Stark Co. board appoints Demetreon interim sheriff

TOULON - Chuck Demetreon's tenure as interim sheriff of Stark County got off to a good start Tuesday night.

Not long after the Stark County Board approved Demetreon as interim sheriff, he gave his first official report to the board in his new role.

Demetreon outlined plans to cut overtime, hire a new dispatcher and deputy and acquire two new squad cars in the next

eight to 10 weeks. That prompted a board member to say, "That's the most thorough report we've had all year."

Demetreon, 49, takes over for longtime Stark County Sheriff Steve Sloan, who announced his retirement last month, ending a



48-year career in law enforcement. Demetreon has worked in the Stark County Sheriff's Office since November 2003 and has been chief deputy since 2017.

"It's something I've had in my headlights and aspired to," Demetreon said. "I'm excited to start this. Excited and nervous. But it's something I think I can handle. I've got a lot of support, family, friends and coworkers - a good crew behind me to work with and bounce ideas back and forth."

Reducing overtime is his first challenge. The department racked up over \$300,000 in overtime last year but OT has been cut to about \$100,000 moving forward, Demetreon said.

"I've been thinking about it since Steve approached me, long before his announcement," Demetreon said. "So I started jotting numbers down and knew there were areas I could take care of to cut that down."

Adding a 14th dispatcher to the staff, he said, will help with short shifts that had previously been covered as overtime hours. Demetreon is also cutting deputy

schedules and will use impound fees to outfit the new squad cars.

Prospective Deputy Derek Welge of Kewanee should graduate from the police academy in March, in time to take the spot of Gary Bent, who plans to retire in April. Welge will work full time as a deputy and part time for the Toulon Police Department.

In other business Tuesday, the board heard some details on the new county highway building in Bradford. County Engineer Judd

FEDERAL FUNDS TO FARMERS

Farm Aid on the way

Trump earmarking \$12 billion for farmers By JIM TALAMONTI

The Center Square

President Donald Trump has announced \$11 billion in federal public aid for farmers.

The president made the announcement during a White House roundtable Monday afternoon, along with Cabinet members, federal lawmakers and members of the farming community.

The relief funds are aimed for producers of row crops, with an additional \$1 billion in public funds for specialty crops and others.

Trump said the money would come from the "hundreds of billions of dollars" the U.S. is bringing through tariffs.

"What we're doing is, we're taking a relatively small portion of that and we're going to be giving and

providing it to the farmers in economic assistance," the president said.

U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Brooke Rollins said the relief funds are necessary due to a crisis that the Trump administration inherited.

"We are going to be effectuating

an \$11 billion bridge payment to our farmers. The money will move by Feb. 28, 2026," Rollins said, adding that farmers would know what their payment would look like by the end of December.

"You will have that number in hand," Rollins said, so farmers

Continued from Page 1 Giffin reported that the first quote to remove concrete and install stainlesssteel trench drains in the building was for \$97,000, with \$57,000 in materials alone. Giffin said he had hoped to have drains installed for under \$50,000 and plans to look at other options moving forward.

Work is also progressing to clean the building and two new garage doors have been installed, Giffin said.

Board Member Adam Wilson said he is "pushing on the architect" to have plans for the new building by the board's Jan. 13 meeting. Wilson said his goal is to have building renovations shovel ready by April 1.

In other road-related news, Giffin said snowplowing has gone well so far this winter and the county's new plow truck performed well. "It's a beast," he said, noting the truck has a 12-foot wing plow compared to the previous 8-foot plow.

Painting of stripes has

been done on some roads. Giffin said some roads that have been resurfaced could not be striped since equipment borrowed from Bureau County could only be used on roads that still had faint lines to follow.

Giffin also said that due to a "mess-up" the board would need to reconvene for a special meeting before the New Year to approve a resolution for equipment rental for 2026 so it can be reimbursed by Motor Fuel Tax funds. A meeting date had not been set by press time.

County Treasurer Paula Leezer reported that the final disbursement of property taxes has been sent to taxing bodies and was just over \$17.8 million. In regards to the annual budget, she said the General Fund, State's Attorneys Office and County Clerk's Office were all significantly under budget while the Sheriff's Office was over budget for 2025.

The board also approved 2026 dates for its 6:30 p.m. meetings: Jan. 13, Feb. 10, March 10, April 15, May 12, June 9, July 14, Aug. 11, Sept. 8, Oct. 13, Nov. 10 and Dec.

Finally, Katie McCauley from the Stark County Soil and Water Conservation District distributed a survey to board members seeking input for a natural resources inventory reporting application she is developing.

Minutes from two board meetings in November (Nov. 10 and Nov. 26) were approved and show the following:

- Approval of the Fiscal Year 2026 budget appropriation and tax levy ordinance, showing \$2.67 million in estimate revenues and \$2.825 million in estimated disbursements for an expected deficit of \$155,000.
- · News from Board Member Robin Nowlan that a timeline for the wind-farm project has been moved up for Stark County, which is now in Phase Two, instead of

- Approval of the appointment of Valerie Wagher to the County Board of Appeals.
- The 2026 insurance package was approved with estimated disbursements of \$260,200, up from \$239,000 in 2025.
- · A proposed purchase of E-Ticket software for the Sheriff's Department will not happen.
- Approval of a resolution to correct the levy rate in the county federal aid matching fund request sent to the Illinois Department of Transportation. This required a transfer from the general fund to bring the rate up to the required .045%.
- · Approval was given to: an annual intergovernmental agreement with Marshall and Putnam counties for probation services; a 2026 noxious weed work plan; purchase of a truck for the highway department; a revised food ordinance; and approval to use IDOT grant funds for bridge repairs.

FARM AID: Governor declares ag trade crisis

Continued from Page 1 could make plans for the year ahead.

Joe Maxwell, Farm Action's chief strategy officer and co-founder, said farmers across the country are hurting. Maxwell said the current problems facing the U.S. agriculture system have been decades in the making due to policy that prioritizes commodity crops for export, which he said only benefits global grain traders and meat-

"Without addressing the root causes of this issue, farmers will be left to continue relying on government assistance into the future. That is why Congress must take action and fix our failed subsidy system in the next farm bill," Maxwell added.

Trump's announcement comes weeks after Gov. J.B. Pritzker declared an agricultural trade crisis in Illinois. On Oct. 29,

Pritzker signed an executive order directing state agencies to take immediate action to enhance domestic markets for ag commodities and to bolster mental health support for farm families.

Pritzker and Illinois Department of Agriculture Director Jerry Costello said Illinois' roughly \$26.4 billion agricultural sector had been hurt by Trump's tariffs and trade policies.

Trump said he would be open to tapping into tariff revenue for farmers again if necessary. He also said moves to eliminate the estate tax and end green equipment requirements

would help farmers across the nation.

Illinois Rep. Jonathan Jackson, D-Chicago, said the president is trying to paper over a crisis of his own making.

Illinois Rep. Mike Bost, R-Murphysboro, said the president's announcement is welcome news.

"After years of soaring input costs, unstable markets, and zero new trade deals under the Biden-Harris administration, the Farmer Bridge Assistance Program will provide real, timely relief to producers who have been stretched thin through the years," Bost posted.






NOTICE: CITY OF TOULON SNOW REMOVAL PARKING

The shelter will operate 24/7 and be staffed by trained, certified professionals prepared to meet the needs of survivors at any hour.

Founded in 1983 by Princeton resident Nedda Simon, Freedom House serves Henry, Stark, Bureau, Marshall and Putnam counties. In addition to a shelter in Princeton, the agency provides various free services, including a crisis hotline and medical advocacy, legal advocacy, comprehensive counseling and psychotherapy for those impacted by domestic and sexual violence. Freedom House also offers outreach offices to ensure easy access to support.

According to Chloe Lund, the agency's Chief Operating Officer, Freedom House has served tens of thousands of survivors.

"One in four women and one in seven men will experience severe intimate partner violence in their lifetime," Lund said. "The need for our services continues to grow."

GALVA – The Galva Arts Council is sponsoring its annual Tour of Lights in the Galva area.



ORDINANCE NO. 757 CITY OF TOULON, Stark County, Illinois AN ORDINANCE REGULATING SNOW REMOVAL - PARKING CITY OF TOULON

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is necessary and in the best of the City of Toulon to mend the City's snow removal -parking regulations; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TOULON, STARK COLINTY, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS: SECTION ONE: Section 9-1-19 of the City Code is mended to read as follows

SECTION 9-1-19: SNOW REMOVAL - PARKING (a): After a snowfall of 2 inches or more, and for a eriod of 24 hours after snowfall stops or until City snow removal has been completed on the street in question, it shall be unlawful to allow any motor vehicle, trailer or any obstruction to remain within the City's right-of-way of any street within the City Limits, including the street roadway and area between the street and sidewalk

(b) The City shall have the authority without notice to move any vehicle, trailer or other obstruction, at the wner's cost, which remains within the City's right-of-way in violation of his section.

(c) Any person violating Section 9-1-19(a) shall be fined not less than TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS nor more than ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLARS, addition, each person or owner shall be liable to the City for its costs of towing and removal of the vehicle, trailer, or other obstruction.*

SECTION TWO. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. SECTION THREE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect ten days after its passage and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law. Passed and Approved by the Mayor and the City Council of the City of Toulon, Illinois, this 8th day of February, A.D. 1999.



Rebels home for the holidays

Stark County boys holding five-team Xmas tourney

The Country Roads Classic is intended to take the Stark County boys basketball team home for the holidays.

A first-year tournament, the five-team round robin is to begin Saturday in Toulon. Each team is to play twice Saturday, then twice Dec. 20 in the twoday event.

In addition to showing off the new Stark County gymnasium, which opened last season, the tournament will give the Rebels a chance to breathe a little, according to Coach Kane Mastin. The new event replaces on the Stark County schedule the usual post-Christmas holiday-tournament appearance at Erie.

Many of the Stark County basketball players also were on the school's football team that qualified for the Class 1A state playoffs. That scenario happens more years than it doesn't, which leads to perhaps too busy a schedule, Mastin suggested.

"We're a football school where basketball is not always the top priority," he said. "To get kids excited to play games the day after Christmas is difficult.

"Having the new gym and having the opportunity to maybe do something at home before Christmas, I think it'll be great for rejuvenating the energy with the program, to get the kids five or six days off between Christmas and New Year's and

hit the ground running for conference season."

Mastin said most of his players' families support the plan. Playing in a traditional holiday tournament requires either a long trip – Erie is more than an hour north of Toulon - or a short trip to Princeville, where most of the field consists of teams Stark County plays during the regular season.

The new tourney might already be a success. According to Mastin, sponsors have pledged about \$7,000. Mastin's goal was \$2,500. Part of that is to cover new road uniforms.

"Our travel uniforms now are essentially crepe paper. Very thin," Mastin said about the current, old duds. "It seems like there's no losing in this situation, other than maybe taking a few days off where we might get a little rusty.

"I'm just hoping that it turns into a tradition where the community can really build around. When they think of holiday bas-
