Pritzker picks running mate for 2026

Mitchell in for Stratton By BEN SZALINSKI

Gov. JB Pritzker announced Tuesday that former Deputy Gov. Christian Mitchell will be his running mate for the 2026 campaign.

Pritzker's selection, made just days after announcing a third campaign for governor, comes from a close circle of trust in Pritzker's administration. Mitchell previously served in the governor's office as one of four deputy governors overseeing key projects in Pritzker's first term.

"Christian Mitchell is a proven leader with deep experience, steady judgment, and an unshakable commitment to the working families of Illinois," Pritzker said in a state-

ment. "Whether it's transforming our clean energy future, rebuilding our infrastructure, or keeping our communities safe, Christian has been a force behind so much of our progress. I couldn't ask for a better partner to continue delivering results for the people of Illinois."

Mitchell, 38, will replace Lt. Gov. Juliana Stratton on the ticket

as she seeks the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate.

Mitchell comes in with hefty experience in state government and public policy. A resident of Chicago's Hyde Park neighborhood, Mitchell served three terms in the Illinois House beginning in 2013 and was executive director of the

Warrant issued for former Toulon man

TOULON – A bench warrant was issued June 27 for the arrest of Brant R. Knowles, 23, formerly of Champaign and Toulon. His current address and whereabouts are unknown.

Knowles was charged last Sept. 16 with Class 2 felonies of burglary and theft, plus a Class A misdemeanor of criminal trespass to state land.

The bench warrant was issued in Stark County Circuit Court for failure to appear in court for the above charges. His court appointed Public Defender Bradley P. Popurella, of Princeton, told Judge James A. Mack that he has had no contact

with Knowles since his initial court appearance on Nov. 15, 2024.

Knowles has failed to appear the past seven times when scheduled for court. He has been impli-

cated in the burglary and theft of items from Wyoming's Illinois Department of

Transportation site on South 7th Street. It is alleged that he and Caleb Deck stole various items from that facility and possibly from other immediate area locations.

Oglesby found guilty of murder

For The Prairie News GALESBURG - Marcy Oglesby was led from a Knox County courtroom to jail last week, possibly never to be free

After a bailiff placed Oglesby in handcuffs, the person who might have been second-most responsible for that situation was the one in tears.

"I'm just very relieved that we were able to get justice for Richard Young. That's what it's about," Knox County State's At-

torney Ashley Worby said after a judge convicted Oglesby of Young's murder.

A path that began with Young's death in late 2021, continued to the discovery of his body a year later and included murder charges that were dropped and reinstated, came to a four-minute conclusion June 26 in a gray-painted, woodpaneled room on the second story of the Knox County Courthouse.

Following lunch on the fourth day of a bench trial, Judge Andrew Doyle found Oglesby guilty of first-degree murder, attempted

murder and aggravated battery regarding the poisoning death of Young. He spent 30 years as a police officer in Maquon, which has about 220 residents.

Law-enforcement officers found Young's body in October 2022 in a Maquon storage unit after neighbors complained about an odor. Oglesby, 53, who admitted hiding Young's remains, was arrested shortly thereafter.

Oglesby was found not guilty of concealing a homicide. According to Worby, that verdict Continued on Page 2

OGLESBY: Sentencing scheduled for Sept. 3

Continued from Page 1 and Oglesby being on pretrial release from jail were linked to the earlier dismissal of the murder charge. Doyle did that in early 2023 because of speedy-trial concerns, but a state appellate court overruled him.

The next scheduled court appearance in Galesburg for Oglesby is Sept. 3, for her sentencing. The murder charge mandates a 20-to-60-year state-prison term, to be served in full. Until then, Oglesby is to remain in the county jail.

Oglesby decided not to testify, according to one of her attorneys, public defender Christopher Kanthak. Clad in a pastel-pink T-shirt and black shorts, Oglesby departed the front of the courtroom before Worby and friends of Young exchanged hugs and well-wishes in the back.

This was Worby's first successful murder prosecution since she became state's attorney last December. She was an assistant state's attorney when Oglesby first was charged.

"So many hours over the course of years to get here," wet-eyed Worby said. "And hours of sleep lost and time away from my family to make sure that Richard can rest in peace. I have to keep this emotional distance so I can get through it. There's just a huge amount of relief and release for everyone."

If someone writes a book about this case, it could be titled "The Visine Killer." The prosecution maintained Oglesby put eye drops and other medication in her longtime boyfriend's food and drink over three or four months beginning in the summer of 2021.

Young's death, in late October or early November of that year, was from tetrahydrozoline intoxication, according to Dr. Amanda Youmans, who performed the autopsy in Peoria.

Tetrahydrozoline is the active ingredient in eye drops. The drug is harmless when used as intended but can be fatal if ingested.

"This was the first time I had an autopsy where this drug was detected," Youmans said June 24 on the witness stand. "It's significant, because it's an over-the-counter eye medication."

In her closing argument two days later, Worby said Oglesby's two-pronged motive – financial and romantic – was as old as time.

To access Young's bank accounts, Oglesby initiated purchase of an 80-acre Knoxville-area farm that had a listed price of \$800,000. She and Young were to reside there. In evidence offered in court, Young texted friends about how he was planning to purchase a tractor.

But after the deal fell through, Oglesby drained at least \$60,000 from Young's savings, Worby said.

"And she is just spending it,"
Worby said. "On what, we don't
know. She has no source of money
other than Richard Young's bank account"

Oglesby worked for years in the medical field but had no recent gainful employment, according to Worby. Oglesby intended to pursue an art-related career, possibly with a Nigerian man nicknamed "Sonny."

In an interview police recorded shortly after Young's body was found, Oglesby accused Young of being stingy. She also said she and the Nigerian never met in person. They communicated online.

"More like a fantasy, more like something that filled in the blanks," Oglesby said during the interview, which the court heard June 25. "We're 6,224 miles apart. I was with someone who was 22 years older than me and not the most affectionate

person in the world. I had a midlife crisis."

Not long after the farm deal was aborted, 71-year-old Young tested positive in August 2021 for COVID-19. He didn't consult a doctor, according to court testimony. He texted associates about feeling dizzy, nauseous and unsteady.

"That's when the light bulbs go off," Worby said. "She's not going to be able to pay back this money, and Richard is going to be upset she's taken over 60 grand from him.

"Perhaps Marcy caught something on TV about eye drops, and she got an idea. Rick is ill. She wants to get rid of him. How is she going to get out of it? This is her opportunity."

Worby also referred to testimony Galesburg police officer Timothy Spitzer offered June 25. He conducted digital analysis of Young's cellphone and determined Oglesby commandeered it in November 2021.

Oglesby impersonated Young in responses to text messages his phone received after October, Spitzer's evidence indicated. Selfies of Young taken between July and Novembershowed him becoming increasingly gaunt and bruised.

On the final day of the trial, the defense called two witnesses. One was Karen Doubet, Oglesby's 79-year-old godmother, who earlier in court implicated Oglesby and alleged her eyedrop abuse. The other witness was Craig Chatterton, a forensic toxicologist for the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner in Edmonton, Alberta. A paid witness, Chatterton disputed conclusions about how Young died.

Chatterton said tests of muscle tissue, which in Young indicated skyhigh levels of tetrahydrozoline, were not as accurate as tests of blood. That option wasn't available because Young's body had decomposed.





nity, and making sure every community has the resources and opportunities they deserve. This is about delivering real results for the people of Illinois, and I'm excited to get to work."

Though the lieutenant governor has few constitutional responsibilities in Illinois, Pritzker has leveraged the position to task Stratton with leading key legislative initiatives and overseeing the implementation of some of his administration's top priorities at state agencies.

If Pritzker is elected to another term, the role will hold greater importance as Pritzker considers running for president in 2028.

presidency would require Mitchell to serve the final two years of his term.


While keeping Mitchell's selection under wraps, Pritzker told reporters in recent days he was looking for a running mate who was ready to immediately step into the governorship if required.

"The number one qualification is, 'can you do the job of being governor because if you're lieutenant governor, that may come to you," Pritzker said.

"The second thing I think about is person who I might choose for lieutenant governor somebody who has a heart for all the people of Illinois, not just some or some specific segment of the population because we have a big, diverse state," he said.

In 2020 and 2021, Mitchell oversaw the negotiations of Pritzker's marquee climate policy - the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act. It massively reformed the utility and energy industry and requires all fossil fuel power plants to close by 2045.

Mitchell was responsible for representing the governor in negotiations around the bill and was the face of the Pritzker administration as it went through the legislature.



The class is held from 5-10 p.m. both nights. You must be present both nights. Those attending must be at least 9 years old by Dec. 31, 2025.




