Talking turkey with Windsweep owner

Feathered gobblers are much more than the center of customers’ holiday meals for Renee Koster and her family at Windsweep Farm in Lee County.

For Koster, turkeys are the curious creatures that greet her. “They are funny. Our building is open on one side. They all come running when they see you,” she said.

A turkey is also the bird of choice for Koster’s Easter meal.

And, for her 10-year-old son Colin Koster, a turkey is a way to learn about earning money, a 4-H project and a pet.

Renee Koster farms near Dixon with her father, Leonard Sheaffer, and her husband, Peter Koster, focusing on direct-marketing diverse natural products. “We have five children. The older ones help on the farm,” Koster told FarmWeek. Windsweep Farm also grows organic soybeans, wheat, corn and soybeans.

“Turkeys are just one thing we do,” said Koster, who started her farm by milking a couple of dairy cows in 2002. She added more dairy cows, beef calves, hogs, laying hens and broilers over time.

Seven years ago, she added turkeys, the start of

Brimfield intends to raise tax levy

School district seeking 9.1% increase in property taxes

BRIMFIELD – Add the Brimfield School District to the list of public bodies planning to increase their 2025 property-tax levies by more than 5%.

Brimfield intends to ask for a levy of \$6,600,431, a 9.1% increase. That is well above the 5% threshold that triggers a state-mandated Truth in Taxation hearing, which is to be held in conjunction with the Brimfield School Board meeting Dec. 17. The 2024 tax extension was \$6,052,411.

If the proposed levy is approved, the owner of a house valued at \$200,000 would pay an additional \$243 in property tax. The tax rate would increase only negligibly, from 4.87 to 4.88. Peoria County is estimating a 6.5% increase in equalized assessed property value in the Brimfield district.

Potential Elmwood park back to idle

ELMWOOD – The on-again, off-again possibility of a park in the Fairground Acres subdivision is off again, at least until early 2026.

Concerns about costs, traffic, terrain and environmental factors prompted City Council members to table discussion Nov. 18. Alderwomen Kristy Johns and Kristen Strom hesitated to accept Fairground Acres developer Fred Paige’s proposed donation of a vacant lot to be used for park-

land.

“I would love moving forward to just go about this in a really smart way in terms of having all the information,” Strom said. “Because I’m hearing that no one is against parks. It’s just a matter of, is this in the right area? Have we thought it through completely? Can we have a better plan in place?”

City Treasurer Bonnie Beal, who resides near the proposed park along Hickory Run, had another question.

“Can we just say, ‘No, thanks?’” she said.

The council intends to discuss the issue again in January. It’s been debated the past few months, but an official offer from Paige was not forthcoming. The city now has one, according to Mayor Andrew Almasi.

Last week, Beal addressed the council as a private citizen. So did four others, all Fairground Acres residents. All were opposed to the proposed park, or at least skeptical. Resident Tim Stobaugh echoed Beal’s con-

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TIF application considered by Princeville board

PRINCEVILLE – The Princeville Village Board is reviewing a TIF IV redevelopment agreement application submitted by Hand Craft’d.

Originally, the village had agreed to pay \$7,500 toward renovations of the building in which Hand Craft’d, a freeze-dried candy company, is located. However, owner Amanda Hand submitted an updated applica-

tion.

“Those things are Phase 2. I have plans to make a retail area inside, but right now only Phase 1 is finished,” Hand said. “I’ve transformed a restaurant into a wholesale manufacturer kitchen that is federally registered. The flooring and insulation need replaced, and I’m thinking about solar, but this was my first step in making Hand Craft’d.”

Hand said she wanted the initial

application to go toward the purchase of the building itself rather than renovations. The board would need to get approval from TIF administrators before any changes could be made to the agreement.

Hand said she had a growing business with ties to Hy-Vee and the Peoria Riverfront Museum, among others.

The board expects the TIF Committee to meet before the Dec. 1 board meeting.

During a School Board meeting Nov. 19, Brimfield Superintendent Chad Jones said the district has less than one year of operating funds in reserve. The district also had significant, planned expenses over the past year or so, including extensive renova-

tions at Brimfield Grade School.

“It keeps me up at night,” Jones said about finances. “The expenses just keep going up. We have an opportunity to get that revenue that we need in order to operate the district for another year.

“We got a lot done and

we’d like to continue to do that, as long as the money’s there.”

The proposed levy does not leave money on the table, according to Jones. That has been a common theme among nearby school districts. Counterparts in Elmwood, Farmington, Princeville and Williamsfield have proposed exceeding the Truth in Taxation limit or already have done so.

Also approved was an agreement with the Peoria County Regional Office of Education to implement an Alternative Learning Opportunity Program, effective in January and continuing through the 2026-27 academic year.

The program will provide Brimfield with a full-time, on-site educator to work with at-risk students individually, at no direct cost. Because of how enrollment is calculated, Brimfield probably will lose about \$1,500 in state money as a result, according to Jones.

Last month, ROE Director George McKenna presented the board with details about the program. ROE reserve funds are to pay for the first two to three years of administration. That includes hiring educators.

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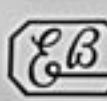

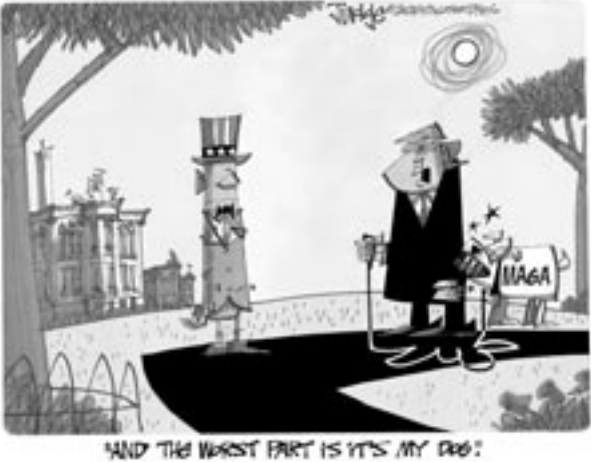

Of dumb cats, Hallmark Xmas & gun season

Rambling through central Illinois, wondering if snow is being replaced by fog in our weather pattern.

While firearm deer season was not super-exciting for our crew, we did get a charge out of the Cat Rescue of 2025. On Nov. 11, our dog chased a black cat up a maple tree in the back yard. On Nov. 14, the cat was still in the tree, meowing pitifully.

While this did not cause me to lose sleep, other worried members of the family demanded action. One rescue attempt involved a blanket over the cat and an ill-fated grab that made the silly thing shimmy up a higher, less steady branch. There she sat for a cold, wet evening.

Finally, between hunts on opening day of shotgun deer season, my boys went into action. The middle boy got a pole saw, put on a tree-stand safety harness and climbed a ladder to cut the branch holding the cat. The youngest held the ladder. The oldest shot video.

The middle boy’s plan was for the branch to drop gently into a nearby oak, thereby slowing the rate of fall

and letting the cat make it to the ground safely. Somehow, it all went off without a hitch. Truth be told, it was fun to watch. As an added bonus, without that branch, the oak should grow even better ... and the cat likely won’t be as eager to return.

Hate to admit this, but I watched an entire Hallmark Christmas movie last weekend. It took several sittings and plenty of bourbon, but I made it through “Holiday Touchdown: A Bills Love Story.” The experience left me curious.

Are all Hallmark Christmas movies this bad? Are we supposed to ignore the oak and maple trees with green leaves in the supposed snow scenes? How can everyone be so happy? And since when did real actors start doing Hallmark movies?

Bad as it was, I’ve got it on good authority that the Bills movie is way better than last year’s “Holiday Touchdown: A Chiefs Love Story.” Even so, if not for ties to Buffalo, I would not watch three minutes of that schlock. When it comes to holiday movies, stick to the old favorites: “The Guardians of the Galaxy Holiday Special,” “Elf” and “It’s a Wonderful Life.”

Speaking of holidays, this is a great week to count blessings. I’m thankful the youngest boy completed his foot-

ball career with no major injuries and all-conference honors; that the middle boy is good at climbing trees; that the oldest boy has moved closer to home and shows up regularly; and that my wife still puts up with it all.

Back in 1991, when major steps toward expansion of Illinois deer hunting began, shotgun season accounted for 81% of the whitetails harvested. Twenty years ago, shotgun hunters took 67% of the total. By last year they accounted for just 48%.

Bowhunters have picked up the slack, increasing from an 18% harvest rate in 1981 to 43% last year. Of those, crossbows now account for nearly 54% of the archery harvest, compared to 14% in 2015.

No wonder last weekend’s first shotgun season is no longer a big deal. My kids look at me with disbelief when talk turns to a barrage of shots on opening day. Nowadays, it’s easy to keep track of the few blasts we hear. At one farm the total on opening morning was 10. At the other it was 15.

Warm weather, fog and a lack of rut action contributed to a lack of action where we hunted. Another reason to give thanks, though, is the miserable weather in the forecast that should get deer moving.

cerns about potential traffic congestion and other issues.

“We need more information about what the overall plan is going to look like,” Stobaugh said. “You’re going to get some kids there, but you’re also going to get some riff-raff. It seems like we need to get a little more into the weeds.”

Alderman Bob Paige, who helps administer city parks, said developing the lot would cost almost \$17,000 initially. That includes lawn maintenance and playground equipment. The parks budget has enough money to cover it, according to the alderman.

But Johns and Strom suggested potential costs could be significantly higher than their colleague’s estimate.

Additional expenses might include property grading to eliminate a slope and other work to make the land compliant with the federal Americans with Disabilities Act. Environmental remedia-

tion also might be necessary, according to Strom. She said Fred Paige has been dumping sludge on part of the lot.

“It smells,” Strom said. “That’s an added expense if we have to take it out.”

Johns asked for a complete cost estimate, as well as public input and an environmental study. Almasi suggested at least some of her requests would compound the price tag.

“It’s a chance to have an opportunity to have another recreational area,” Almasi said about the proposed donation. “I don’t see what’s wrong with that.”

Aldermen Nathan Brunnelson and Tim Teel appeared to take a wait-and-see approach.

“I have mixed emotions about it,” Brunnelson said. “I don’t think it has to be an elaborate park. And I think it would have some benefits. I’m sitting on the fence.”

In other business during a meeting that lasted almost two hours, councilors authorized a Truth in Taxation hearing re-

garding the 2025 city property-tax levy. Increases of more than 5% trigger the state-required hearing. It’s to be held before the council’s regular meeting Dec. 9.

Initial projections indicated the levy would rise by less than 5%. Upon further review, an unanticipated increase in property-and-casualty insurance requires an additional \$22,000, accord-

ing to City Attorney Bob Potts. The revised levy could result in a \$26 tax increase for the owner of a \$150,000 house.

The council also OK’d the temporary hiring of a building inspector, Joe Boyer of Peoria. The current inspector, Dave Hall, is recovering from hip surgery, according to Almasi. Boyer is to charge \$50 per inspection.

Lockers may return to Billtown school

WILLIAMSFIELD – A lack of student lockers in the middle-school hallway of the Williamsfield school building might be a backbreaker.

District officials are attempting to determine if lockers should be installed in the middle-school area. The school has 150 lockers currently, but they’re located in the high school hallway. That can require a bit of a walk during the passing periods between classes, about three minutes.

It also can result in middle-schoolers preferring to lug weighty book bags instead. School Board Member Paul Bosnich and some of his colleagues suggested that might lead to a bad-back epidemic.

“Try to carry around that book bag for a day,” Bosnich said during a meeting Nov. 17. “I couldn’t do it. It’s terrible.”

Any student in grades 5-12 who wants a locker can have one, Principal Zack Binder said. There is a total of 164 students in those grades, in-

cluding 76 in the middle school. But few students want and use a locker, according to Billtown Superintendent David Mills.

Lockers used to exist in the middle-school wing but were moved during a COVID-19 pandemic break, Binder told the board during its October meeting. He favors locker use instead of book-bag use. But student mindset might be a challenge.

“Are lockers still as necessary as they once were?” Binder stated. “Or have we simply shifted toward book bags, which can sometimes be a nuisance, a health concern or even a potential safety risk if used to carry unnecessary or inappropriate items?”

Mills said he plans to start looking at what costs might be associated with new-locker purchase and/or old-locker repositioning. Multiple opinions are to be solicited, and nothing is likely to happen until this summer at the earliest.

“There could be some sticker shock, but not if we can start planning and move forward,” Mills said.

If there are enough lockers for every student, the district probably would implement a no-book-bag policy, according to Board President Chad Goff. That appeared to be fine with Board Member Wes Wrage.

“It’s not too big of an ask,” he said last month. “An excuse to me is, ‘I don’t have time to get to my locker and back.’ Yes, you do. You just choose not to.”

During the November meeting, board members were told the elementary school received an exemplary designation on the 2024-25 report card the Illinois State Board of Education issued. That’s the highest ISBE category, among the top 10% of schools statewide in academic performance.

The high school was rated as commendable, one spot below exemplary on the five-spot ISBE scale. The high school just missed an exemplary designation. Also commendable was the middle school, which rose one place from targeted status the previous year.

Gun hunters kill 51,409 deer during first season

SPRINGFIELD – Hunters in Illinois shot a preliminary total of 51,409 deer during the first weekend of Illinois firearm deer season, Nov. 21-23. Comparatively, hunters took 54,661 and 53,348 deer during opening gun season in 2024 and 2023.

Illinois’ seven-day firearm deer season concludes Dec. 4-7. For the first time, youth hunters with an unfilled youth deer permit can hunt with the permit during the second firearm deer season.

In local counties, hunters shot 1,228 deer in Fulton County, 685 in Knox County and 586 in Peoria County. Totals for Knox and Fulton were down, but Peoria was up from the past two years.

ICC strikes \$55.8M from Ameren gas-rate request

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois Commerce Commission cut \$55.8 million from Ameren Illinois’ rate request for its natural-gas delivery

services. The decision reduces Ameren’s \$128.8 million request by about 43% and approves a 9.60% return on equity, a reduction from the company’s requested 10.70% ROE.

The ICC issued its decision after scrutinizing Ameren’s filings, along with additional materials submitted by the utility, consumer advocates, commission staff and various interveners over an 11-month legal proceeding.

Brady Day had 15 points, Eli Christianson 12 and Collin Lowery 11 for Princeville, which trailed 18-7 after a quarter and 27-24 at halftime. Bosch had seven fourth-quarter points.

Princeville lost four starters from its 27-9 Class 1A sectional finalist, including its backcourt of Tucker Sennett and Jake Williams. Among the returnees are two seniors, guard Day (7.7 ppg) and center Lowery (5.2 rpg). Classmates Kaden Blunier, Brock Butler and Christianson are expected to bolster them.

“Our defense and hard work will help us win games, although we will look to push the pace,” Princeville Coach Tait Sennett stated. “We graduated a great class of hard-work-

• **Elmwood** – Garrett Webster had 24 points, Quinton Johns 13 and Miles Addison 12 in the fourth quarter as Elmwood expanded an early lead and beat host Wethersfield 61-42 in a Wally Keller Invita-

tional opener at Kewanee. Webster had all his team’s 13 first-period points.

Tournament play is to continue Friday and end Saturday.

Elmwood seeks to improve last season’s 15-15 record. The Trojans return three starters – senior guard Webster, junior guard Johns and sophomore forward Karsyn Bolton. One of his classmates, Gavin Strom, is expected to contribute at center.

“Every night should present a challenge for us to overcome,” Elmwood

Coach Josh Fugitt stated. “Our players enjoy competing each night in practice, they’re a coachable group and we hope to make a lot of progress throughout the season before regionals in February.”

• **Farmington** – North Fulton defeated Farmington 51-42 in a Fulton County Tournament opener at Lewistown. According to Farmington Coach Marty Lozier, his team had too many turnovers and self-inflicted mistakes against the North Fulton 2-3 zone defense.

The Farmers’ second-leading returning scorer, Jack Gronewold, didn’t play. He’s expected to miss at least two weeks with a hamstring injury, according to Lozier. Landon Crawford had 13 points, and Boston Smith scored 10.

Smith averaged 17.6 points per game last season behind a hot final 12 games. Gronewold averaged 11.8 points and 4.1 rebounds in only 15 games because of injury. Crawford averaged eight points, 5.3 boards and 2.6 assists.

With Traphagan gone to Brimfield, the Cougars return only one starter, 6-7 junior Max Nichols, from an 11-21 team.

Returnees who don’t have much game experience are Empson, Drake DeJaynes, Robby Nixon, Daniel Skala and Hayden Tucker. Hart sees the inexperience as a strength, because opponents won’t know what to expect.

“We will use this as an advantage to where we will be highly diversified on both ends of the court,” Hart stated.

more, and freshmen Audrey Updyke and Madison Hersemann round out Brimfield’s roster.

McKown said he’s not sure what to expect from his team early. Losing Ava Heinz, who averaged 20 points per game last year, poses a problem. But it could be a blessing in disguise.

“The flip side of (losing Heinz) is that everyone that will play has the ability to score and they’ll be looking to do that more since we won’t have a specific No. 1 option offensively,” McKown said. “We should be a fairly quick team and hopefully that leads to us causing some havoc on the defensive end.”

Size is an issue for the Indians so rebounding could be a problem, and they will have to limit turnovers.

On Monday, Brimfield got off to a good start against Tremont but the Turks turned it up in the second half and pulled away for a 62-48 victory.

Updyke led Brimfield with 14 points.

• **Farmington** – A youth movement is underway at Farmington, which was 6-25 a year ago and fifth in the Prairieland North.

Coach Donovan Benson has just one returning starter on a roster with only two seniors. Junior wing Lynsey Shriber started last season and will be joined by seniors Laney Pollitt and Sophia Anderson. Pollitt is a post player and Anderson is a guard.

Top newcomers for the Farmers include Avery Blunier, a junior guard, and sophomore guard Sophia Puckett. Three freshmen – Ella Essex at guard and wing players Ashlyn Brewer and Andree Wright – are also expected to be in the mix for Benson.

“We are a young team with only four upperclassmen, but our basketball IQ is as high as it’s ever been,” Benson said. “The freshmen had a lot of success in junior high that I would like to carry on throughout high school. Once we all learn each other’s play styles and start to jell, I think we can be competitive in a lot of games.”

Rebounding and turnovers were a challenge last year, but Benson said

In the rebound victory, Wright had 12 points and Schriber added 11.

“Way better game shooting the ball,” Benson said. “Lynsey Schriber got us going by hitting her first two shots and everybody else got going behind her.”

Farmington (1-3) fell 70-31 to a tall, talented Chillicothe IVC team on Monday.

• **Princeville** – Sahara Streitmatter, a 5-foot-8 junior guard/forward, returns after posting 14.9 points and 6.1 rebounds per game a season ago. Guard Reagan Calder brings back the next-best scoring average at 7.3 ppg and is joined by forward Brie Ehnle as the only two seniors on Princeville’s roster.

Bethany Sennett, Kamryn Smith and 5-8 forward Addison Buckley round out the Princes’ junior class. Sennett averaged 3.9 points and 3.5 rebounds at a guard spot last year, while Buckley pulled down 5 rebounds a game.

Princeville has two sophomore guards – Morgan Cafferty and Laurynn Bowers – and two tall freshman forwards in 5-8 Ella Buckley and 5-9 Abbie Christianson.

So far, Princeville has sandwiched two wins around a loss to Tremont.

Princeville beat Brimfield 47-39 on Nov. 17 and scored a 51-42 win over Wethersfield last Saturday. Calder had 16 points and Streitmatter netted 15 in the win over the Geese at Elmwood’s tournament.

Princeville (2-2) dropped a 40-28 decision to Kewanee on Monday. Calder scored 10 points and Addison Buckley had 11 rebounds.

“We have played two good games and two absolutely horrible games,” Coach John Gross said. “I believe we could have a good season if we get our act together. We need to get tougher mentally and play consistently to reach those goals.

“The ability is there if I can get them to play harder and with more confidence.”

Princeville was scheduled to play at Elmwood on Tuesday in a tournament makeup game that was delayed due to a power outage Saturday.

• **ROWVA-Williamsfield** – Expectations are high for the R-W girls despite posting a 9-22 season a year ago. The Cougars only lost two senior starters and return a wealth of experienced players.

“It was the girls’ first year under a new system and we played a lot of close games, but just couldn’t get over the hump when we needed to,” Coach Jeff Hannam said.

Seniors Ella Rigg and Lauren Johnson, along with junior Emerson Hannam and sophomore Eliza Tucker will all play big roles in R-W’s backcourt.

Senior forward Riley Smith will be relied on as a perimeter shooter, and junior front-court mate Kinley Danner is versatile and will see time at numerous spots on the floor, the coach said.

Senior post players Megyn Erlacher and Ella Erlacher provide a physical presence in the paint. Megyn Erlacher was an all-conference selection in the Lincoln Trail last year and has high expectations this season.

Maddi McGarry, a junior forward, was hurt in R-W’s sectional volleyball game and her return is questionable, according to Jeff Hannam.

“We would like to get out and run this year,” he said. “Our post play is our strength, so we want to get the ball inside as much as possible.”

Rebounding and perimeter shooting are weaknesses heading into the ICAC and LTC.

“Playing in two conferences can be rigorous, but I think we have the depth to handle it,” Hannam said. “I would like to think that we can compete with everyone on our schedule.”

R-W has started 1-1, topping Monmouth United (45-24) and losing to Mercer County (55-21).

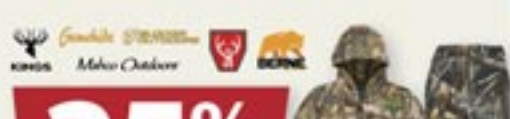
