County building in Bradford

County approves \$310,000 contract

TOULON – The Stark

County Board of Supervisors is close to obtaining a

property for a much-discussed new county highway building.

At a special meeting held on Monday, the board approved a sales contract with GK Rogers LLC, of Roanoke for \$310,000 for the former Bradford John Deere tractor business.

Most recently operated by Heritage Tractor, the building is located at 16501 Illinois Route 40 in Bradford.

Finding a new location for the highway department has

been discussed for several years and was first an agenda item at the May 2024 monthly meeting of the county board. It has been tabled every month since and spoken about during many closed sessions.

Several potential sites in Toulon were examined and ultimately rejected, either by the county board or by the property owners.

The need for a new county highway building was discussed in 2004 when the county board suggested tearing down the 1942 concrete building. Eighty-three years later, the county highway building is nearing the end

of its lifespan.

In 2018, Bellwether LLC, of Bloomington, reported findings of a study conducted about the highway building to the board of supervisors. Bruce DeLashmit, Bellwether's founder, informed the county board that the building would be unsuitable for repairs and money would be better spent on constructing a new building.

DeLashmit cited inadequate ventilation to clear toxic fumes from vehicles and insufficient heating due to inadequate insulation. He also said zoned heating resulted in expensive heating and cooling costs for the vehicle area and administrative office.

A leaky roof led to flooding in the administrative office, which caused mold growth and had the potential to harm employees' health. At one time, a temporary building was brought in because this specific problem was so hazardous.

The City of Toulon has indicated an interest in obtaining the property to bring in businesses at the intersection of routes 17 and 91. Once the current highway building is demolished, Toulon or other purchasers of the property could develop that area.

Wyoming stop signs on hold

City Council tables resolutions until Oct. 21 meeting

WYOMING – A special meeting of the Wyoming City Council came to an abrupt halt Tuesday night just as four resolutions concerning the placement of stop signs were about to be presented for council approval.

Alderman Steven Hansard asked Mayor Jim Mercer why the new stop signs were not discussed by the streets and alleys committee.

Mercer said the resolutions were a police issues and not an issue for that committee. Hansard argued that it was, then made a motion to table the agenda resolutions that would have authorized the city to add stop signs on various streets around the city. Alderwoman Michelle Owens seconded the motion.

In a roll-call vote, the six council members voted to table the resolutions until the Oct. 21 council meeting. Hansard, Owens, Dave Rumbold, Dave Lindahl and Carol Potter voted to table the resolutions. Dan Hardman dissented.

The council passed a resolution to authorize the purchase of a 2013 Ford F-350 truck with 20,000 miles on it for the street department to

Galva school board OKs FY26 budget

GALVA – The Galva School Board passed a Fiscal Year 2026 budget at Monday night's school board meeting that is projected to be in the black.

The revenue is \$5,332,395 and the expenditures are \$4,823,840.

The board held a budget hearing at 6:55 p.m just before the regular meeting but no one commented.

The board will take action at their October meeting on transferring \$400,000 from working cash to the transportation fund. Superintendent Joe Becker said the district purchased two buses last year and the transportation fund is getting a little low.

The board approved four seniors to graduate in December. They will have met the graduation requirements.

The board heard a Facetime chat on the results of its 10-year

life safety re-survey report.

The high school has 12 violations that are estimated to cost \$177,240 to repair. The elementary school has 13 violations with a cost estimate of \$241,506.

Some of the main violations involve doors, glass and door closures. Becker said some of the priority items need to be completed in one year and lesser items need completed in

Continued from Page 1 five years. Becker said the district's maintenance crew will get started on the items in the near future to save any money

they can.

The Galva district will hold parent-teacher conferences on Oct. 8-9. Call the office to set up a time with your student's teacher if you want a conference.

The board discussed appointing two student representatives to join its

ranks. This has been done in surrounding districts and is something the board thinks would be beneficial for Galva's schools.

The students would have no vote and could not attend executive sessions.

The board reviewed the district enrollment total, which is 463. There was also discussion on the impacts of home-schooling and the number of students who attend other

districts.

One reason given was students can't drop out until a certain age but can be home-schooled.

Another problem for several families is not being able to find housing in Galva so they must move to a neighboring district. Some leave as another parent gets custody who does not live in the district.

Galva's biggest class is the third grade, with 44 students – 28 boys and 16

This year's eighth-grade class has 25 students, with only five boys and 20 girls.

Becker said, overall, the district gained 10 students this year. Five came back to high school this year and two others are homeschooling in high school this year.

Both principals gave presentations on their 2025-26 school-improvement plans.

The board approved Becker to begin the application for a school-maintenance project grant.

The following personnel items were approved for 2025-26: Destiny Bailey as a cafeteria aide and Ashton Kramer as an elementary custodian.

Quintessential attack on open debate

This past week should have brought a profound sadness on all freedom-loving Americans who cherish the concept of open and free debates in our grand experiment of representative democracy.

Charlie Kirk was on a college campus in Utah for a debate with students, which was a very normal activity for him. This time, however, an individual who Richard

disagreed with Kirk's message chose not to de-

bate him and instead elected to kill him with an assassin's bullet. That act was the quintessential attack on free speech and open debate.

I concede I was not one who kept up on Charlie Kirk's activities and events. Kirk appealed to young people in our society, especially those in college. My days in college have long passed. I should have been paying more attention to his events.

Charlie Kirk was 31 when he died. He was a husband and the father of two small children at his passing. He grew up in the Chicago suburbs and had a passion for politics and faith-related discussions. His parents supported his efforts.

Charlie Kirk was a very smart student but declined to attend college, as he viewed it as a waste of his time. Kirk was a self-educated man. Stop for a moment and consider another self-educated Illinois man, Abraham Lincoln.

Like Lincoln, Kirk read incessantly and was willing to debate anyone regarding his belief system,

be that political or theological. This non-college kid debated the best throughout the world. College campuses worldwide welcomed Kirk to to debate. Kirk even debated at Oxford in England, which is no small achievement.

The amazing thing about Kirk was that he was always polite and respectful of those who had opposing views. Kirk was extremely persuasive in his debate skills and students who truly wanted to learn attended his debates. The adage is so true that we learn more from those who we differ with than those of like mind.

The problem in the United States is that we have overly politicized differences of opinion. Those individuals who attempted to assassinate Trump, shot Scalise and bludgeoned Paul Pelosi all disagreed with them or their spouses' political positions. They have been indoctrinated with the belief system that their worldview is that of ultimate virtue and those who oppose them must be eliminated.

That belief system justifies murder as being for the greater good of mankind. That is the type of indoctrination we have seen in North Korea, Stalin's Russia, Nazi Germany and to a large extent China today. Kirk wanted the debate and he knew that there were personal risks involved. He debated anyway.

Truth will always win if given a free and open debate. America is at a turning point, we can open up the nation to honest and open debate or we can curtail it and allow violence to determine the winner. I believe the nation wants open debate and not the dogma that many are spouting.

That being said, I admit to reservations about each. Coal, natural gas and nuclear do not rely on the sun or the wind to produce power. These production units are stable and easy to control by their respective operators. You cannot ramp up a turbine or a panel. It simply produces what Mother Nature provides.

Add to this concerns over how much the government subsidizes the wind and solar units and one must question what the true costs of the electricity produced are. The same question can be asked of the costs of electric cars with the government subsidies. Add the concern of taking valuable farmland out of production and we have more questions.

Both Lincoln and Maroa recently had solar farms erected within their corporate limits or abutting them. What does that do to home values in those communities? Maroa's solar farm received serious storm damage in the past month. What are zoning specifications for wind resistance, if any? These technologies, which may be the future of energy, seem to be promoted by legislation rather than the marketplace. That promotion is my concern.

Stark schools predicted to operate under budget for FY2026

WYOMING – The Stark County school board held a Public Hearing of the FY2026 budget prior to the regular meeting with Superintendent Brett Elliott presenting an overview of the budget with a few minor changes in the Education Fund Expenditures and Revenues that occurred since the tentative budget was presented last month.

The FY2026 final budget was passed later under unfinished business after it was on display for 30 days from Aug. to Sept. Elliott predicted that the school district will be "under budget if

emergency funds are not needed."

The board went into the first of two closed Executive Sessions to discuss employee compensation, non-renewals, employee performance. Speaking to the board at this time were Breann Cart and Samantha Berchtold accompanied with her husband Gerald.

These parent's indicated their displeasure with their children being required to recite the school district's mission and vision statement at the start of every school day.

Elliott reported that the Annual Parent-Teacher Conferences are scheduled for Oct. 14

and 16 from 4 to 7 p.m. He also said that on Oct. 17 there is no school for the annual fall break. Staff and students will return on Oct. 20.

The Oct. monthly meeting is rescheduled from Oct. 20 to Oct. 21 due to a personal conflict for Elliott.

The board, with a recommendation by Elliott, awarded the fuel bid to AgView (current vendor) over new bidder River Valley. Prices bid are AgView \$2.93 /gal gasoline, \$3.29/gal diesel while River Valley bid \$3.04/gal gasoline and \$3.49/gal diesel.



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

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Agencies directed to limit spending

JOLIET - Illinois agencies must identify spending reductions and create reserves in their budgets to prepare for an economic downturn, according to an executive order issued Tuesday by Gov. JB Pritzker.

Pritzker said the order is designed to combat federal policies by the Trump administration that are likely to increase costs on the state and put pressure on the economy. The latest order requires most state agencies to, within 30 days, "identify immediate spending reductions, including efficiencies that will result in reduced spending."

Pritzker also directed the agencies to reserve 4% of fiscal year 2026 general-fund appropriations. Lawmakers approved a \$55.1 billion spending plan, meaning the order could halt up to \$2.2 billion in approved spending in anticipation of state revenue declining.

Some state agencies, such as the State Board of Education and the state's pension systems, are not subject to the order to identify spending cuts.

Pritzker also ordered agencies that find budget shortfalls to identify lines in their budgets that can be reduced. The order also directed agencies to pause nonessential purchases and travel.

"It's a beginning of dealing with what we think could be a very severe challenge for the state budget this year," Pritzker told reporters. "Remember, we can only identify what we know. Here's something that I'm very concerned about, which is that the budget is affected vastly by the economic situation of the country, and we're already seeing that states like Iowa are in recession."

General Assembly Republicans voted against the budget. House Minority Leader Tony McCombie, R-Savanna, said her party was sounding the alarm about pressure on the state budget before President

Donald Trump's second term.

"We warned that this budget was irresponsible and overspent," she said in a statement. "Stop passing blame, Governor. Illinoisans aren't buying that recent policy changes in Washington, D.C., are to blame for the decades of Illinois financial mismanagement."

Pritzker said Trump's policies are driving fears about declining revenues.

Pritzker noted the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act," signed by Trump in July, is at the top of the list because it passes costs for several federal programs to the states.

Congress, for example, required states to pay a greater portion of administrative and benefits costs for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. Congress also tightened access to other programs, such as Medicaid, meaning it will be up to states to close funding gaps to allow many people to stay on the program.

The bill also extended tax cuts for businesses and wealthy Americans. The order said much of Illinois' tax code is tied to the federal tax code and Illinois will see revenue decline because of these tax cuts at the federal level.

The executive order also said tariffs will hurt consumer spending by increasing costs.


"There are hundreds of millions of dollars that are going to have to be made up for as a result of the cuts the federal government is making, including in health care and nutritional assistance, but also across the economy, with the tariffs that are impacting businesses in Illinois," Pritzker said. "So we think this is a prudent endeavor."

Legislative Democrats anticipated that federal policies would affect state coffers and established a \$100 million BRIDGE fund with money swept from 57 different funds. Pritzker can tap into that fund "in the event of unanticipated delays in or failures of revenues."

Rebels roll to 4-0 with R-W shutout

Daum leads the way in 33-0 victory

ONEIDA – A Stark
County football team that
had questions galore at the
start of the season might
provide a big postseason
answer this week.

After they beat ROWVA-Williamsfield 33-0 in a LincolnLand small-division game Sept. 19, the Rebels (4-0, 4-0) are only one victory from an almost-certain berth in the state playoffs. They are to play Friday night in Wyoming against winless Monmouth United.

The toughest part of the schedule lies ahead for Stark County, which is in first place in the league. Stark County is to face preseason conference favorites Annawan-Wethersfield, Rushville-Industry and Princeville in successive weeks, starting Oct. 3.

Still, as Stark County Coach Jade Noard sees it, postseason qualification would be an accomplishment for a team that had few veteran varsity players.

"It's a group that has not had a ton of success at lower levels – really, in any sport," he said. "You hope that we could put it together. We've had some good fortune, but I think our kids have made some good plays, too. It would be a really good achievement for this group to be in already after five weeks."

Week 4 against R-W (1-3, 1-3) was a bit dicey early. According to Noard, Stark County killed a few of its drives, thanks to dropped passes and other mistakes. Meanwhile, the Cougars threatened to score first by driving to the Rebels' 18-yard line.

But on third-down-and-1, the on-field officials stopped play for about 30 minutes because of lightning. When the game resumed, Stark County

WALNUT – A healthier and happier Stark County cross country team ran to strong finishes last Saturday at the annual Dale Donner Invitational.

Sophomore Evan Knobloch topped the field of 199 runners with a time of 15:46 on an unusual and notoriously slow course. That was a big turnaround for Knobloch, who had placed 41st in 15:57 at the Sept. 13 First to the Finish Invitational at Peoria's Detweiller Park.

"First to the Finish wasn't his favorite race so far but he adjusted and the results speak for themselves," Stark County Coach Bob Rennick Jr. said. "Night and day performance from last week for Evan and I'm really happy for him. He has to tangle with the best of the best week in and week out."

The girls team placed
