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New component for graduation

Brimfield superintendent proposes community-service requirement

For The Weekly Post BRIMFIELD - A community-service graduation requirement for Brimfield High School students probably will take effect in about one year.

Details are to be determined, according to Brimfield Superintendent Chad Jones. He presented the proposed requirement July 23 to the Brimfield School Board as part of a review of the district's five-year strategic plan, which is in its second academic year.

The community-service component wouldn't be implemented until the

2026-27 academic year. Jones said he has heard from district stakeholders about a need to get students more involved in the community.

"We wanted to try to start that this year," Jones said about a 2025-26 term that begins Aug. 13. "We thought it would take a year to get more buy-in with the kids.

Springing into new manufacturing site

Greenfield Contractors officials suggested a possible autumn start for construction on 15½ acres at the north edge of town,

Princeville Public Works Superintendent Chad Gardner told the Village Board when it met July 22.

According to Gardner, Greenfield owner Lucas Young previously indicated the expansion might commence next spring. Greenfield specializes in constructing fabric-cov-

Showcasing Brimfield's history

Brimfield Area Museum 'a dream come true' and will open to the public

For The Weekly Post BRIMFIELD - It began with a dream imagined by the Brimfield Historical Society as far back as its 1986 inception: a place for Brimfield-area artifacts, memorabilia and documents.

Until now, the historical society has only been able to accept documents because it lacked a place to store donated items. The Brimfield Public Library once had a history room that dis-



played some items, but somewhere along the line, that room was quietly removed.

When the village decided to move town hall to the former Methodist

church, a space became available for the Historical Society's vision of a museum. Brimfield Village Board established the Brimfield Area Museum on July 7 and approved a budget. Kim Hanks, the museum coordinator, described the opportunity as "a dream come true."

"It's a huge gift to the community," she said. "We're honored that we're a part of it. I just can't even believe it."

Once the work began, volunteers became the backbone of the museum's progress. The fruits of their work will be open for public perusal starting Saturday, Aug. 2, during the Super Cruise-In. The museum Continued on Page 9

Continued from Page 1 be able to want to do it."

Service time is to be prorated by class, according to Jones. He acknowledged he isn't sure how many hours of service is appropriate, but 100 hours has been discussed.

The impending requirement is part of the community aspect of the strategic plan, one of four prongs. The others are district health, teaching and learning and climate and culture.

Among other potential implementations for the

upcoming two academic years are activities designed to promote school spirit. A reunification drill, in case of a campus emergency, also is planned.

The Peoria County Sheriff's Office was to visit district buildings this week, in part to learn the lay of the land, according to Jones. He also highlighted recent security upgrades, including new doors and key-fob entry systems.

"I don't want to make our schools look like

prisons, but you can always be safer," Jones said. "We've got to make sure we're doing everything we can within our budget to make our schools as safe as can be."

Following the presentation, board members authorized the transfer of \$1 million from the district working-cash fund to its capital-projects fund. The planned transfer is to help cover outstanding expenses from renovations at Brimfield Grade School, among other things.

Other items approved included a three-year contract with the Brimfield teachers' union. The annual salary schedule for 2025-26 ranges from \$45,725 to \$88,175, depending on experience and education level. The ranges for 2026-27 and 2027-28 are \$47,125 to

\$90,701 and \$48,525 to \$93,226, respectively.


The board also OK'd a \$15,437.50 deal with C.J.L. Landscaping, Inc., of Brimfield for mulch at the grade-school playground area.

Regarding personnel, the board approved hiring Rich Monk as a gradeschool paraprofessional, Jeff Blundy as a gradeschool volunteer assistant basketball coach, Maggie Butterfield as a gradeschool volunteer cross country and track coach, Jason Snyder as a gradeschool boys and girls golf coach, Dalton Wills as grade-school baseball head coach and Chris Yocum as 7th grade boys basketball coach.

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

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


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

Board OKs sale of district-owned house

ELMWOOD - The Elmwood School Board on July 21 approved a bid of \$777 for a house owned by the school district at 205 W. Ash St.

Barry Shoop of Elmwood submitted the only bid for the house and attached garage. He now has 90 days to move the house from the property and an additional 30 days to remove all debris and reclaim the house site.

Shoop has indicated he plans to move the house to a lot he owns in Elmwood.

Not all construction news was





good, as the width of the main court in the remodeled elementary school gym was inadvertently reduced by nearly 8 feet. The flooring company, TSI Commercial Floor Covering,

had used IESA regulations of 42 feet, 8 inches for the court, but the school wanted a width of 50 feet. The company remedied the mistake for no additional cost by installing new flooring on the edges of the court. The gym is ready for the first day of school on Aug. 14.

At the start of the meeting, the board also honored Tony McCoy, who has retired after serving the district for 32 years as a teacher, coach and, most recently, as junior and senior high school principal.

"McCoy's passion for education, steady leadership and genuine care for every student have shaped a legacy of excellence and integrity,"

Elmwood Superintendent Joel Schmieg said.

The board also approved several personnel matters for the 2025-26 school year, including hiring Katherine Janovetz as a special-education teacher, Emily Bonebrake as a high school biology teacher, Thomas Huffcutt as an elementary aide, Garrett German as a part-time media center aide, Rachel Wintern as a substitute aide and Ian Smith as a substitute custodian.

Extracurricular approvals were Cooper Hoffmann as high school girls track coach, Karla Begner as high school JV volleyball coach and Tara Lim as a volunteer junior-high scholastic bowl coach.

Finally, the board approved ele-

mentary-school teacher Shauna Blum's letter of notice for retirement at the conclusion of the 2028-29 school year. The letter was submitted after the June 1 deadline, but Schmieg said because it is based on unique circumstances it does not create a precedent.

In other business, the board approved Schmieg to develop a tentative budget for Fiscal Year 2026, substitute-teacher pay rates of \$150 per day and \$200 for long-term substitutes, various PRESS policy changes, an updated extracurricular activities policy and code of conduct. No changes were made to previous expectations or to the consequences for violations of the code of conduct.

Continued from Page 1 ered and steel-framed agricultural buildings. It also has offices in Iowa and

Young has inquired about possible connection to village water and sewer systems, Gardner said. That could be accomplished in the spring, depending on construction bids. Septicsystem installation at the site also is possible.

Greenfield has planned to build an office and a 20,000-square-foot area for fabrication and inventory storage, among other uses. The site is just north of the Dollar General store at 1107 N. Santa Fe Ave. That's across the street and north of the current Greenfield facility.

In 2023, Young first presented his plan to the board. The 151/2-acre plot was unincorporated, but the village later annexed it. At the time, Young said construction was about two years away ideally.

Shortly after Gardner addressed trustees, some of them expressed reservations about children operating motorized vehicles in the village. Of particular concern to Trustee Donald Peterson Jr. was two kids aboard the same electric scooter, something he's seen recently.

"When you've got two people on one scooter, it's a recipe for disaster," Peterson said. "I'd rather be safe than sorry when it comes to that type of stuff."

Village President Jeff Troutman also cautioned about underage kids driving golf carts in town. Only licensed drivers are allowed to operate them. Peterson suggested more rigorous law enforcement.

Regarding action items, the board approved a \$27,500 deal with The Best Roofing of Yorkville to install new roofing at the

Village Hall and the municipal water-treatment plant. Gardner said he considered metal roofs, but the expense was prohibitive. The new shingles have a 30-year warranty.

"Metal roofing is nice, but 30-year shingles, that's a good warranty," Trustee Spencer Wilson said.

The Village Hall roof hasn't been replaced in at least 30 years, according to Gardner. The roof at the water-treatment plant last was replaced in 1998.

Also approved was a taxincrement-financing redevelopment agreement with Princeville Prints, Inc. The screen-printing business located at 132 E. Main St. is to be reimbursed up to \$5,471 for a new heating, ventilation and air-conditioning system.

The board authorized placement of a 12-by-16foot prefabricated storage shed at 419 W. Blanchard St. It also approved Res-

idential Rehabilitation Program reimbursements of \$2,500 each for a roof and siding at 614 E. Main St. and garage and driveway improvements at 430 E. Spring St.

Solar-panel building permits were issued for structures at 210 N. Ellen Ave. and 1475 N. Town Ave.

When the board met July 7, it approved Residential Rehabilitation Program reimbursements of \$1,273.34 for a garage roof at 112 E. South St. and \$2,500 each for windows at 410 N. Santa Fe Ave., a garage roof at 324 E. North St., paint at 216 E. North St. and siding at 213 W. Spring St.

Building permits were reported at that meeting for a pool at 415 N. Walnut Ave., alterations and dock expansion at 917 N. Santa Fe Ave., a wood pergola at 611 N. Aten Ave. and a 4foot chain-link fence at 602 N. Town Ave.



Charges dropped for key witness in homicide

GALESBURG – A key witness in a trial that ended in a Maquon woman's murder conviction no longer is in legal trouble.

As part of a plea bargain, Karen Doubet was sentenced July 15 in Knox County Circuit Court to two years of non-reporting probation after she pleaded guilty to concealment of a homicidal death. The charge stems from the death of former Maquon Police Chief Richard Young.

Doubet's goddaughter, Marcy Oglesby, was found guilty in June of murdering Young, whose body was found in October 2022 in a Maquon storage unit about a year after he died. Oglesby poisoned Young with eye drops and drained his bank accounts of at least \$60,000, prosecutors argued successfully.

Knox County State's Attorney Ashley Worby dropped multiple criminal accusations against Doubet in exchange for her testimony against Oglesby. Among charges Judge Andrew Doyle dismissed were first-degree murder and two counts of aggravated battery.

Doubet appeared earlier this month

in front of Doyle, the same judge who found Oglesby guilty following a four-day bench trial. Doubet was accompanied by her attorney, public defender Christopher Colburn. She received credit for time served in jail four days – and her court costs were waived.

Oglesby is scheduled to be sentenced Sept. 3. She faces between 20 and 60 years in state prison. Meanwhile, she is being held at the Knox County Jail. Oglesby also has been accused in Fulton County of passing bad checks. A hearing in that felony case is scheduled for Sept. 24.

The museum will also be open during Old Settlers Days from 4-7 p.m. on Aug. 7-8 and from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. on Aug. 9.

Regular hours start Aug. 11, with the museum open from 4-7 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays and 10 a.m.-2 p.m. on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

"We've been really blessed with the number of people that have already come on board and that are willing to work in the future," Hanks said. "This lets me know that this is the right thing at the right time."

Village employees cleared the building of furniture, Clarence Catton donated 13 display cases from his farm and the Brimfield Men's Club moved the cases and set them up. In addition, six other volunteers moved items from the Historical Society to the museum building, Kelly Fletcher and her team of volunteers cleaned all of the cases and several collections have been donated or loaned to the museum.

A volunteer board of directors was appointed by the Village Board and includes Fletcher, Charlene Dye, Janet Fishel, Emily Mathias and Brandi Lester. Fletcher creates every display in the museum.

"When you walk in here, what you see is from her," Hanks said of the displays.

Nancy Jenkins has framed everything herself and Mathias has been creating signage.

Among the items housed within the museum are Brimfield-area memorabilia, a street lantern used prior to electricity, record books and a casket display table. During Old Settlers Days, there will be a special display of Old Settlers memorabilia.

The Henrietta Memler research room will be available to learn more about

• **PRINCEVILLE** – Law-enforcement authorities were searching for an apparent reckless driver whose vehicle collided with another south of Princeville.

Subsequently, another person told authorities an eastbound SUV on Parks School Road almost hit him while he was riding a side-by-side. One of the SUV's headlights was missing. The Lucerne sustained major damage to the driver's-side rear door, rear wheel, rear fender and rear bumper and was towed.

• TRIVOLI – A faulty riding lawnmower might have caused a fire that destroyed a barn west of Trivoli.

The blaze began shortly before 4:30 p.m. July 6 in the 20900 block of Illinois Route 116, according to a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report. A deputy arrived to find the barn fully engulfed in flames.

A 49-year-old man owns the property. He said he had just finished mowing the yard and backed the mower into the barn. He spent the next 20 minutes or so unloading his camper, then looked out one of its windows and saw flames around the mower, the report stated.

The fuel-line valve on the mower had been malfunctioning, the owner said. The barn appeared to be a total loss. Firefighters from the Elmwood, Farmington and Logan-Trivoli departments responded.








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



Food prices follow inflation uptick

After a few months of a downward trend, inflation is on the rise again, with food prices following suit.

The latest Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased 0.3% in June and 2.7% in the past 12 months.

Food prices rose faster than overall inflation. The CPI for all food increased 0.3% from April to May, with food prices in May 2.9% higher than a year ago.

Prices for beef and veal jumped 8.6% higher in May compared to a year ago. Overall, beef and veal prices are predicted to increase 6.8% this year due to tight supplies and continued consumer demand.

"U.S. demand for beef has remained strong even as prices hit record highs," said Bernt Nelson, American Farm Bureau Federation economist, who noted the domestic cattle supply is at a 74-year low.

Meanwhile, pork prices rose 0.7% from April to May. Pork prices are predicted to increase a modest 0.5% in 2025. In contrast to beef, pork production is projected to increase this year.

"It is a bit of a delicate balance and especially with all the global uncertainty, more measured (pork) production growth is probably beneficial in these times," said Erin Borrer of the U.S. Meat Export Federation.

Retail egg prices decreased for the second month in a row, falling 7.5%. Egg prices in May were still 41.5% higher than in May 2024, continuing to experience volatile month-to-month changes due to an outbreak of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) that began in 2022.

Whitney's Walk raises \$73,000 at annual event

BRIMFIELD - The 22nd annual Whitney's Walk for Suicide Prevention and Awareness attracted hundreds of participants to Jubilee College State Park on Saturday and raised more than \$73,000 to support mental-health education.

Organized by Carle Health Center for Philanthropy in Greater Peoria, the annual event has raised more than \$1.8 million since it started in 2004.

The event was started by the family of Whitney Grotts, who died by suicide. According to organizers, Jubilee College State Park was one of her favorite places and lime green – the color of shirts worn by walk participants - was Grotts' favorite.

Graham breaks ground on Galesburg center

GALESBURG – Graham Health System has broken ground on a new \$6.6 million ambulatory surgery center at 2028 N Seminary St.

Graham is investing \$5.1 million in the facility and \$1,500,000 in technology to expand access to highquality, affordable surgical care in rural and underserved communities.

The new facility will include two operating rooms and 15 pre- and post-surgical bays, offering a wide range of outpatient surgical services, many of which are not currently available in the Galesburg service

"This project is a direct response to the needs of the Galesburg community following the closure of Cottage Hospital in 2022," said Bob Senneff, CEO of Graham Health System. "The number of outpatient procedures in the Galesburg market have decreased on an annual basis over 65% since 2013. Our goal is to bring that care back to this market, to keep folks here in town."

Graham Health System, one of Illinois' last remaining independently

owned rural health systems, entered the Galesburg market in 2022. In just over two years, Graham has opened four clinics, including one on the historically underserved south side of Galesburg.

These clinics have already served more than 12,200 patients across 315 distinct zip codes and conducted nearly 45,000 patient visits.

The center is expected to perform over 1,900 surgical procedures in its first year and is set to be fully operational by September 2026.

New law addresses gun storage

Gun owners in Illinois will soon be required to take additional measures to keep their weapons out of the hands of children under a new law signed Monday by Gov. JB Pritzker.

In addition, law-enforcement officers in the state must now start tracing the ownership of any firearm that is recovered from a crime scene, used unlawfully or is believed to be associated with a crime.

Pritzker signed those bills into law at a time when federal courts are growing increasingly skeptical of state and local efforts to curb gun violence. A federal court of appeals is preparing to hear arguments in a challenge to Illinois' most significant recent gun restriction – a ban on assault-style weapons and large-capacity magazines.

"I'm tired, frankly, of treating something completely preventable as inevitable," Pritzker said at a bill signing ceremony in

Chicago. "I'm tired of forcing our children to duck and cover because too many politicians are ducking and covering for the gun industry's money."

Senate Bill 8, known as the Safe Gun Storage Act, prohibits gun owners from storing their weapons in an unsecured manner at any location where they know, or reasonably should know, that the gun could be accessed by a minor, a person at risk of harming themselves or others, or by a person who is prohibited under state or federal law from possessing a firearm.

To secure the weapon, under the law, owners will be required to keep them in a locked container so that

they are inaccessible or unusable by anyone other than the owner.

Gun owners who violate the law could be subject to civil fines of \$500. But those fines could go up to \$1,000 if a minor, at-risk person or prohibited person obtains the firearm, and as high as \$10,000 if such person uses it to kill or injure someone in the course of committing a crime.

In lieu of those fines, courts could instead order the gun owner to perform community service or pay restitution for violating the law.

The new law also provides that gun owners could be subject to civil liability in private lawsuits.

Continued from Page 20 Central, which went 1-1 against Brimfield in a one-day event at Olivet Nazarene University in Bourbonnais. Brimfield also played in June at Delavan, Farmington and Princeville.

Doe began this summer with a broken foot he sustained during baseball season. "I'm not sure we ever saw him at 100 percent," Carlson said.

Incoming seniors Tommy Burkitt and Jackson Kappes and sophomore Griffin Hougham figure to be prominent in Brimfield plans. So do two rising juniors, Luke Estes and Lane Symonds.

"Offensively, I think we're going to be quite a bit better," Carlson said. "If we really pick up the defensive end, I think we could be a real threat."

• Elmwood – Trojans Coach Josh Fugitt believes his team might be at a disadvantage physically and skill-wise this season. That's why part of his summer focus for a relatively young group was on team building.

Elmwood players and coaches spent a few days at a mini-camp in Macomb, including a stay in cabins at the Western Illinois University Horn Field Campus.

It must have worked, at least in part. Elmwood went 5-0 in a two-day event at Seneca. The competition was tailored to the Trojans' level, according to the coach.

"It was exactly what we needed," said Fugitt, who used a

seven-player rotation. "We matched up well. I was probably coaching it a little closer to where I would during the season. A lot of times, it's a glorified scrimmage with officials. A few of the teams we played probably were treating it that way.

"Our guys took a lot of confidence after struggling a lot in the summer. We were playing a lot of sophomores and juniors who have zero varsity experience. It'll take some time, but it was fun."

Elmwood also went 1-1 at Illinois College in Jacksonville in an event truncated by a tornado that struck the area the day before it was to begin.

Incoming senior Garrett Webster, junior Quinton Johns and sophomore Karsyn Bolton are expected to lead Elmwood, which finished 15-15 last season. Johns impressed this summer with his aggressiveness, according to Fugitt.

• Farmington – Depth appears to be a strength for Farmington. The Farmers went 4-1 in a shootout at Monmouth College without two of their top players, Landon Crawford and Jack Gronewold. According to Farmington Coach Marty Lozier, a lot of his basketball players had baseball and football commitments.

That gave some other Farmington basketball players an opportunity. Among those taking advantage were 6-foot-5 incoming sophomore Logan Gardner,

junior Blake Melz and seniors Kaydon Bollinger and Treyven Haroldson, according to Lozier.

"Last year, we had trouble scoring," he said about a team that finished 10-20. "This team, they are scorers. Not just shooters, but scorers. This team (also) gets after it defensively. I think we are a lot quicker this year."

Farmington was host in June to a shootout and a regular league, which attracted 14-15 teams.

Incoming senior Boston Smith led Farmington in scoring last season (17 ppg). Gronewold, who played only about half the season because of injury, averaged 13.2 points and 4.1 rebounds. Helping them will be new junior-varsity coach and Lozier's heir apparent, former Havana head coach Tyler Southwood.

"It's going to be a fun year, I think," Lozier said.

• **Princeville** – Coach Tait Sennett must replace his starting backcourt, among other positions, from a 27-9 team that advanced to the Class 1A sectional finals. He doesn't appear sure the summer clarified much in that regard.

"We didn't get a lot of partici-

pation," Sennett said. "Kids are just doing other things in the summer. Getting everybody together was pretty difficult. But I was proud of them. They learned a lot and they did well."

Princeville lost all five games it played at Monmouth. Its schedule included Class 3A Galesburg and no 1A competition. Princeville also was host to games on Monday nights in June. Brimfield, Peoria Heights and Peoria Christian, which beat the Princes in the sectional, were among the participants.

Returning starter Collin Lowery focused on football this summer, and fellow incoming senior Brady Day played only two nights, according to Sennett. Seniors Caden Blunier and Eli Christianson and junior Blake Dickinson were impressive.

Sennett suggested a guardoriented team in 2024-25 might give way to more post play and height this season. Starters' heights could range from 6-5 to 6-1.

"I don't anticipate us being as good as what we were last year. I'm not going to sugarcoat it," Sennett said. "That was a pretty special group that we had. We could be just as good, just a little different format than what we saw last year."

• ROWVA-Williamsfield — Who might replace Traphagan is a good question, according to R-W Coach Ryan Hart. He indicated that person did not present him-

self during a summer in which the Cougars won only once, against coach-less Bushnell-Prairie City.

"It's going to be a group effort, because he was going to have the ball in his hands all the time," Hart said. "He pretty much had the ball in his hands all the time last year. That is the biggest question going into the year. Our sophomores are decent ballhandlers, but they're not real strong."



Nichols, Wick and senior Henry Powers gave R-W some size – all are in the 6-4 range. Hayden Tucker, a junior, emerged as possibly the best R-W scorer.

R-W played Monday nights in Billtown against North Fulton and Peoria Heights, among others. The Cougars also played at Princeville, as well as a oneday event at Granville Putnam County.

"They need to gain confidence offensively," Hart said. "Defense will be fine, and they're willing to work. They're a good group of kids. We've got to get over the hurdles of confidence, learning how to win and understanding you can be better than the people you are playing."

Brimfield boys enjoy hot start

basketball season doesn't
begin for about four more
months. But Brimfield
Coach Scott Carlson probably wishes it could start
next week.

Brimfield probably will return three starters for 2025-26, including senior Connor Doe, who led the Indians in scoring last season (16.3 points per game). But they also are set to return a fourth starter, although he didn't start for Brimfield.

Senior point guard Dawson Traphagan, who led ROWVA-Williamsfield in scoring last season, is transferring to Brimfield, according to Carlson. Traphagan averaged about 15 points per game and was a first-team all-Lincoln Trail Conference selection.

Traphagan's intent to transfer took place just before Brimfield, which was 22-10 last season, began its summer schedule May 31, according to Carlson. Classes begin Aug. 13.

"His dad called me and said they were going to make this move and wanted to know if I could incorporate him into the summer," Carlson said. "He's been involved in everything we've had all summer. It just makes (next season) look even brighter. I was thinking we were going to have a pretty

good year.

"One area I was wondering about was our point-guard position. Dawson comes in as a pure point guard. He's going to step right in. He had a really good summer."

So did Brimfield, which was 14-2. Its losses were to Farmington and to Clifton

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
