Elmwood district hopes to sell house

Bids being accepted for 805 W. Ash St.

ELMWOOD – Faced with determining the best way to handle a vacant rental home on school-owned property, the Elmwood School Board is turning to a familiar plan.

The board on Monday approved taking bids to sell the house it owns at 805 W. Ash St. – with an understanding that the buyer will pay for costs of moving the structure to a new location.

Superintendent Joel Schmieg said the district looked into having the Elmwood Fire Department perform a practice burn to take down the structure. But the building commit-

tee opted for a sale instead, hoping the home will bring a new family into the district.

That has already worked twice for the district, which in 2017 sold a home at 305 N. Althea St. to create room for a new parking lot and another house on Campus Court that had served as administrative offices. Both buildings were moved elsewhere in town and now house families with students in the school district.

Princeville to pay developer up to \$5.1M

PRINCEVILLE – It cost a Stark County-based transportation company at least \$1.4 million to acquire the old Alcoa Building Products facility in Princeville.

That amount and about \$3.7 million more are eligible for municipal tax-increment-financing reimbursement under an agreement the Princeville Village Board approved June 17 with West Jersey Express.

According to the agreement, the village is to reimburse 70% of the annual net increase in property-tax

revenue the West Jersey Express project generates. Payments are to continue through 2047 or until the reimbursement reaches \$5,112,720, whichever comes first.

Like most of Princeville, the West Jersey facility at 917 N. Santa Fe Ave. is in a TIF district. In those districts, property taxes that are to go to various public bodies are frozen. Subsequent tax increases are diverted into a fund used for infrastructure improvements that can lead to area redevelopment.

In September 2024, West Jersey Express took over the 15-acre property Alcoa shuttered 24 years ago. A local man owned it most recently.

The TIF agreement listed reimbursement-eligible demolition costs at \$295,380. Eligible reimbursements for interior and exterior rehabilitation, renovation and expansion of existing buildings and repair and rehabilitation of parking lots and driveways amount to \$3,417,340.

West Jersey Express also has facilities in Toulon and its eponymous hometown. The Princeville facility is expected to create 15 full-time equivalent jobs, according to the TIF

Oglesby implicated

Godmother testifies in long-awaited trial

GALESBURG – On the
witness stand Monday,
Karen Doubet implicated
her goddaughter in the
death of former Maquon
Police Chief Richard

Young.

The long-anticipated trial of Marcy Oglesby began in Knox County Circuit Court almost 33 months after she was arrested, in October 2022, when Young's decomposing body was found in a Maquon storage unit. Oglesby is accused of poisoning Young's food and drink over time, then hiding Young's body.

Young's autopsy revealed lethal levels of a drug found in over-the-counter eye drops. Oglesby and Doubet, who resided together with Young, were charged with first-degree murder. But in her testimony, offered as part of a plea bargain, Doubet suggested she had nothing to do with Young's death.

"I came out of the bathroom one day and she was
putting drops in Rick's coffee. ... She said she was trying to poison Rick,"
Doubet, 79, said about
Oglesby. "She crushed up
pills and put them in his
food."

Doubet's appearance aside Judge Andrew Doyle climaxed the 10-witness opener of a bench trial set to last three days. Testifiers included law-enforcement officials, Young's ex-wife

and two men named Mark Thomas – one the current Maquon village president, the other the former Knox County coroner.

But Doubet's presence might have been the most surprising.

Like 53-year-old Oglesby, Doubet was charged with aggravated battery and concealment of a homicidal death, as well as murder. Because of the plea deal, only the concealment charge is to remain for Doubet, who used a cane and a ramp to access the witness stand. Jail time appears unlikely.

Doubet owns the house on Third Street in Maquon where all three central figures lived. Doubet said Oglesby was like a daughter to her. Oglesby and Young were in a romantic relationship that cooled.

"I tolerated him because *Continued on Page 5*

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

our district," Schmieg said.

After a budget hearing, during which no public comment was voiced, the board passed an amended budget with a surplus of \$138,584 instead of the

deficit projected last August. Schmieg said the surplus is due to better-than-expected revenues and \$30,000 less in expenses.

In public comment, teachers union representative Tiffany Bell welcomed Junior-Senior High School Principal Tom Bell, whose first official day is July 1. Bell said he and his family will live in a house in the district and he looks forward to his new job.

In other business, the board approved giving science teacher and football coach Todd Hollis 73 extra sick days to facilitate his retirement following the 2029-30 school year.

The board also: approved a new strategic plan for the district; added Member Heather Windish to the education committee; approved 2025-26 student-parent handbooks; heard 44 of 45 seniors who started last year graduated; heard work is on track for the elementary gym remodel; and heard that the building committee is exploring an outdoor classroom on the patio north of the Industrial Arts building to be funded by the Elementary Parents Club.

In personnel, the board agreed to the following 2025-26 hirings: Zach Bombold (custodian and bus driver), Emily Brunnelson (junior high scholarstic bowl coach), Dianne Burwell (part-time elementary aide), Nicole Briney (JH cheerleading coach) and Tyler Baysingar (summer IT worker).

The board accepted the following resignations:
Sarah Christy (elementary special education teacher),
Alex Coulter (high school biology teacher and JH basketball and track coach), Emma Vallas (JH assistant girls track coach) and Kyle Anderson (HS girls track coach).

Numerous volunteer coaches were also approved.

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
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


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When you're 8 or 9 years old, you don't see the world as you will as a 50- or 60-year-old. Much of what seems perfectly ordinary to a child often becomes quite extraordinary with the passing of time.

For example, as a young boy I had six grandparents: my father's mother and father, my mother's father and mother and my father's maternal grandmother and grandfather. That

to me then but is now extraordinary.

seemed ordinary

Mom's father was Harry, a Depression-crushed farmer resurrected as a skilled carpenter. Dad's dad was Victor who, after two years in

the seminary, changed direction and became a stock and bond broker. His father-in-law and my Dad's grandfather was Henry, a retired blacksmith who everyone but family called Hank.

Their spouses, respectively, were Lottie, Ruth and Clara. All were strong, smart women who led by example. Two never drove a car and the third probably shouldn't have.

Looking back at that lineage, it's hard to see where my father, a dairy farmer, found his calling. He was no carpenter and he and Mom had more children, six, than money so he never needed his father's specialty.

And while Dad was competent with the farm's Lincoln welder, he

often paid the local smithy to repair equipment that needed to stay together for longer than one day of use by his machinery-bending Uncle Honey or one season with his easily distracted sons.

Despite all these generations of fathers – and mothers – in my youth, I don't remember celebrating one Father's or Mother's Day with any of them. In fact, I don't know if the thought of either day ever crossed our minds.

Part of the reason might be that we already spent much of our free time together, usually some part of most Sundays. Since all six grandparents lived in the same small southern Illinois town and attended the same Lutheran church, everyone usually visited after the late Sunday service.

Grandma Ruth, the self-appointed social director of the family, often stretched those Sunday visits into dinners of fried chicken, mashed potatoes, milk gravy and two kinds of pie. Few, including my very overworked mother, ever objected to Grandma seizing the day, family, or menu.

Then, as the heat of those languid Sunday afternoons took charge, a card table or two appeared on Grandpa's shady carport so adults could play pinochle and cool off with an icy Falstaff beer. In the background, a radio played our summer soundtrack, that day's St. Louis Cardinals baseball game.

Then, by 3:30 p.m., my mother would steer us to the car so my father

could be back on the farm in time for the evening milking. Later, when my older brothers and I got our driver's licenses, we left the card games, the grandparents and Dad and Mom for the milking parlor.

Harry, my mother's father and the most quiet of the six, was the first to pass. That was late 1962 and the first time I heard the word cancer.

Three years later both my great grandparents – each in their late 80s – died, the ailing Henry in March and wheelchair-bound Clara in September. Grandpa Vic, their son-inlaw, was buried on his wife Ruth's 67th birthday on a postcard-perfect September day in 1969.

Both my grandmothers, Ruth and Lottie, remained active until 1988 when I last visited Ruth while she helped the St. John's Ladies Aid serve Lottie's funeral dinner. Eight months later and again in September, the same ladies served Ruth's funeral dinner.

And now, as another "Day" drifts into memory, my mind goes to all those fathers and mothers who gave me so much of themselves and how ordinary it all seemed and how extraordinary it truly was.

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OGLESBY: Eye-drop ingredient elevated in blood

Continued from Page 1 he was with Marcy," Doubet said.

Oglesby cultivated an online relationship with a man from Nigeria, an artist nicknamed "Sonny," according to Doubet and Sgt. Jeremy Moore of the Knox County Sheriff's Office.

Doubet's house is across the street from Roberts Self-Storage. Sheriff'soffice deputies were dispatched there Oct. 7, 2022, after neighbors complained about a foul odor emanating from it.

Inside Storage Unit No. 29 was the partially liquefied body of Young, wrapped in plastic and encased in two cardboard boxes, according to court testimony.

Oglesby first told officers a dead, pregnant opossum was in the boxes. As Oglesby was attempting to open them, she hemmed and hawed, Deputy Keith King indicated. Finally, Oglesby took King aside.

"She said, 'Keith, I can't do this anymore.' She kind of went pale, almost a frightened look," said King, who resides in Maquon. "She said, 'You're going to find out, anyway. There's not an opossum in the box. There's a body in there."

Oglesby said Young died of natural causes, according to Moore. He said Oglesby claimed she panicked because she didn't know how to honor Young's final wish – to be buried in a nearby former Native American settlement.

Young was 71 when he died, probably in October 2021. That summer, upon Oglesby's request, Doubet began to purchase eye drops from stores in Elmwood and Knoxville. Ostensibly, the drops were to treat Oglesby's allergies. Doubet kept buying them after the alleged coffeetampering incident.

"I didn't comprehend what she was trying to do," Doubet said.

According to Doubet, Young died inside her house. He had been progressively weaker and unsteady, Doubet said. Oglesby carried Young's body into a bedroom, then asked Doubet to help her put it in a box. Doubet said she wore disposable gloves, to avoid fingerprints.

"I didn't really want to be messed up in this ordeal," she said.

As Doubet spoke, black-clad Oglesby sat beside her attorneys, public defenders David Hansen and Christopher Kanthak. She showed little expression and took notes for much of the day. Eye contact between Doubet and Oglesby appeared fleet-

Oglesby was offered a negotiated plea but rejected it, according to State's Attorney Ashley Worby.

During cross-examination, Kanthak indicated Doubet changed her story

from when police first interviewed her. Back then, Doubet said Young needed eye drops, too, and required his oral medication to be crushed, because he had trouble swallowing.

On Monday, Doubet twice said she lied in those early interviews, because she was scared.

Testimony from law-enforcement authorities revealed they found at Doubet's house 19 empty boxes and six empty bottles for Visine and other eye-drops brands. Also found were 11 empty boxes and six empty bottles for headache-relief tablets.

"It was a messy residence. It appeared that a hoarder had lived there," sheriff's-office Sgt. Greg Jennings

Testimony Tuesday morning focused on toxicology.

Sherri Kacinko, a toxicologist with the Pennsylvania-based laboratory that tested some of Young's remains, said concentrations of tetrahydrozoline in Young's muscle tissue were six times the reporting limit. Tetrahydrozoline is a key eye-drops ingredient that can be fatal if taken orally, according to Kacinko.

"In order to get into the muscle in a detectable level, there would need to be a relatively significant amount in the blood," she said.

In other action, the board approved an agreement with the Peoria City/County Health Department for village employees and their immediate family to receive medication and/or vaccines in case of a public-health emergency.

"It is possible that public health may need to administer medical countermeasures to many individuals in a short period of time with little to no lead time," the agreement states.

"By collaborating we will be able to serve (village) employees and their employee family members and reduce the number of individuals that will need to come to Open Points of Dispensing."

Village President Jeff Troutman said the health department initiated the agreement, which at least three other municipalities have approved.

"It really doesn't have anything that we're going to be doing right now," Troutman said. "It's in case of another COVID or something like that."

Troutman voted to approve the agreement, as did Trustees Ron Delbridge, Rick Pope and Spencer Wilson. Trustee Teresa Gilroy abstained; she said she hadn't had an opportunity to read it, because of technical difficulties. Trustees Donald Peterson Jr. and Steve Potter were absent.

Like other village presidents in Illinois, Troutman votes only in case of ties or if only half of the six trustees voted in favor of a measure.

Trustees also approved hiring an additional Peoria County Sheriff's Office deputy to help patrol the village Heritage Days celebration, which was held June 19-21. The deputy was to work the final two days of the festival. Cost was \$70 per hour.

Building permits were issued for alteration of an entry door on a garage at 306 N. Town Ave. and for installation of an aboveground swimming pool at 317 N. Cottage Grove Ave.



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



The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

 Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

 Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses. Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum

production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems. Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gasproduction and mining

activities.http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead. Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPAs Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-4791.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit theamount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population.

Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The drinking water supplier is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components in your home. You share the responsibility for protecting yourself and your family from the lead in your home plumbing. You can take responsibility by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Before drinking tap water, flush your pipes for several minutes by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. You can also use a filter certified by an American National Standard Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead in drinking water. What Are The Health Effects of Lead?

Lead can cause serious health problems if too much enters your body, from drinking water or other sources. It can cause damage to the brain and kidneys, and can intefere with the production of red blood cells that carry oxygen to all parts of your body. The greatest risk of lead exposure is to infants (particularly if they drink formula prepared with water containing elevated levels of lead), young children, and pregnant women. Scientists have linked the effects of lead on the brain with lowered IQ in children. Adults with kidney problems and high bloodpressure can be affected by low levels of lead more than healthy adults. Lead is stored in the bones, and it can be released later in Ite. During pregnancy, the child receives lead from the mother's bones, which may affect brain development.

What Are The Sources of Lead?

I The primary sources of lead exposure for most children are deteriorating lead-based paint, lead contaminated dust, and lead-contaminated residential soil. Exposure to lead is a significant health concern, especially for young children and infants whose growing bodies tend to absorb more lead than the average adult. Infants that drink formula Prepared with lead-contaminated water are at a greater risk because of the large volume of water hev drink relative to their body size. Lead is rarely found in source water, but enters tap water through corrosion of plumbilig materials. Homes built before 1986 are more likely to have lead pipes, fixtures and solder.

What Can I Do To Reduce Exposure to Lead in Drinking Water? If the level of lead found in your drinking water is above 15 ppb or if ou are concerned about the lead levels at your location, there are several things you can do:

 Run your water to flush out lead. If water hasn't been used for several hours, run water from your kitchen tap or whatever tap you use for drinking and cooking for at least 3 minutes and it becomes cold or reaches a steady temperature before using it for drinking or cooking. This will help flush lead-containing water from the pipes. In order to conserve water, you can fill multiple containers after flushing for drinking, cooking, and preparing baby formula

 Bottled drinking water should be used by pregnant women, breast-feeding women, young children, and formula-fed infants at homes were lead has been detected at levels greater than 15 apb.

 Use cold water for drinking, cooking, andpreparing baby formzila. Do not cook with or drink water from the hot water tap; lead dissolves more easily into hot water. Do not use water from the hot water tap to make baby formula.

. Do not boil water to remove lead. Boiling water will not reduce lead.

Look for alternative sources or treatment of water.

. Test your water for lead. Call us at the number below to find out how to get your water tested for lead.

. Identify if your plumbing fixtures contain lead. New brass faucets, fittings, and valves, including those advertised as "lead-free," may contribute lead to drinking water. As of June 19, 1986, new or replaced water serviced lines and new household plumbing materials could not contain more than 8% lead. Lead content was further reduced on January 4, 2014, when plumbing materials must now be certified as "lead-free" to be used (weighted average of wetted surface cannot be more than 0.25% lead). Consumers should be aware of this when choosing fixtures and take appropriate precautions

Source of Water: PRINCEVILLE To determine Princeville's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, a Well Site Survey, published in 1989 by the Illinois EPA, and a Source Water Protection Pfan were reviewed. During the survey of Princeville's source water protection area, Illinois EPA staff recorded fourteen potential sources of groundwater contamination that could pose a hazard to groundwater pumped by the Atlanta community water supply wells. One potential source, route, or possible material sources or problem sites are located within the combined 200 foot minimum series of wells #1 and #2. Four potential sources or problem sites are located within the 1,000 foot survey radius of well #3. These sites include two treated wood/fumber yards, a construction/demolition company, a mortuary, three below ground fuel storages, an auto repair shop, an auto body shop, two machine shops/sheds, two businesses that manufacture/process chemicals, and an above ground fuel storage. The Illinois EPA has determined that Princeville wells #1 and #2 are susceptible to IOC, VOC, and SOC contamination. Well #3 is not susceptible to IOC or SOC contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including monitoring conducted at the wells, monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system, and the available hydrogeologic data for the wells.

ALL-SPORTS ROUNDUP

Crawford, Fagerburg earn baseball all-state honors

Two area juniors made the Illinois High School Baseball Coaches Association Class 2A all-state first team. Landon Crawford of Farmington and Dane Fagerburg of Brimfield-Elmwood were selected as IHSBCA all-staters.

Crawford batted .447 with six home runs, 11 doubles and 28 RBI as leadoff hitter. On the mound, he had 89 strikeouts in 49 innings and a 1.27 ERA.

"Kid had an amazing year," Farmington Coach Justin Begner said. "Can't wait to see him grow in his senior year."

A third baseman, Fagerburg batted .463 and had a .586 on-base percentage – leading the Indians in both categories. He scored 51 runs, stole 19 bases (getting caught just once) and had 17 extra-base hits.

B-E junior pitcher/out-fielder Kaeden Schatsiek was an honorable-mention all-stater after hitting .423 with seven home runs, 12 doubles, 50 RBI and 39 runs scored. He was 2-0 in seven pitching appearances with a 1.62 ERA and had 33 strikeouts in 13 innings.

• Shrine all-stars – Farmington quarterback Lane Wheelwright was 2-for-2 passing and threw a 21-yard touchdown pass in Saturday's Illinois High School Shrine all-star

game at Illinois Wesleyan University. He played for the Blue team, 29-7 winners over a Red team that included Farmington lineman Caden Mowen, a starter and captain.

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
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
