Bar closed, benefit may continue

22nd annual event raises \$111,721.06

YATES CITY – While she has closed her bar here, Jody McKinty said Tuesday she is not closing the door on another benefit for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

Fresh off a successful 22nd annual My Place-St. Jude event that generated \$111,721.06 for the charity, McKinty is not calling this the finale. She did concede Saturday's event is likely the last in Yates City.

McKinty closed the My Place bar at 107 S. Union St. that she has operated for the past 23

years, calling the decision "bittersweet." The last day of operation was June 14.

"It's with full hearts and deep gratitude that I announce the closing of My Place after 23 unforgettable years," McKinty said in a Facebook post. "This decision didn't come easy, but due to some big life changes, it's time for me to close this chapter."

McKinty said she has no plans to close her bars in Elmwood,

Brimfield OKs solar

Village expects to recoup \$419,000 cost

BRIMFIELD - The Brimfield Village Board approved spending \$419,000 to install new solar fields during a special meeting on Monday.

The board voted 4-1 in favor of a ground-mount project at the water plant and a

rooftop solar project at the new village hall. Council Man barred from Princeville school Member Rod Gilles property for one cast the lone vote year. Page 5 against the project, which is expected to be completed in November.

Illinois Solar Services will partner with Oberlander Electric of Mossville to install the solar panels.

The board had discussed the solar proposal June 2 and had more discussion Monday.

Gilles voiced concerns about investing more than \$400,000 upfront and relying on politicians for reimburse-

"What if the program is eliminated?" Gilles asked. "If something sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Administrations change and policies change."

Village President Dan Fishel said he spoke with State Rep. Travis Weaver about the

> grants involved and was assured that 70% of the return is secure and can't be stopped.

"Nothing I've looked into has

scared me away," Fishel said. "Anytime we spend money, it scares me a little, but it's a chance we take when we take on a project of this nature.

"The savings per month is something you can't ignore. We're looking at saving \$1,800 a month just in utilities. Even if we only got 70% of the grants, we would break Continued on Page 3

Farmington dealing with vacant homes

FARMINGTON - The Farmington City Council approved demolishing a decrepit, vacant house at Monday's meeting and made progress on an ordinance that might head off similar problems in the fu-

Slated for demolition in the near future is a house at 165 N. Wall St., for which real estate taxes have not been paid since the owner died in

Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam told the council the city has been mowing

the property and has nearly \$5,800 in unpaid invoices.

"It's just money we're never going to see," Stufflebeam said.

The council then approved the city buying the property for \$817 from Fulton County and paying Zack Foose \$5,000 to tear down the house.

The neighborhood would love to see it go," Stufflebeam said.

After that, the city plans to sell the

Stufflebeam said he has also made inquiries about a lot at 181 E. Court St. but said nothing can be done

there for another year.

At the urging of Police Chief Chris Darsham, the council briefly discussed amending city code to require owners of buildings that become or remain vacant to register with the city.

The ordinance would also establish fee structures for owners who do not maintain their vacant proper

The council plans to revisit the ordinance at its July meeting.

In other business on Monday, the council approved paying Maurer-Continued on Page 2

Stufflebeam said most duties of former City Manager Bettina Bohanan have been divided between himself and Administrative Assistant Shelby Zeigler.


• **FOIA** – A request for information about Bohanan's salary also sought information on salary increases given city staff in April.

The police department received raises in January, and the starting wage for an officer was increased to \$24 per hour.

The city also added Logan Van Middlesworth to a new lead position in public works, with a starting hourly wage of \$22.25. Starting pay for publicworks staffers was bumped to \$18.50.

Even after the pay increases, Stufflebeam said the city's total payroll for Fiscal Year 2026 will decline by \$35,226.40 with the elimination of the cityadminstrator position.

Council Member Allison Porter said she checked to see if village insurance would cover the new solar equipment before the meeting. She said it will. She also wanted to confirm that the solar deal would not affect a water-tank replacement project the village also has in progress.

Fishel assured her the solar project will

operate independently of the water tank, adding Weaver assured him the solar installation would not count against the village in terms of financing for the water tank.

Panels installed at the water plant are expected to have a 3.2-year return on investment while the village hall project is expected to have a seven-year return on investment due to its smaller size.

Princeville bars man from school property

For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE - A local man is banned for almost one year from Princeville School District property and events.

Following closed session, the Princeville School Board voted June 10 to exclude William Vaughn. According to Princeville Superintendent Tony Shinall, Vaughn brandished a knife during a verbal altercation with someone following a band concert May 5 at the junior high-high school.

District officials were contacted about the incident, which was recorded on video. A member of the public also addressed the board about it, Shinall said.

The ban against Vaughn is to expire May 8 of next year.

Also following closed session, the board approved hiring Steve Bosch and Ashley Reed as summer custodians at Princeville Grade School, Alex Coulter as district technology coordinator and Christina Stedman as junior-high science teacher and 8th-grade class sponsor.

Stedman resigned as a permanentsubstitute teacher, and Lindsay Garcia resigned as a high school second-shift custodian, effective July 31. Shinall announced. He also announced Bosch is to retire as a teacher after the 2027-28 school year.

The previously announced retirement of Grade School Principal Julie Bayless is effective June 30. District officials paid tribute to Bayless, who worked in Princeville for more than a decade, during the board meeting.

"She's leaving a very strong legacy in Princeville," Shinall said after the meeting. "I've never known an educator to love kids more than her. Her care for children and for staff was very genuine.

"We're going to miss her terribly, but we're also very happy for her so she can enjoy here retirement. She has most definitely earned it."

Bayless also taught in Peoria and Washington. In January, the board approved hiring Hillary Tiller as new principal, effective July 1. Tiller has been assistant director of special education in the Dunlap School District.

Before it went into closed session, the board approved \$4,321.41 in additional pay for school counselors who work more than their contract stipulates, according to Shinall. Also OK'd was spending up to \$4,450 on an underground power line for the fuel station at the district bus garage.

Central Illinois Electrical Services of Bartonville provided the \$4,450 quote, and the district is waiting for another quote from another firm. If that quote is lower, the district might accept it, Shinall said.

Among other items, the board authorized a new policy that ensures at least one staff member is designed as a resource person for students who are parents, expectant parents or domestic-or-sexual violence victims. Shinall said he believes the measure is a response to a new state law.

Board members tabled a decision regarding the purchase and installation of video cameras in school

In May, Shinall announced the resignation of junior-high science teacher Malley Zadrzynski.

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
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

Police reports

• **PEORIA** – A Princeville-area woman was arrested after she abandoned a damaged vehicle on a Peoria thoroughfare, then claimed she wasn't the driver, according to authorities.

Peoria police responded about noon May 27 to the 8800 block of N. Orange Prairie Rd., where they found a 2012 Nissan Leaf stopped in the farthest-right southbound lane. The vehicle's front passenger-side tire was deflated and the rear passenger-side rim was damaged, a police report stated.

A witness reported a woman fled the scene on foot into nearby woods. The woman, later identified as 60year-old Stephanie D. Mathews, was located on a trail. She told police she was a passenger in the vehicle, the driver hit a curb and someone picked him up to take him to work.

Mathews' story was false, according to police. Mathews was accused of failure to remain at an accident scene, driving on a suspended license, operating an uninsured vehicle, improper lane use and failure to reduce speed to avoid an accident.

• OAK RUN – A two-vehicle crash at an Oak Run intersection resulted in a neck injury for an Altona man.

Dale G. Grawe, 72, was driving a westbound 2013 Ford Explorer shortly after 5:15 p.m. May 30 on Lakeview Road North when at Brentwood Circle the vehicle collided with a southbound 2025 Mazda3, according to a Knox County Sheriff's Office report.

The other driver was Deric K. Sakaguchi, 39, of Gulfport, Miss. His vehicle was pushed off the pavement into a ditch. There are no traffic-control devices at the intersection.

Grawe declined medical treatment. Sakaguchi was uninjured. Both vehicles sustained disabling damage and were towed.

• FARMINGTON – Both drivers refused medical treatment following a two-vehicle wreck east of Farmington

Britt A. Reeves of Roseville was driving a westbound 2019 Chevrolet truck at 5 p.m. May 27 in the 24600 block of W. Farmington Rd. when the vehicle rear-ended a 2024 Volvo sedan, according to a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report. Matthew N. Frauenhoffer of Farmington was the other driver.

Reeves said he was returning home from work when he fell asleep. Frauenhoffer said he was slowing because his vehicle was approaching Farmington city limits. The Volvo sustained major damage and was towed. The Chevy sustained moderate damage but was drivable.

• **PRINCEVILLE** – A Princeville teenager and his passenger sustained minor injuries when their vehicle overturned on a village thoroughfare.

At 4:30 p.m. May 27, the boy was driving a northbound 2025 Nissan sedan on Edwards Avenue at South Street when animals ran onto the pavement from the west. The driver swerved to miss them and overcorrected, according to a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report.

The vehicle flipped onto its top. Both the driver and his passenger, also a boy, were able to get out of the vehicle. After Akron-Princeville ambulance personnel checked both boys, their parents signed a refusal for medical treatment. The vehicle sustained disabling damage and was towed.

• **FARMINGTON** – A Peoria motorcyclist was cited for multiple vehicular offenses in Farmington.

Landrean D. Jones, 33, was aboard a westbound 2006 Suzuki and was using the center turn lane to pass vehicles about 7:30 p.m. May 26 on Fort Street, according to a Farmington police report. An officer pursued Jones, who stopped at a residence in the 100 block of W. Court St.

Jones said he was having a mechanical issue with the motorcycle. He also said he did not have vehicle insurance, nor his license. Jones was accused of improper lane use, driving with a suspended license, driving a motorcycle without a proper license and operating an uninsured motor vehicle.

The motorcycle was impounded. A Fulton County Circuit Court appearance for Jones was scheduled for June 20 in Lewistown.

• WILLIAMSFIELD – A South Carolina man was driving 29 mph above the speed limit on Interstate 74 south of Williamsfield, according to authorities. Bill Holloway, 63, of Myrtle Beach was behind the wheel of a Dodge Charger a Knox County Sheriff's Office deputy stopped shortly before 7:15 a.m. May 23 on the interstate at mile marker 63.

According to a sheriff's-office report, Holloway was driving 99 mph. The speed limit is 70 mph.

It took about 6 miles before the deputy was able to stop Holloway, who was cited for careless driving/speeding. The vehicle was impounded.

One of Good's two passengers, a female, complained about chest and head pain and was transported to OSF Saint Francis Medical Center in Peoria. Otherwise, no injuries were reported. Both vehicles sustained significant damage and were towed.

• FARMINGTON – A Farmington man was cited for disorderly conduct following an incident in front of a local residence.

A 68-year-old man said Caine D. Woods, 49, was in front of his residence about 7:45 a.m. May 15 in the 600 block of W. Fort St. taking photographs of the parkway alongside an adjacent property. According to the victim, Woods told him not to mow the parkway, then threatened him.

Farmington police had issued ordinance violations to the property owner, a 52-year-old area woman, regarding tall grass and illegal no-trespassing signs. The neighbor mowed the parkway, apparently. Woods was located two days after the incident and received a citation.

- EDWARDS Shortly before 5:30 a.m. May 27, Jacob P. Woerner of Trivoli was driving a southbound 2012 Chevrolet Impala in the 3800 block of N. Taylor Rd. south of Edwards when the vehicle struck a deer. Woerner declined medical aid, according to a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report. The vehicle sustained major damage but was drivable.

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Yates City boy faces several charges

FARMINGTON – A 16year-old Yates City boy
was accused of multiple
crimes after he beat a 65year-old Farmington man,
stole his vehicle and
crashed it, authorities
stated.

Knox County Sheriff's Office deputies arrested the boy June 9 south of Yates City, not long after he fled the accident site, in the 100 block of Knox Road 2300 East. The accident north of Farmington was reported shortly before 6 p.m.

At about the same time, Farmington police were summoned to a residence in the 100 block of W. Pearl St. There, officers found the victim bleeding severely from his head.

He said he knew the boy, who asked him for a ride. When told no, the suspect pushed his way into the residence and pulled out a gun, according to the victim. The victim then was pushed into a shelf, beaten and kicked in the head.

The victim passed out, woke up bloodied and sought help from a neighbor, according to police. The victim's wallet, keys, vehicle and cellphone were missing. While officers were at the scene, they were told the stolen vehicle, a 2007 Ford Focus, was involved in an accident in Knox County.

According to a sheriff's-office report, the vehicle appeared to be traveling north on Knox Road 2300

East when it left the pavement to the west and crashed into a barbed-wire fence. The vehicle stopped about 20 yards off the roadway and sustained front-end damage.

Deputies were told the unaccompanied driver ran from the vehicle northwest through a field. A deputy who knew where the suspect resided was able to locate and detain him, the sheriff's-office report stated. He was handed over to Farmington police.

Fulton County authorities charged the boy with home invasion, motor-vehicle theft, aggravated battery and aggravated battery against a person 60 or older. Knox County authorities cited him for leaving the scene of an accident, possessing a stolen vehicle and not having a valid driver's license.

The boy was being held at the Mary Davis Detention Home in Galesburg, according to Farmington police.

Personnel from the Fairview Police Department, the Fulton and Peoria county sheriff's offices and the Fulton County Emergency Services Disaster Agency assisted Farmington officers and Knox County deputies.



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


Marjorie A. DuBois
