dianthus Interspecific Capitán Magnifica (Dianthus interspecific var. Capitán Magnifica): A mix of pink and light pink, this dianthus keeps blooming and growing through the summer heat. Bred with more heat tolerance than other dianthus, the plant also has rain and cold tolerance.

 Marigold Mango Tango (Tagetes patula var. Mango Tango): This plant has compact bi-colored yellow and red flowers that bloom prolifically. Great for containers or inground, it can be planted in a full-sun to par-shade locations. In European trials, Mango Tango was the recipient of the Fleuroselect award.

• Nasturtium Baby Gold (Tropaeolum minus var. Baby Gold): This winner features intense gold flowers set against dark green foliage. From the baby series, it is known for its mounding, petite flowers and is great for containers or in small space gardens.

• Nasturtium Baby Red (Tropaeolum minus var. Baby Red): Uniform and compact, Baby Red has rich red flowers on dark

green foliage. From the baby series and known for its mounding and petite flowers, this winner is great for containers or in small space gardens.

• Nasturtium Baby Yellow (Tropaeolum minus var. Baby Yellow): Featuring soft, light-yellow flowers contrasting dark green foliage, this winner is from the baby series and known for its mounding, petite flowers. It is great for containers or in small space gardens.

• Petunia Dekko Maxx Pink (Petunia x hybrida var. Dekko Maxx Pink): This regional winner has non-fading pink flowers and a compact, fastspreading habit.

· Petunia Shake Raspberry F1 (Petunia multiflora var. Shake Raspberry F1): This National winner is a naturally compact petunia with coloration of blended reds, pinks and lemon-lime. Does not fade or melt during the summer months.

 Snapdragon Double-ShotYellow Red Heart F1 (Antirrhinum majus var. DoubleShot Yellow Red Heart F1): This National winner is an early bloomer with long-lasting yellow, red and pink flowers.

· Zinnia Zydeco Fire (Zinnia marylandica var. Zydeco Fire): A National winner that has a fully double and larger orange flower when compared to



Cellphone ban clears Senate committee

SPRINGFIELD - Legislation that would prohibit public school students from using cellphones and other wireless communication devices during class time cleared a Senate committee Tuesday and could soon be considered by the full Senate.

It's a policy change that Gov. JB Pritzker called for in his State of the State address in February and one that has been gaining popularity in recent years throughout the U.S. According to the health policy website KFF.org, at least nine other states have adopted statewide policies limiting or banning the use of cellphones in schools. Elsewhere, even in the absence of a statewide policy, individual districts have begun acting on their own, including Peoria Public Schools, which implemented its own ban this year.

Senate Bill 2427, sponsored by Sen. Christina Castro, D-Elgin, would require all school boards to adopt policies prohibiting the use of wireless communication devices during instructional time. That would include any wireless device such as cell phones, laptops, tablets and gaming devices that can provide voice, messaging or other data communication between two or more parties. However, it would not include school-issued devices or devices that students are required to possess or use for educational purposes. The district policies would, at a minimum, prohibit the use of those devices during instructional time. But the policies would also have to allow exceptions that allow students to use

them during emergencies or in response to an imminent threat to someone's health or safety.



The policies must also provide exceptions if the devices are needed as part of an individual educational plan for a student with disabilities, or if they are needed for medical care.

The new policies would have to be in place in time for the 2026-27 academic year. Castro said she's aware some districts have already adopted policies that are stricter than the standards set forth in the bill, while other districts have not yet adopted any type of limitation on cellphone use. 
Sutherland pitched 10 of Princeville's victories last season, lost six times and had an ERA of 3.87. Cihla batted. 373, Stahl .312.

• Galva softball - Coach Brad Jackson did not respond to multiple requests for information. Galva was scheduled to open its season Thursday at Monmouth-Roseville.














IHSA alters classification policies for 2025-26

BLOOMINGTON - The Illinois High School Association Board of Directors approved three changes it hopes will address competitive equity and simplify the postseason

Enrollment cutoffs for each sport were determined by starting with the average classification cutoff from the

process will be eliminated and replaced by an annual waiver application. A baseline criteria was also established to judge if a team is eligible to apply for a waiver.

classification process.

Last December, the board voted to alter the classification process from a two-year cycle to an annual cycle beginning in 2025-26. Additionally, the board issued a questionnaire to member schools in January to gain additional feedback on multiple topics.

Meeting on March 15, the board approved changes that will be used to determine classifications for the 2025-26 school year.

The IHSA intends to release fall and winter sport classifications by May 1.

"Competitive equity and classifications are a topical issue here in Illinois and for state associations around the country," said IHSA Executive Director Craig Anderson.

The latest changes are:

 1. Moving back to fixed classification cutoffs in 2025-26. IHSA sports and activities with multiple

past four years, then rounding up or down to nearest 50th or 100th. Some sports were then adjusted slightly based on class-participation trends over the past two years.

Under the new rules, football classes will still be determined at the end of the regular season.

Schools with enrollment under 300 will be in Class 1A for girls and boys basketball, baseball, softball and volleyball. Class 2A will be for schools with enrollments of 300-700 students.

The Class 1A cutoff in cross country is under 600; in golf it is under 500; in track and field it is under 450; in wrestling it is under 750.

• 2. The Board also voted to change the multplier waiver process.

In 2005, IHSA member schools voted to implement a 1.65 multiplier on the classification enrollment of non-boundaried schools. Beginning in 2025-26, the automatic waiver

A sport or activity at a non-boundaried school is not eligible to apply for a waiver if, over the course of the previous three school terms, the program has achieved certain set levels of success.

• 3. Finally, the board voted to change the success adjustment.

The policy was initially implemented in 2014 and seeks to provide greater competitive equity for nonboundaried schools that achieve certain levels of success by moving them up in classification.

Beginning in 2025-26, the success adjustment policy will encompass a rolling three-year period. Entering each school year, if a team has won two state-final trophies in the past three years in a sport, they will then be subject to the adjustment and move up one class in that sport.
