Weaver says there's no hope for new DMV in Wyoming

TOULON – State Rep. Travis Weaver reiterated that the Illinois Secretary of State has permanently closed Stark County's Department of Motor Vehicles facility during an address to the Stark County Board of Supervisors on Tuesday.

"The Secretary was looking for a reason to close the Wyoming facility and he got it when there was criminal activity in the apartments above the DMV," Weaver said.

He said the Wyoming facility was the least-utilized DMV in Illinois and efforts by Weaver and Sen. Neil Anderson to reestablish a Stark County DMV were

thwarted by the Secretary of

Weaver also said a new pharmacy in Toulon's First Choice Healthcare facility at 120 E.

Court St. still

requires a state inspection before it can open. He said the inspection has been delayed by the state. The purchase

of property for a new county

highway building was tabled Tuesday night for the 15th month in a row. Heading into the meeting, the board had a letter of intent to purchase property owned

by Matt Plumer on Illinois Route 17 between the former Kraft cheese plant and the current county highway department building. No action was taken and there was no discussion.

Society of Growth representative Kim Dahl addressed the board about the Wyoming-based organization's goal to help people with addictions. She also spoke about the need to finance residents' community health needs, plus grant writing.

County Engineer Judd Giffin reported that about 70 new larger road signs have been installed to replace smaller signs in the county. There will be over 100 signs replaced once the project is completed. Giffin also said South Castleton Road continues to be rebuilt in order to replace the pothole riddled roadway.

Giffin also wrote in his July report that the new maintenance building ground has been surveyed. Whether this included the proposed property purchase just east of the highway department is unknown.

County Treasurer Paula Leezer told the board the first \$943,969 in property taxes received has been distributed to various county agencies.

Chief Deputy Chuck Demetreon gave the sheriff's report and explained that two Flock cameras costing \$6,000 are expected to be up and operational in about six months. These cameras are mounted on tall poles in order to monitor vehicle speeds and other traffic related items.

Bills from the Sheriff's Office were not submitted to the board for approval this month.

The board approved Joseph Charvat's appointment to the **Emergency Telephone System** Board, replacing Chuck Terwilliger, who resigned. Charvat will fill out the remainder of that term.

Before the regular board meeting, there were county budget presentations at a finance committee meeting. No major changes were given except for an annual request for salary increases for county employees.

Estate debate

Federal estate tax rising, no change yet in Illinois

While President Donald Trump's recently signed "big, beautiful bill" raises the federal estate tax exemption, offering relief to family farms and small businesses nationwide, Illinois has yet to follow suit.

Trump's newly signed "big, beautiful bill" raises the federal estate-tax exemption to \$15 million per estate, or \$30 million for couples, and permanently eliminates the sunset clause.



The estate-tax threshold in Illinois is \$4 million, far below the new \$15 million federal threshold and one of the lowest in the country. Some say that low threshold threatens the future of family farms.

hold is \$4 million, far below the \$15 million federal exemption, one of the lowest state estate tax thresholds in the country.

Given that, Samuel Karnick, senior fellow at The Heartland Institute, warns Illinois' outdated estate tax

continues to threaten the future of generational farms, even as the federal government moves to ease the burden.

"If you raise the exemption from \$5 million to \$15 million, more farms are protected, but it becomes a

Galva city OKs appropriations By CAROL TOWNSEND For The Prairie News

GALVA – The Galva City Council unanimously passed a Fiscal Year 2026 appropriation of \$4,429,182 at Monday's meeting.

The total is \$49,632 more than last year with an extra \$166,873 in the general fund to help purchase a truck for the Fire Depart-

The council also opened the only bid on a lot located at 301 Market Street. The approved bid of \$2,010 was from Jeff Campbell, who owns Trash Bandits, and is opening a store next to the lot in the near future. The bid stated he plans to expand his building and also have public parking.

The city has sold two building lots – Lot 7 in the Olaf Krans Subdivision to Brian Lapan and Lot 8 in Northpoint (next to Villas at Galva) to Nelson Lay.

Second Ward Alderman John Wirth led a discussion about residents who own vacant lots in Galva and want to put up a storage shed. Among the discussion topics was limiting the sheds to a single-story, 120-square-foot building that must be on cement and must have vinyl siding that matches. Also discussed was having the property surveyed before anything can be built and not renting the buildings.

It was noted that two buildings have gone up on vacant lots, one built by Ernie Barlow on SW 7th

Street and one owned by the City of Galva and the Youth Sports Association, who were allowed to put up a building to keep their supplies.

It was noted that there are several pools in Galva that are 24 inches deep and have no fence around them. By code, pools must be enclosed by a fence that is 4-feet tall.

In other discussion, residents were asked to not put building materials in piles of brush that the city picks up for free.

Second Ward Alderman John Wirth said some electric bikes are not following traffic rules on the streets. He said he was almost hit by one the other day, as the operator was texting. Po-

Continued from Page 1 lice Chief Kraig Townsend said that he and the mayor are working on something with the schools.

City administrator David Dyer said there are new backboards in Wiley Park that were paid for by the city, Jane Doss and Jim Anderson of Player's Edge.

Dyer also reported that the American Job Center has provided Galva a

grant of \$101,000 to fix the building next to the Galva Post Office.

He said the Job Center is also paying wages of Department of Corrections inmates from the Kewanee Life Skills Re-Entry Center. Inmates are learning a trade while working on the upstairs of the building.

Dyer said the downstairs had some structural damage and the city and David and Allison Triggs are taking care of first-floor repairs.

Dyer said he hopes to get the same grant next year for another building next year. He noted that the trades union will interview the inmates who have the skills from the project that might help them with employment after they are released.

Continued from Page 1 value judgment," said Karnick. "Why should a \$15 million farm be taxed while a \$5 million one isn't? Eliminating the estate tax entirely would be far more beneficial to the state's economy."

According to Alex Muresianu of the Tax Foundation, very few estates actually end up paying the federal estate tax. In 2022,

only about 3,000 estates, just 0.1% of all deaths, owed any estate tax. While around 8,000 estates were required to file returns, only a small number were farms. In fact, just 112 of those taxed were in agriculture-related sectors.

Karnick said the best fix isn't a higher threshold, but full repeal.

"Yes, the state would lose revenue short-term,"

Karnick said. "But over time, you get more production, more private-sector activity, and more economic growth. That's what expands your tax base, not driving family farms out of business."

A bill at the Illinois Statehouse backed by both Republicans and Democrats would raise the farm exemption to \$6 million but remains in committee. Karnick questioned why transferring assets from parent to child should be taxed in the first place.

"When they say we'll raise the threshold, I think what they're trying to do is square the circle," Karnick said. "So when you say, 'okay, we're going to raise the cap,' what you're saying is that 'we found more farmers we're going to say we care about."





- Art education.



Stark County roads second safest in state

TOULON – A new statewide traffic study by Onward Injury Law has named Stark County the second safest county in Illinois for car accidents, based on 2022 crash data from the Illinois Department of Transpor-

With just 44 reported crashes and zero fatalities that year, Stark trails only Hardin County in overall road

safety.

Stark County's low crash rate is likely influenced by its small population of 5.313 and the absence of any interstate highways, which tend to carry higher-speed, higher-risk traf-

"It's fascinating to see how the picture changes when you adjust the statewide data for population," said Brook Paslay, Director of Marketing at Onward Injury Law. "This ranking shows how less-congested roads and

thoughtful driving habits can have a real impact."






