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Farm to table? Not in Illinois

More infrastructure needed for crops

CHICAGO — Inside a factory on Chicago’s North Side, the smell of simmering soybeans drifts through the air. On a typical day, “I use about 4,000 pounds of dry beans,” Jenny Yang said. She and her team grind, cook and press thousands of pounds of soybeans into silky tofu and rich soy milk – the taste of home for Yang and for many who grew up with tofu on the table.

“She still makes it the same way – no preservatives, made mostly by hand,” said Bob Lum, a longtime friend of Yang who helps with the business. Her company, Phoenix Bean, has been making tofu and soy milk this way since she bought it in 2006. It is one of the few businesses in the state that uses Illinois food-grade, non-GMO, or non-genetically modified organism, soybeans, sourced directly from local farms like Janie’s Mill in Ashkum.

“I know them since back in the day, like at least 10, 15 years,” Yang said. “This is a good, very good partnership.”

Illinois grows more soybeans than any other state, harvesting more than 639 million bushels in 2025, well ahead of Iowa’s 595 million bushels and Minnesota’s

Well-versed in faith

SC sisters champion their religion

Some athletes have been heard to say running is their religion.

Not the Smith sisters of Bradford. For Dusti and Cheyenh Smith, religion is the reason they run. That’s obvious on their hands every time the sisters take to the track. Before each meet, they write Bible verses on the back of their hands.

“People ask about the verses,” Cheyenh said. “They are always interested.”

Last week’s hand scripture for Dusti at the Class 1A girls state meet included parts of Proverbs 3:5-6 and

the following from Isaiah 40:31.

“Those who wait for the Lord will renew their strength. They shall mount up on wings like eagles, they shall run and not grow

weary, they shall walk and not faint.”

The running part of that familiar verse obviously fits well with the lives of the Smith sisters, who helped Stark County win a state championship in the 4x800-meter relay last Saturday and who have amassed 10 state track medals between them in the past four years.

For both girls, religion is never far from conversations about their success.

“I’m a Christian and run-

Bradford board OKs personnel, coming or going

BRADFORD – The Bradford School Board approved a variety of personnel matters at its May 26 meeting.

After closed session, the board approved hiring Caroline Piase as a 5th-grade teacher and approved contract extensions for IT Director Ryan Switzer, District Secretary/Bookkeeper Kristen Atchley and District Nurse/Elementary Secretary Megan Streitmatter.

Resignations accepted were from Morgan Coleman, assistant girls volleyball and basketball coach; Tara Blundy, library assistant; Maggie Suddeth, 1st-grade teacher; and Paul Barry, transportation manager, who will step down with 33 years of experience after the 2026-27 school year.

The board approved a preliminary amended budget with plans to hold a hearing in June and pass the amended budget.

The board also OK’d:

- A new health insurance plan that includes a 12% cost increase.
- Various Illinois School Board Association PRESS policy updates.
- Retaining Gorenz & Associates as district auditor for no more than \$22,670.
- IESA registration for Fiscal Year 2027.
- The 2025-26 school calendar.
- Bids for milk from Prairie Farms, bread and fuel, with prices very similar to what was paid last school year.

Superintendent Chad Gripp reported that registration will be Aug. 3 from 2-6 p.m. and Aug. 4 from 9 a.m. to noon. The first day of school for 2026-27 will be Aug. 19 for students, with teachers attending Teachers Institute on Aug. 17-18.

got the baton, Dusti steadily closed the distance and, coming off the final turn, sprinted to first after a sizzling split of 2:10.44 that would have won the open 800 in Class 1A and 2A.

"I've always dreamed of watching her come down that stretch in first place and feeling like, 'Thank you Lord for this moment,'" Cheyenh

said.

Cheyenh did her part in the relay, as well, running a 2:18.62 that staked Stark County to an early lead.

After three years of running together, the sisters admit that participating in a final state meet together is bittersweet. A senior, Cheyenh plans to attend Liberty University in Lynchburg, Va., next fall. Dusti is a

junior and will be a highly touted runner next prep cross country and track season. Both sisters attend Bethany Baptist Church in Peoria.

SOY: State relies on imports for its soy food

371 million bushels. Lawmakers designated the soybean as the official State Bean in 2025, effective Jan. 1, 2026, with Sen. Doris Turner, D-Springfield, who chairs the Senate Agriculture Committee, calling Decatur the "soybean capital of the world."

But almost none of those millions of bushels end up

as food on Illinois plates.

According to the Illinois Soybean Association, 60% of soybeans grown in the state are exported; most of the remaining 40% are processed as animal feed, leaving the state reliant on imports for its soy food.

"Ninety-five percent of food consumed in the state of Illinois is imported," said Rep. Sonya Harper,

D-Chicago, chair of the House Agriculture and Conservation Committee, speaking of Illinois food crops. "If there were any type of natural disaster, Illinois only has enough food that will last us for three days."

In 2025, with a trade war freezing exports to China - one of the biggest buyers of Illinois soybeans - Gov. JB Pritzker declared an "Agricultural Export Crisis" on Oct. 29 and directed state agencies to enhance domestic markets. For farmers and food producers, the pressure has made the need for local infrastructure more urgent than ever, raising the question of whether more of Illinois' own crops can finally start feeding more Illinoisans.

Harper said more effort and massive investment are needed. She sponsored the Local Food Infrastruc-

ture Grant program, which provides local farmers with small grants for processing, storage and distribution.

"We have some of the best soil, the best farmland," Harper said. "No matter where you are, urban, suburban and rural - we need to be producing more food in the state."

She described local food production as a win-win that will help create jobs and generate revenue.

For Illinois farmers, the math is brutal. Food-grade soybeans require older genetics that yield 10 to 15 fewer bushels per acre. Jeff O'Connor, a northern Illinois farmer who has grown food-grade soybeans, said his commodity soybeans averaged in the low 70s bushels per acre last year. His food-grade soybeans, which use varieties more than a decade old, yielded in the low 60s.

Weed control is another issue. Unlike commodity soy, which allows for certain herbicides, food-grade soybeans are non-GMOs, so farmers can't use any of those chemicals. And fields often look unkept.

"You can't do that again," one landowner told O'Connor after a season of raising food-grade soybeans. "I don't care if we made a little more money. They looked terrible."

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Village of Bradford Residents,

To make sure every resident is aware of changes, we are writing to inform you of an increase that will affect your water bill in the coming months. For the last several years, the cost of running the water and sewer facilities has continued to increase. The Village Board has investigated and discussed alternative solutions to keep the cost to citizens down. Bradford has attempted to apply for Grant Funding to help our area, the board was told by USDA Rural Development that we cannot apply as we do not meet the criteria. Bradford was told we do not charge enough on water and sewer to maintain upkeep of the repairs. Until we increase our rates, Bradford will not qualify. Unfortunately, this problem has come to a head.

To give residents a glimpse into this decision, we have compiled a few items that we acquire regular increases on. Ameren costs alone have increased by approximately 41% on average from 2023 to 2026. This overall rise is driven by two main factors: rising "supply" prices (market cost for electricity) and periodic "delivery" rate hikes (regulated fees for grid maintenance). Yearly cost of municipality maintenance has increased as well. Wastewater / Sewer costs for some municipalities have increased 25% in 2026 alone, following the 40% increase in prior years to fund required upgrades set by the EPA.

In early 2025 the village experienced an extremely heavy burden. Membranes for the water treatment facility needed to be replaced immediately. These are basically "filters" inside the vessels that the water flows through. Wyoming just had the same issue in July of 2025. The cost of the membrane is around \$75,000. Then, if not installed and pressurized correctly, the membrane can blow out and will need to be replaced again.

In Bradford's case, we were fortunate enough to have our own City Maintenance Manager who is educated in this matter and saved Bradford substantial funds. Bradford replaced the membranes for \$39,480.34.

The increase in the water and sewer bill was not a decision that was made lightly. Several conversations trying to establish alternative actions have been discussed. The increase affects all residents in Bradford. We do understand the constraint that this can put with individuals in low-income households. Copies of funding assistance can be found in the front lobby of the Village Hall if needed. We encourage residents to call these resources if needed.

It was discussed by the board to raise the cost of water and sewer during the February Committee Meeting. Voting on the increase was determined at the April Board Meeting. The rate for water will increase from \$45.50 to \$50.50 and the rate for sewer will increase from \$35.50 to \$40.50 so the total bill will be \$110.00. This is an increase of \$10.00 per month and this will take effect on the bill issued in July.

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Preemptive water tests advised near CO₂ sites

To the Editor:

As a retired U.S. Marine Corps judge advocate, member of the bar of the Supreme Court of the United States and State Bar of Texas and owner of a Knox County farm that was once threatened with the use of eminent domain by a CO₂ pipeline company, controversy surrounding the contemplated Lapis Project Big River carbon capture and sequestration project at Galva caught my eye.

It immediately made me think of the potential for toxic-tort litigation in the event of a carbon-dioxide leak or underground migration of carbon dioxide from the sequestration site.

Although industry platitudes might lead the public to think CCS is safe, the CO₂ pipeline rupture that sent nearly 50 people to the hospital, and forced the evacuation of nearly 300, near Sartoria, Miss., in 2020 suggests otherwise.

While proving that one's family or animals were killed or injured by CO₂ leaking into the atmosphere would be relatively straightforward, proving one's domestic water supply was contaminated by sub-surface CO₂ migrating from a pipeline rupture or underground sequestration site could be problematic. Without baseline data to show the condition of a plaintiff's water prior to con-



struction of a CCS project, a defendant might persuasively argue to a judge or jury that there is no proof a plaintiff's water is in any worse condition after a leak than it was before.

Hence, although I'm not an Illinois lawyer, I'll go out on a limb and suggest that any resident, landowner or governmental entity near a proposed CO₂ pipeline or CO₂ sequestration site consider having their water tested prior to construction. This may not be as hard as one might think.

A Google search using the term "water testing Henry County Illinois" produced six pages of information, including the fact that water test kits and advice can be obtained directly from the Henry & Stark County Health Department.

The search results also indicate that in-depth analysis of water samples is available through the use of Illinois-certified commercial laboratories, and provided contact information for testing facilities in Peoria, Peru and Springfield.

If you want to dig deeper, consider contacting the Illinois State Bar Association, or a law firm that handles toxic-tort litigation, for additional suggestions and information. The potential for high-dollar judgments against CCS toxic tort defendants – especially in cases involving mass casualty incidents – should make helping potential plaintiffs prepare the groundwork for such lawsuits attractive to the legal profession.

The bottom line is that if you think you may someday need to sue a CCS company for contaminating your water, get your water tested now. Take it from a retired Marine: the time to prepare the battlefield is before the war begins, not after.

Source of Drinking Water

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:
- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPAs

Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-4791.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population.

Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The drinking water supplier is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components in your home. You share the responsibility for protecting yourself and your family from the lead in your home plumbing. You can take responsibility by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk.

Before drinking tap water, flush your pipes for several minutes by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. You can also use a filter certified by an American National Standard Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead in drinking water. Source of Water: GALVA To determine Galva's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, information obtained during a Well Site Survey performed by the Illinois Rural Water Association on May 18, 1999 was reviewed. Based on this information, 14 potential sources of contamination were identified within proximity of this water supply's wells. The Illinois EPA does not consider the source water susceptible to contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and the available hydrogeologic data on the wells. In anticipation of the U.S. EPA's proposed Ground Water Rule, the Illinois EPA has determined that this water supply is not vulnerable to viral contamination. This determination is based upon the completed evaluation of the following criteria during the Vulnerability Waiver Process: the wells are properly constructed with sound integrity and proper site conditions; a hydrogeologic barrier exists that should prevent pathogen movement; all potential routes and sanitary defects have been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a history of disease outbreak; and a sanitary survey of the water supply did not indicate a viral contamination threat. Because the wells are constructed in a confined aquifer, which should minimize the movement of pathogens into the wells, well hydraulics were not considered to be a significant factor in the vulnerability determination. Hence, well hydraulics were not evaluated for this groundwater supply.

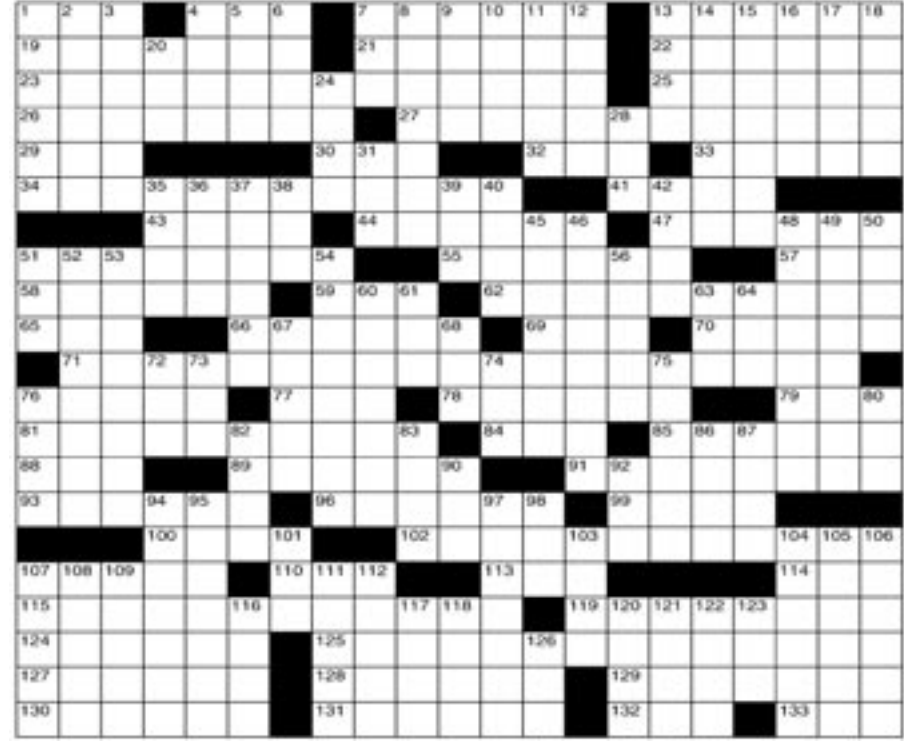

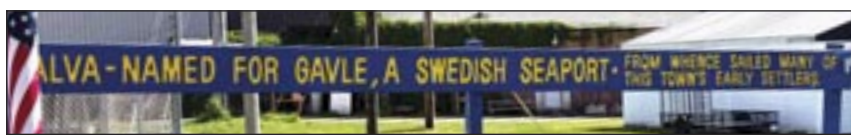
Galva's June 1 council meeting moved to H.S.

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Pulling the trigger on gun law?

SPRINGFIELD — Illinois lawmakers are considering legislation that a major gun-rights organization says would effectively ban one of the nation's most popular types of firearms.

The House Gun Violence Prevention Committee voted 9-5 along party lines last week to pass House Bill 4471, which seeks to ban the sale of any semiautomatic pistol with a cruciform trigger bar in Illinois. Supporters say that design can be altered to install an already illegal switch, ultimately turning the pistol into a machine gun.

John Weber, Illinois' director of the National Rifle Association, said banning that design would ban Glocks from being sold in Illinois. However, it would not apply to people who currently own that type of gun.

Bill sponsor Rep. Justin Slaughter, D-Orland Park, called the bill a consumer-product safety measure that

continues to support smart, sensible gun ownership.

Slaughter said consumers still have other pistols to choose from that do not use the same firing mechanism design as Glock, such as Henry County-based Springfield Armory.

Advocates said the goal is to put pressure on Glock to change their design to make it impossible for

their guns to be modified with a switch. Lawmakers in California banned the sale of guns with the design beginning July 1.

"The Responsible Gun Manufacturing Act will go to the root cause of the source by holding the gun industry accountable," said Kathleen Sances, president of the Gun Violence Prevention PAC.

Knobloch wins 2 sectional races

ALEDO – Last year’s Class 1A sectional track meet was one to forget for Evan Knobloch. This year’s was one to cherish.

While winning both the 1,600-meter and 3,200 races, the Stark County sophomore set two school records on May 20 at Mercer County High School. Knobloch followed his 3,200 time of 9:32.76 with a clocking of 4:28.28 in the mile.

As he headed to state at Eastern Illinois University in Charleston for Thursday’s prelims, Knobloch was seeded first in Class 1A for both races.

“He had not had a double like that all year,” Coach Clint Terwilliger said. “I wasn’t sure what he was going to have left in the tank after that record 3,200, but he followed it up with a record mile.”

Knobloch ran third in the 3,200 in sectionals last year but did not finish the 1,600. He was not fully recovered in time for the state meet and placed 26th in the 3,200 in 10:30.24.

“He is peaking at just the right time,” Terwilliger said. “I look for him to show even better down there.”

pass her.”

That set up Smith’s thrilling finish, which started with her 30 meters off the lead.

“As a seasoned runner, you could tell she knew exactly how she needed to attack that,” Coach Clint Terwilliger said. “She just kept herself close and kept eating away at it. When she came around that last curve and into lanes two and three, I knew it was over.

“I’ve seen that again and again this year, when she comes out you can tell she’s feeling it and, sure enough, she turns it on. She just has better footspeed than a vast majority of the girls out there.”

Even so, the speed of the finish was impressive. Dusti’s split was 2:10.44, her fastest by seven seconds and a time that – had she run it in the open 800 – would have won both the Class 1A and 2A titles.

“The fact every one of them ran their best race at the same time in the finals was just amazing,” said Terwilliger, handing most of the credit to assistant Bob Rennick Jr., who coaches the distance runners. “Come to find out, we needed every bit of it.”

Second-place Winnebago ran 9:27.26 and third-place Shelbyville was clocked in 9:28.55. Terwilliger



said a look through records dating back to 2017 shows just three other relays in the 9:20s outside this year’s trio.

“Everybody was so fast this year,” he said.

But nobody was faster than Stark County.

“Everyone did their part. It was exactly what we needed them to do,” Dusti Smith said.

Added Cheyenh Smith, whose 4x800 medal was her fourth in high school and sixth overall, “It’s been an amazing four years. Just growing together with such a special group of teammates and coaches has been really special.”

The only downside to the adrenaline of a state championship may have been felt in individual races later on last Saturday.

Cheyenh Smith placed sixth in the 800 with a time of 2:16.79 – well back of Jacksonville Routt sophomore Millie Schumacher who won in

2:13.86.

Cheyenh Smith had posted a personal-best time of 2:16.72 and battled within .41 seconds of Schumacher in prelims on May 21.

“I was hoping for higher than that, would have hoped for top three,” Cheyenh Smith said. “I was feeling pretty tired during the 800, which is strange because I don’t usually feel like that coming off 4x800 and I had more time than usual.

“I think it was just after the adrenaline from that 4x800 and then coming back down, it was hard to run another race.”

Dusti Smith echoed her sister’s comments after placing seventh in the 1,600 in 5:04.7, well off her PR of 5:00.37 at Distance Night in Palatine. Klaire Eighner of team champion Maroa-Forsyth won the mile in 4:56.75 and also won the 3,200 in 10:17.66.

“It definitely wasn’t my best race. I was still tired from the 4x800 and I was OK with that,” Dusti Smith said. “The opportunity we had in the 4x8 is something that likely won’t be repeated. It was everything we had been hoping for.”

The same quartet that ran the 4x800 relay also qualified in the 4x400 relay but did not advance out of prelims after placing 16th on May 21 in a time of 4:12.98.

sectional, Ridgewood second. Each of the Rebels’ four games preceding the sectional semifinal were decided by one run.

Indeed. Stark County again squandered an early lead, this one 3-0 after three innings. But the Rebels erased a three-run deficit in the seventh to

force extra innings. Newton drove in three runs overall, and Cambri Holmstrom drove in two.

Regardless of how this season finishes, Wise appeared satisfied with how her senior-less team has played, particularly in May. Headed into the sectional, the Rebels were 9-1 this month.

“They’ve really grown a lot as a team,” Wise said. “They’ve played together since junior high, and they’re all such good friends. That chemistry is what contributes to their success.

“It’s a super-great feeling to know I’m going to have every single one of them back (next season) and got freshman coming in who will be an asset as well.”

Lady Rebels 4x800 wins state title

All four runners post fastest splits, paced by Dusti Smith's sizzling 2:10

CHARLESTON – Running third as she entered the final turn in the 4x800-meter relay, an idea occurred to Dusti Smith.

“The thought went through my head that this was the chance I was waiting for,” the Stark County junior said. “All the sudden, I realized we had the chance to win and I was so excited and it gave me this burst of energy. And I gave it everything I had in the last 100 meters.”

And with that sizzling finish that saw Smith win easily in a split of 2:10.44, the Lady Rebels relay capped four years of steady improvement on the iconic blue track of Eastern Illinois University with a Class 1A state championship. The medal was the fourth straight for a relay that was ninth in 2023, seventh in 2024 and fourth last year.

Making the final move up to win a title took an almost perfect race in which all four runners posted their fastest splits of the year for an overall time of 9:24.77 – nearly 23 seconds faster than last year's time of 9:47.19.

Senior Cheyenh Smith got Stark County an early lead with her split of

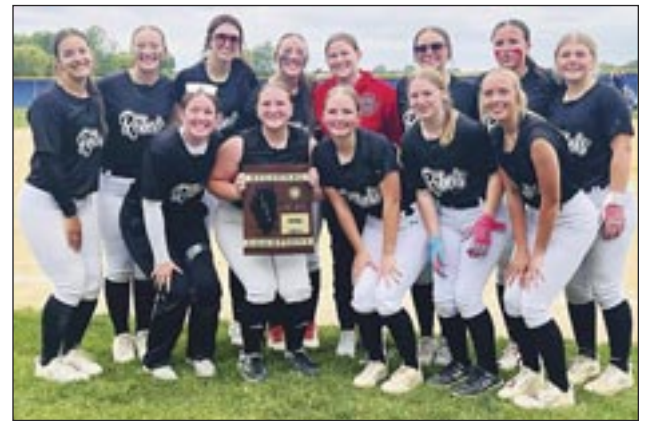

2:18.62 and then handed to freshman Norah Rorem, who lost a spot but stayed in sight of the leader from Winnebago after a 2:26.58. From there, senior Paytin Terwilliger slipped back one spot behind a runner from Shelbyville but kept things close by posting her fastest time (by three seconds) of 2:29.13.

“Paytin kept us in a really good spot, but I was nervous how far Winnebago got ahead,” Dusti Smith said. “I just tried to focus on (second-place) Shelbyville because I knew their anchor can run a really good 800 and I knew she could pull me to a good position and I could try to
