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Wyoming mayoral race includes Maher, Mercer and Potter

WYOMING – Long-time Wyoming mayor Pat Maher faces a challenge from two other candidates in the upcoming April 1 election.

Jim Mercer has served on the City Council but is running for mayor this spring, as is Ian Potter. Here are questions asked of the three candidates.

• Why are you running?

Maher: I've been mayor for 16 years and would like to continue bettering Wyoming..

Mercer: I aim to bring fresh ideas and new approaches to address the town's needs and encourage community involvement.

Potter: Because I care deeply about Wyoming's future. I believe with fresh ideas and a focus on collaboration, we can strengthen our economy and create more opportunities for everyone.

• Where did you grow up?

Maher: In rural Wyoming on a farm. We raised Black Angus cattle.

Mercer: I was born and raised in Wyoming. My mother's family was one of the first settlers in Wyoming.

Potter: I grew up right here in Wyoming watching it grow and change over the years.

• What goals do you have

for Wyoming if you are elected?

Maher: My main goal is getting some sort of senior living, getting a family physician for our town and a new subdivision in the TIF-2 District. We also need more playground equipment for all three parks, along with a pickleball court.

Mercer: My goals include improving infrastructure, upgrading water equipment, enhancing school safety and strengthening business relations. I also would promote Wyoming as a very safe city and a great place to live

Potter: My main goals are to enhance quality of life for all

residents. I would like to get the movie theater up and running again.

• Do you see any problems that need addressing?

Maher: Yes. Some of our residential areas need addressed – clean up yards and show pride in our city. Sidewalks need repair all over town. I would like to see some trees planted.

Mercer: Better relationships with our town's Chamber of Commerce, improving our downtown streets and updating our city parks. We also need to work on freeing up land for building new homes.

Potter: The aging infrastructure, roads, public facilities and sidewalks to better serve our community.

• What is the single largest problem you would work on in the next four years?

Maher: Affordable housing for the elderly.

Mercer: Securing more grants and state funding for the city's needs.

Potter: The single largest problem I would focus on is revitalizing our town's infrastructure, our roads, public facilities and sidewalks. Addressing them would improve safety, attract businesses, and enhance overall quality of life.

Maher: Sixteen years of experience as a mayor, plus 14 years as an alderperson.

Mercer: Leadership and the ability to listen to the community's needs. I have run many projects in my years in industrial business and know how to prioritize land for building new homes.

Potter: I bring a strong sense of dedication and a collaborative mindset and a deep love for Wyoming.

• What are strengths of Wyoming you would like to build on?

Maher: Wyoming is a great community with great schools and many great businesses.

Mercer: Very strong belief of

community from everyone who lives in Wyoming. We have great employees who take their jobs seriously. One of the friendliest towns in the whole U.S.A.

Potter: Wyoming has a strong sense of community with people who care deeply about each other.

• Over your years in Wyoming, do you think the community has improved, or declined, or stayed about the same and why?

Maher: I feel Wyoming has definitely improved. Some of the things we have done since I became mayor: new water tower, new water hydrants, new water mains, beautification of the downtown district, TIF-2 was established, disposal plant was completely overhauled, new handicap accessible sidewalks downtown, city clock, purchase and renovation of the Paramount The-

ater and marquee.

Mercer: Over the years we have become a smaller community, have lost a lot of businesses. The younger generations prefer to live closer to their jobs. We need to focus on trying to bring more jobs to our area. I believe we have declined, not due to one person or one thing. All rural America is in decline. That is why we need stronger leadership in the role of the mayor's office. Let's put Wyoming back on the map.

Potter: I believe Wyoming has had its ups and downs. I've seen positives and negatives to business due to the lack of investments in certain areas in the community. There is a lot of untapped potential here in Wyoming.

Cauthon: I want to invest in our future. Clean up the housing. Bring in new businesses that will in turn bring in new families. Make Bradford inviting like it once was. Develop programs with our schools for our youth to grow and succeed.

• Do you see any problems that need to be addressed?

Carlton: The biggest problem in the village is working together. There are many good ideas but you have to follow procedures to get them done.

Cauthon: Bradford is such a great place to raise a family, however we have a vast number of homes currently unoccupied. Those homes could have children who would attend our schools, which could give us more access to state funding. Each empty home is also one less revenue to the city and to the businesses within it.

• What is the single largest problem you would work on in the next four years?

Carlton: Bradford's biggest problem is working together to get things done. Bradford needs growth. It takes many people to get things done by working together and not all against each other.

Cauthon: Bradford needs growth. Bradford needs more business. We need to focus on the availability of new ideas. With a major state highway that passes through the Main Street of our town, we need to utilize resources wisely. We cannot continue to leave empty businesses decaying.

• What qualities would you bring to the office that might help Bradford be a stronger community?

Carlton: I bring experience to the board and I am willing to listen honestly.

Cauthon: I am ready to stir things up. I want to learn how our community system works and throw out new plans, ideas and strategies to bring people in. I think a fresh set of eyes could give a different perspective.

What are strengths of Bradford you would like to build on?

Carlton: Bradford is a good community with few houses for sale, which means residents are staying. Along with staying, we need to build growth in businesses.

Cauthon: Personally, I cannot brag about our schools enough. Bradford Grade School was ranked on the U.S. News & World Report "Best Elementary Schools" and Bradford Junior High was ranked in the top 10% of junior highs in the state of Illinois. Growth for the youth within our community could be so beneficial in the future. We are also lucky to have fantastic individuals who are willing to put in their time, effort and love whenever possible. There are so many things that are possible in Bradford just with the helping hands of a community that cares.

• Over your years in Bradford, do you think

the community has improved, or declined, or stayed about the same and why?

Carlton: Bradford has stayed the same in years and now it is time to go forward in growth.

Cauthon: The roots of Bradford run very deep. We have several families like mine who have raised multiple generations. We have improved by continuing to share that bond with the next generation. Amazing opportunities exist with the Silver Streak touring and the beginning of the Yellowstone furnishings through Green Gables.

We have declined, however. The warmth and welcome spirit of Bradford has gone downhill. We have a separation that needs resolved. I want people on U.S. Route 40 to drive through and see kids in the park, businesses on Main Street, and pride in where we live. That is the Bradford that I want to live in and the legacy that I will leave to the next generation.

West Jersey Township Roads are posted with a 5 Ton Weight Limit

As a reminder, West Jersey Township roads have an imposed weight restriction on certain roads to prevent damage caused by the seasonal freeze/thaw cycle. Among these restrictions, 5-ton posted roads play a crucial role in protecting infrastructure, ensuring road longevity, and reducing costly repairs that require the use of local taxpayer dollars.

During the transition from winter to spring, the ground beneath the roads undergoes a freeze/thaw cycle. As temperatures fluctuate, moisture trapped in the pavement and subgrade expands and contracts. This process weakens the road structure, making it highly susceptible to damage from heavy loads. Without restrictions, heavy vehicles can cause significant harm, leading to potholes, cracks, and structural failures.

A 5-ton posted road means that vehicles exceeding a gross weight of 5 tons (10,000 lbs) are prohibited from traveling on the designated roadways during the restricted period. This limitation applies to single-axle and multi-axle vehicles unless an exemption is granted. These postings are temporary and typically last several weeks, depending on weather conditions and road stability.

These Restrictions Protect Infrastructure

- Prevention of Pavement Rutting and Cracking Weakened road surfaces are prone to deep rutting and cracking under excessive loads. The weight limits help minimize stress and deterioration.
- Reduced Maintenance Costs Limiting heavy vehicle traffic decreases the need for frequent and expensive road repairs, ultimately saving taxpayers money.
- Extended Road Lifespan By preventing excessive strain during the most vulnerable period, roads last longer and maintain their integrity for years to come.

This is not intended to be an inconvenience to motorists with weight restricted vehicles. It is to protect current infrastructure for longevity in hopes to delegate funding to additional road projects in the township. Local authorities and township officials are expected to enforce these weight restrictions through signage, patrols, and penalties for violators. Businesses and truck operators should plan alternative routes or schedule deliveries outside the restriction period to comply with regulations. In some cases, special permits may be issued for essential services, such as emergency vehicles and critical supply deliveries.

5-ton posted roads during the spring freeze/thaw period are an essential measure to protect infrastructure from seasonal damage. It is appreciated that motorists with weight restricted vehicles consider the residents of the township and the ordinances that are in place. These restrictions help maintain the quality and safety of sealed roads while reducing the financial burden of repairs. Compliance with these regulations benefits the entire community by ensuring a durable and reliable road network for the future.

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
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Everything to be picked up must be out by Monday, May 19th. The garbage truck will start in the north end of Wyoming and move south. They will not revisit an area they have already picked up.

It will be free to all residential households in the corporate limits of the City of Wyoming. Per state laws they cannot pick up any electrical items. Large non-electrical appliances and large pieces of furniture such as couches, large chairs, mattresses and box springs will require a tag at a cost of \$10 each. Tags can be purchased at City Hall. City Hall's hours are Mon-Fri 7:30-noon and 12:30 to 4pm. Anything placed out should be easily picked up by one man and placed into the back of the garbage truck. Bundle items when necessary so they may be picked up in a timely fashion.

THE FOLLOWING WILL NOT BE PICKED UP:

 Electrical items • Landscape waste • Hazerdous material as in kerosene, fuel oil, paint thinners, batteries and tires • No Bricks, building materials and long poles as these items damage the garbage truck.

Murphy's has the right to refuse to pick up any piles of garbage that is larger than 4ft. by 4ft. pile or contained items mixed in that are not allowed.

Any large items set out without the required bulk tags will be

in violation of City Ordinance and subject to possible fines.

Brexit shows what's ahead for U.S. trade war

In the seven weeks that global markets and U.S. farmers have been living in the uncertain trade world of the Trump Administration, prices for most American ag exports have headed south faster than a Canada goose in late October.

In fact, futures prices for most key ag markets –soybeans, corn, cotton, wheat, and pork – are 5% to 8%

lower than when the president first spun his traderoulette wheel in February. Only cattle futures, still dominated by historically low herd numbers, have regained February's lost footing.

The U.S. equities market is following the commodity markets. In the four-week period prior to mid-March, the S&P 500's market value fell 10%, from an estimated \$52 trillion on Feb. 19 to \$46.8 trillion March 14. That's a \$5.2 trillion punch in the mouth.

That smacking, like the earlier drop in commodity prices, was forewarned. After all, anytime you take a crowbar to some of the key floor joists of today's integrated global marketplace - like free trade or the value of the U.S. dollar – there will be consequences.

If you choose to look past that reality – or, worse, believe that reality doesn't apply to you or your policy choices – spend a minute catching up on Brexit, the United Kingdom's

2016 vote to remove itself from the commercial and trade umbrella supplied by the European Union.

Like the White House now, UK Conservatives back then firmly tied the stumbling national economy to out-of-control government spending, the EU's regulatory bureaucracy and a tide of EU-sanctioned immigrants landing in the UK. The complaints carried Brexit - the British exit from the EU – to a startling win.

Now, however, eight years after that history-changing blame shifting, Brexit is seen as an indefensible blunder sold to an aging, immigrantfearing UK by fear-peddling politicians and reality-defying royalists.

The price of the blunder, according to the Financial Times, has been steep. According to a recent academic report, exports from the UK since 2016 are down an average of 17% while imports, because of rising protectionism, are down an even bigger 23%.

Moreover, since 2016, the EU economy has grown 24% while the UK GDP has increased an embarrassingly tiny 6%.

A final comparison is even more stark. One year before Brexit, Greece, another EU member nation, faced a UK-like choice: leave the EU and its tough management of the Greek economy or stay in the multinational group, clean out its systemic corruption and rebuild under EU rules and loans.

Unlike the UK in 2016, though, Greece followed its EU leaders. "Greece was rational," Bloomberg noted bluntly a year ago, "and since then its economy expanded 11%, representing a 1.53% annual rate, easily exceeding the UK's anemic 0.7% annual growth."

Moving forward, nations trading with the United States, Politico suggested March 17, face a similarly stark choice. As the White House continues to escalate tariff talk, countries can choose to follow the recent Mexico model, a slow approach that favors "laying low and buying time," or the Canadian method that's "more confrontational, including immediate trade retalia-

The latter drew "swift White House retribution," and the former "doesn't have much more to show for it." That's because trade wars forget all the chest-beating, socialmedia rants, or hockey metaphors have no winners. Losers, however, are everywhere.

Sooner or later, all aggrieved parties in this fight will learn that lesson. Again.

Right now, however, Politico goes on to report, farmers and "some agriculture groups are growing tired of feeling like their private requests for exemptions or support ... are failing to result in any tangible change."

Go figure.

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

Venison a game changer for food pantries

Hunters Feeding Illinois is taking a shot at tackling food insecurity throughout the state by connecting hunters, meat processors and food pantries.

During the 2024-25 deer hunting season, the program provided 24,278 pounds of venison to 54 food pantries. Hunters donated 584 deer to 20 meat processors, increasing access to lean protein in central and southern Illinois.

"All of the venison that is donated stays local,

which we're really proud of, and the funding that is raised also stays local," said Kaitlyn Streitmatter, a senior manager of Illinois Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education at University of Illinois Extension.

The process starts when a hunter donates meat to a local food processor. Streitmatter said the program helps address deer nuisance issues. Hunters who have more meat than they need can donate it to families in their commu-

After the donation, Feeding Illinois pays food processors who turn deer into ground meat. Probst said in past years, U of I Extension would reimburse meat processors, but partnering with Feeding Illinois helps the reimbursement process run smoother.

Streitmatter added that the deer donation program included in Illinois Senate Bill 2160 would further streamline the reimbursement process. If passed, the legislation would establish the Hunter Food Bank Fund to support grants for food banks to pay processors.


The committee is also considering two bids to replace the old mower,



Construction stalled at state universities

Buildings on Illinois' college campuses were falling apart when lawmakers approved \$2.9 billion for higher education construction as part of the 2019 Rebuild Illinois capital plan. The funding brought hope for long-overdue upgrades, but the slow rollout has left

colleges in limbo.

A series of setbacks have stalled progress, including staffing issues at the Capital Development Board, the state's construction management agency, rising post-pandemic construction costs and local disputes over how to stretch funding that no longer covers what university officials originally planned.

Construction costs shot up nearly 40% by 2023 compared with pre-pandemic levels, according to Associated Builders and Contractors.

SIUE was able to build its Health Sciences Building, but it came with major changes to the original plan.

SIU Carbondale faced a similar problem with plans to fully renovate its 1960sera Communications Building on the Carbondale campus with roughly \$85 million allocated from Rebuild Illinois. By the time they set out to finalize the design, officials no longer had enough funds to do what they'd originally planned. SIU leaders initially asked lawmakers for additional money, but finally started moving forward with a scaled-down design, according to Hong Cheng, dean of the College of Arts and Media.

Lately, state officials have sought to provide some relief. The Illinois Board of Higher Education's 2025 budget included \$575 million to help schools affected by rising costs see their projects to fruition. For 2026, the board is urging law-

makers to carry over any unspent funds and speed up project approvals to ensure those under Rebuild Illinois are completed within the six-year timeframe, according to IBHE spokesperson Jose Garcia.

The state has also faced challenges. The Capital Development Board oversees all major projects. But the agency's staff has been overwhelmed by the surge of projects under Rebuild Illinois. The agency reported in 2023 that many projects fell behind schedule due to a wave of retirements.

"When you have a very large group of people that is disenfranchised, that is going to cause division and I think separating states

maybe would help people get along better," Merritt said. "People look at this on the surface and think it's a Democrat versus Republican thing, that is not the way we see it at all. It is an urban versus rural, small town and suburban thing."

Merritt said a 1964 U.S. Supreme Court ruling effectively allowed a state's largest populated area to dictate politics for the rest of the state.

"When you take a state that already has a history of corruption and you apply Reynolds v. Sims to that, that causes all the power to be concentrated


