Farmington approves grant for Ulms' parlor

For The Weekly Post FARMINGTON - A traveling ice-cream shop will set down roots next year with help from the Farmington City Council.

At its Monday meeting, the council approved a \$20,000 commercial TIF grant for Kent and Bobbi Ulm to help acquire 64 E. Fort St. The loan will be forgiven over four years.

The building once housed a barber shop but will eventually be the home for Lefty's Parlor, where the Ulms will create and sell handdipped ice cream. The Ulms expect to close on the property in August but will need time to add a commercial kitchen. Bobbi Ulm said she expects the storefront to

Williamsfield will get assist from donation

WILLIAMSFIELD - Village government in Williamsfield is on the verge of owning what has been an assisted-living facility. But village officials don't plan to own it for long.

Following closed session Monday nght,

the Williamsfield Village Board voted to accept the donation of Williamsfield Retirement Center from its Galesburg-based owner, Achievement Unlimited Inc. The

facility is in the process of shuttering, Village President Robert Johnson said after the board meeting.

After the village takes possession, it plans to sell the building and property. Proceeds from the sale could fund various village improvements and initiatives, according to Johnson.

State trims funds for housing programs

The number of homeless people in Illinois is rising, but the state's spending on homeless prevention and other housing programs is headed in the other direction.

Facing a tight budget year with constrained spending and limited natural revenue growth, the \$55.1 billion fiscal year 2026 budget that took effect July 1 reduces total funding for ing to the governor's office, despite housing programs by more than \$14 million, including Gov. JB Pritzker's

signature initiative designed to eliminate homelessness in Illinois.

"Last year homelessness increased 116% in the state of Illinois," Doug Kenshol, co-founder of the Illinois Shelter Alliance, told Capitol News Illinois. "To be in the midst of this crisis and then have the state cut funding was beyond disappointing."

Discretionary spending rose by less than 1% in the FY26 budget, accordtotal spending increasing by \$2 billion. That minimal spending growth

led lawmakers to reduce several programs.

"Is it enough? No, it isn't ... we know that homelessness is an existential crisis, and the state of Illinois takes this seriously," Sen. Adriane Johnson, D-Buffalo Grove, who serves on a state homeless prevention task force, told Capitol News Illinois. "We have a really bold vision for ending homelessness and we're going to continue down that path."

Pritzker first established a task force by executive order in 2021 that Continued on Page 7

"If this comes to fruition, if all the stars align, this will be a godsend for the village," Johnson said. "We've got some debt and we've got some projects that have needed to be done for 20-30 years but we just never had the money for.

"It would behoove us to take this money and fix all the problems we've had. Instead of raising taxes to pay for all that, we'll be able to use that to support the infrastructure that's been neglected." Achievement Unlimited, a not-for-profit organization, purchased the property in 2008 for \$872,500, according to Knox County tax records.

Located at 112 Illinois Route 180, Williamsfield Retirement Center has 16 rooms. Most recently, it was a group home for the developmentally disabled, according to Ron Wilson, chief financial officer of RFMS Inc. That Galesburg-based firm provides back-office services for Achievement Unlimited.

Frequency of medical trips to and from Gales-

burg for Williamsfield-facility residents as they age was problematic, Wilson suggested.

"It just became a little bit impractical from that standpoint," he said Tuesday. "The location just didn't work anymore."

A woman who answered the telephone Monday night at the Williamsfield facility said it had five residents, all of whom were to move out by Thursday. Williamsfield-facility residents were to be relocated to other group homes Achievement Unlimited operates in Galesburg, Wilson said.

The RFMS board approved the donation in June, according to Wilson. The organization considered selling the property but instead contacted Johnson. He is an

executive at Bridgeway, Inc., a Galesburg-based not-for-profit human-services organization.

"Once the decision was made that it's going to better suit the clients that lived in the Williamsfield home for them to be in Galesburg, the board ... wanted to provide Williamsfield the opportunity to take it if they wanted it, because they thought that was the best use," Wilson said.

Johnson thanked Wilson and the RFMS board for the donation. Negotiations are underway to finalize the transfer of ownership.

Once that process is complete, the village intends to mothball the building and hire an appraiser, according to Johnson. Sealed bids for the property would be solicited.


"Hopefully somebody is interested in running that kind of facility, or maybe they'll do something different with it," Johnson said.

A new village administration facility, new lawn-mowing equipment and paying off recently purchased vehicles are among items that the sale of the building could help finance, according to Johnson.

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

Sometimes you need to put lipstick on a pig

Six months into my first job as pup reporter in another century, I pestered my boss to transfer me from the green fields of north-central Iowa to the story-littered streets of Washington, D.C., to cover the just-brewing 1980s ag crisis.

My pitch was earnest and honest: As the crisis began to bleed rural

Americans' profit and hope, government would be forced to take a more active role in everyday decision-making with programs like new farm loan guarantees, ruralbank bailouts. more farm pro-

gram payments and increased assistance for about-to-be-hammered rural communities.

My boss, a reliably cautious man, pondered the request for a week, then said no. His reasoning was straightforward and unforgettable: Congress, he explained, wasn't interested in expanding government's role in U.S. agriculture and neither were U.S. farmers.

So, he concluded, I wouldn't be needed to cover that "big" story because it was going to be a big non-

Not his best decision. A quick, back-of-the-envelope calculation shows that direct farm program payments made to U.S. farmers since that 1981 non-story have totaled, in nominal (not inflation-indexed) dollars, somewhere between \$585 billion and \$600 billion.

Indirect support payments – like federal subsidies to crop insurance companies, "export enhancement" programs, decades-long import tariffs on commodities like ethanol and sugar and any other of the now 150 U.S. Department of Agriculture administered "farm" programs - have added hundreds of billions more.

This generation-by-generation growth is almost perfectly displayed this year. According to USDA's own forecast, direct federal farm support will hit \$42.4 billion in 2025, a 354% increase over 2024's \$9.3 billion. Only 2020's \$45.6 billion, the last time U.S. agriculture faced Trump Administration-imposed trade tariffs, was larger.

Perhaps most surprising, 2025's total net farm income, forecast at \$180 billion, will be just \$2 billion under 2022's record net farm income of \$182 billion. Interestingly, government farm payments that year were \$27 billion less than this year's nearrecord amount.

Farmers and ranchers aren't the only ones watching this heavily lobbied Congress send a river of taxpayer money to farmers.

Big agbiz firms have an abiding interest in seeing steady-to-rising U.S. farm income and steady-to-rising government payments. For example, Deere & Co.'s share prices soared from \$418 on Jan. 2 to \$514 on June 23, a remarkable 21% leap while the overall general stock market and most ag commodity markets have hovered on either side of flat over the same six-month period.

Government, of course, has dozens of ways to indirectly impact ag markets. Two weeks ago, farmers and agbiz anxiously awaited word on how much biofuel production the Trump Administration – no friend of biofuels in the past – would mandate for 2026. Their fears, however, were sent packing by completely unforeseen good news.

"In a move that surprised biofuel industry analysts and sent soybean prices skyrocketing by 25 cents" – it was a modest, 2% ride skyward – "the (EPA) announced... its highest ever volume requirements for American grown biofuels in the Renewable Fuels Standard," explained the Michigan Farm Bureau.

So, just like that, U.S. farmers now have another big, beautiful - and centrally planned - government program to continue to produce billions of bushels of corn and soy feedstock for biofuels that are, at best, debatably "green" and, at worst, not even necessary.

As such, it's well past time we call these ever-larger, ever-more-costly transfer payment schemes to farmers - and the handful of the rural industrialists and multi-generational, corporate "family farms" who capture the vast majority of them – by their proper name: rural industrial policy.

Or, if you prefer, ag policy with lip-

Man loses pinkie finger in fireworks accident

EDWARDS – A firework that exploded inside a moving vehicle near Edwards severed the left pinkie finger of the man who lit it, according to authorities.

Shrapnel injured two people. Criminal charges were pending earlier this week against the man, who is from the Hanna City area, according to the Peoria County Sheriff's Office. An investigation was in progress.

The incident happened about 9:30 p.m. July 1 inside an eastbound 2015 Jeep Grand Cherokee in the 11900 block of Illinois Route 8. The injured were transported to OSF Saint Francis Medical Center in Peoria.

At the hospital, the man said he purchased legal fireworks from a

local stand, according to a sheriff's office report. As he was sitting in a back seat of the vehicle, he lit a 2inch-wide artillery-shell firework.

The man said he was trying to shoot the firework through the vehicle's open sunroof, but it detonated faster than he expected. He admitted drinking several alcoholic beverages earlier in the evening.

According to the report, the man's left hand was split between his second and third finger. His left pinkie was missing. Brimfield firefighters found the missing digit under the rear driver's-side passenger seat.

St. Francis medical staff were uncertain if the man would require a transfer to the burn unit of a Springfield hospital.

An injured woman said she was sit-

ting in a front seat of the vehicle and talking with other occupants when she heard an explosion and sparks blinded her. She sustained scattered cuts and punctures to her upper-left thigh, left arm and left shoulder.

The woman, who was sitting in front of the suspect, she said she didn't see who was holding the firework.

A boy who was in the middle back seat sustained scattered cuts and punctures and possible right-leg and left-shin burns. Surgery was possible, according to medical staff. The boy identified the suspect as the person who lit the firework.



Brimfield approves generator for village hall

BRIMFIELD - The Brimfield Village Board approved the purchase and installation of a backup generator for the new village hall.

The on-site generator will be able to provide the building with air conditioning, heat and lights being run at maximum capacity if the village needs a crisis center. The purchase will initially cost \$18,000 but will include a 40% tax credit (\$7,200) since the generator is being run through the current solar project.

Several sidewalks in Brimfield will see repairs and lifts coming up, with

18 different trip hazards identified by the village and approved for repair. The repairs will come in waves in order to spread the cost over more than one annual budget -\$3,000 has been approved for this year for this proj-

The Brimfield Men's Club recently put up a new power pole on North Galena Avenue, which was fired up for the first time last week. The power pole eliminates the need for a generator with a wire running across the intersection during carnivals and events. It also makes it easier for the Men's Club to set up and tear down their equipment. The club had

originally budgeted \$2,000 for the installation, but the project went over budget. The wire alone cost about \$1,500 and the rest of the supplies cost nearly \$1,200, bringing the bill closer to \$2,700.

Because the village will benefit from the installation, the Men's Club asked the village board to consider a donation for the improvement. The board approved \$1,300 for the reimbursement of the electrical panel.

The board also approved an ordinance placing a 1% local sales tax on groceries, replacing the state's tax on groceries set to expire on Jan. 1 – maintaining the tax the village was already

Until then, the Ulms will sell ice cream out of a trailer. The business moved to a mobile operation after spending this spring in the LJ's Coffee storefront in downtown Farmington.

Kent Ulm said a top seller is butter pecan, though he said Reese's and fudge also sells well.

The Lefty's Parlor grant was one of several recommended by the CEDC on June 26 and OK'd by the council Monday. Other grants went to Jonetta Scapecchi, \$12,735 for overhead-door replacement at Lane Transfer; Bob Batterton, \$2,100 for sealcoating the Spin City parking lot; Scott Anderson, approximately \$8,000, with

\$4,092.84 to be paid after completion of a new roof over his Subway building and the rest paid out annually for three years; Jane Rutledge, \$2,500 for new windows; Jim Nadar, \$2,500 toward a new roof; Greg Holloway, \$2,500 for tree removal; and Verda Roberts, \$1,000 for gutters.

Previous grants that were reapproved went to the Farmington Moose Lodge, \$5,317.50 for door replacement; LaVonna Kenney, \$2,500 for concrete work; Brad and Dawn Ward, \$1,000 for an awning; Vern Oldfield, \$2,400 for tree removal; and Stan Hansard, \$1,125 for tree removal.

In other business, the council tentatively approved a \$6,550 bid from Spoon River Mechanical to install a new 5-ton, 14-seer air-conditioning unit in the Farmington Community Center. Spoon River Mechanical had the lowest of three bids submitted and will get the job so long as it can install the unit before dance classes start Aug. 9.

UTVs and golf carts will no longer face time constraints within city limits after the council approved an amendment to a city ordinance. Previously, UTVs and golf carts were not allowed on city streets after 11 p.m., according to Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam.

The council also approved a \$250 donation to an Aug. 24 Back to School Bash at Reed Park.

An ordinance requiring registration of vacant homes was tabled.

Continued from Page 1 would create a plan for "Home Illinois" to reduce homelessness in the state to "functional zero" where homelessness is temporary and people without housing can quickly obtain housing resources. The executive order did not set a date for the state to reach func-


tional zero, and funding for Home Illinois is declining by \$26.6 million in FY26.

While some housing programs saw increases that offset reductions to Home Illinois, total spending on housing programs is down by \$14.6 million in the FY26 budget, to \$354 million.

An October report by a

Department of Human Services task force shows the state had 25,787 unhoused people on the night of the annual "point in time" count in January 2024 – a 116% increase from 2023.

The increase is largely driven by migrants who have been sent to Illinois by other states.





Gross back at Princeville

Veteran girls hoops coach plans to return for 50th season

John Gross has his sights set on at least one more season of coaching girls basketball.

The veteran Princeville coach, who last year celebrated his 900th victory, said Monday he anticipates being on the bench for a 50th year this fall, barring any unforeseen health issues. Gross was with his Lady Princes team for all but one week of summer play.

"Right now, we look pretty good," Gross said. "We've got four starters back and had a pretty good summer."

Gross has been at Princeville since 2015. Prior to that he led Limestone and Peoria Richwoods to girls state finals, winning titles with Richwoods in 2005 (Class AA) and 2009 (Class 3A) and placing second in Class AA at Limestone in 1992

Last season he expressed some uncertainty about returning due to health concerns. Gross had a pacemaker replaced this summer and said it has made a difference in how he feels.

"I'm planning on it," he said. "It just depends on my health. I want to be able to do a good job."

Gross should have the players to help make that happen, with only Paisley Schock graduated from his top six.

Leading scorer Sahara Streitmatter returns along with fellow starters Bethany Sennett, Addison Buckley and Reagan Calder and top reserve Kamryn Smith.

GREEN ENERGY ISN'T "CLEAN ENERGY"

While green advocates commonly use the terms renewable, sustainable, and net zero to describe their efforts, the dirty little secret is that much of the waste from solar panels and wind turbines is ending up in landfills.

The current amounts of fiberglass, resins, aluminum and other chemicals – not to mention propeller blades from giant wind turbines – pose no threat current to local town dumps, but this largely ignored problem will become more of a challenge in the years ahead as the 500 million solar panels and the 73,000 wind turbines now operating in the U.S. are decommissioned and replaced. Greens insist that reductions in carbon emissions will more than compensate for increased levels of potentially toxic garbage; others fret that renewable energy advocates have not been forthright about their lack of eco-friendly plans and the technology to handle the waste.

"Nobody planned on this, nobody had a plan to get rid of them, nobody planned for closure," said Dwight Clark, whose company, Solar E Waste Solutions, recycles solar panels. "Nobody thought this through."

I he blades (from wind turbines) are so big that they are usually broken into three pieces when decommissioned, and the giant chunks of fiberglass, resin, and composite materials go to landfills or warehouses.

Already, horror stories exist of municipalities faced with decommissioning problems. Towns like Sweetwater, Texas, which for many years has been the leading state for wind power, have seen turbine recycling contracts ignored. Global Fiberglass Solutions, one of the companies handling such contracts, did not return requests for comment.

"You can't reuse turbines, and there are now thousands upon thousands of blades just sitting there in warehouses already," Isaac said. "It's an environmental disaster we're looking at." From RealClearInvestigations
