For The Weekly Post GALESBURG – A bench trial, not a jury trial, has been scheduled for late June for a woman accused of murdering the former Maquon police

Marcy Oglesby waived her jury-trial right Monday during

a hearing in Knox County Circuit Court. Oglesby was implicated in October 2022 regarding the death of Richard Young,

whose decomposing body was found that month in a Maquon storage locker.

Numerous hearings and rulings have happened in Oglesby's case since then. But until the hearing Monday in front of Judge Andrew Doyle, a jury trial for Oglesby had

been assumed. Following the hearing, public defender David Hansen didn't go into detail regarding the benchtrial rationale.

"It's an individual client's decision. That was the decision that was made," said Hansen, one of Oglesby's attorneys. "It's her decision

solely."

The bench trial, with Doyle presiding, is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. June 23. The trial is expected to last at least

three days, according to attorneys for the defense and the prosecution. What probably is a final pretrial hearing, according to Hansen, was set for June 13.

"I think that it's very likely that we'll be going forward

Farmington OKs bid for rebuild of Oak Street

FARMINGTON – A rough piece of road in Farmington will get smoothed over this summer.

The Farmington City Council on Monday accepted a \$313,727 bid from C&G Concrete Construction of East Peoria for a complete rebuild of Oak Street.

The bid was lowest of two received and was 14.2% below the original engineer's estimate of \$365,242.50. Laverdiere Construction Inc. of Macomb had the other bid, \$332,727.18.

Farmington will use Motor Fuel Tax money to pay for the project, which should start soon.

"They're ready to go," Farmington Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam said after signing bid documents following the meeting.

The board also voted in favor of financing for reconstruction of another sort at Monday's meeting. Approved unanimously was the ordi-

Brimfield considering more solar fields

BRIMFIELD - The Brimfield Village Board on Monday heard a proposal from David Knight, president of Illinois Solar Services, on the possibility of adding a solar field for the water-treatment facility as well as panel installation for the village hall building.

Knight said the switch to solar power for those two facilities alone would lower the village's electric bill from an approximate

\$1,850 per month to \$59 per month. Illinois Solar Services would partner with Oberlander Electric out of Mossville to complete the project.

Knight said the total cost for the water-treatment facility would be \$386,000 with a 3.2-year payback time. The project would also qualify for several incentives, including \$162,615 in Solar Renewable Energy Credits from the state over the course of six years, a \$49,068 Smart Inverter Rebate

from Ameren and a 40% investment tax credit from the federal government.

With all those credits, the village would make \$18,682, according to Knight.

The solar system would require two rows of ground panels, tie into the generator system and come with an all-inclusive 30year warranty.

The new village hall would require 12 roof-mounted solar



panels and would initially cost
\$33,140, with a return on investment
of 7.7 years. Incentives for roofmounted panels are \$5,800 from the
state, \$1,500 from Ameren and
\$1,650 from the federal government,
lowering the cost for the village to
\$9,154.

Should the systems produce more power than the village can use, the village gets credit and any excess carries over with no reset of credits.

The board tabled a vote on the solar proposal until next month's meeting, pending a check to make certain insurance will cover the systems.

The board did approve drafting an

ordinance to establish the Brimfield Area Museum. Once an ordinance is written and approved, the next step will be to appoint members to the museum board. Kim Hanks, current president of the Peoria County Genealogical Society and a future museum board member, has drafted a set of bylaws, a deed of gift and an acceptance of collection from the Brimfield Historical Society for the Village Board to review.

Under the proposed bylaws, the museum board will consist of five people in staggered two-year terms. The initial board will have three people serving a three-year term and two people serving for two years in order to stagger the terms moving

forward. A soft opening of the museum is planned for Old Settlers Days in August.

The board also approved its annual budget and appropriation, which accounts for solar installation.


Also approved were: a \$60,231.90 bid from United Contractors Midwest of Peoria for sealcoating, about \$5,000 under initial estimates; \$4,000 to cover materials and labor for a new door for the men's bathroom at Brimfield Park; and \$1,200 to remove a tree on East Clay Street to prevent further sidewalk damage.

Finally, the board approved an additional three days of paid time off for village employees, effective immediately.

Banning cellphones in school is a local issue

Banning cellphones in public schools has been a legislative rage this spring. The Illinois Senate passed a bill that would ban cellphone use by students during most of the class day. Gov. JB Pritzker has pushed for the bill and the legislation has received a fair amount of press.

As of June 1, the bill was referred to rules in the House and, apparently, will not pass this spring. But many districts appear to have a serious problem with students using phones during class ses-

sions and not attending to the business of simply being a student.

This bill is the state acting like Big Brother and forcing another rule on the local school system. While the legislation may be well intentioned, it is still Big Brother sticking its nose into local affairs.

Clinton School Superintedent Drew Goebel was asked what he thought of the legislation. He said it was common sense, adding that Clinton schools had banned cellphone use during most of the school day

several years ago.

I agree with Goebel that the bill is mostly common sense, but why do we even need it? A local school district has the authority to make its own rules of conduct and enforce them with a student code.

If a district is allowing rampant and unrestricted use of cellphones by students, that is a district problem, not a state problem. The Clinton School District realized there was a potential problem and took action to resolve the problem. They did their job, and more power to them.

Some districts apparently don't know how to manage their own problems and enforce discipline. They want to shove that responsibility to the state or to some legislator thinking up more rules. The bottom line is we are losing local control and the state is taking more control of local issues. That is simply an unwanted Big Brother syndrome.

Some of the most cost-effective and productive units of Illinois government are local school districts and townships in rural Illinois. Local government works. Its leaders and employees understand they should

serve while being responsible to their fellow taxpayers.

In the above situation, Clinton schools had resolved the problem. Now Illinois is coming in to fix the problem. If the bill passes down the road, the state will spend more dollars to fix a problem that a bunch of country hicks had already fixed, only they weren't looking for any public accolades. All they wanted was to provide for their local students.

The next time you run into a school board member, a county board member, a township official or a city council member, thank them for their efforts and for keeping issues local. All too often when Springfield says it wants to help, Springfield only wants to take over and expand its bureaucracy. We need local control, not state mandates.

While I'm on the local bandwagon, please don't forget to shop local. Our local grocery stores, hardware stores, restaurants and other businesses are very price competitive. Factor in the cost of travel and one soon realizes that shopping local is a great buy.

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

Continued from Page 1 nance setting aside \$25,000 for homeowner redevelopment grants outside of Farmington's TIF district.

Started under former mayor Kent Kowal, the grant program pays up to \$2,500 for first-time applicants seeking to redevelop their property. The grant limit is reduced to \$1,000 after the first successful application.

The council approved ordinances for commercial facade grants and for in-TIF homeowner redevelopment grants earlier this year.

"The rehab grants have made a lot of properties be more energy efficient with new windows as well as having better curb appeal," Stufflebeam said. "We have helped replace crumbling sidewalks, broken garage doors and entry doors. It is great the city can partner with homeowners to improve properties."

The board also approved \$1,000 in-TIF payments recommended by the CEDC for Anthony Severine to replace some doors and for Ted Arndy to take down a tree at his property.

The other ordinance approved Monday was to give Dana Cardenas 90 additional days to complete work on the former Senior Center building

The council OK'd the city working with Masonic Lodge 192 and the First Presbyterian Church of Farmington in coordinating a July 4 parade and after party. The city's role is to include the event under its insurance policy to save the lodge \$400.

Council Member Lelsye Smith reported that signups have gone very well for the summer recreation program scheduled to start June 9.

Resident Matt Ulm also suggested the city have the Illinois Department of Transportation restripe traffic markings on Lightfoot Road.

Family of Logan Dunne suing Carle Health

PEORIA – A Peoria hospital neglected a Brimfield man who disappeared from the facility and was missing for five months before he was found dead, a lawsuit claims.

The family of Logan Dunne is seeking at least \$50,000 in damages from Carle Health Methodist Hospital, according to a lawsuit filed May 27 in Peoria County Circuit Court. That's almost two years to the day Dunne was admitted involuntarily to Methodist – May 29, 2023.

Dunne was being treated for mental-health issues and for Type 1 diabetes. The lawsuit asserts Methodist employees knew Dunne wasn't taking his medications and knowingly transferred him May 31 from a secured psychiatric floor to an unsecured floor for his diabetes treatment.

On June 2, while waiting to be transferred back to the psychiatric floor, Dunne dressed and left the hospital, despite Methodist employees knowing he was not allowed to leave, according to the lawsuit. That was the last day Dunne was seen alive.

A search that attracted national attention ended Nov. 12, when a hunter found Dunne's remains in woods in Limestone Township. Dunne family members said they did not learn he left the hospital until June 5.

The lawsuit alleges at least 18 instances of negligence by Methodist.

"As a direct and proximate result of one or more of the aforementioned negligent acts and/or omissions, Logan suffered severe and debilitat-

ing physical, emotional and psychiatric injuries ... resulting in physical pain and suffering, emotional and psychiatric distress ... and ultimately (his) death," the lawsuit stated.

Dunne's father, Brian Dunne, is plaintiff and administrator of his son's estate. Listed as potential defendants are four physicians -Thomas Boyd, Jose Kuzhively, Andrew Lancia and Riaz Shah – and Trillium Place, a Carle-affiliated behavioral-health facility.

"This has been a long process and I wouldn't wish this on anybody," Brian Dunne told WMBD-TV of Peoria. "This is Mental Health Awareness Month, so our goal is accountability, but it is also to bring awareness to the stigma that is related to mental-health disease."



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No decision on railroad crossing

LAURA – A decision on closing a railroad crossing east of Laura doesn't appear likely anytime soon.

Illinois Commerce Commission status hearings the past year or so regarding the BNSF Railway proposal to close the Whittaker Road crossing have been brief and usually lacking in information. An online hearing that lasted less than 10 minutes May 28 was not much different.

An evidentiary hearing has yet to be scheduled. But the ICC administrative judge handling the case suggested more speed might be desirable.

"We've been in this mode for quite some time," Latrice Kirkland-Montaque said.

Another status hearing was scheduled for July 1, when attorneys for BNSF are expected to offer dates

for depositions. The departure of the lead BNSF attorney from his firm has led to additional delay, according to Daniel Hronek, a Chicago-area lawyer who now is the railroad's chief representative.

Some earlier delays were attributable to the replacement of Illinois Department of Transportation engineers who were familiar with the case.

In July 2023, BNSF requested the unguarded Whittaker Road crossing be closed. The railroad cited safety concerns and

lack of use. Local officials oppose closure because oversized farm equipment uses the crossing and proposed detours are unsafe, among other reasons.

At the same time it made the Whittaker Road request, BNSF petitioned the ICC to close two crossings in Knox County and one in Rock Island County. Like the Whittaker Road situation, those cases are pending. The railroad's rationale in all four cases is similar. according to ICC documents.





Late rally lifts B-E softball to first sectional title in a decade

For The Weekly Post CHILLICOTHE - Softball isn't necessarily a game of inches, but the Class 2A Chillicothe Sectional was a game of feet.

Or a foot, to be more accurate – one human foot.

An overturned out call to lead off the bottom of the sixth inning led Brimfield-Elmwood to a four-run rally in a 4-1 victory May 30 over Peru St. Bede at Illinois Valley Central. It gave the Indians (33-3) their first sectional title in

B-E was trailing the 2023 Class 1A state champions 1-0 and couldn't generate offense against St. Bede starting pitcher Macy Strauch. At least not until No. 9 batter Anja Nelson began the sixth by hitting an infield grounder.

In receiving the ensuing throw, first baseman Jillian Pinter was ruled to have lifted her foot off the bag. The first-base umpire called Nelson out initially, but after a conference with the plate umpire, that decision was reversed.

"I was really hoping I was going to beat the throw," said Nelson, a sophomore. "When I saw it come in, everybody was screaming, 'She's off the base!""

Neither Nelson nor B-E Coach Kurt Jueriens could see the play, they said. Neither could St. Bede Coach Rob Ruppert. But Juerjens said the B-E firstbase coach, Matt Legaspi, was adamant about Pinter's lifted foot. B-E junior pitcher Sawyer

Drury seemed certain, too.

"I heard (an umpire) say she was off by a pretty big amount to the other team's coach," Drury said. "That was definitely a gamechanger. I was like, 'All right, let's get this thing going."

The Indians did.

Drury followed Nelson by singling to right field, then Kendyl Binder hit a blooper to left that filled the bases. Reese Legaspi's sacrifice fly to center scored Nelson with the tying run. Then came the big blow, a two-run triple by Layla Hersemann.

A squeeze-bunt single by Brooke Allen drove in Hersemann and completed the scoring – six batters, four runs, one out. Just like that, offensive woes vanished for a team seeded second in its sub-sectional.

Strauch, a sophomore, struck out only four batters overall. But over the first five innings, B-E put 11 balls in play that resulted in outs.

"Nothing was really working," Juerjens said. "You can talk to the kids all you want about making adjustments, and I think they tried to make adjustments, but it just wasn't working up to that point.

"Their pitcher did such a nice job of keeping us offbalance – spinning the ball, changing speeds. Whatever we got there, we earned it."

St. Bede (16-12), seeded third in its sub-sectional,

didn't go quietly. Ava Balestri and Maci Kelly had consecutive one-out singles in the seventh. But Drury ended it by striking out Pinter swinging, then Leah Griggs looking.

All told, Drury struck out 15. The first-inning St. Bede scoring, on Strauch's center-field double following a two-out walk to Lili McClain, represented the first run B-E and Drury allowed in four postseason games. After Strauch's RBI, Drury retired 15 consecutive St. Bede batters.

"We couldn't lay off that high fastball at times, and that hurt us," Ruppert said.

In the sectional semifinal May 27 against top-seeded Canton, B-E left 11 runners on base. But with two outs in the top of the ninth, Reese Legaspi cleared them.

The freshman's two-run homer off Canton pitcher

Tori Birch sailed over the fence in left for the only scoring of the game. A Binder walk immediately preceded Legaspi's home run, which came after she flied out to left with runners on first and second to end the seventh.

"I was honestly hoping Kendyl would get walked, because I really wanted an at-bat," Legaspi said. "My last at-bat, I almost hit the fence. I was like, 'That was my moment.' She was throwing inside, and that's what I like. So I just knew it was going to come and I needed to wait for my pitch and take it."

B-E also stranded runners on second and third in the first inning, on first and second in the second, on first and second in the sixth and on second and third in the eighth.

"We had chances," Juerjens said. "We just didn't quite get it done at times, but Reese kind of made up for that."

Drury and Birch matched each other in strikeouts overall (10) and in shutout innings until Legaspi's big

Canton (19-11) left runners at second and third with two outs in the bottom of the seventh. B-E second baseman Layni Linthicum forced extra innings by running toward right field to grab Averi Smith's humpbacked fly.

"If that ball drops, the game's over," Juerjens said.

"It's not what we expected, but overall that team is good, so hats off to them," said Drury, a junior committed to play at Creighton University. "But our team did the best we could and we battled through the whole game, so I'm proud of them for that."

Drury, who pitched each of five B-E postseason games, settled down after Beecher scored twice in the first inning and once in the second. But Bobcats

junior counterpart Ava Lorenzatti, a Florida State recruit, allowed only one hit through the first five innings. In the top of the sixth, with the top of the B-E order at bat, that situation changed quickly.

Drury led off with a double, then Kendyl Binder was hit by a pitch. Reese Legaspi's ensuing double to left field scored Drury, Layla Hersemann's sacrifice fly drove in Binder and Brooke Allen's double over left fielder Tayiah Scanlan's head brought home Legaspi with the tying run.

"I'm thinking, 'We might make this work," B-E Coach Kurt Juerjens said. That's when Hayhurst changed pitchers. Out came Lorenzatti and in came Norkus, who is committed to Colgate. Pitching is Hayhurst's specialty. He was an assistant at South Holland Thornwood when it won three Class AA state titles in the 1990s.

"I just didn't want them to get the lead on us," Hay-hurst said. "I thought the new pitcher coming in, we could hold them at least one time through the lineup. With the way she throws her changeup, it's tough to see the first time."

Hersemann confirmed that: "The second girl had a nasty changeup."

B-E loaded the bases later in the sixth but was unable to score again. The Indians left a runner at third against Norkus in the seventh, then left runners at second and third in the ninth and another at second in the 10th.

"I was just thinking, 'We need to get runs,' and we finally got some, and all we had to do was just get one more," Drury said.
"But that's all right. We did what we can do."

After Drury retired the first two batters in the 10th, Beecher singled three times to set up Norkus' heroics and to advance to a semifinal against Auburn (27-5), at 5:30 p.m. Friday, June 6, at Louisville Slugger Sports Complex in Peoria. The title game starts 4:30 p.m. Saturday.

"But we thought it would be a good idea just to get him in there so he had that experience, what it was like to run three events," Meyers said. "Maybe you get lucky and you feel a little bit better halfway through and go, but when you come down here, it can be very overwhelming.

"That's at least going to give Darwin some sort of perspective going forward next year. Do I want to do three or do I want to focus on two?"

Herman dueled with Garrett Beebe of Pleasant Plains in the 4x800, in which the E-B runner dropped into third briefly on the final leg. Faulkner and Stevenson held steady after Florey led in the first lap. Rockford Christian didn't trail after that.

Nelson was seeded third in the 3200 and was in a third-place pack late in his heat, which was the fastest of three. Down the stretch, he edged past Annawan-Wethersfield senior Karson Shrum to finish third. Nelson was knocked to fourth overall after Gillespie junior Chaz Oberkfell ran 9:38.14 to win his heat.

Unlike the other events, there was no preliminary round May 29 in the 3200.

"I felt like I ran pretty good. I was dead on that last lap, though," said Nelson, bound for the Milwaukee School of Engineering. "I put all I had left out in that last 100. When we got to around lap 5, I was a little behind where I wanted to be, but I still ended up being happy with where I placed."

Florey finished 11th in the 800 (2:01.22).

Lowery's medal-winning shot put – 52 feet, 5½ inches – came in the preliminary round. He fouled on each of his final-round attempts. Dwight sopho-

more Graham Meister threw his winning distance (58-51/4) in the prelims, too.

Lowery, also plays football and basketball. Princeville Coach Jon Carruthers called Lowery a work in progress in track after playing baseball the last two seasons.

"I didn't want to do baseball and I knew I had to stay in shape for my main sports, so I stopped by track to see what it was like," Lowery said. "Then my coach said, 'Well, you're throwing,' and ever since, I liked it.

"I didn't think I'd be able to do what I did, come into state and especially make it to the state finals."

Morrison won the 1A team championship, with 60 points. Tuscola was second (35 points), and Rockford Christian and Shelbyville tied for third (32 each).

CHARLESTON – Elmwood-Brimfield runners went the distance last weekend at the Class 1A boys track and field state meet. By the time it was over, Darwin Herman certainly felt it.

After he ran the anchor leg of the Trojans' second-place 4x800-meter

relay the morning of May 31 and finished sixth individually a few hours later in the 800, Herman steeled himself for a late-afternoon run in the 1600 final. The junior was seeded second, based on sectional performances.

But on the blue track at Eastern Illinois University, that particular seed didn't quite sprout.

Of the 11 smallschool boys who finished the metric mile at O'Brien Field, an ex-

hausted Herman was 11th, in 4:39. That was more than 24 seconds behind the winner, Winnebago senior Nicolai Martino.

For Herman and for the Trojans, there was no shame in that performance. And there were plenty of good things, not to mention some preparation for next season.

"My first time running at state and I still got two medals," Herman said about awards for the top nine placers in each event. "A last-place finish is not the end of the world."

Overall, E-B made significant additions to its collection of state-meet

hardware.
The 4x800 team of Herman, senior

Reed Florey and juniors Aiden Faulkner and Kam Stevenson finished in a season-best 8:02.94, about 5 seconds slower than the foursome from Rockford Christian. It represented the Trojans' seventh runner-up finish and 19th medal since 1980 in that event.

"It's always good to be top five, second place. I'd rate it a 10 out of 10," Florey, headed to McKendree University in Lebanon,

said about the latest E-B 4x800 effort. "I think everyone ran very well."

E-B senior Mika Nelson ran 9:45.90 in the 3,200 to finish fourth, behind champion Martino (9:33.86). Herman's 800 time of 1:58.06 was a personal best in an event Delavan sophomore Corie Green won in
