Aerial mishaps on the radar

Aerial applicator crashes draw attention to safety

Summer skies fill with planes and helicopters in rural Illinois every summer as corn and soybean fields need crop protection. However, the risk to aerial applicators was magnified last month with four crashes within eight days in Illinois.

An applicator plane crashed near the Ogle County Airport in Mount Morris along Illinois Route 64 in mid-July. The 23year-old pilot, who was the sole occupant of the plane, died.

Elsewhere, no one was injured when a plane crashed near Hartsburg on Illinois Route 121 close to the Logan County Airport.

Minor injuries were reported in a plane crash in Wyoming, and no injuries resulted from a helicopter accident near Bloomington, according to the National Traffic Safety Board.

Every year, there is a crucial time in June and July when planes and helicopters weave low above the fields

"There's a lot of acres that must be sprayed very quickly. So that's when we have accidents," said Dennis Bowman, digital agriculture specialist with the University of Illinois Extension.

"With the windmill and cellphone towers, we have made the environment more dangerous," he told FarmWeek.

For corn, most of the products are applied shortly after tasseling time. The soybean season is a little longer. So, July and early August are prime time.

"Already facing razor-thin margins due to low crop prices and high input and land costs, farmers strive to set their crop up for success and reduce the neg-

Little blustery at Brimfield board

Resident critical of open house for proposed wind-energy development

BRIMFIELD – An open
house for a proposed windenergy development
helped bring some bluster
to a Brimfield School
Board meeting last week.

Area resident Dan Keyt said he disagreed with the high school commons playing host to the open house, sponsored by Four Creeks Wind and scheduled for earlier this week. The public event Wednesday was related to the 24,000-acre project planned for western and northern Peoria County.

Keyt asked the district to consider canceling the

open house. He said his opposition had nothing to do with the proposed project, which calls for windmills as tall as 650 feet to be erected.

"Whether I'm for it or against it does not matter," Keyt told the board Aug. 13. "It's about a commercial business benefiting from an activity at the school. There are (other) places in Brimfield that *Continued on Page 2*

Council on Monday unanimously approved an ordinance regarding vacant or abandoned buildings in the city.





"It is not an informational meeting. It is completely one-sided. They won't talk about any drawbacks. I don't believe that we should be doing it."

No board action was forthcoming. The meeting lasted only 14 minutes, but afterward Keyt and Board President Steve Updyke spent about half as long debating the topic vigorously.

After that, Superintendent Chad Jones said he made the decision regarding the open house. Four Creeks Wind representatives contacted him last month. Representatives also updated the board in April regarding the project, which has been under development since 2021.

community. It affects our community.

"It's really about getting information out to people. ... It's a hot topic. People are very passionate about not having them. I don't have a feeling either way. I think there are some (other) people that are like that, too."

District facilities typically are the sites of such community events once or twice a year, Jones noted.

Four Creeks Wind has not yet filed with Peoria County officials a preliminary application for the project, according to Andrew Braun, the county director of planning and zoning. He also has not received an updated timeline.

In April, Four Creeks Wind representatives suggested project paperwork probably would be filed with the county late this summer or in the fall.

The board meeting last week was held the same day Brimfield classes began for the 2025-26 academic year. But problems with two modular classrooms at Brimfield Grade School resulted in a delay regarding preschool special-education students the district is accommodating from around Peoria County.

According to Jones, the

used new-to-Brimfield building from JMO Modular of Marion was in worse condition than he was led to believe. Other work was not completed before an Aug. 1 deadline.

"Someone from JMO Modular is not in the good graces of their bosses at this point," Jones told the board.


The superintendent expected the building to be ready early this week.

Regarding action items last week, the board authorized a tentative budget for the 2026 fiscal year. It projects a deficit of \$1,648,155, on income of \$14,788,464. The overall fund balance is projected to be \$5,936,875. A budget hearing and final passage are expected Sept. 17.



Of WGBTs, costly aces and stellar soybeans

Rambling through central Illinois, surprised to see that even native prairie plants were wilting before Tuesday's downpour.

As part of an annual tradition, Monday was supposed to be my day to ride around Maple Lane Country Club with ROWVA-Williamsfield High School Golf

Coach Andy Fritz.

Ostensibly, the meeting is scheduled to gather information on R-W for the upcoming season. Most years, our conversation is 4% golf, which is how I prefer dis-

cussions in golf carts to go, anyway.

But Monday, the scheduled meet was called off due to the heat and humidity. Hey, I understand liability concerns and protecting the health of kids. Ironically, though, while leaving the country club, I spotted at least two members of the Elmwood golf team playing. It was reminiscent of school being called off for snow or cold and then seeing kids playing outside.

Meanwhile on Monday, 40 miles away in Lacon, the Brimfield boys golf team made a case as best in the area by running its record to 2-0 in a 10-team meet. That made me dig into heat-based sports rules.

Since 2019, decisions to play or not to play have been made by host teams based on the Wet Bulb Globe Thermometer, a device that measures heat stress in direct sunlight. The Illinois High School Association has a chart on monitoring heat illness. When the fancy thermometer tops

89.9, outdoor events must be delayed until a cooler WBGT is reached. There are also stipulations for breaks and maximum practice times based on the WBGT numbers.

Obviously, the IHSA and member schools take this very seriously, and they should. Monday's WBGT reading in Elmwood was 92.1 at tee time, leading to the cancellation.

Myself, I'm buying a WBGT and will tell the missus any reading over 89.9 is classified as "recliner only" weather - unless somebody wants to go golfing, fishing or shooting. Might also be time to buy stock in a company that makes WGBTs.

Golf has been on my mind a lot lately, due mostly to witnessing the aftermath of a hole-in-one earlier this summer. Greg Mackie is a Williamsfield native who moved to Ohio for years and now lives in Elmwood. He's a regular out at Maple Lane and, a few Thursdays ago, he carded a hole-in-one on No. 17.

While Mackie is not a threat to win many championships, he's a generous, happy-go-lucky fellow who was glad to buy drinks for half of Elmwood that evening. He might even have sipped a few himself, though his memory on that is a bit fuzzy.

Mackie's ace made for a fun night. The excitement of a hole-in-one is infectuous, partly due to the free drinks but also because of the seeming randomness of it all.

But after the last few days, I'll convinced there won't be enough bin space in the area this fall. ... Kudos to whoever repaved Knox County Highway 12 from U.S. Route 150 to Oak Run. The road is smooth, actually kind of attractive, and the county has done a good job cutting back brush to improve visibility. Even that rough railroad crossing in the Spoon River bottoms is pretty passable. ... Parting shot: Sniffling seems to be on the rise and there's been an increase in muttering about the dreaded "C word" lately. Here's a little secret to avoid getting COVID. Don't get tested.

Economic cornerstone feeling the pressure

Illinois is known for many things: its hard-working people, dynamic urban center, rich farmland and robust manufacturing base.

But quietly and powerfully, the insurance industry has emerged as one of the state's most significant economic engines. It provides more than just peace of mind in times of uncertainty; it underwrites prosperity, security and stability in nearly

every corner of our economy and has made Illinois a national leader in protecting the financial assets and economic wealth of individuals and businesses throughout the U.S.

Yet despite its vital role, Illinois risks losing companies and jobs – along with millions of dollars to the state at a time when federal cuts are straining the state's budget – due to good-intentioned but overreaching regulatory and legislative initiatives that threaten the very foundation of this essential industry.

According to a 2024 report from the Katie School of Risk Management & Insurance at Illinois State University, Illinois is home to 176 domiciled property & casualty, life and health insurers. These companies collectively write nearly \$230 billion in premiums, more than insurers in 48 other states, second only to Connecticut. And on a per-capita basis, the Gross Domestic Product contributed by Illinois insurers and related financial activities – \$3,333 per person – ranks second nationwide, behind only New York.

In total, insurance carriers and affiliated services contributed nearly \$42 billion to Illinois' GDP in 2021, representing 4.5% of the state's entire economy.

That's a larger contribution than sectors such as transportation and warehousing, construction, hospitality and food services, agriculture and even hospitals. Nationally, Illinois insurers help generate nearly 7% of the insurance-related GDP, ranking fourth in the country.

But the true value of the industry goes far beyond premium volume or GDP figures. Illinois insurers actively absorb financial risk on behalf of households, businesses, institutions and governments. In fact, they paid out nearly one-third of all P&C, life and health losses nationwide – \$162 billion – shielding stakeholders from devastating costs that would otherwise upend lives and harm economic progress.

Insurers make long-term commitments not just to policyholders but to the communities they serve. To meet those obligations, Illinois-based insurers have invested more than half a trillion dollars in bonds, including municipal and corporate bonds that help finance infrastructure, schools, hospitals and other vital public goods.

Their portfolios also include strategic investments in mortgage loans and real-estate projects designed to support affordable housing, farm development and commercial growth across the state.

Their contributions to the state's fiscal health are equally notable – more than half a billion dollars in tax revenues for Illinois' FY 2025 budget came directly from the insurance industry.

Yet for all this good, the industry faces growing headwinds and harsh political rhetoric.

Later this year, Health Alliance, a domestic carrier serving nearly a quarter-million Illinois residents, will shut its doors, leaving individuals, families and employers scrambling for coverage – and causing the loss of nearly 600 jobs in central and eastern Illinois.

By 2026, Quartz and Aetna will also exit the state's individual market, meaning that residents in nearly half of Illinois' counties will have only one insurance option in the individual health marketplace.

These exits come at a precarious time. The sunsetting of enhanced federal premium tax credits, paired with inflation and rising medical costs, is pushing health insurance premiums higher – employer plans rose by 8% in 2025, and similar increases are projected for 2026.

Fewer choices and rising costs threaten affordability and coverage

rates, increasing the burden on the health system and eroding the very tax base that helps fund public services.

This contraction isn't confined to health coverage. A December 2024 report from the Illinois Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability identified Bloomington, home to two major insurers – State Farm and Country Companies – as the worst-performing metro area for real GDP growth from 2019-23 in the country.

The local insurance and finance sector, a linchpin of the region's economy, saw a sharp 31% GDP drop in 2020 and an additional 8.4% decline in 2021, with little rebound since.

Insurers exist to protect against risk and financial ruin, but when the financial and regulatory environment becomes too volatile – when losses rise and costs can't be recovered sustainably – they might have no choice but to reduce exposure or exit markets entirely. That outcome is not just a business decision – it's a warning sign for the state's economy at large.

Illinois and its elected leaders and regulatory officials must recognize the insurance industry not only as a safeguard in times of crisis, but as a strategic partner in economic growth, infrastructure investment and community stability. Thoughtful regulation, strong public-private collaboration and a policy framework that respects actuarial realities are essential to maintaining a healthy, competitive insurance marketplace.

Because if insurers cannot stay, consumers lose choices, costs rise and the state itself stands to lose much more than coverage – it risks losing one of its most reliable drivers of economic vitality.

New law may be windfall to trial lawyers

The governor signed 266 laws on Friday, moving closer to finalizing his part in approving – or rejecting - over 430 laws sent to him by lawmakers this spring.

The new laws include measures to make public defenders more independent, tighten safety regulations at warehouses and increase the age for required annual driver tests.

Gov. JB Pritzker also vetoed two bills, a somewhat rare move from a governor of the same party as the legislature's supermajorities. One veto was somewhat technical – a budget provision already implemented the policy – but the other highlighted a policy disagreement between him and the state treasurer.

One of the bills Pritzker signed Friday invited almost immediate pushback from Republicans and business groups.

The law, outlined in Senate Bill 328, allows lawsuits to continue against companies that operate in Illinois even if the company and plaintiffs are from other states. The law only applies to cases dealing with "toxic" substances under state law.

The law is seen as good for trial lawyers, who might see expanded business opportunities under the new law. The head of the Illinois Trial Lawyers Associations applauded the governor's approval last week and said the sole intent of the law is provide justice for people exposed to toxic substances.

Critics, like the Illinois Manufacturers Association, say the measure will be bad for business.

A group of Republican lawmakers filed a lawsuit challenging the bill earlier this summer, criticizing it as legalizing "litigation tourism."

That lawsuit – focused on the legislative process more than the bill's contents - could also end the practice of passing "gut-and-replace" bills. That's a procedural maneuver where lawmakers modify a bill already passed in one chamber of the General Assembly with an amendment that removes the entire bill and replaces it.

The lawsuit is still pending in Sangamon County.

Another measure – this one backed by State Treasurer Michael Frerichs would have allowed Frerichs' office to create an investment pool for Illinois not-for-profits.

But Pritzker vetoed SB 246, saying the measure had harmful unintended consequences. He pointed to an Indiana not-for-profit linked to the Oath Keepers, an anti-government militia Pritzker said would be eligible for the investmentfund program. But the treasurer issued a statement countering that claim.

Another law signed Friday, contained in House Bill 3363, will create the Office of State Public Defender to provide publicdefender offices with more resources.

An analysis by a Northwestern University research team found that Illinois had a shortage of public defenders in fiscal year 2023, with only about 56% of the needed number allocated statewide.

School using Jacobs Park for post-football game activities including a homecoming car smash.



YATES CITY – The Yates City Village Board approved the purchase of a utility truck vehicle for use by the water depart-

Though the exact UTV had not been chosen at the last meeting, the board approved up to \$16,000 in case a used UTV is found between meetings. Prior to the Aug. 13 board meeting, suitable used UTVs were found on two separate occasions and acquired by another buyer before the board could approve a pur-

While the idea of a new UTV is not off the table as board members shop around, the approval of these funds opens the possibility of buying a used

UTV before someone else does.

Additionally, the board approved hiring Tri-City Masonry to pour a concrete pad at the south lot of the village for a total of \$7,300. The concrete pad is intended as a place to store pea gravel used to patch the roads and to prevent gravel from getting mixed into the mud and wasted.

Other purchases include six office chairs that meet safety standards to be used at the village office, police office, public works and sewer plant for an amount not to exceed \$1,283.52; a wall air conditioner for the water-treatment plant not to exceed \$500; and six American flags and flagpoles in the amount of \$303.95.





impacts from stressors like weather and pests," said Kathryn Seebruck, commercial agriculture educator, U of I Exten-

This might include aerial application of cropprotection products such as fungicides and insecticides to prevent diseases and insects, respectively, from damaging the crop during this sensitive period, she said.

One advantage of helicopters over planes is that some can land on a platform on the back of a truck and take off again. The ability to hover and land in small areas is an advantage. However, statistics show fatalities are a mix of both helicopters and airplanes, Bowman

So far in 2025 in the U.S., there have been four aerial-application fatalities, two with planes and two with helicopters. In Illinois, five aerial ag application accidents have been reported this year: three airplanes, one helicopter and a drone.

"Pilots are skilled, but they have to be alert every second," Bowman said. "Pilots need to take time, not be fatigued and not let concentration slip."

Meanwhile, farmers

chemicals applied quickly in a small, specific window.

"The key thing for farmers is to be patient with the pilots," Bowman said of farmers' role in safety.

For years, planes and helicopters ruled the skies over Illinois farmland, carrying out these tasks. Drones in ag were initially used for mapping and scouting. But the vehicles started taking off about three years ago when the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) changed its rules to make it easier to apply products using drones.

"I got mine three years ago, when it was fairly rare, but they started showing up. Last year, the number of drones really increased, and we started

see them on a major commercial basis. It continues to grow," Bowman said.

Spray drones were designed specifically for agricultural applications, and their size increased so they can cover more area.

As far as safety is concerned, drones stay in the field boundaries and don't need to zoom up and around for the next pass. If something does go wrong, there's no pilot on board. Spray drones also minimize the risks associated with carrying large volumes of hazardous materials and aviation fuel, as they typically carry much smaller payloads, Bowman said.

While drones offer a higher degree of safety, manned crop dusters still have several key advantages, especially for large-

scale agricultural operations. Manned aircraft can carry much larger payloads and cover hundreds to thousands of acres per day at significantly faster speeds, making them more efficient. Their longer operating times also make them wellsuited for continuous, high-output applications. Although drones are advancing quickly, their limited battery life, smaller coverage capacity and regulatory restrictions currently make them less cost-effective for large operations.

"As technology and regulations evolve, swarms of drones working in coordination will likely overcome many of today's limitations," Bowman said.


"One of the paramount advantages of advancing agricultural technology like drones is that they make ag work easier and, more importantly, safer. As their benefits are realized, they may just become as much of a familiar sight in the summer as crop-dusting airplanes and helicopters."

Local fire department gets State Farm grant

ELMWOOD - The Elmwood Fire Department was awarded a grant to help secure more equipment on Monday, one of seven departments in Illinois to receive the grant.

State Farm and the National Volunteer Fire Council distributed \$10,000 to 150 fire departments in 44 states, NVFC spokesperson Kimberly Quiros said.

The grants are for smaller departments with budget restraints that might make it difficult to meet the rising costs of equipment.

Elmwood Fire Chief Bob Tannock said the grant would be used to help pay for part of the \$60,000 bill for 20 sets of new turnout gear for firefighters. The current turnout gear expires at the end of 2025 and must be replaced every 10 years, Tannock said.





CWD meeting in Peoria Sept. 22

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois Department of Natural Resources will host public meetings throughout northern and west-central Illinois to provide information on the status of chronic wasting disease, its effect on free-ranging deer populations and the department's ongoing efforts to manage the disease.

IDNR staff will be available to discuss current management strategies and answer questions about CWD. Landowners, hunters and concerned citizens are encouraged to attend.

CWD is a fatal neurological disease that threatens the long-term health of whitetailed deer in Illinois. First documented in Illinois in 2002 near Roscoe, CWD has been detected in 25 counties across the northern edge and northeastern portions of Illinois, and as far south as west-central Illinois. Affected counties now include Adams, Boone, Bureau, Carroll, Cook,

DeKalb, DuPage, Ford, Grundy, Jo Daviess, Kane, Kankakee, Kendall, Lake, LaSalle, Lee, Livingston, Marshall, McHenry, Ogle, Peoria, Putnam, Stephenson, Will and Winnebago.

CWD was detected in Adams, Marshall, Peoria and Putnam counties in February 2025 following routine surveillance of hunter-harvested deer.

Unless otherwise noted, meetings will begin at 6 p.m. with a 45- to 60-minute presentation and discussion to follow.

Renewed push for election reform

CHICAGO — A group of former Obama administration officials and election lawyers announced Tuesday they are attempting to reform the way the state draws district maps for the state legislature. They want to do this by passing a state constitutional amendment via a ballot initiative during the 2026 general election.


They say the current legislative redistricting process leads to overrepresentation of Democrats and few competitive legislative districts, meaning politicians must do less to serve their constituents.

Former U.S. Secretary of Transportation Ray LaHood, a Republican, and former Secretary of Commerce Bill Daley, a Democrat and member of the Daley political family, are leading the effort. Both served under President Barack Obama, with Daley as his chief of staff.

Former State Board of Elections Chair Bill Cadigan and election lawyer Michael Dorf, whose past clients include the Democratic Party of Illinois and several statewide officials, also are backing the effort.

The proposal would create a 12-member "Legislative Redistricting Commission," appointed by the top Democrat and Republican in each legislative chamber. Each legislative leader would appoint one member of the General Assembly and two members who are not lawmakers.

Commissioners would be barred from considering political party registration or voting history data when drawing maps.




