Farquer arrested, placed on leave

Ex-Billtown superintendent faces felony charge of official misconduct

For The Weekly Post ALEDO – A former Williamsfield School District superintendent could face two to five years in

state prison, based on charges filed against him last week.

Farquer ordered a school nurse to disclose to him students' vaccination information, then compiled it and shared it with someone not authorized to have it, according to Mercer County Circuit Court documents. That resulted in the arrest of Farquer, the Mercer County School District superintendent.

Farquer, 53, was released Sept. 25 from the Mercer County Jail. That was one day after his arrest and the same day he first appeared in court, by video conference from jail. In the courtroom, in front of Judge Matthew Durbin, Altona-based attorney Karl Johnson represented Farquer, who resides in Williamsfield.

Farquer was accused of official misconduct, unauthorized access to medical records and computer tampering. The officialmisconduct charge is a Continued on Page 5

Princeville in the running for \$1 million

PRINCEVILLE - The Princeville School District could use an extra \$1 million. First, however, the high school could use some internetbased votes.

Princeville is among 25 finalists in a national contest a cellphone company is conducting. The school district already won \$35,000 over the past year or so from T-Mobile through its Friday Night 5G Lights contest, a football-related promo-

Votes from the public at the Fri-

day Night 5G Lights website are being accepted for each finalist, of which Princeville is the only one in Illinois. Voting ends Oct. 24. School-generated social-media posts on Instagram and X also boost the odds.

The grand-prize winner, to be announced Oct. 30, is to receive \$1 million for a football-field upgrade. Among ancillary prizes are a trip for 16 school representatives to the SEC football championship game this December in Atlanta, as well as an upgraded weight room.

Princeville upgraded its weight

room about a year ago, so the contest is a little late for that. But School Superintendent Tony Shinall isn't about to complain.

"We're super excited," he said. "The kids absolutely deserve this. Even if we don't win, this is doing wonders for school spirit and the community. We're going to go down swinging."

Princeville was in 11th place in the voting as of early this week, with Dexter (Maine) Regional High School at the top. Still, that isn't shabby for Princeville, which is one



Continued from Page 1 of the smallest schools remaining in

the competition. More than 2,000 schools nationwide participated.

The genesis of Princeville's contest involvement lies with a friend of Shinall's wife, Aimee. The friend told her about it last year. Shinall applied and the school won \$5,000, a prize for finishing among the top 450 schools. Princeville applied again this year and won another \$5,000.

After that, area T-Mobile representatives took a closer look at Princeville's potential. So did Kelly Jenkins, the district technology coordinator, and colleagues Alex Coulter and Summer Rice. They and high school mass-communications students developed social-media posts with T-Mobile hashtags.

"Summer has taken this as a per-

sonal challenge, and she has delivered for our kids so much," Shinall said. "She has been all over this since day one."

Princeville-produced social-media videos included administrators Jake Lowery and Rich Thole demonstrating how well (or not so well) they know current teenager slang, according to Shinall. A group of gradeschool teachers also proved adept at video creation.

All of it helped lead to the top-25 selection, which included a \$25,000 prize. It also led to a raucous, earlymorning pep assembly last week, where Princeville students celebrated the achievement. Among the congratulations was a personalized Instagram video from retired NFL player Rob Gronkowski.

"I'd never done a morning pep as-

sembly before," Shinall said. "It was a lot louder than I thought it was going to be."

Another gathering that's likely to be loud is set for halftime of today's homecoming game against ROWVA-Williamsfield. That's when Princeville is to be presented the \$25,000 T-Mobile check.

Last year, the T-Mobile money funded the purchase of stencils for on-field logos, according to Shinall. This year's prizes might go toward field irrigation work. But Princeville always could use a little more. Or maybe a lot more.

"Hopefully we're have a spending problem here soon and have to figure out how to spend much more money," Shinall said.







Newspapers are the original A.I.

Artificial intelligence is going to transform everything we watch, hear and read. You can already see it happening.

Asking an A.I. search engine a question about an obscure fact can yield quick and surprisingly detailed responses. And when it comes to transforming legendary televisionshow casts into babies, A.I. is world-

But news? A.I.-fueled news poses problems.

The first is that news is about reality. A.I. provides tools to bend reality. We're seeing a wave of A.I.-abetted falsehoods and deepfakes online.

No, Ukraine is not sending children, the disabled and the elderly to clear minefields. President Trump does not have a forehead indentation indicating serious illness. Sen. Amy Klobuchar didn't attack Sydney Sweeney and complain that Democrats are "too fat to wear jeans or too ugly to go outside."

It's time to retire "seeing is believing."

A second issue with A.I. is that it

doesn't know what the truth is. Its take on the world will be driven by the data it accesses. Popular but untrue information isn't necessarily filtered out. In contrast to the breathless tone of clickbait, newspapers can seem a little old-school.

Local newspapers embrace the original A.I.: accurate information. How refreshing is that? Newspapers focus on your community, written by neighbors who shop at the same stores and send their kids to the same schools. Most can readily be reached by phone or email, and when they make an error, they correct it.

How quaint. How essential.

A.I. isn't magic. When used for search, it offers an analysis and recasting of information about what's already known, drawing on the vast resources of the web.

Any search about your hometown, though, depends on that information being captured and published in the first place. If your local newspaper doesn't report on a new transportation plan for your community, there's nothing for A.I. search to draw upon.

There's an oft-used phrase in data analysis: Garbage in, garbage out. No local news in, no local news out.

In the long run, artificial intelligence may be good for us; it may be bad. But it will be.

The question is whether we will support the local daily journalism that informs us, protects our communities and, yes, fuels A.I.

Unless we support local newspapers and local journalism, we will lose the collective knowledge and insight that allows a community to address its needs and move forward.

If we don't subscribe to and support local news media, we will no longer know how our tax dollars are being used, how well elected officials are doing their jobs or what the real stakes are for the next local election.

But just wait until you see the mayor as a baby.


TOLO: Quest includes restoration of old trophies

Continued from Page 1 pass onto me and he kept the other for his family.

I was on the verge of giving up hope of ever fulfilling my quest when Pat texted to let me know she had a 1938 TOLO for me.

My search for TOLOs led me to attend numerous auctions, to run ads in the newspaper and to received many gracious donations to the point where I had all but the 1978 and 1938 yearbooks. They were the hardest to find and thanks for my copy of the 1978 TOLO goes to Kay Jenkins, who donated a copy to me.

Over the years, I've donated duplicate copies to the Toulon Public Library and have also been contacted by a few people who asked

about the TOLO from their graduation year that they lost and wanted to replace. If I had duplicates, I only

asked for \$5 that begins to cover a small portion of my expenses.

Other people ask for information I gladly research for them.

I decided to collect TOLOs when I found out that our TTHS and T-L history had been accosted in 1992 by a superintendent of the newly formed Stark County school district who ordered our trophies "thrown out" in the trash.

I have restored eight or nine trophies that were severely damaged and weathered.

A third 1970 TTHS classmate, Kris Reed McGill, suggested that I indicate where my TOLO collection should go after my death. It's an excellent suggestion and I'll do such with my final directives.

FARQUER: Preliminary hearing set for Oct. 20

Continued from Page 1 felony, subject to a prison term. The other charges are misdemeanors.

A preliminary hearing was scheduled for 9 a.m. Oct. 20 in Aledo. Court documents stated Farquer's alleged misconduct began about Sept. 1 and continued until his arrest.

"Unfortunately I cannot comment but am anxious for the facts to come out soon," Farquer stated in an email to The Weekly Post.

In a text message, Johnson said he was unavailable. A telephone message was left for Mercer County State's Attorney Grace Simpson.

During a special meeting Sept. 26, the Mercer County School Board voted to place Farquer on paid administrative leave.

Appointed as interim superintendents were Alan Boucher and Scott Petrie. Both are former Mercer County superintendents. Farquer succeeded Petrie in 2024.

A statement School Board President Bill Smock emailed to The Weekly Post read, in part: "As more information becomes available, the

board remains committed to transparency, collaboration and maintaining the high standards of excellence that the community expects from its schools."

Petrie pleaded guilty in Scott County, Iowa, to drunken driving in 2019. He received probation and served four days of in-home detention, according to KWQC-TV of Davenport, Iowa.

A news release issued Sept. 24 stated the Aledo Police Department had been investigating a complaint regarding school-district employees illegally accessing students' medical records. Electronic devices were seized through a search warrant.

The investigation led to the arrests of two school-district information-technology employees, Andrea Long and Amberly Norton. Both are 41 and from Aledo. They face the same charges as Farquer, whose involvement was discovered during the investigation.

Durbin ordered Farquer not to have contact with Long and Norton, whose preliminary hearings are scheduled for Oct. 7. The school nurse was not identified and was not charged with a crime. How many students' records were divulged was not revealed.

In a statement Sept. 25, the School Board suggested health records are part of a student's overall school record, as defined under the Illinois School Student Records Act. Medical-privacy laws regarding health-care providers do not apply.

"Their use by teachers, school nurses and support staff is not only common but necessary to meet the educational and developmental needs of our students," the statement read, in part. "Their use within the school setting is lawful, regulated and essential to the functioning of our educational mission.

"We ask the community to withhold judgment until all facts are reviewed and due process is respected."

Farquer attended high school in Williamsfield and was its superintendent from 2013 until 2024. He left the district by mutual agreement with its school board.





Pritzker: Feds set to deploy troops

seeking to send 100 military troops to Chicago,
according to Gov. JB
Pritzker, who assailed the
move as the Trump administration's latest – yet
not unforeseen – push to
consolidate power.

"What he plans to do with that power now or during the 2026 elections should worry all of us," Pritzker said at a Monday afternoon news conference, adding, "You cannot call this anything except an attack on the Constitution of the United States." In the days leading up

to the news conference, armed Customs and Border Patrol officers paraded through the streets of Chicago arresting people and shot chemical projectiles at protesters in Broadview, including allegedly at a TV news reporter's car.

As of Monday, the Chicago Tribune reported that federal prosecutors had charged five people in relation to recent protests, including two who were apparently armed, according to federal authorities.

The Tribune reported that federal Judge Gabriel Fuentes noted there has been "a tendency for ICE to be very aggressive," in response to the Broadview protests, and it was "not a surprise that there was a confrontation."


Pritzker said the Illinois National Guard learned that the Department of Homeland Security sent a memo to the Department of War, formerly the Department of Defense, seeking 100 troops. He said the stated reason was to protect ICE facilities and other DHS agents working in Illinois. He said Oregon's National Guard received a similar notice on Sunday.

"The mobilization of the military isn't just an ineffective strategy to address crime. It is illegal," Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul said.

After returning from active duty, Gene began his career at Ratliff Brothers in Kewanee, where he worked for 46 years.


In June 1954, he married the love of his life, Wanda, and together they began farming in May 1960.



Rebels rolling

Stark County rolls past United, 49-22 to set up battle of unbeatens with A-W

WYOMING — Stark
County football passed a
pretty big test last week. It

A 49-22 home victory Sept. 26 over Monmouth United kept Stark County in first place in the LincolnLand small division. It also all but assured the Rebels (5-0, 5-0) a stateplayoffs berth, which would be their 17th in Coach Jade Noard's 21season tenure.

This impending postseason appearance might be among Noard's most satisfying. Stark County returned almost no regulars from a team that went 8-2 in 2024. The current underclassmen hadn't had much success until now.

"What they've been able to do five Fridays in a row ... that was a big question mark for us," Noard said. "We thought we could have some high notes, but could we do it week after week? The fact that they've been able to do that has been really fun to be a part

Things become tougher beginning Friday at Annawan-Wethersfield, which also is undefeated but has played one fewer conference games. A 35-14 victory last week against Rushville-Industry was the only game so far in which A-W has had fewer than 42 points.

In consecutive weeks after this one, Stark County plays R-I and Princeville. Those two teams and A-W were considered the top ones in the league headed into the season. With a playoff berth probable, Stark County players can have clearer minds headed into this stretch, according to Noard.

"Now you're playing with house money. You're in," he said. "You shouldn't feel like there's a lot of pressure, just because there weren't a ton of expecta-
