Investors to put Palace up for sale

Theater opened in 1913

ELMWOOD – The oft-heard suggestion to “get ahead of the narrative” makes me smile when it is applied to the realities of a small town. As in, is that really possible?



So if you recently heard that Elmwood’s Palace Theatre is for sale, you heard correct. If you heard Elmwood’s venerable theater is closing, you heard wrong. The narrative is this. Ten years ago, a group of investors banded together to purchase The Palace after it had been closed for a few months. The idea then and now was to

keep the theater open for as long as possible, building on the legacy left by past owners Ed and Vivian Hahn and Vern Reynolds.

Thankfully, another generation can say they experienced the big screen in a historic theater that survived a tornado and dates back to its opening as a vaudeville venue in 1913.

Along the way, our group of investors (in full disclosure, I own two shares) has worked to improve the old brick barn. The bathrooms and concession stand were remodeled. Wiring has been updated. The marquee functions better than ever with LED lights. Mice make fewer visits. Part of the HVAC

Brimfield OKs state loan for new water tank

Awaits final IEPA approval

BRIMFIELD – The Village of Brimfield has done its part to secure a \$1,150,000 loan from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. Now comes the waiting.

The Village Board on Monday approved an ordinance allowing Village President Dan Fishel to sign documents with the IEPA for a loan that would fund the purchase of a new 70,000-gallon water tank. Final word on loan approval and terms is expected from the IEPA after March 1, Fishel said.

“We’re on the path to approval but nothing has been finalized,” Fishel said. “It seems likely. We’ve never gone this far in the process and not got the money.”

Brimfield secured an IEPA loan for \$109,000 in 2022 to replace water mains and to loop

Princeville meeting room getting makeover

PRINCEVILLE – The Princeville Village Board will meet away from home for a while.

Starting with its meeting Feb. 17, the board is to convene at the Lillie M. Evans Library, which is across the street from Village Hall. The meeting room and adjacent areas in that building are receiving their first makeover in almost 30 years, according to Village President Jeff Troutman.

The current meeting room is to be enlarged and new lighting is to be installed. So is a soundproof door, for when the board enters closed sessions. Renovations are expected to take two or three months. Monday night represented the last board meeting at Village Hall until the work is completed.

During that meeting, Trustee Spencer Wilson said he’ll be looking for alternatives to a code-enforcement-software proposal the village has received.

Wilson has been unable to find a mutual time to meet with an up-

state-New York official whose village uses the software provided by Kansas-based CivicPlus. Princeville officials have been seeking reviews from other communities. CivicPlus provides Princeville with municipal-code software.

But Trustee Ron Delbridge raised concerns about the CivicPlus price tag for the code-enforcement software. The firm is to charge \$16,000 initially. Annual renewals would begin at \$9,750 and increase by 5% thereafter.

water lines to prevent dead ends in the system.

Brimfield’s current water tank is about 30 years old, Fishel said, but had a 50-year life expectancy when it was installed. The blue tank has been repaired but Fishel said “it could go at any time.” He said the tank originally had a glass lining that is no longer present.

If the latest loan is approved, Brimfield hopes to acquire the new tank and start construction on the project this summer.

The new tank has an estimated 40-year life and comes with a step-down warranty, holding at a flat rate until a certain milestone and then decreasing by percentages with time.

The village will also be updating its computer software with Locus Technologies to the next version in the system. Staying with its current version would incur higher fees from the provider, and the newer version has everything the village currently has plus cloud access. The board approved \$8,000 to cover the technology and training involved, though the actual cost should be lower.

The 2025 Brimfield Comprehensive Plan written in conjunction with the Tri-County Planning Commission was discussed but was tabled. In question was language on page 78 titled “Plan Implementation.” Current wording of the first paragraph states, “Brimfield will advance the Objectives and Key Results identified in the comprehensive plan, share annual progress reports, and actively seek funding that supports plan implementation.”

“I don’t want to be bound to that legal statement if someone were to bring us to court,” Fishel said.

“I’m thinking we need to say, ‘The Village of Brimfield board will, as time and finances allow, move towards completing these objectives’ or something like that.”

Fishel suggested that Village Attorney Rick Johnson could reword the section in question and then board approval could come as early as the March meeting.

“It’s a plan, not a commitment,” Fishel said. “We will make every effort, but finances and unforeseen circumstances could prevent implementation of everything. I would be more comfortable with a cover sheet eliminating legal liability to this 20-year plan.”

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

system is new. The basement has been cleaned. The list goes on.

But making a go as a movie theater is getting harder and harder, particularly for a small-town group with just one screen. We have no economies of scale with our lone theater and incur extra costs because of our unique corporate structure.

The nation’s change in movie-watching habits since Covid is also a huge factor. More and more, people stay home and watch on the small screen, instead of enjoying delicious popcorn and experiencing the big screen. My kids are even content to view movies on their phones. While that makes no sense to me, it’s a hard trend to fight.

The Hollywood mafia hasn’t helped either. There are fewer and fewer compelling movies to choose from each week.

Faced with those realities, shareholders gathered for our annual meeting last Saturday to make a hard decision. Understand, none of the investors have made money on their shares. To the contrary, actually. In 2024, some even contributed extra money to a capital drive to ease us through a tight financial spot. Others have donated their labor and their time.

Deciding what to do next was not easy, but the vote Saturday was 471-168 in favor of selling. There was no applause after the ballots were tallied. Just a sad reality.

The theater’s board of directors has tried various special promotions over the past decade with mostly limited

success.

Last year’s special showing of the locally filmed indie movie “Wardcliffe” ranks among my personal highlights, as do showings of “The Revenant” and “Jaws” – among the many memorable movies that need the big screen for full effect.

Mostly, though, it has been very gratifying to see cars lining Main Street after normal business hours and people walking out of The Palace laughing, talking and smiling. The downtown is more alive thanks in part to the theater.

That’s why the last thing investors want is to see another business go dark in Elmwood. As is true for all small towns, businesses here struggle to stay afloat. Closings in recent years include the pharmacy, dentist office, grocery store, chiropractor and a once-popular restaurant.

Bright spots are fewer, though a new coffee shop and arts center and

some new restaurants have emerged to keep hope alive. Still, there’s a net loss that worries civic-minded folks.

Our hope is to find a buyer to keep the theater going for another decade. Maybe someone with a chain of theaters can cut enough costs to make showing movies work. Maybe Hollywood will start making better movies. Perhaps there’s a motivated movie buff who has always wanted to own a theater. Or maybe someone has a different idea for how best to use the theater’s large space and numerous seats.

In any case, investors have pledged to keep the doors open as long as we can. We may tweak our hours and prices in the weeks and months ahead, but the plan is to continue showing as many first-run movies as possible. Your continued support will help extend that timeline, just as it has for the past decade.

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More HVAC upgrades for Farmington center

FARMINGTON – Heating and cooling should be improved in the near future at the Farmington Community Center after Monday’s meeting of the City Council.

The council approved hiring Roy Keith Electric Company to install three new fans on the west side of the gym to circulate warm air down to the floor. The \$4,295 project will be paid for with funds from Farmington’s Tax Increment Financing district.

Currently there are only three fans on the gym’s east side.

“The more heat we can push down the better,” Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam said.

The council also approved paying \$4,410 in TIF funds to RKE to run additional power lines for new HVAC units being installed on the roof of the community center. Power lines were placed underground and will not be impacted by

pending demolition of the old junior high that sits between the community center and city building.

At its Jan. 19 meeting, the council had approved plans to install three new HVAC units. Covenant Heating & Cooling of Pekin is doing the work for \$47,000.

Alderman Dave Rose said the project also includes installing three thermostats in the gymnasium so that space can be divided into three separate zones.

Rose said the foyer will have its own heating system, as will locker-rooms and the dance room and concession area. Previously, the only thermostat for the center was located in the foyer.

“When you closed the doors, it had no idea what the temperature was (in the gym),” Rose explained.

Rose said he hopes the improvements will greatly lower heating bills, maybe even to the point of paying for the projects over the life of the system.

Rose also took part in a meeting with contractors about demolition of the junior high in preparation for an upcoming bid opening.

In other business, the council reapproved a CEDC recommendation to pay Smashing Assets \$2,500 for tree removal and fence repair. The project had been previously approved last fiscal year but contractor delays slowed its completion.

Police Chief Chris Darsham reported that ordinance work is ongoing, including notifying Dollar General management that its fence is down again.

Darsham said Farmington’s new squad car is being striped and having equipment installed and should be on the road by the end of this month. He said officers Andy Steck and Cody Rice will again coach the Farmington High School trapshooting team. Rice is also now the department’s third state-certified trainer, meaning more instruction can be done in house.

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Changes coming for mail-in election ballots

Elections are coming. Contracts are being signed. Major projects are under-way. Here's what your governmental representatives are doing.

Peoria County Board
The Peoria County Board met Dec. 11 with all members present except Eden Blair, Brandy Bryant and Paul Rosenbohm. The board approved an amendment addressing a litigated point concerning building permits. The change clarifies that the county cannot limit the number of building permits and send such requests to the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Highlights of the unanimously approved consent agenda include:

- Two PCAPS donations for \$2,000 and \$2,500, and a \$250,000 bequest from Dr. Michael Ihlenfeldt for capital projects.
- A \$12,000 Illinois Arts Council Creative Projects grant for the Juvenile Detention Center.
- Road and culvert projects on Mossville, Truitt and Akron Roads.
- Agreements with Tyler Technologies for a cloud solution for improved cybersecurity, disaster recovery and Americans with Disabilities Act compliance for the County

Clerk's Recorder of Deeds software and a CloudGavel warrant system that will be shared with the City of Peoria, which will cover 50% of the three-year contract cost.

- \$1,457,150 annual premium for 2026 Risk Management excess insurance.
- An agreement with Beck Oil Company to improve Kickapoo Edwards Road and Civil Defense Road for access to a proposed gas station and truck stop.
- A \$43,990 three-year lease agreement with Richard E. Shane to farm 132.5 acres of county owned farmland.

Peoria County Election Commission
All Commissioners were present at the Jan. 13 monthly meeting.

Federal Companies was awarded the contract to deliver and return voting equipment for both the primary and general elections in 2026.

Executive Director Elizabeth Gannon was creating primary ballots, slated to be done by the Jan. 28 public test.

Election-judge training started Feb. 2, both on-line and in person. Overseas mailing started Jan. 30; Early voting and vote-by-mail begin Feb. 5.

Those who vote by mail need to be made aware of

changes made by the Post Office that will affect when envelopes are date-stamped. Votes can no longer be dropped in a mailbox on election day and be date stamped that day.

An insert is being planned to outline various options: mailing several days early, going into a post office to have a clerk hand-stamp the ballot or using a drop box.

Mail-in voters can sign up for Ballot Trax to follow their ballot and receive a reminder if they haven't sent it in yet.

The primary will be held on March 17. There will be two advisory referenda, one for Peoria Heights and one for Peoria Township.

Metropolitan Airport Authority of Peoria
The meeting was called to order on Dec. 15 with eight of nine commissioners present. Absent was Karen Jensen.

Board approved the Nov. 17 minutes.

Director of Airports Gene Olson reported that the November passenger record of 62,474 moved the yearly record to over 700,000 – passing the previous record set in 2019.

Work at the terminal entrance is completed. There is illegal parking by some customs employees; tickets are authorized. Parking had to be rented at Thanksgiving.

The board approved two change orders for construction of the control tower and a three-month hangar lease at Mt. Hawley.

Randy Hurst, director of operations and maintenance, noted the work required to clear the runways of wet, heavy snow. At one point, one of the runways was closed.

Steve Perrone, director of finance and administration, discussed November financial statements, which were approved along with vouchers payable and the tax-levy ordinance

Also, fabric has failed on some of the waiting room chairs and a claim against the warranty is being investigated.

“That’s a lot of money for a town our size,” Delbridge said.

Some other communities that use the software are significantly more populated than Princeville, which has about 1,700 residents.

“It’s a great software program,” Wilson said. “Maybe there’s other stuff out there that’s not as grand-scaled as this.”

The board tabled discussion re-

garding possible village acquisition of two vacant parcels of land in the 100 block of N. Walnut Ave. Troutman said he was awaiting clarification regarding whether the properties are available.

A fire in June 2019 destroyed a two-story building on those lots. The building housed Los Jimadores restaurant on its first floor, apartments on its second.

Troutman suggested the village

buy the land, if it’s affordable, to better market it to potential developers. When the board met Jan. 20, Troutman indicated the current owner might be delinquent in paying property taxes.

An item tabled during that meeting was approved Monday – the 2024-25 village financial and audit report.

Pritzker reaffirms goal to fully fund pensions

Gov. JB Pritzker is continuing to push a plan he introduced two years ago to reform Illinois pensions.


The governor announced Monday he is reviving a plan introduced during his 2024 budget address that calls for fully funding pensions by 2048 and changing benefits calculations to comply with Social Security requirements.

The General Assembly has not moved forward on Pritzker’s reform plans.

The hallmark of the plan calls for fully funding pensions by 2048, rather than reaching 90% funding by 2045 like current state law calls for.

The governor also wants surpluses in the state fund dedicated to paying out tax refunds to go to the pension systems.

Surpluses in that fund after tax season otherwise go to general fund operations under current law.

Passenger numbers at all-time high at airport

PEORIA – General Wayne A. Downing Peoria International Airport has officially entered a new era, closing out the most successful year in its history and reaffirming its role as a critical economic and transportation asset for central Illinois.

Finalized passenger numbers confirm December 2025 set a monthly record with 70,672 passengers, helping propel PIA to an all-time annual high of 812,396 total passengers. That figure represents an 18.15% increase over 2024 and surpasses the airport’s previous pre-pandemic record set in 2019 by nearly 18%.

In total, PIA set passenger records in 15 of the past 17 months.

Looking ahead, the airport is planning for continued growth.

As Phase 1 of the air-traffic control tower project nears completion, Phase 2 is scheduled to begin in May, representing a \$25.5 million local investment. Additionally, Taxiway Alpha rehabilitation is slated to begin this spring at an estimated cost of

\$9.3 million. To address increased passenger demand, plans are also underway for a new parking facility along Dirksen Parkway, easing current constraints and allowing for future expansion.



