Troutman elected in Princeville

PRINCEVILLE – The race for Princeville village president was unusual, according to both candidates. But the result wasn't unusual at all.

For the third consecutive time, Princeville voters chose Jeff Troutman to lead their village government for four years. Unofficial results from the election April 1 had Troutman receiving 118 votes (56%) and challenger Rick Pope, a village trustee, receiving 93 votes (44%).

During and after the campaign, Pope and Troutman said they weren't going to let it affect their years-long friendship. Pope suggested one of his main motivations was to see Troutman

Newcomers elected

Farmington elects 2 ex-teachers to board

There will be two new faces on the Farmington School Board, and a few other newcomers also won election on April 1.

In the vote for the Farmington Board of Education, newcomer Ann Riccioni was top vote-getter, with 566 ballots cast with her name on them.

Incumbent Keith Deppermann was next-highest, with 515 votes, and newcomer Allison Smith won the third spot with 424 votes.

Both Riccioni and Smith have experience teaching in the Farmington school district. They outpaced incumbents Dustin Blunier (350) (350 votes) and Daniel Gorsuch (328), as well as Farmington Police Chief Chris Darsham (262).

In Princeville Township, write-in candidate Terry Ras-

mussen received 133 votes to 58 for Kathy Humphreys, who had been serving as appointed supervisor.

Not all winners were new, though, as longtime Salem Township Supervisor Chris Bewley rebuffed a challenge from Ken Vallas, 108-78.

Winners in the Salem Township trustee race were Mark Kiesewetter (140), Jeffrey Johnson (139), Norlyn McCormick (109) and Paul Noe (107), ahead of Dennis Mohn (57).

In the race for four Elmwood Township trustee positions, winning candidates were William Atwood (185 votes), Kenneth Howard

Farmington JFL returning to its home field

FARMINGTON – The Farmington JFL is returning to its home field – and just in time, according to league president Tom Oldfield.

"We're glad to be back where we should be, especially when we're getting ready to celebrate 100 years of Farmington football," said Oldfield, noting the first season of high school football was 1926.

While the JFL has only been around for 20 of those seasons, most have been at the former Farmington

High School football field. After a one-year absence, that's where the JFL will return, thanks to a lease and sublease approved at Monday's meeting of the Farmington City Council.

Under terms of the five-year lease, the city has been named as an additional insured, alleviating insurance liability concerns of landowner Industry Technical Solutions. Those concerns had ended the JFL's tenure at the field prior to last season. The league then spent last summer and fall practicing on the grounds of Farm-

ington CUSD 265 while playing games on the road.

This year, Farmington will practice and play on its home field.

"Thank you guys for your persistence and patience," Farmington Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam said. "The city is here to help."

In lieu of rent, the city has agreed to mow the entire property. Stufflebeam said the JFL will also assist with mowing.

In other business, Bryan Green and Wyatt Decker were sworn in as full-

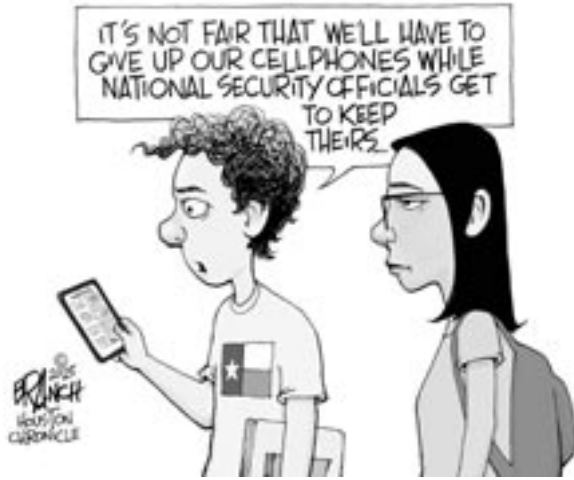

Trump uses theatrics to achieve his agenda

One of President Donald Trump's strengths in negotiations is his ability to disrupt or unsettle the other side during negotiations.

Skilled negotiators always know their final objective. It is to their benefit to make that goal uncertain to the other side. Trump is a master at keeping his final objective hidden at the front side until after his opponent has made a move that can be used against the opponent.

I believe Trump's tariff demands are simply a part of his trade negotiations at a higher level. Trump is always looking for leverage against an opponent and, historically, he has proven his skill at getting that advantage.

Presidents in this country have lost much of their political power during second terms because everyone knows that the president's time in office is numbered and a new guy will be moving in. Presidents have their greatest clout during their first two years in office.

Trump is now in his second term of office. Normally, his political clout would be starting to slide, but we have had some crazy elections of recent date. Trump is proving his detractors wrong and appears to be gaining in that commodity called po-

litical clout. He is the master of keeping the topic focused on Trump personally until he is able to come up with the resolution to an issue that he wants.

Current talk of a third term for Trump appears to be just a tactic to maintain his agenda as he starts his second term.

George Washington set the standard by refusing to run for a third term and leaving office after eight years. That informal standard was followed by successive presidents until Franklin Roosevelt. Roosevelt was president during World War II and decided that it would be best if the nation simply retained its current president. He succeeded and was elected four times.

After WWII, the nation and Congress really started to question if any president should have an unlimited stay in office. Congress passed what would be the 22nd Amendment to the Constitution, limiting the time in office for any president to two elected terms. States ratified the amendment in 1951 and it is the current law.

But Trump has allowed pundits to speculate on how a third term could be achieved. By allowing discussion on this third-term idea, his opponents are distracted and Trump is pushing his agenda. It is the same bargaining

tactics that Trump has always adhered to.

I give very little credence to Trump seriously seeking a third term, but I do admire the theatrics.

The same is true in his treatment of Bill Maher, a left-leaning comedian with a true insight into politics. Maher is funny and articulate, even with a potty mouth. What sets him apart is his ability to discern political opinions without regard to his own political preferences.

While Maher has voiced his disagreement with the far left of the Democratic Party, he has also consistently opposed Trump's political positions in a direct and forceful manner. Trump recently invited Maher to dinner at the White House. Why? Trump does enjoy a debate, but this is more than that. As stated above, Trump seeks to sidetrack his opposition. Bringing Maher to the White House gives more attention to Trump and maintains his clout.

Discussions of third terms and having Maher over for dinner are simply an art form for Trump and his agenda. Trump is the consummate politician. Enjoy the theatrics of Trump, as it is great theater, but keep your eye on the agenda and see how it is progressing.

You mess up the creek, you clean the creek

Family lore has it that sometime in the pre-refrigeration days of the late 19th century, my forefathers dug a small cave into a steep hillside on their adjacent farms to store several barrels of home-brewed beer.

Like the family's suds, the cave was cool, dark and prized.

This being southern Illinois, however, a minor earthquake one day sent the roof of the underground rathskeller onto the barrels of beer. Soon their hoppy contents were flowing into the nearby creek.

A minor catastrophe, yes, but the brothers and their stein-tipping friends weren't the only ones without their favorite beverage.

With a slow-moving creek now half-full of sweet-smelling beer, milk production of the neighborhood's cows soon dropped low enough to worry downstream neighbors.

Within a week, though, the creek flowed clear again, the neighborhood's cows were back to their regular, sober routine and my family was done with its beer-making hobby for good.

I once asked my father if the tale was true. It was, he replied, and after the collapse his great-grandfather "apologized to all the neighbors for the trouble he had caused.

He believed that if you messed up the creek, you cleaned up the creek."

It's the rural version of the Golden Rule: Do unto your neighbors' farms that you'd have your neighbors to do unto yours.

At least it seemed that way in the late 1800s when farms were smaller, neighbors were more numerous and the height of farm technology included a personal beer cellar.

My father's rural ethic harkened back to his ancestor's view. In the six decades we shared, I never once heard him covet any neighbor's land, machinery or success. Not once, not anything.

Part of the reason may have been what he already had; too many cows, too many acres, too much work and too little time. A bigger part, however, likely was contentment; he simply didn't want much more of anything, except time to go fishing.

And that included partners. In the late 1970s I asked him what might happen if "the farm" borrowed money to expand its dairy herd to boost farm income so I might return.

"What might happen," he said almost reflexively but firmly, "is that that news would be on the front page of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch the next morning."

The answer, deeply in character for a German Lutheran farmer, was one we did not argue, debate or discuss. I took it as intended, a clear "No," and soon thereafter the

lovely Catherine and I went back to the university with an eye for another line of work.

Equally unsurprising was that neither Dad nor I ever mentioned the topic again. He went about his life's work and so did I – after I stumbled upon it.

A key part of his work was neighborliness. For example, a neighbor with a carload of growing children often stopped at the dairy barn twice, sometimes three times a week to get a couple of gallons of milk for, well, a very long time. Decades.

When they did, Dad would fill their one-gallon glass jars while the children made a small show of adding a pencil mark to their already foot-long tab in a nearby cabinet.

When Dad retired from dairying 25 years later, the tab, like the cabinet, simply disappeared. Again, the long-gone milk and long-lost tab were never mentioned.

It was a hallmark of my father's unwritten rural rules: Among our neighbors, tabs, kept or unkept, were meaningless. Only one tab mattered to him, and it wasn't of this world.

And that, too, he believed, was already forgiven.

Brimfield will raise water rates by 10%

BRIMFIELD – The village will raise water rates by 10% in advance of a \$1 million project to replace a ground tank.

The rate increase will start June 1 and is not an increase on the entire bill. The sewer rate, garbage and recycling rates will remain the same, and only the water portion of the bill will see an increase.

The Village Board on Monday approved another 5% increase in 2026, a 3% raise in 2027 and a 2% raise in 2028.

Village President Danny Fishel said he knows every dollar matters to the citizens of Brimfield right now as every dollar matters to the village as well. He said that the village has been working with Dan Good, a local

engineer, and has done the equivalent of three months of work in two weeks in a bid to qualify for Illinois Environmental Protection Agency funding for the water-tank project.

“We want to get it done long before it’s a crisis,” Fishel said.

Billing for water this month was around \$14,000. With a 10% increase, that would be an additional \$1,400 a month, or \$16,800 for the year, to put toward the tank project.

The board discussed applying for participation in the Peoria Rural Enterprise Zone program. Currently, the program only covers about 20 square miles of scattered parcels. But Peoria County is offering an opportunity for expansion through an amendment to its program.

Incentives for inclusion into the program include sales-tax exemp-

tions on building materials and property-tax abatements on improvements and would apply to properties within the bounds of a map drawn by the board.

Participation by each individual within the bounds of the map is optional, but the program itself is meant to inspire property improvements within the community. The board plans on having a map drawn by the next meeting.

Resealing was approved for all of Galena Avenue and three blocks of Clinton Street from North Jackson Street to North Washington Street. The project will be put out for bids.

The board also approved the appointment of Kevin Gilles to the Brimfield Zoning Board. One position remains open.

tions to run was to give Princeville residents a choice after Troutman had been in office eight years.

“Evidently, people are happy with Jeff,” Pope said a day after results were announced. “It kind of is what it is. Jeff hasn’t done a bad job. We had a real nice campaign, a clean one.”

Troutman concurred. “We pretty much made it clear upfront that we weren’t going to be a normal race,” Troutman said. “This is what I stand for, this is what he stands for, and let the public decide. We’re not going to go out and badmouth each other. We’re going to stay friends, no matter how it winds up.”

“That’s basically what we did.”

Filling the seat Pope vacated to run for president will be Spencer Wilson, one of three people elected last week to four-year terms as trustees. Wilson received 126 votes. He finished third, behind incumbents Steven Potter (174

votes) and Teresa Gilroy (139). Challenger Branden Curtis received 83 votes.

Wilson is a former village clerk who was a trustee from 2020-21.

“Spencer is a wealth of knowledge,” Troutman said. “He was great when he served as village clerk, and when he went to trustee, he was very good. He’s thorough.”

Incumbent Village Clerk Sarah Cordis ran unopposed.

There were 221 ballots cast among 1,140 registered voters in Princeville, a 19% turnout. In 2021, with uncontested races for president and Village Board, turnout was 7%.

“It was very nice this time to have two of our three races contested,” Troutman said. “It shows that there’s other people who have an interest in the village.”

According to Pope, his advocacy for the closure of the Princeville Aquatic Center in 2023 might have hindered his presidential public appeal. No trustee voted to keep open the

pool, which village officials said was draining municipal finances. A local not-for-profit group is attempting to reopen it.

“I was one of them very adamant about closing it,” Pope said. “That might have upset the wrong people. Small-town word of mouth can lead to things. But I stood my ground on it.”

Troutman said his third-term agenda includes attracting more businesses to Princeville, including a restaurant. He cited the expansion of the West Jersey Express trucking-and-logistics firm into the old Alcoa Building Products facility at the north end of town.

Helping to shepherd a \$6.2 million sewer-improvement project, as well as determining rate increases to help pay for it, also is on Troutman’s to-do list.

“I’m very fortunate to have a board of trustees that are going to be a great group of people. There’s a lot of knowledge there,” Troutman said.

That group won’t include Pope, at least for now. He didn’t rule out a return to village government someday.

“I think I had a good four-year run,” Pope said. “I got some things accomplished and made a few enemies along the way, but that’s part of the job.”

time police officers, bringing Farmington to full staff at six officers.

Green is a Tremont High School and Illinois State University graduate who is returning for a second stint in Farmington.

Decker is a Cuba High School graduate who served in the U.S. Army from 2019-23.

"I hesitate to say we're fully staffed in our police department," Stufflebeam said.

"For now, at least," said Chief Chris Darsham.

The council also voted to approve a complete rebuild of Oak Street. The project will include redoing curbing and driveway approaches, milling the pavement surface and applying a 4-inch overlay of asphalt.

Motor Fuel Tax funds are expected to pay for about \$200,000 of the project, which has been estimated at \$415,000. Any remaining costs will come from the city's Tax Increment Finance fund.

"This allows us to go into early bidding," Stufflebeam said.

In other business, the council approved a \$2,000 agreement with Hoerr's Blacktop & Sealcoating to sealcoat and stripe lines at the downtown city parking lot located at East Fort and South Cherry streets.

Also approved was an intergovernmental agreement between the city and Farmington Township Park District. Under terms of the deal, city staff will maintain the park for \$17,000, with an additional \$6,000 buffer in place for any additional work that needs to be done.

The council passed two other ordinances: one to clear the way for the sale of a city-owned lot on West Fort Street across from the U.S. Post Office and one to amend a previous TIF agreement with Scott An-

derston.

Recommendations from the CEDC approved on Monday include \$60,000 for the Fiscal Year 2026 in-TIF redevelopment program, \$30,000 for out-of-TIF redevelopment in FY 2026 and \$75,000 for the FY 2026 facade program.

Individual awards included \$1,331.25 to Smashin Assets for fence and tree removal, \$3,915 to Sedgwick Funeral Home to sealcoat a parking lot, \$1,725 to the Moranville family for tree removal, \$2,400 to Vern Oldfield for tree removal and \$2,175 to The Smalltown Circus LLC for water drainage and a garage door.

Laurie Horton and other participants in the Canton-to-Peoria St. Jude Run received permission to collect money at four-way stops in Farmington on June 19-20 and July 10-11. Proceeds benefit St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

And Allison Smith received permission to put signs in parks promoting a school PTO golf fundraiser in September.

School traffic pattern changing in Billtown

WILLIAMSFIELD – At specific times of day, there will be a major reason not to head east on Kentucky Avenue in front of the Williamsfield school building.

Beginning with the 2025-26 academic year, Kentucky Avenue between Olive and Poplar streets is to become a one-way westbound thoroughfare from 7:30-8:30 a.m. and 2:30-3:30 p.m. on school days.

The change is designed to improve safety for students going to and coming from school, according to Sarah Hall, a Knox County Sheriff's Office deputy. The Billtown school resource officer presented her one-way proposal Monday night to the Williamsfield Village Board.

"It's so hectic in the mornings," Hall said. "Kids are being dropped off on the other side of the road, and high school kids are flying through there

(driving). All the schools in the area, if they don't have a private drive, they're all one way."

According to Hall's plan, westbound Kentucky Avenue traffic will turn south at Poplar Street, which is to be one way to Park View Street. Those dropping off or picking up children can park on the north side of Kentucky Avenue, in front of the school building. Parking will not be permitted on the south side.

"I think it's a great idea, because it's super-chaotic (now)," incoming Trustee Kyle Gibbs said. He is to take office next month after he won a board seat in the election last week.

Hall said she plans to be outside directing traffic during the one-way hours. School staff is to help students enter the building. School buses are to enter the campus from Pine Street. Along Kentucky Avenue west of Poplar Street are to be three parking spaces reserved for visitors.

According to Hall, some high school students drive 30-40 mph in that area when students are present. The speed limit then is 20 mph. Trustee Lucas Leckrone suggested police issue more citations, albeit selectively.

"From what I could find, there were about four tickets issued in the last calendar year throughout the entire town," he said. "The one worry I had was we would start ticketing parents coming the wrong direction. I didn't want to take advantage of people

trying to drop off their kids.

"If we've got kids speeding 20 over the limit, maybe those are the kids to cut off."

With Leckrone dissenting, trustees authorized spending up to \$500 for road signs that denote the changes. They also decided the village no longer will play host to paint-and-electronics recycling drives for the Macomb-based Western Illinois Regional Council & Community Action Agency.

According to Village President Robert Johnson, not-for-profit WIRC charges \$5,000 a year to haul away the items collected. The village usually has two WIRC-sponsored recycling drives annually, intended for Knox County residents. Johnson suggested most of the customers are from elsewhere.

"Since we're catering to everybody outside the village and we're paying the taxes, I don't think that's fair," he said. "If we just had it locally here and we've got a pile, I'm guessing us collecting it and taking it somewhere is less than five thousand dollars."

Among other business, the board:

- Authorized a \$1,600 deal with Supreme Radio Communications, Inc., of Peoria Heights for installation of a camera in the village police vehicle.

- Agreed to pay \$2,300 to Core & Main of Washington for two check valves for the village water plant.
- Approved selling Mark Hannifin a village-owned vacant lot on Cottonwood Court in the Ralph Norman Subdivision. The price is \$7,000. The vote was taken after trustees discussed the purchase in closed session.

- Approved a strategic plan.

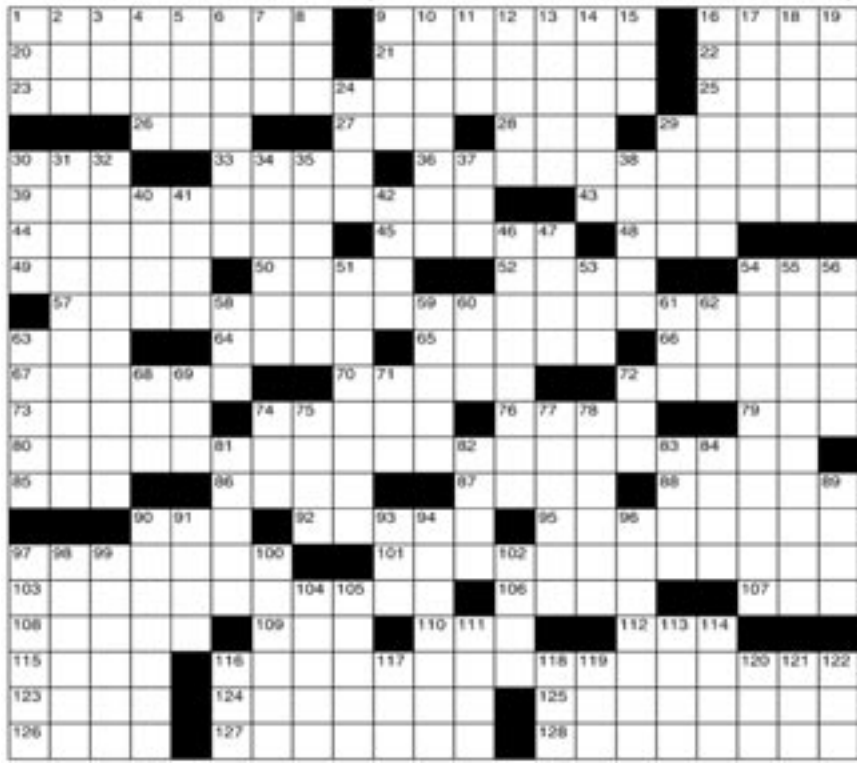

Village of Princeville Residents: Public Works will be flushing hydrants on April 21, 22, and 23.

Hydrant valves are opened and closed to control the flow of water and flush the system lines of sediment. Given the scouring velocities involved, flushing operations will likely lead to discolored water during, or immediately following the flushing.

Hydrant flushing may also result in sediment being disturbed within the water mains. Although this sediment is common and expected in any system, we are now required by Illinois EPA regulations to notify our customers that this sediment may contain lead even though our water system contains no known lead conduits.

The benefits of flushing include removal of rust and sediment, improved chlorine residual, and reduction in taste and odor; all of which can help provide high quality water to our residents.

Things you can do as a homeowner or business owner:

- If water discoloration is noticed in your residence or building, stop all water use and wait. Several hours may be required to rid the cloudiness from the water mains that serve your home or business.
- Turn on outside spigots, cold-water bathtub faucets, flush toilets, and run a cycle through the washing machine to clear the water in your service line.
- Do not wash clothes or run a dishwasher during or immediately after flushing takes place. Washing clothes with discolored water can cause laundry stains.
- Discolored water poses no threat to your health. You may wish to avoid drinking or cooking with the water.

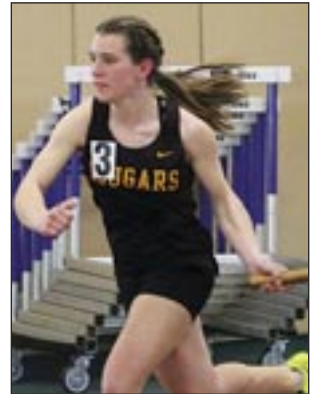
The ROWVA-Williamsfield girls team took first place and the boys were second on April 3 at the Red Storm Invite at Monmouth United High School.
