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Galva contacting residents about repairs

GALVA – About 54 letters have been send out to Galva residents whose properties need attention.

Police Chief Kraig Townsend told the City Council at Monday's meeting that since the city sent out the letters, several residents have called and asked questions.

Chief Townsend also reported that the 2023 squad car had an engine failure and is fully covered under the warranty. The car only had 38,000 miles on it. He said the new tasers have arrived for use by the Galva Police Department.

Every town in Henry County is going to STARCOMM radios. This will take effect

in about a month.

Chief Townsend said he is looking into more cameras at Wiley Park. He said there was a call that there were kids on the pavilion roof at 2 a.m. and windows were broken in the restrooms at Washington Park recently.

Mayor Rich Volkert said there is more trash every morning in Wiley Park than there has been in the past.

Second Ward Alderman Jim Hartman reported the mesh for a privacy fence at the old Bixby Zimmer building needs attention on the north side of the property. He also asked about the fence the owner was going to install on the property. City Administrator David Dyer said the city

paid for half of the fence and the owner never picked it up at a local company. Dyer will check on the situation.

Two proclamations were read:

- Declared April 3 as Junior Achievement day.
- Declared April 25 as Arbor Day in Galva, encouraging all residents to plant a tree and maintain the trees on their property.

Resident Dustin Williams asked if anyone from the city had reached out about repairs to the slide at Wiley Park.

Dyer said he had contacted an individual who wanted \$25,000-\$35,000 to replace part of the slide after it was damaged by a *Continued on Page 2*

Top honor for Best

Girl Scouts honor Stark Co. senior for developing digital music library



4365 has earned the Girl
Scout Gold Award, the
highest honor in Girl
Scouting, for developing
a digital music library to
support area music
teachers.

The Gold Award is the highest achievement a Girl Scout can receive, earned by girls in grades 9-12 who demonstrate extraordinary leadership and create a significant and sustainable positive change in a community.

The Stark County High School senior wanted to make a meaningful impact on her school's music program, and knew digital PDFs of sheet music were becoming more popular and easier to manage than physical copies stored in cabinets.

To help her school's music program more efficiently find songs for its ensemble, Best created a digital music library by digitizing nearly 300 pieces of existing school sheet music and organizing them by title, composer/arranger and file number of any physical copies.

Judge releases Deck from jail

Case dismissed for no probable cause

TOULON – Caleb A. Deck, 48, appeared in Stark's Circuit Court Friday, April 4 for a preliminary hearing on his charges of felony intimidation/physical harm. Deck was arrested March 27 and incarcerated at the Bureau County Jail.

Circuit Court Judge James A. Mack heard arguments from both defense and prosecuting attorneys concerning this newest charge against Deck.


"Caleb Deck's actions were not innocent. Why couldn't he have asked her while she was at the DMV?" Stark County State's Attorney Austin King stated, regarding Deck going to a DMV employee's Wyoming residence to inquire about an alleged lost cat.

Deck's Public Defender Robert M. McBride argued, "Intimidation is a threat verbally or physically. We can't substitute a thought into a crime. None of the specifics are relevant."

King offered no rebuttal.

McBride then listed seven points about why the intimidation case should be dismissed. King offered no response in argument for the judge to consider.

Mack therefore ruled, "No probable cause is found and this case is dismissed.'

McBride then requested the pretrial release for Deck be revisited. Mack again paused for a lengthy period of time after King said Deck allegedly committed a new offense and that he should be kept in cus-

Mack ordered Deck to be released but with a curfew, placed on GPS monitoring and to have no contact with the DMV employees. Deck was transported back to Bureau County

Jail to be processed for pre-trial release and a monitoring device placed on his ankle later that evening.

Deck's bench trial on his traffic charges will be scheduled at his April 25 court appearance and a review of his remaining cases will be

Continued from Page 1 fire. Dyer noted that the company wanted \$83,000 to make several repairs to the playground equipment.

He said the city is waiting to replace the entire playground as soon as money is available. The city is expecting funding from a new solar project going up in Galva.

Cemetery plot rates will increase by 25% on May 1. Each space goes from \$1,000 to \$1,250. Anyone interested in a space before the increase should call

City Hall. Other cemetery costs will also increase.

First Ward Alderman Jeff Olson asked what the rules are for electric bicycles. He was told they are legal on the streets but for certain classes of the bikes you must have a license to operate. Many electric bicycles don't require a license or insurance to operate them, according to Chief Townsend.





One of President Donald Trump's strengths in negotiations is his ability to disrupt or unsettle the other side during negotiations.

Skilled negotiators always know their final objective. It is to their benefit to make that goal uncertain to the other side. Trump is a master at keeping his final objective hidden at the front side until after his opponent has made a move that can be used against the opponent.

I believe Trump's tariff demands are simply a part of his trade negotiations at a higher level. Trump is always looking for

leverage against an opponent and, historically, he has proven his

skill at getting that advantage. Presidents in this country have lost much of their political power during second terms because everyone knows the president's time in office is numbered and a new guy will be moving in. Presidents have their greatest clout during their first two years in office.

Trump is now in his second term. Normally, his political clout would be starting to slide, but we have had some crazy elections of recent date. Trump is proving his detractors

My father's rural ethic harkened back to his ancestor's view. In the six decades we shared, I never once heard him covet any neighbor's land, machinery or success. Not once, not anything.

Part of the reason may have been what he already had; too many cows, too many acres, too much work and too little time. A bigger part, however, likely was contentment; he simply didn't want much more of anything, except time to go fishing.

And that included partners. In the late 1970s I asked him what might happen if "the farm" borrowed money to expand its dairy herd to boost farm income so I might return.

"What might happen," he said almost reflexively but firmly, "is that that news would be on the front page of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch the next morning."

The answer, deeply in character for a German Lutheran farmer, was one

I give very little credence to Trump seriously seeking a third term, but I do admire the theatrics.

The same is true in his treatment of Bill Maher, a left-leaning comedian with a true insight into politics. Maher is funny and articulate, even with a potty mouth. What sets him apart is his ability to discern political opinions without regard to his own political preferences.

While Maher has voiced his disagreement with the far left of the Democratic Party, he has also consistently opposed Trump's political positions in a direct and forceful manner. Trump recently invited Maher to dinner at the White House. Why? Trump does enjoy a debate, but this is more than that. As stated above, Trump seeks to sidetrack his opposition. Bringing Maher to the White House gives more attention to Trump and maintains his clout.

Discussions of third terms and having Maher over for dinner are simply an art form for Trump. He is the consummate politician. Enjoy the theatrics, but keep your eye on the agenda and see how it is progressing.

Family lore has it that sometime in the pre-refrigeration days of the late 19th century, my forefathers dug a small cave into a steep hillside on their adjacent farms to store several barrels of home-brewed beer.

Like the family's suds, the cave was cool, dark and prized.

This being southern Illinois, ho-

wever, a minor earthquake one day sent the roof of the underground rathskeller onto the barrels of beer. Soon their hoppy contents were flowing into the nearby creek. A minor catas-

trophe, yes, but the brothers and their stein-tippling friends weren't the only ones without their favorite beverage.

With a slow-moving creek now half-full of sweet-smelling beer, milk production of the neighborhood's cows soon dropped low enough to worry downstream neighbors.

Within a week, though, the creek flowed clear again, the neighborhood's cows were back to their regular, sober routine and my family was done with its beer-making hobby for

I once asked my father if the tale was true. It was, he replied, and after the collapse his great-grandfather

we did not argue, debate or discuss. I took it as intended, a clear "No," and soon thereafter the lovely Catherine and I went back to the university with an eye for another line of work.

Equally unsurprising was that neither Dad nor I ever mentioned the topic again. He went about his life's work and so did I - after I stumbled upon it.

A key part of his work was neighborliness. For example, a neighbor with a carload of growing children often stopped at the dairy barn twice, sometimes three times a week to get a couple of gallons of milk for, well, a very long time. Decades.

When they did, Dad would fill their one-gallon glass jars while the children made a small show of adding a pencil mark to their already foot-long tab in a nearby cabinet.

When Dad retired from dairying 25 years later, the tab, like the cabinet, simply disappeared. Again, the longgone milk and long-lost tab were never mentioned.

It was a hallmark of my father's unwritten rural rules: Among our neighbors, tabs, kept or unkept, were meaningless. Only one tab mattered to him, and it wasn't of this world.

And that, too, he believed, was already forgiven.

Shipp gets 12 years on child-porn plea

TOULON – Matthew R. Shipp, 21, of rural Toulon, pleaded guilty to one count of child pornography in a fully negotiated disposition plea deal.

Circuit Court Judge James A. Mack sentenced Shipp April 4 to 12 years in prison on the Class X felony. Nine other counts were dismissed per the deal.

Shipp was credited with 508 days served in Henry County Jail and according to court documents he must be imprisoned 50% of the 12 years

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per the deal versus the 85% standard Class X felony incarceration time in the Illinois Department of Corrections

Mack told Shipp that he could reduce the six years further by taking classes while in prison.

Asked if he had a statement, Shipp said, "No."

After he is released from prison, Shipp will be placed on parole three years to life as determined by a prison review board.

Shipp was initially arrested Nov. 15, 2023, at his rural Toulon res-

idence and charged with five counts of child pornography distribution. Five additional counts were filed later. Shipp admitted to investigators that he had been sharing child porn online for a year.

Shipp was transported back to Henry County Jail to await his transfer to IDOC. His defense counsel was Douglas Johnson while Shantikumar Kulkarni was the state's prosecutor

Shipp did not transmit child porn across the state's boundary, which would have made his charges federal.

BISHOP HILL – The return of spring will be welcomed during an ancient Swedish traditional Valborg bonfire at the Vasa National Archives on April 25 at 6 p.m.

Yard games and activities will be available to the whole family. Hot dogs, buns, coffee, iced tea and hot chocolate will be provided. This event is free and open to the public. Visitors are encouraged to bring a dish to share.

In the event of rain, the festivities

will be moved to the Vasa National Archive's second floor.

The history of Valborg goes back to Viking era. Pre-Christian Swedes held spring bonfires to herald the onset of the growth season. It attempted to ward off evil, ensure fertility and cleanse the land of the dead of winter. Today, it marks the gateway to longer and warmer days.

Early Christians merged the pagan spring bonfires with celebrations of Saint Walpurga, who was canonized on May 1 ca. 870.


Valborg continued to be useful celebration into the early modern era. Swedish farmers kept their livestock penned up in barns until early May to protect them from weather and predators. Farming villages and farmers used the Valborg bonfires and celebratory noises to scare away predators. A few days after being let out of the barn, livestock was herded to summer pastures.

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Sheep producers have 'bright' options

Sunshine might help increase sheep populations in Illinois, according to an Ohio sheep producer.

Camren Maierle, an American Lamb Board member, showed Illinois sheep producers photos of his sheep grazing on Ohio pastures in a field of solar panels. Solar grazing has become a big part of his business.

"There could be a decent amount of this in Illinois in the next couple of years," Maierle told Illinois lamb and wool producers at the Sheep Industry Day. There are about 55,000 sheep in Illinois, according to USDA.

Maierle predicts there will be more large-scale solar operations because of energy demand. "I want sheep on every one of those sites that are conducive to having sheep on them," he said.

"I'm not promoting solar panels, but if they go in, I want sheep there," he said virtually from Ohio at the University of Illinois event on March 22.

He sees it as a huge opportunity for sheep producers. "Our ability to capitalize on affordable feed is huge," he said of combining solar power and production agriculture, known as agrivoltaics.

Sheep are the animal of choice for solar grazing because they "fit" and cause less wear on the equipment than cattle or goats. "It's a risk mitigation industry," Maierle said

Usually, a clover mix is used to graze three to five ewes per acre. Maierle said his goal, on well-managed pastures, is to graze eight to 10 sheep per acre.

He estimates that if a sheep producer grazes 500 solar acres, he or she could earn half a million dollars with 2,000 ewes if the lease was for \$350 per acre. That's not counting any lambs.

The competition for grazing solar fields isn't from neighboring sheep farmers, it is mowing companies, he said. Solar companies pay land-scapers about \$480 per acre per year to keep the weeds down. Comparatively, sheep grazers might charge \$300 to \$500.

"I offer an improved service of soil health and management for equal pay," Maierle said. "Energy companies eat

that up."

Challenges for grazing sheep on a solar farm compared to a traditional lot or pasture include movement of solar panels and managing wires sheep must traverse.

As for marketing increased Illinois lamb production, Maierle said homegrown lamb could displace some of the lamb imported today. Between 60% and 70% of lamb consumed in the state is imported from New Zealand and Australia.

To help farmers take advantage of the opportunities, the American Lamb Board and the American Sustainability Growers Association (ASGA), are teaming up to offer solar grazing certification programs. Maierle will be

one of the trainers at the new ASGA solar grazing training program June 11-13 in Kankakee. The three-day workshop costs \$200.

"The certification program can help a sheep producer become a valuable service provider," said Maierle, who noted there are things farmers will learn as a sheep producer at the event, even if they aren't solar grazing now.



Bill would ban Midgets as Freeburg mascot

SPRINGFIELD - The House passed a bill Tuesday that would ban public schools from using mascots that discriminate against people with disabilities.

The bill, if signed into law, currently would affect just one high school in St. Clair County.

Freeburg Community High School's mascot, the Midgets, is considered a slur used against people with dwarfism.

The school's administration did not reply to a request for comment.

Under House Bill 3527, the school could continue using "uniforms or other materials" it bought before the bill was passed until Sept. 1, 2028, as long as it already picked a new mascot, according to the bill's language. The bill doesn't clarify what repercussions, if any, the school would face if it didn't change its mascot.

The bill passed through the House on Tuesday with a vote of 71-38.

The mascot was chosen during the 1930s when a reporter coined the term because the tallest member of the basketball team was just 5 feet, 10 inches tall, according to the school's website.

The bill's main sponsor, Rep. Maurice West, D-Rockford, said the name was chosen during a time when freak shows, the exhibitions of human "abnormalities," were popular.

School alumni, members of the Freeburg community, along with activists and organizations, filed almost 1,000 "witness slips" to the General Assembly for and against the bill.

Opponents said the school's mascot is a tradition, and there aren't any students with dwarfism in the school who might be affected by the mascot.

However, Shelby Holloway, a woman with dwarfism and a national advocate and co-director of Mascots

Matter, said students at Freeburg aren't the only ones affected.

"This is a statewide issue, and it deserves a statewide solution," said Holloway during a March 20 committee meeting. "The Freeburg mascot does not just affect the students who attend that school. Every time a Freeburg sports team travels, its mascot's name is displayed in the schools across Illinois."

Rep. Kevin Schmidt, R-Millstadt, represents Freeburg and argued against the bill on the House floor.


Schmidt and other opponents said the school board should be in charge of changing the mascot name, and the General Assembly is infringing on other governing bodies.

The bill still has to go through the

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Bill would prohibit move-in fees for renters

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois House of Representatives passed a slew of bills on Tuesday.

One measure, House Bill 3564, prohibits a landlord from imposing a move-in fee for renters. It also limits fees for the late payment of rent to a one-time \$15 fee for every \$1,500 of rent. Democratic state Rep. Rita

Mayfield, D-Waukegan, said that amount is pointless.

"As a landlord, I'm going to tell you that \$15 is not punitive enough to force anyone to pay their rent on time," said Mayfield. "We have a lot of problems with individuals who don't want to pay their rent and having the ability to charge a daily late fee actually spurs them to pay their

The measure passed by a vote of 61-43 and is headed to the Senate for consideration.

The House also approved the Illinois Sexual Assault Survivor Treatment Act in House Bill 2805 sponsored by House Minority Leader Tony McCombie, R-Savanna, which prohibits insurance co-pays for sexual assault exams. The measure now heads to the Senate.





Bundle items when necessary so they may be picked up in a timely fashion.

THE FOLLOWING WILL NOT BE PICKED UP:

- Electrical items Landscape waste Hazerdous material as in kerosene, fuel oil, paint thinners, batteries and tires . No Bricks, building materials and long poles as these items damage the garbage truck.
- *Murphy's has the right to refuse to pick up any piles of garbage that is larger than 4ft. by 4ft. pile or contained items mixed in that are not allowed.*

Any large items set out without the required bulk tags will be in violation of City Ordinance and subject to possible fines.

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
