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### Princeville Twp. a microcosm of why April 1 matters

There are few headlines or television commercials promoting candidates running in next Tuesday's election.

But from a local perspective, the vote that will be conducted on April 1 for school boards, township positions, mayors, village trustees and other grassroots positions still has a very direct impact on our lives.

How else to explain the standing-room-only crowd that gath-

ered March 11 in Monica for a meeting of the Princeville Township Board?

Among the topics discussed was mowing and maintenance of Princeville Township's 20.5-acre cemetery. That issue and how it played out since last fall led to the resignation of township trustee Tom Webber and cemetery board president Veronica Haskell at the March 11 meeting. Cemetery board member Rich Knapp also resigned previously.

That issue is also a hot topic in

the race for Princeville Township supervisor, which pits current supervisor Kathy Humphreys against write-in candidate Terry Rasmussen.

Humphreys was appointed last April to fill the role vacated by Summer Rice, who had accepted a full-time position in the Princeville School District.

"When I took over in April, I was looking for ways to save taxpayers dollars by reviewing all records," Humphreys said.

She also contacted attorney John Redlingshafer of Washington to review some records. Among those was employment of Mike Nauman, caretaker at the cemetery since 2016.

"The mowing contract really should have been put out for bid because for several years the

earnings were over the bid threshold," Humphreys said. "After careful consideration and with advice from the attorney, the board decided to terminate the contract and explore all options."

That was last Oct. 24 and Nauman, who hired an attorney after the contract was terminated, had not done maintenance at the cemetery until last week.

On March 19, Nauman signed a new job description that spelled out terms of employment for him Continued on Page 8

### **Elmwood** loses \$1M in fed funds

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD - The City of Elmwood has lost \$1 million in

federal funding for planned improvements of its wastewater lagoons.

U.S. Rep. Eric Sorensen had requested funding in May 2024 to remove sludge from the bottom of the wastewater lagoon's four cells (ponds) and to replace the system's existing rock filter in the 2025 fiscal year.

Wrote Sorensen in his request, "The project is an appropriate use of taxpayer funds because the lagoons discharge into a nearby creek which empties into the Illinois River. This project will protect the waterways from contamination by sewage."

At the time, Elmwood Mayor

JD Hulslander said in a press release, "These requested funds for the City of Elmwood wastewater lagoon upgrade are a great benefit and would have a huge financial impact for our community. The City of Elmwood will benefit not only immediately but generationally. The Community Project Funding request would allow us to prevent issuing bonds, raising water and

sewer rates, or raising property taxes for our community."

However, that funding was stripped along with all other congressional earmarks in the spending bill signed by President Donald Trump last week.

The City of Elmwood is expected to reapply for funding in the 2026 fiscal year but will not wait for those funds before

### Elmwood hires principal

Board OKs ex-Limestone teacher, coach Bell

The Elmwood School Board on Monday unanimously approved hiring Bell as junior and

senior high principal to replace Tony McCoy, effective July 1. McCoy is retiring after eight years as a principal in CUSD 322.

Prior to spending the past five years in Arizona, the last three as principal at Southern Arizona Community Academy in Tucson, Bell's educational work was all in Illinois.

A native of the Cass County town of Virginia, where his family still farms, Bell served

three years in the U.S. Army before graduating from Western Illinois University. He later earned master's degrees in public history and archival research from the University of Illinois-Springfield and education administration from Quincy University. Bell was a socialstudies teacher at Astoria Junior High from 2004-08 and at Limestone High School from 2008-20.

Bell also has extensive coaching experience, having served as a football assistant at Limestone and head coach of the boys and girls cross country and tennis

"My family and I are so excited to be part of the community," Bell said. "The main reason we want to come back is we just miss the sense of community. Elmwood is a great town. For me a small town doesn't mean small minds. To me it's the opposite, it means big hearts."

Bell, 49, and his wife,
Allie, have two children,
Charlotte, 6, and 6-month
old Angus. Bell said he
plans to live in Elmwood.

"I think it's very important for an administrator to be a part of the community," he said.

Elmwood Superintendent Joel Schmieg said Bell rose above three other finalists for the position, which attracted seven applicants overall. Bell receives a starting salary of \$100,000 on a three-year contract.

"His vision for school emphasizes values such as academic excellence, community involvement and a student-centered culture for learning," Schmieg said. "These values mirrour our own Trojan Way – Tradition of Excellence."

In other personnel moves, the board congratulated teachers Kayla Peters and Tricia Little for earning tenure. The board also accepted the following resignations: Constance Roberts and JoAnna Bernal, elementary aides; Emily Roberts, high school spirit cheer; Dianne Burwell, learning-loss specialist; Thomas Huffcutt, bus driver; and Cindy Dunn, cafeteria worker.

In other business, the board approved a \$212,500 bid from GIVSCO Construction Company of Pekin to install a new floor and remodel the elementary-school gym. There were six bids for the project. The deal with GIV-SCO includes a \$5,000 allowance for bleacher adjustment and repairs and a \$11,270 contingency if a vapor barrier is needed under the flooring.

Work on the gym will start June 2 and must be completed by July 31, Schmieg said. Funding comes from the Peoria County school facilities sales tax and from a \$50,000 ISBE school facilities maintenance grant.

The board also handled annual formalities by approving membership in the IHSA and IESA and a consolidated district plan for ISBE.


In regards to finances, Schmieg said he plans to present an amended budget to the board in May with expected adoption in June.


Also, Schmieg said the school district's tax rate will decrease again, from 5.23289 to 5.22793.


Board member Jessica Reyling reported that work on a new district strategic plan for the next three to five years is nearly complete and will include a new vision statement, mission statement and goals.

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
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

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

### Brexit shows what's ahead for U.S. trade war

In the seven weeks that global markets and U.S. farmers have been living in the uncertain trade world of the Trump Administration, prices for most American ag exports have headed south faster than a Canada goose in late October.

In fact, futures prices for most key ag markets -soybeans, corn, cotton, wheat, and pork – are 5% to 8%

lower than when the president first spun his traderoulette wheel in February. Only cattle futures, still dominated by historically low herd numbers, have regained February's lost footing.

The U.S. equities market is following the commodity markets. In the four-week period prior to mid-March, the S&P 500's market value fell 10%, from an estimated \$52 trillion on Feb. 19 to \$46.8 trillion March 14. That's a \$5.2 trillion punch in the mouth.

That smacking, like the earlier drop in commodity prices, was forewarned. After all, anytime you take a crowbar to some of the key floor joists of today's integrated global marketplace - like free trade or the value of the U.S. dollar - there will be consequences.

If you choose to look past that reality – or, worse, believe that reality doesn't apply to you or your policy choices – spend a minute catching up on Brexit, the United Kingdom's

2016 vote to remove itself from the commercial and trade umbrella supplied by the European Union.

Like the White House now, UK Conservatives back then firmly tied the stumbling national economy to out-of-control government spending, the EU's regulatory bureaucracy and a tide of EU-sanctioned immigrants landing in the UK. The complaints carried Brexit - the British exit from the EU – to a startling win.

Now, however, eight years after that history-changing blame shifting, Brexit is seen as an indefensible blunder sold to an aging, immigrantfearing UK by fear-peddling politicians and reality-defying royalists.

The price of the blunder, according to the Financial Times, has been steep. According to a recent academic report, exports from the UK since 2016 are down an average of 17% while imports, because of rising protectionism, are down an even bigger 23%.

Moreover, since 2016, the EU economy has grown 24% while the UK GDP has increased an embarrassingly tiny 6%.

A final comparison is even more stark. One year before Brexit, Greece, another EU member nation, faced a UK-like choice: leave the EU and its tough management of the Greek economy or stay in the multinational group, clean out its systemic corruption and rebuild under EU rules and loans.

Unlike the UK in 2016, though, Greece followed its EU leaders. "Greece was rational," Bloomberg noted bluntly a year ago, "and since then its economy expanded 11%, representing a 1.53% annual rate, easily exceeding the UK's anemic 0.7% annual growth."

Moving forward, nations trading with the United States, Politico suggested March 17, face a similarly stark choice. As the White House continues to escalate tariff talk, countries can choose to follow the recent Mexico model, a slow approach that favors "laying low and buying time," or the Canadian method that's "more confrontational, including immediate trade retaliation."

The latter drew "swift White House retribution," and the former "doesn't have much more to show for it." That's because trade wars forget all the chest-beating, socialmedia rants, or hockey metaphors – have no winners. Losers, however, are everywhere.

Sooner or later, all aggrieved parties in this fight will learn that lesson. Again.

Right now, however, Politico goes on to report, farmers and "some agriculture groups are growing tired of feeling like their private requests for exemptions or support ... are failing to result in any tangible change."

Go figure.

moving ahead with the project, required by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to be completed by November of this year. Instead, should funding be approved in the next fiscal year, that money will be used to pay down a \$2 million loan the city intends to take from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In other business at its March 18 meeting, the council said it is researching options to replace ERP Pro 10 software licensed through Tyler Technologies. ERP Pro 10 handles fi-

nancial tasks of small to mid-size local governments, including payroll, utility billing and property tax management, but will be phased out as of December 2026. Tyler Technologies offered another option with a price tag significantly higher than what the city pays now and wants an answer by June. Council members are contacting other municipalities to check for other software options.

The city also agreed to pay an additional \$36,220 to pave privately owned land adjacent to the city park-

ing lot located south of Main Street. Last month, the council approved a \$279,692.51 bid from Stark Excavating of Bloomington to pave the cityowned part of the lot. The additional money will pave parcels owned by business owners Jody McKinty, Terri Bednar, Alan Howerton and Emma Manness.

The council said it will offset the cost with funds for street maintenance and sidewalk funds not already earmarked. That way all the work can be finished at once.

### Princeville board increasing sewer fees

For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE – Sewer fees in Princeville are going up. The only question is how high.

That might be answered starting at 7 tonight, March 27, when the Princeville Village Board is expected to meet in special session to authorize a rise. Money the village tax-incrementfinancing districts generate probably will mitigate a sewer-rate maximum hike, according to municipal of-

When it met March 18, the board approved an agreement with the Illinois **Environmental Protection** Agency that includes a \$6.2 million loan for longplanned improvements to the village sewer system and wastewater treatment plants. A rate increase is intended to help pay off the

"We've been warning people for a long time this is coming," Trustee Rick Pope said. "It's not like we came up with this out of the clear blue."

If the loan term is 20 years, sewer prices per customer might increase \$38 a month, according to Kevan Cooper, president of Bruner, Cooper & Zuck, Inc., a Galesburg-based engineering firm. A 30year loan might result in a \$27-a-month increase.

Currently, the Princeville monthly sewer fee is \$13, plus \$5 for each 1,000 gallons of water used. Increases are to take effect once the project is completed, probably in the autumn of 2026, Village Public Works Superintendent Chad Gardner said.

The figures Cooper presented are based on spreading the cost equally among all sewer customers. They do not account for TIF funds that might be contributed toward the loan, something that has been part of the plan, according to Gardner and Trustee Ron Delbridge

"Before we say we're going to impose these rates, we want to see what we can use from TIF to offset the raises," Village President Jeff Troutman

The IEPA is requiring an expedited timetable for such moves, according to Cooper and Gardner. That's what is prompting the additional board meeting before the next regular one, set for April 7.

Construction bids are expected to be awarded May 5, with work probably commencing in July. Both pumping stations in town, which Gardner said date to 1968, are to be replaced and two excess-flow lagoons are to be constructed, among other

The project is designed to prevent Princeville residents from getting sewage in their basements during

heavy rains, Gardner said. The IEPA put the village on notice about 3½ years ago regarding that.

"For years they knew that it happened," Gardner said. "Now they said, 'OK, we're done. We've let it go long enough. We've got to start doing something, and you've got to get it taken care of."

Earlier this month, the board approved increases in water rates and fees, effective April 1. Delbridge and Gardner acknowledged Princeville water and sewer customers might be in for sticker shock.

"I think even with the smaller amount, it could be a hardship for some people," Delbridge said.

In other water-sewer news, the board approved a \$250 bill credit for Bob Koller, owner of the Northwest Estates development. Village officials notified

Koller about an aboveground water leak Feb. 28 at 217 N. Stanton Ave. that spilled about 138,000 gallons into a cornfield.


The leak resulted in Koller's water bill being about \$500 higher than usual, Troutman said. Koller requested a onetime reduction. Troutman said the board usually doesn't offer relief from water and sewer charges, but this was a special case.

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### More seats than candidates for Brimfield board

BRIMFIELD – The Brimfield School Board election April 1 features an abundance of open seats and a dearth of candidates.

The only candidates on the ballot for four spots are one incumbent, Board President Steve Updyke, and one newcomer, Ashlee Stabler. Current board members Mark Bell, Katie Kappes and Vice President Jason Snyder are not seeking re-election.

Brimfield Superintendent Chad Jones is soliciting applicants for the two post-election board openings. The goal is to have those positions appointed officially in May.

Appointees would serve until the April 2027 election, unlike the four-

year terms for which Stabler and Updyke are running. All four seats will be up for election in 2029.

Updyke doesn't believe it will be difficult to fill the vacancies.

"I think there will be enough people that think it's a two-year commitment, they'll get on and see if they like it," he said. "There are other districts in the same boat."

That was the case with Kappes. She was appointed in 2021, then ran and won in 2023 to complete the four-year term. But the current situation is a big change from that Brimfield board election.

In 2023, eight candidates competed for three four-year terms. Nick Butterfield, Rachel Blodgett and Constance Monk were the top three vote-getters, in order. None of the full-term incumbents – Brent Graham, Todd Johnson and Patrick Meyer – ran for reelection.

"Last time it was a lot of COVIDrelated stuff that drove people to run. I think it's settled down since then," said Updyke, who has served on the board eight years, the past four as president. He is a global account manager with The Sherwin-Williams Co., focused on Caterpillar Inc.

Stabler is an attorney with Whitney & Potts Ltd. of Elmwood. She has no public-office experience.

"I believe in education, and I believe in supporting our teachers so that they can best educate our kids," Stabler stated.

Several who spoke at the March 11 meeting criticized Humphreys and the board for not communicating better and for a lack of upkeep at the cemetery after Nauman was let go.

Countered Humphreys, "The board has heeded the advice of our attorney by not speaking publicly about what was going on because

Mixed in with all that is the race for supervisor.

Humphreys, who has lived in Princeville since 1994, has a job as a social worker with at-risk youth. She has two children.

Since last April, Humphreys said she has connected with other township supervisors and clerks to better learn the job. She also attended an annual township conference and is a member of the Peoria County Township Supervisors group.

One of her main goals is to save taxpayers money, and she said an intergovernmental agreement signed with Road Commissioner Darrell Fuchs is accomplishing that. Instead of paying \$120 every time snowplowing is needed, Fuchs handles plowing and is reimbursed only for gas.

Humphreys also hopes to start a diaper program for township residents and to bring more resources into the area for seniors.

She has already enrolled Princeville Township in the Dolly Parton Imagination Library program, through which children under the age of 5 receive one free book per month. Sign-up information is available at Princeville Village Hall and at Lillie M. Evans Library in Princeville.

Rasmussen said the cemetery dispute led him to run for the supervisor position.

"I decided to attend a

township meeting back in January and, after I attended that meeting, it was apparent to me that there seemed to be a little chaos going on," he said. "The more I've experienced in the last three months, the more apparent it has become to me that something needs to change."

A former lieutenant in the U.S. Navy who has lived for 35 years in Princeville, Rasmussen has family ties to the community dating back to his grandparents, who farmed in the area. He and his wife raised three children who attended Princeville schools. He has also worked as an engineer for the Illinois Department of Transportation and as a manager in the digital-technology group at Caterpillar Inc.

Rasmussen said his platform is to restore order and common sense to the township. He would also like the township to have a Facebook page or website to increase communication.

"It shouldn't be this hard," he said. "There needs to be a means to communicate to the community and be responsive to their needs and requests."

Rasmussen said he also hopes to see the cemetery board restored, since Peggy Delbridge is the lone member still serving.

Humphreys said the fate of the cemetery board is up to the township board to decide.





### Brimfield schools buy 3 used vehicles

A well-worn black minivan the Brimfield School District has been using is heading to the motor-vehicle equivalent of the glue factory. Its retirement was assured March 19, when the Brimfield School Board voted to purchase three used vehicles for the district's fleet.

The \$40,000 deal with Heinz Bus Co. of Brimfield gives the district a 2015 Dodge Grand Caravan minivan that has 102,000 miles, a 2019 Grand Carvan that has 52,000 miles and a 2019 Thomas Built 25-passenger bus that has 96,000 miles.

According to Superintendent Chad Jones, the district has been negotiating with Heinz the past few years about a possible purchase. This opportunity arose the week before the board meeting. Jones called the purchase a need, not a

want, and a win-win for the approved the trip, which indistrict and for Heinz.

The vehicles will help transport special-education students, among other uses. The district special-ed transportation needs keep increasing, Jones said.

"We need vehicles to be able to get our kids where they need to go," he said. "Having vans and activity buses provides more flexibility for us, because you don't need a bus license to drive (them)."

Jones referred to the tobe-decommissioned minivan by its nickname. It's been used as a backup or for short runs.

Last year, the district purchased a new minivan for \$50,000. Obtaining three vehicles for less than the price of one fits the district budget and should complete fleet needs for now, Jones suggested.

A regular school bus and an activity bus are to transport high school seniors on their class trip May 9 to Six Flags St. Louis. The board

cludes two chaperones.

Regarding personnel, the board approved tenure for four teachers: Karen Barrow, Josh Clarke, Ryan Gilles and Melissa Ross. Tenure is to take effect at the start of the 2025-26 academic year. Other teachers in various stages of probation were approved as well.

The board also voted to appoint Robert Hostert as a high school special-ed teacher for 2025-26, Richard Monk as a high school cafeteria worker, Jeremy Przybylo as a high school softball volunteer coach and Brett Cahill and Josh Latour as high school bassfishing volunteer coaches.

In April, board members probably will consider construction bids for a bus barn to be built along Brimfeld-Jubilee Road east of the high school, Jones said. Fehr Graham Engineering & Environmental of East Peoria is handling the bidding process under a contract the board approved in January.

Also likely up for board consideration next month is a deal with the Special Education Association of Peoria County for the district to build two modular classrooms to house morning and afternoon preschool classes for SEAPCO-member districts.



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### Peoria Co. landfill changes

PEORIA – The Peoria City-County Landfill will reach capacity soon. The landfill closure will not impact residents who have waste picked up curbside under a contract through their municipality. It will impact residents who utilize the free-load program, bring construction debris or dispose of large items at the landfill.

The last day for freeload and cash customers at the Peoria City-County Landfill is April 19. After that, residents may take a weekly free load to the following locations:

- Indian Creek Landfill: 24501 McMullen Rd., Hopedale, Monday-Friday, 7 a.m.-3:30 p.m., Saturday, 7
- Wigand Transfer Station: 19908 N. Illinois Route 29, Chillicothe, Monday-Friday, 7 a.m.-3 p.m.

The free-load program is for household waste and will transition to a new transfer station in Pottstown once it comes online, likely in 2026. County residents are allowed one free load per week, not to exceed 580 pounds.

After April 19, construc-

tion debris may be taken

- Indian Creek Landfill: 24501 McMullen Rd., Hopedale

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




Next up for R-W is a Lincoln Trail home matchup vs. Knoxville on Saturday.

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
